### INDUCTION CEREMONY HUGE SUCCESS

The 8th annual Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame Induction Ceremony held November 16th was a huge success, with a sold out house at the Future Inns & Conference Hotel and over one hundred attending the Sunday morning Brunch at the Hall in Petitcodiac, where they reminisced and toured the Museum with its several new displays.

The Induction on Saturday brought in ten new inductees to bring the total to 83 that have been inducted since 2006.

Three were inducted for their contribution to the Motorcycle field of motor sports.

Roy Blakney - Motorcycle Competitor, Rider/Restoration/Specialties - residing in Denver, Colorado (USA) He grew-up in Goshen, Albert County, NB. His contribution as businessman, official, promoter, sponsor, media and clubs in motor sports has been local, national and international.

1951 to 1966 the list of 1st and 2nd finishing is amazing. Roy's aggressive riding won him Maritime Championships.

In 1952 he was instrumental in designing "The Ranch", a track and playground in Petitcodiac (NB). Besides Canada he has

competed in the U.S., Australia, and New Zealand. At 82, he is still an avid cycle rider. In 1961 Roy placed 12th at Daytona at the new speedway.

Joseph Bolger - Motorcycle Competitor, Creator - Born in Charlottetown, P.E.,



moved to Barre, MA., USA

To mention a few of his awards on his racing resume: the 1959 Canadian National Motocross Champion, 250 Expert Class, a five-time sportsman rider of the year, a five-time winner on the Eastern USA Motocross

Championship series, undefeated winner in 1965 Eastern USA v Canada International MX Series where he also won numerous races between 1962 and 1970. He was instrumental in establishing international off-road racing events in the 1960s when he also contributed to Cycle Sport magazine as

an editor - a position he also filled for Cycle World (California). He raced 'Scrambles' and invented many parts and tools for bikes, some of which are patented by 'Joe Bolger Products'.

In 2004 Joe Bolger was inducted into the

American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) Hall Of Fame.

Scott Livingston - Motocross/ Stock Car, Competitor - Charlottetown, PE

Scott's interest in all things mechanical started at a very early age. He began racing in motocross competition, he has raced on ice, and he has raced stock cars. At just 17 years of age he opened 'Scott's Cycle'. He is a certified motorcycle mechanic and a registered instructor in the Canada Safety Council's Motorcycle Training Program. In the 1980s he became active in the family welding shop. He builds cars for himself and for others. In 1986 Scott's stockcar-racing career began. He raced MASCAR Tour and Pro Stock Tour.

Raced the Halifax Moosehead Grand Prix in 1992 & '93. Scott was licensed to compete with the ACT Tour.

He retired from driving in 2010 after a racing injury but continues to influence employees and former pit crew members, tow that have gone on to become team members on the NASCAR Sprint Cup Series. He serves as the Prince Edward Island Vice President for the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame.

feature winner on the MASCAR Tour. In 1991 he competed in the NASCAR Busch North Series at New Hampshire Motor Speedway. Besides MASCAR and Busch North, his stock car resume includes super late model ACT and super modified divisions. He took a break from racing between 1995 and 2006 to grow his auto repair shop in the Newfoundland Targa Road Race, and in 2010 he made a return appearance in that event where his was the only penalty-free team after three days of racing.

Jack Way (1941-2012) - Drag Racing/Stock Car - Dartmouth, NS Jack started his racing career in 1957 as a drag racer where he competed at Matiland, Drag City, Coyuga and in Niagara Falls where he won a King of the Hill event. Drag Racing associates were such names as Junior Hanley, Len Currie, Terry Clattenburg, John Howard, Kevin Burns, Gary Lovely and Carl Crisp. In 1968 he got into racing stockcars in the Mini-Bouté class at Halifax-Dartmouth International Speedway. He competed at Coyuga and Beech Ridge. His lifelong love for automobiles extended to his professional life where he sold cars, and at the age of 19 had his own Studebaker dealership in Dalhousie. He had several close friendships with the Scots and Ontario racing community. He was an export business. In 1980 he was invited to join a handful of dealers on Chrysler Canada's Advisory Board where he worked with Lee Iacocca to help revolved industry problems.

He is a multi-time winner and champion with notable accomplishments including the 1968 Atlantic Sports Car Club title; in 1969 and 70 won the CASCAR Atlantic Region driving skills championship, the 1970 Ice Drive in Dartmouth - where he is undefeated winning five events in seven years. In 1971 as manager, he won an endurance race with a team of four - one of his proudest moments in motor sports. He has operated driving schools, as a past director of the Atlantic Sports Car Club, and an honorary founding member of the Atlantic Sports Car Club.

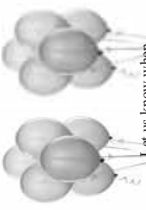

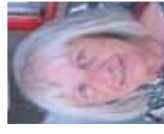

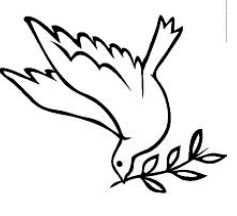

It is amazing how everyday people can do such extraordinary things. You will see that as you read this month's story about Claude and Elsie Bamister.



Claude was born in 1936 in the house next door to his home. The original homestead that his grandfather built burnt down; he said that his sister Maude painted a picture of that house. He went to school at the old Pollack River School which is now a stone house now. After grade 6 he attended Technical School and took carpentry. He then went to work for Lockhart's. While working there he used to go stand on Main St. at noon hour, there Claude would see Elsie Snyes and Marjorie Horseman walking the street. He said Marjorie was one of those girls that was a beautiful woman since she was 12 years of age and he knew he couldn't have her so he set his heart on Elsie, who was also a beautiful redhead. As the two of them strutted down the street, Elsie's great long manglets flopped in the air, he decided to cross the road and ask her out; doing so he almost got run over. Now Elsie says a bunch of the girls walked the street for exercise. When Claude asked her out she told him that she was going home for the weekend thinking that it was alright to tell him because he'd never find her; but he was to get back at Claude's, long as there was a cat in the yard she felt safe, so

but now she lived during the week with her grandmother and worked at Lounsbury's. Claude had an old car and it shimmied and shook, his way out there, he didn't think it would make it but it did. They started dating in 1956 and they were married in 1958.

Claude worked a time for Carter's Furniture, and then he ran the Irving garage. Later he tried his own business doing Carpentry and repair but there were so many regulations and government audits that he found that too much so he went to work for Lee Lane - Allied Furniture as a long haul trucker. This left Elsie alone, but she worked for The Department of Transport. After eight years she became pregnant and gave birth to their only son, Darren.

Then Claude got the worst job in Canada, a guard at Westmorland County Jail. At first it wasn't too bad but later on you had to be careful how you presented them, sometimes he felt more like a prisoner than they were taking him to the hospital. A female guard came to help come along but she wasn't any help, the naked man was just like grabbing her. He ran into a room where there were two women, he hit the window, reminding Claude of a cartoon character as he bounced off all cut up. Claude got him down, the guard showed up and Claude asked her for her cuffs but she didn't have them, while she went back to get them he got away again. The prisoner ran into a room and got in and handcuffed him Claude then shoved him to the bed. Then the doctors sawed him up right there without anaesthetic, Claude couldn't help but say to him, "serve you right". Another time he was giving the job of "babysitting", a couple "Vito" family members, the third ranking criminals in Canada, who were caught transporting drugs in Barbair. Strangely enough the old man proved quite gentle and Claude actually enjoyed talking with him. After these people were transported to Montreal the man's daughter sent Claude a thank you card.

Elsie didn't care for being alone at night, she thought if she didn't get to bed she may as well go to get back at Claude's, long as there was a cat in the yard she felt safe, so

Claude would travel with another guard grandmother and worked at Lounsbury's. Claude had an old car and I think they considered his stature, he being a big man, and took him at his word.

All the men in Claude's family are tall and well built, Claude mentioned two uncles Stan and Ben who both weighed in at 300 pounds.

Well now there is much more I want to tell you about Claude and Elsie and I will next month. This is another story that is hard to shorten. You will want to know how Claude lost his sight looking at "gold tooth Genie".

guided to list some of the barriers or challenges that might prevent you from being successful followed by the all-important step of making plans for overcoming these barriers. Overcoming the roadblocks along the way is easier if you can identify what support and resources might be needed to help you as you move forward. The tool also helps to score your confidence. (can I do it), and the importance. (do I want/need to do it), of reaching your goal. Success builds success so it is important that you set realistic goals, not goals that you perceive to be unimportant or have no confidence in achieving. You should also set a timeline for reaching your goal.

The change I want to make happen is: I want to avoid eating holiday chocolates at my desk. My plan for the next month is: I will only eat 2 chocolates/week. Action Plan: I will have one chocolate (what) on Mondays, and Fridays (when) with my lunch (where).

Things that could make it difficult to achieve my goal: Chocolates are usually left on the counter in the lunchroom. My plan for overcoming these challenges are: I will put the unopened boxes of candy in the cupboard or fridge and out of sight. Support and resources I will need: I will discuss my plans with my co-workers. How important is it to me that I achieve my goal? (scale of 0 to 10, with 0 being not important at all and 10 being extremely important): 9. How confident am I that I can achieve my goal? (scale of 0 to 10, with 0 being not confident at all and 10 being extremely confident): 6

This is an example of what an Action Plan for the holiday's might look like. Developing an Action Plan and reviewing it with your diabetes team can help you to get through the holidays without falling prey to temptation and keep on track with your diabetes self-management plan. And remember, it is possible to enjoy the season and live well with diabetes!

Jim was inducted into the Canadian Motorsports Hall Of Fame in 2003 as Builder/Competitor Stockcar Racing, this was the same year that Guy Lombardo was inducted as Competitor Boat Racer. So here we are tonight to add one more accolade to his long list.

## Happy Holidays What Does the Village Office want you to know:

**SEASONS GREETINGS** - The Village Office and Staff wish you a joyous holiday season with good health, happiness, and prosperity throughout the coming New Year.

**WINTER PARKING** - Just a reminder that for the purpose of snow removal no person shall stand or park a vehicle on any highway within the Village of Salisbury between the hours of 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m., from the first day of November in any year to the first day of February in the following year.

**HOLIDAY OFFICE HOURS** - The office will be closed at noon on December 24th and will reopen on December 27th at 8:30 a.m. for the Christmas holidays and will close at noon on December 31st and will reopen on January 2, 2014 for New Years.

**CHRISTMAS TREE DISPOSAL** - Natural Christmas trees will be collected by Village staff from January 6 to 17, 2014.

Tree bags, tinsel, ornaments, nails, tree skirts, strings, at the curb. Christmas wreaths will not be collected as part of the tree disposal program. Trees should be clear of snow and ice and easily accessible for collection.

Residents who wish to drop-off their Christmas tree can do so at the following site from December 27, 2013 to **Village of Salisbury Wastewater Treatment Facility, 47 Government Road (in Designated Area)**

Christmas trees are shredded for the production of compost.

**GREENBLUE WASTE SEPARATION** - The Village of Salisbury has been promoting the Blue Container program for recycling. This program has been implemented and made it mandatory in 2008 for village residents to separate their waste into blue and green transparent plastic bags.

**Green Waste = Organics and Compostables** - Green waste includes all food items, yard waste, sanitary products, kitty litter, meat tray liners as well as any other soiled item that would contaminate the recyclables. Never put these items in your blue bag.

**Blue Waste = Recyclables, Glass and Everything else** - Blue waste includes all items that are recyclable (paper, cardboard, plastic, metals, etc.), as well as glass. Remember to rinse all containers before putting in the blue bag. All caps should be removed from all bottles, containers, etc.
