Rural Ride
Rural Rides is a new concept in transportation, is now in operation in the greater Upper Pettoctidac River Valley area which includes the communities of Salisbury, Pettoctidac, Havelock, Elgin and all the surrounding areas.

Rural Rides is a not for profit group of individuals providing transportation to people in our service area. This service is available to individuals in our area to provide affordable and acceptable transportation for medical reasons, visiting, shopping or even recreation. The fees will be on seniors, non-drivers, non car owners, and people temporarily without a vehicle, with low or fixed incomes, those eliminating a second car and environmentally concerned people or anyone needing transportation.

We require people wishing to use our service to complete a simple form and pay a \$10 registration fee to be a member. This is not a taxi service. Members will be required to contact us 48 hours in advance of a drive. We will arrange to have one of our volunteer drivers pick them up for their drive and return them to their beginning point.

The fee for this service is based on the distance travelled and much of the money collected goes to the volunteer drivers to offset the cost of using their vehicles. All volunteer drivers will have an R.C.M.F. background check, safe reliable vehicles and the proper insurance coverage.

It is the hope of Rural Rides that this service will allow people in our area a greater sense of independence. With your help we will get the word out to our communities about this new service about "Neighbours Helping Neighbours".

Our next business meeting in Pettoctidac on Thursday Dec. 04, 2014 will be at the Pettoctidac Kwanias Centre. It will be open to the public at 7 PM. Please plan to attend and learn more about Rural Rides and how it can benefit Pettoctidac.

Get the Most from Your Seasonal Plants

Whether you receive some plants this season as gifts or you purchase them to dress up your abode, now is the time to consider how to extend the life of each one of them and maximize the pleasure that you get from them.

• **Peonies, cyclamens, azaleas and the like** have all received their share of attention from plant breeders over recent years and the benefits accrue to you and me — the consumers. Longer blooming times, less work, bigger plants. None the less, to get the most of them here is what you need to know:

• **Poinsettia.** The classic Christmas flowering plant is easy to maintain and even to grow if you understand just a few things about it:

- They love a bright room. A south or west facing window provides the perfect place to call home.
- They do not like to be overwatered. Let the surface of the soil dry about a centimeter or two down between watering. Do not let the plant sit in water for more than a few hours. If you experience yellowing leaves and leaf drop, this is usually the cause.
- Fertilize with ½ strength Plant Prod 20-20-20 every 2 or 3 weeks to maintain healthy green leaves and buds (the red that you see is not the flower, these are the top leaves).
- Poinsettias do not like drafts, especially cold ones.

• **One summer I** recommend that you stick the pot next to a sunny spot in your yard and let it like a "rose" shaped Azalea. The gorgeous "rose" shaped blossoms of the azalea are to die for. And the plant is permanent; you can expect it to bloom each year come fall or winter with the proper care. It will bloom for 2 to 4 weeks and makes a great foliage plant otherwise. It is evergreen. If it loses its leaves this is not a good thing. Rather, it is a sign

that there is some stress in its life. Azaleas are a bit spoiled that way — they experience stress often and seemingly without cause. This is where it is to your advantage to think like a plant.

Azaleas like their soil to be "damp" but not soggy. When the surface of the soil gets dry that is your sign to add water. Make sure it is tepid water (not too cold or too hot).

• They like to be fertilized every 3 weeks when they are out of bloom with Plant Prod 30-10-10 water soluble at ½ strength all winter and fall strength from May through early fall.

• If all of the leaves turn yellow and fall off cut the plant back by ½, and let it dry out 70%. Put it in a sunny window and ignore it except for watering once every 2 or 3 weeks. Likely you have given it too much love and attention. Get a pet.

- To rebloom an azalea, leave it out of doors next fall during the early frosts. When temperatures drop to minus 3 Celsius bring it indoors and place it in a sunny window. It has now been shocked into blooming once again.

• **Cycladom.** I love the new varieties of this exotic looking indoor flowering plant best of all. Perhaps it is the ease of care that has biased me over the years, but who can deny that the new colours and colour combinations are eye-poppers.

Cycladom like:

- slight drying between waterings
- indirect sun while in bloom to prolong the blossom time
- mild fertilizer application every 3 weeks (½ strength 20-20-20 works well)
- A rest when out of flower: cut back on watering and place in direct sunshine.

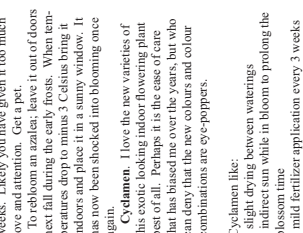
With a little attention your seasonal plants can really perform. Some judicious ignorance also can work.

Ever-day People Submitted by Sheila Robsoncault

Our hearts grow tender with childhood memories and the love of kinship, and we are better throughout the year for having, in spirit, become a child again at Christmas-time. Lana Ingalls Wilder.

This month I had the pleasure of sitting in the kitchen with two of my granddaughters, looking back at childhood days. Roberta came from a large family of 10. Her oldest sister died at 10 days old. They lived in an hundred year-old farm house in Casan River; they had 15 cows, two horses, pigs and chickens. She said that all nine of the children, from the oldest, Stan to the youngest, Alma live within a 50 mile radius.

They have a brother and sister who both live in Ontario.

She recalls her mother separating the milk and churning and pressing the butter. Her mother made lots of bread; she remembers the Star wood stove with an upper oven by the pipe that was full of pans of bread. She didn't do any baking, but she made bread for the family.

Some evening her father would go Harry Burgess store in New Canan and he would buy ice-cream, often it would be pretty much melted by the time he got home; their parents would get them up to enjoy ice-cream and fresh baked bread.

To keep the home warm in the winter they had a wood-burning stove in their parents' bedroom and the children were responsible to carry the wood upstairs, which they didn't enjoy, but they were very respectful of their parents; there was the strap but it wasn't used very often.

The day before Christmas their dad would kill two roosters for their Christmas dinner and their mother would pick up a turkey to roast. She and her mother made the same as always, but when they woke up Christmas morning and opened the kitchen door they saw a small tree in the corner of the kitchen all decorated with cranberries and popcorn, the kitchen table was set and at each child's place sat a small round card decorated with Christmas paper; ribbons and streamers.

Her mother did a lot of sewing; she even made their coats to keep them warm on their mile long winters walk to Cheryvale School. When it snowed their father would take them with the horse and sleigh.

In 1979 their mother passed away. Roberta heard someone say that the Black's home burned down. When she arrived home she saw the foundation. It was full of "now-baked" potatoes, and all the eating her mother had stored there was still on the table. Since continued on page 10

Outdoor Classroom Open at Salisbury Elementary School

What is an Outdoor Classroom? An Outdoor Classroom is a space that brings learning to life by integrating nature into our school curriculum. By giving students the opportunity to get outside and experience nature, the Outdoor Classroom will bring learning to life and a greater appreciation for the world in which the students are an integral part of. Bob Osborne, of Com Hill Nursery, generously donated the landscape design, project management, plans, stone features and construction services for the outdoor classroom. In October, Mr. Osborne, his family members as well as staff at Com Hill Nursery worked to move the soil, site pathways and build a circular classroom of stone paths and built a circular classroom of natural features and beautiful hand milled stones for seating. The Village of Salisbury generously supplied the topsoil and mulch to build the hills and valleys that define the classroom space. The students and staff of Salisbury Elementary School eagerly watched as the classroom took shape over a three day period.



Mr. Osborne will be meeting with the students at Salisbury Elementary to talk to them about the plants in the outdoor classroom and the role the students can play in the stewardship of nature. The research is clear about the benefits of Outdoor Classroom. From Collaborative Classroom: Designing and Implementing Child-Centered Learning Environments describes the Outdoor Classroom as helping to restore the traditional benefits of childhood while addressing these challenges: 1. Involving children in hands-on, loose-purs 3. Creating opportunities to learn how to handle outdoor risks safely 4. Connecting children to nature in ways that encourage them to connect more deeply 5. Fostering children about cause and effect through outdoor and interpersonal activities 6. Providing children with a wide range of activities to explore their beliefs and values. The students and staff of Salisbury Elementary School are thrilled with their new classroom and are very grateful to Mr. Osborne, his family, staff of Com Hill Nursery and the Village of Salisbury; in particular Mr. Jason Coyle, for making a learning environment that will benefit not only the current students, but many more into the future. "If you have a garden and a library, you have everything you need."

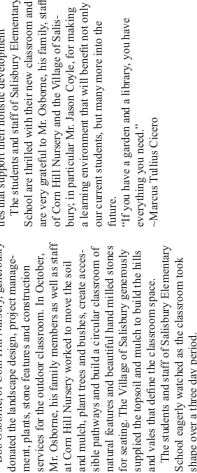
