It wasn't long after the Petitcodiac River Causeway was constructed in the late 1960's that those who had an interest in the river realized that the causeway and the poorly constructed fish way were a major impediment to the passage of fish.

Before the causeway the Petitcodiac River Watershed was home to Atlantic Salmon, brook trout, shad, gaspereaux, striped bass and many other species of fish. The Petitcodiac drains a watershed of approximately 2,071 sq. kms or 800 sq. miles from three Counties.

In the 1980's members of the Petitcodiac Sportsman's Club (PSC) began working on projects to restore the once plentiful runs of Atlantic Salmon throughout the watershed. One of the most successful and rewarding projects that the PSC has been involved with is the Fish Friends Program.

Fish Friends is an educational program developed by the Atlantic Salmon Federation (ASF) and delivered by volunteers through its Regional Councils. Here in this province the NB Salmon Council is responsible for this program. The PSC is a member of the NB Salmon Council.

Fish Friends is part of the curriculum of Grades 4, 5 and 6 in schools throughout the wild Atlantic Salmon's range in North America. This program introduces children to Atlantic Salmon by means of the activi-

ties described in the curriculum guide and through the hands-on activity of raising salmon and trout eggs in classroom incubation to the fry stage after which students release the fry into local streams. Students nurture the fish while learning about habitat, adaptation, biodiversity, life cycles, freshwater ecology, sustainability and stewardship.

Students and teachers have been involved with Fish Friends since 1999 when volunteers led by Gerry Tingley of the PSC introduced this program in Elgin. Gerry Tingley has spearheaded this program in schools in Salisbury, Petitcodiac and Havelock for many years with assistance from Herb Holt, Alan Goddard and Sterling Goddard. This year Gerry will step back from the program and the program is being led by Sterling Goddard. Gerry's work throughout the years with Petitcodiac River restoration and particularly Fish Friends is very much appreciated by the PSC.

Recently salmon eggs from the Fisheries & Oceans Hatchery at Mactaquac have been delivered to the three schools by Sterling Goddard. These eggs will be raised by the students under the direction of teachers and staff with a planned release as fry in the Petitcodiac watershed sometime in June of this year.

The Fish Friends Program is very dependent

on the teachers and staff of the Salisbury, Petitcodiac and Havelock schools for their support and the PSC applauds them for their involvement and dedication.

Today about 700 schools in the Atlantic Provinces as well as the New England States participate in this program. (Newfoundland to New England)

It is important that all anglers release young salmon (parr and smolt) that they inadvertently catch while fishing for trout. To facilitate this the PSC has designed and printed a large number of posters showing the points of difference between young salmon and brook trout and will make them available to anglers or others upon request. In addition a number of these posters will be placed along various brooks and streams in the watershed by the PSC.

Please do not forget to support our annual fundraising dinner that will be held at the Petitcodiac Legion the evening of May 22nd.

EVERYDAY PEOPLE

The heavy snowfall this winter banked around the foundations of homes and blanketed the landscape; we must admit that it makes for beautiful scenery. But down the Glades Road there is a pristine field of white where the Glades Baptist Church used to be, and I'm sure the new empty spot still saddens some hearts when they pass by. So I write this story in memory of The Glades Church and for the people who grew up in that church; who were married there and raised their family there and continued to support the church. Because of structural problems it became impossible to maintain the building so it was decided rather than to continue to put out funds it would be leveled. The grave yard will continue to be maintained.

It was back in the 1800's that Rev. Joseph Crandall appeared in this region, preaching in many villages and country homes from Sackville to the Saint-John River. He helped organize the first Baptist church in the district of Salisbury; his base was at Salisbury and his influence was felt mostly in southern New Brunswick. The Glades Church's roots go back to the time when the first Baptist church was in the district of Salisbury. By the 1830's the Baptist church in Salisbury had grown to a large size - being the only one in miles. It was recorded by a Mrs. Gilliam and others walked from Gowland Mountain, 28 miles, carrying their lunch and shoes and stockings for church. They attended a full day of services and returned at night with a torch of pine knots to light their way through the forest. In 1837 a group of believers in the Poller River district decided that it was time to establish a new congregation; these members of the Salisbury Baptist Church were dismissed to become charter members of a new Baptist Church. Elder Joseph Crandall presided over the first meeting and he was called to pastor the new church as well. This began The Glades Baptist Church and this congregation of faithful worked together to bring the preaching of God's Word, the administration of His ordinances, the fellowship of believers and the evangelistic witness of the community. The preaching of the Gospel was a priority. It was held on One Sunday in March 1838 the new church, with great

joy, gathered at the Poller River to witness the baptism of 12 people. Frost and snow were not a hindrance, even in the wilderness, upwards of 400 people came.

Later the church was given a piece of land owned by Brian Kay and a meeting house was erected. In 1838 the church to be known as 2nd Salisbury was received into the New Brunswick Association. In the session records it read "Members and growth of members of the congregation show that 91 persons were baptized and added to the membership that year.

There were some unfortunate events happen around 1850's & 60's with a new pastor came on scene preaching different doctrines and drew some away. Those who sympathized with The New Brunswick Association met in homes during this dark period. In 1860 Rev. James Goldup came to pastor at Poller River and in 1868 the church finally re-immersed officially with the Eastern New Brunswick Association, it was called The Poller River Baptist Church. In 1875 the church had its first service of ordination, then Rev. Ezekiel Hopper pastored until 1880, Rev. W. Cooy later became Pastor. It was during this time that the original meeting house was dismantled and a new

Nutrition Tidbit From the Food Security and Nutrition Group

The Problem with Sugar

Sugar has become one of the primary sources of calories in the North American diet and the consumption of sugar has been linked to more than 70 different diseases common in North America including diabetes, cancer and heart disease. Of particular concern is the high levels of fructose (sugar made from corn or corn syrup) which is found in soft drinks, fruit juices and almost all processed foods including baby formula. Advances in agriculture and food processing technology has made the fructose derived from corn very inexpensive and it is widely used in the majority of the processed foods that we find on our grocery store shelves today.

The problem with fructose is that it is metabolized or broken down by our bodies in a way that is entirely different from other types of sugars. Fructose can only be metabolized by the liver, which very quickly turns fructose into fat - causing fatty liver disease and weight related issues like obesity, diabetes and cancer. In contrast glucose can be absorbed and burned by every cell in our bodies. A recent study released in the United Kingdom revealed that the high levels of sugar added to fast food eaten by students can result in poorer test scores, another study from the US links high levels of sugar consumption to Alzheimer's disease (called by some doctors "diabetes of the brain") and sugar consumption is known to fuel cancer cell growth.

Two hundred years ago we consumed 18 pounds of sugar a year and today some of us are consuming as much as half a pound of sugar a day. Experts recommend that sugar consumption be limited to less than 25 grams per day - this is just a couple of teaspoons. This is especially true if you are one of the many Canadians now showing signs of insulin resistance such as being overweight, having high blood pressure, high cholesterol, or diabetes.

For more info on sugar and how it harms our health listen to this lecture from Dr. Robert Lustig, Professor of Pediatrics in the Division of Endocrinology at the University of California, San Francisco. He has spent his life studying sugar metabolism and its effect on human health.

- The lighting of any open fire to dispose of dry grass, brush, hay, straw, leaves, buildings or structures is prohibited.
- Other than in a properly constructed incinerator approved by the Department of Environment and Local Government and its successors, no person shall light a fire outside a building for the purpose of disposing of any refuse or waste material.
