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Championship Pedigree
Decorated track champion Colby and up-and coming 3-sport star for Triton

The following article of athletes Chris and Emily Colby are the son and daughter of Nancy Eastwick formerly of Anagance who is a nurse in Massachusetts. They are also the grandchildren of Frank Eastwick (Anagance) and Jeanie and Ray Jorgensen of Petitcodiac.



Rising Triton freshman Chris Colby has enjoyed a highly successful career in middle school as a football, basketball and track star.

Over the past few years, the Triton 55.07. middle school track program has evolved into a powerhouse. The boys and girls teams haven't lost a meet in three years, and the boys recently captured their second consecutive Division 2 state championship.

Though there have been plenty of talented athletes responsible for that success, right at the heart of it has been Chris Colby.

The 6-foot-3, 160-pound Colby, who will be entering his freshman year at Triton Regional High School, Byfield, MA this fall, is perhaps the most decorated middle school track athlete in area history. The three-time middle school state champion has excelled in the sprinting and jumping events, and he also happens to be a top football and basketball prospect as well.

Upon joining the Triton middle school track team, Colby mad a immediate impact, winning state titles in the 200meter dash (26.07) and 4x400 relay (4:07.45) as a seventh grader before capturing the championship in the 400meter run as an eight grader this past spring with a personal best time of

His personal bests in the 100 (12.13), 200 (25.46), 400 (55.07) and high jump (5-6) far surpass what you see from a typical middle schooler, and Triton middle school track coach Tyler Colbert said he's still just scratching the surface of his potential.

"He's the only CAL athlete to ever win more than one state track title in the middle school, and was our top scorer in our undefeated state championship teams the past two years," Colbert said. "He was a CAL Star in six different events over two years, never finishing worse than second in any event at any CAL meet and finished middle school undefeated in the 200, 400 and 4x400 statewide."

Given his original expectations when joining track, Colby admitted he didn't expect things to go as well as they did. "Honestly no, I never thought I would come out like that," Colby said.

"I thought I would be there to get a workout and maybe talk to some friends, and then I realized what Coach Tyler



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

1. Install at least one smoke alarm on every level of you home, test it monthly and change the battery yearly.

2. Never leave cooking unattended.

- 3. Don't overload electrical outlets.
- 4. Never leave candles unattended.
- 5. Stub cigarettes out completely and dispose of them safely.
- 6. Never store gasoline indoors.
- 7. Prevent arson by keeping your property clean of trash and flammables.
- 8. Keep flammable materials such as curtains and furniture at least one metre away from space heaters.
- 9. Store matches and lighters in a child-proof drawer or cabinet.
- 10. Create and practice a fire escape plan with your whole family. Get out, stay out and call 911.

Fire Prevention Week | October 7-13, 2018 This year's Fire Prevention Week theme focuses on three fundamental actions people can take to be fire-safe:

**LOOK** for potential fire hazards around your home. Take action to prevent fire from starting:

Always stay in the kitchen while cooking. If you must leave, turn off the stove. Encourage smokers to smoke outside. Always extinguish cigarettes in large, deep ashtrays that cannot be knocked over.

Check electrical cords for damage such as fraying or nicks. A damaged cord can expose wires and result in a potential shock or fire hazard.

**LISTEN** for the smoke alarms in an emergency. Make sure everyone knows the sound of the smoke alarms and can hear them in an emergency. Early detection of fire provided by smoke alarms gives you the extra seconds you need to get out safely.

**LEARN** two ways out of every room. Practice a home fire escape plan with everyone in your home before a fire starts so you and your family can get out quickly.

# **Liberation 75 Tulips**

When do tulips signify freedom?

When the Dutch give them to Canadians in thanks for the liberation of their country from the tyranny of the Nazis 75 years ago.

As Canadians turn their attention to the spring garden, we plant millions of tulip bulbs in anticipation of a colourful end to winter. "Spring", as we think of it, is often visualized with a tulip somewhere in the image.

Funny thing about tulips: they love our long, cold winters. Our hockey season is a perfect respite for cold-craving tulip bulbs. We plant them now, when the Maple Leafs are about to start a new season and they flower during the playoffs. Which are, for the non-hockey fan, seemingly endless. Testament to the long flowering period of tulips and the huge variety of tulip varieties that bloom for a couple of weeks at a time, over more than two months, depending on the species.

Our association of tulips with The Netherlands is not a mistake. Canadians liberated much of The Netherlands during the final months of the war. Over 7,200 Canadians were lost in the conflict. After WWII the Dutch Royal Family gave the people of Canada, through our federal government, 100,000 tulip bulbs as a thank you for our efforts. Since then, the Dutch have

sent us 20,000 bulbs per year, which are used in Ottawa's now famous Canadian Tulip Festival.

The Netherlands dominates the world market for tulip bulbs. The history of the tulip is steeped in Dutch culture going back more than 500 years.

The origins of the tulip bulb are more complex, as they are native to Turkey, Central Asia and points between.

This fall, The Netherlands royal family is acknowledging the 75th anniversary of the liberation of their country by saying thank you to Canadians with a larger than normal gift of 100,000 tulip bulbs branded Liberation 75. This tulip commemorates the liberation of The Netherlands in 1944.

The gift of 100,000 tulip bulbs is matched by the National Capital Commission in Ottawa, where most of these bulbs are being planted now. 1100 schools across the country will each receive 75 of the Liberation 75 tulips to plant around their school buildings. A reminder, come spring, of the sacrifice made by

One poll indicated that 62% of New Brunswickers are opposed to the Federal Liberal carbon tax.


In April of this year the CFIB reported a majority of their members oppose the federal carbon backstop imposed on our



Though track will likely be where Colby makes his biggest impact initially, he is a football player at heart. Colby, whose father played football at Gloucester High, started playing flag football at age four and has been dedicated to the game ever since.

In recent years he has played with the Mass Elite Football club and in the Triton youth program, and has primarily played wide receiver, outside linebacker and kicker. He has also been part of a North Shore Flag Football Elite team that has qualified for nationals two years in a row, which has allowed him to travel to Orlando over Pro Bowl weekend and meet numerous Pro Bowlers, including New York Giants running back Saquon

"He told me to get in the gym as much as you can, and whenever you have time don't waste it," Colby said of the advice Barkley gave him. "If you really want it you have to work for it."





# **Need for Transportation Growing**

Rural Rides started providing affordable transportation in 2014 and it became evident early on that there is a great need for affordable transportation in the area. Rural Rides is part of a collaborative group comprised of Rural Rides, Rural Rides Tantramar, Tele-drive Albert County and The Volunteer Centre of Southeast New Brunswick Driver Program working under the umbrella of WA Transpo now commonly referred to as Urban/Rural Rides.

There have been a few growing pains and changes as we work together to make sure everyone in Westmorland and Albert County has access to affordable transportation. One of those challenges is keeping up with the calls as they come in. We recently welcomed Marc Gionet to the team to help with dispatching. Clients from all regions are encouraged to call the dispatcher at least 48 hours in advance at 962-3073 to schedule their rides. Marc will be helping dispatch rides for all four groups - Teledrive Albert County, Rural Rides, Rural Rides Tantramar, and The Volunteer Centre of Southeast New Brunswick Driver Program and will be answering the phone as "Urban/ Rural Rides" as he will be working with groups that serve clients in both urban and

The need for transportation continues to grow and Urban/Rural Rides is finding that the demand is greater than the capacity to serve. So much so, that even though every effort is made to combine clients in a vehicle when possible, the demand is so high, six ride request for transportation to medical

needs had to be turned down this past week alone. Requests include trips to dialysis, chemotherapy and other treatments as well as to the hospitals for tests and surgeries. The needs go beyond medical as many residents struggle to access basic life needs such as food, banking and other services. Transportation is also needed to connect residents to community programs and educational activities, particularly for those with disabilities of one form or another.

The greatest need for volunteer drivers is in Hillsborough, Sackville, Dorchester, Port Elgin, Shediac, Cap Pele, Grand Barachois, and Memramcook at present, but more volunteers are always needed and welcome in all areas of Westmorland and Albert County. If you know anyone who might be willing to volunteer a few hours a week or even a few hours a month, please share the information with them.

Every little bit helps. Someone willing to do one ride a week could have helped one or more people get to their medical appointment this past week. Drivers use their own vehicle and are reimbursed for their mileage. They must have a clear criminal record check, a reliable vehicle, valid driver's license, carry \$2 million liability (we will reimburse the extra cost up to \$80 per year) and sign an oath of confidentiality.



From 1996 -1998 Gordie served as Crew Chief for the Street Stock Champion and Sportsman Championship at Open Championships in Shediac. # Salisbury Petitcodiac Minor Basketball Celebrates 5 Years



Petitcodiac Minor Basketball Celebrates 5 Years of Fun Salisbury Petitcodiac Minor

Basketball Association is celebrating its 5th year anniversary and wishes to thank our communities helping us make this happen. This year we will see 35% more kids coming out to play the sport, in our area. The program focuses on basketball skill development, respect, manners, values, leadership skills and having fun while growing the love for the sport.

We have come a long way, as there was a need to provide skills development opportunities for local area kids as well as a chance to play competitive basketball representing the Salisbury Petitcodiac area around Atlantic Canada. Up to that point kids would have to try

out for the Moncton provincial teams a small area. What matters is the with only one or two of our area kids making these teams. It left the other kids with no competitive team to play on. Their only alternative was to play house league in Moncton. In many cases because of the couple of kids playing on Moncton Provincial Teams, it meant not enough kids left to form a local team at all, and these kids quit the sport.

Ken Darling and Rob Campbell had an idea to form a local association to ensure Salisbury Petitcodiac families would have a chance to play here in our area, as well as around Atlantic Canada representing our Villages. Since that time each year we have over 50 to 70 teams visit our area from around Atlantic Canada. It has been an economic benefit to the area, but more importantly we have grown the number of kids playing the sport.

Along the journey the association has taught the kids and their parents that it doesn't matter that they come from

size of their hearts, their hard work and believing in themselves and their teammates.

Over the 5 years the Association has generated 9 Provincial Championship teams, an East Coast Championship team, while having 7 players selected to play for Team New Brunswick. The Association was named Basketball New Brunswick's Association of the year in 2018, and Rob Campbell the Association President was named Volunteer of the year in 2016 by Basketball New Brunswick.

The most gratifying thing about the last five years according to the association has been all the help from our Sponsors, Parents and Volunteers as well as the partnership with Salisbury Parks and Leisure who have been instrumental in our growth. "It takes a Community" said Rob Campbell, Association President, and our success is because of the big hearts and commitment of the amazing people from the Salisbury and Petitcodiac area.

There is great pride in seeing the kids from the program develop over the years. Campbell went on to say "In the last year I watched Kailey Arsenault one of our Alumni Players who plays for Petitcodiac High named to the Provincial NBIAA All Star Team, and another of our Alumni players Keira Jamieson play for Team New Brunswick at the National Championships in Victoria BC. I watched all our High School Alumni players who came through the program coming back to work with our younger kids and these same players volunteering in the community giving back to charities. I am Proud that we Grow Champions on the Floor, but More Importantly We Grow Champions off the floor and future leaders in our communities in Salisbury and Petitcodiac.


