Moore from Ottawa

Since it is now tax time, I want to remind you of some of the ways you may be able to save on your 2011 taxes. Since 2006, our government has helped Canadians by reducing taxes in over 120 ways. These include: cuts to the GST, reductions in income taxes, the introduction of the landmark Tax-Free Savings Account and targeted tax cuts for families, seniors and job creators. We have helped a typical Canadian family save nearly \$3,100 on average, per year.

This year, I want you to get the most out of your 2011 tax return. In this article, you will find a list of some of the valuable tax credits that are available.

Our government has introduced Pension Income Splitting, which allows any Canadian resident who receives qualifying pension income to allocate to their spouse up to one half of their income. We have also doubled the Pension Income Credit from \$1000 to \$2000.

We have increased the Age Amount to help seniors keep more money to meet their retirement needs. Also, we are providing Canadians with the Caregiver Amount for Canadians that are caring for a loved one. This responsibility is both emotionally and financially difficult and under our government, a caregiver may be eligible to claim up to \$4,282.

Our government is providing many other tax credits including; the Canada Child Tax Credit that allows Canadian families to claim a tax credit of over \$2000 per child, the Children's Fitness Tax Credit, which allows parents to claim a tax credit on up to \$500 and the Child Arts Tax Credit which allows parents to claim up to \$500 as well. You may also be eligible to take advantage of the Volunteer Firefighters Tax Credit which amounts to \$3,000, or the Hiring Credit for Small Business that provides up to \$1,000.



Sweet Treats of Spring

Make a visit to New Brunswick in the spring and you're sure to find lots of sugar camps to satisfy your sweet tooth! The province currently ranks 3rd in the world in maple syrup production, an active industry since the aboriginal people first taught settlers how to tap maple trees and boil down the sap

The main syrup-producing trees are sugar maples, red maples and silver maples. Depending on weather, production can start as early as the end of February, and occurs mainly in March and April. During the maple sugaring season an average tree yields approximately 40 litres of sap, which will produce one litre of maple syrup.

A small hole is drilled into the maple tree and a hollow tube or spigot is inserted, allowing the sap to drip into buckets or plastic pipes. Modern use of plastic tubing with a partial vacuum has enabled increased production.

The runs earliest in the spring are the best quality. The best "sugaring" weather is clear, with days above freezing, nights below freezing and snow on the ground. Syrup made late in the season is dark, and the resulting flavour is not as good. The whole process must be done as quickly as possible. Too much time in storage can induce fermentation in the sap, and too much time boiling can also reduce quality. Usually the whole process from any batch of sap finishes in syrup within a few hours.

The New Brunswick Maple Association's website offers more information on the production process, nutritional facts as well as maple-rich recipes.

Maple syrup is boiled to create maple cream, maple butter, maple sugar and translucent candy, which may be poured on snow to harden for eating at the site.

On Friday afternoon, an Open House "Show & Tell" was well attended. People could share their photos, scrapbooks, antiques or just their memories. Reminiscing about the "old days" is always fun and educational. Thanks to all who participated by sharing something of our heritage.

How-to-use-natural-home-remedies-for-cats-with-ear-mites.

Most cats get ear mites at one time or another. Cats with ear mites are miserable with symptoms of head shaking, itching and scratching the ears. Hundreds of these tiny bugs are invading your cat's ear canal living off the wax. A mite's life cycle is three weeks and then they start mating all over again. Ear mites are extremely contagious and spread from one cat to another through direct contact.

Ear mites are the most difficult parasite to get rid of, but by following a specific treatment, your cat will be ear mite free. If not treated, they can cause ear infections, inflamed red swollen ears or even hearing loss to your cat. Some cats have lost their hearing from vigorous head shaking causing a blood vessel to burst.

To check your cat for ear mites, use a cotton swab dipped in mineral or vegetable oil. Fold the ear flap back and wipe the cotton ball in the ear. If there is black debris or a thick coffee grind like substance on the cotton swab, then your cat has ear mites.

Clean the kitty's ears first with vegetable or mineral oil or you can buy a cleaning solution at PetSmart. Clean the ears as directed on the bottle. Always clean the cat's ears first before treating her for ear mites.

There are a few different remedies for cats with ear mites. You can use the conventional method or the holistic approach. The easiest treatment is to visit your veterinarian and get a topical anti-parasitic medication such as Revolution.

It kills fleas as well as ear mites. It is a spot on vial tube that is applied between the shoulder blade and it lasts for one month. Acarexx or Milbermite are two other conventional topical medications you may choose to use. These conventional medications include "pyrethrins" which are an insecticide that penetrates the nervous system of the parasites.

The safest approach is the natural treatment with no chemicals. This is not the easiest way, but is the safest alternative to chemical products. Clean your cat's ears with one tablespoon of Olive Oil and 1 capsule of Vitamin E combined. (Poke the capsule and pour the gel in with the olive oil)

Use an equal amount in a syringe and squirt

in the cat's ears and spread it out. Wait for five minutes, massage base of the ear with your thumb and forefinger and then wipe out the mite debris with a cotton swab. Repeat this process daily for seven days. The Olive Oil smothers the mites and the Vitamin E heals the ears.

Another treatment is by using white vinegar and water. Dilute solution to half and half. Use one teaspoon in a dropper or syringe in each ear. Cup your hand around the base of your kitty's ear, and massage the base of her ear with your thumb and forefinger. Use cotton swabs to wipe out the mite debris. Use this for seven days and then stop for seven days. WARNING: Do not use this method if the ears are red and swollen or have any open wounds.

Garlic and Olive Oil combined are great for treating ear mites. Crush garlic and soak it overnight in warm olive oil. Throw away the clove and warm up the olive oil. Add 5 drops to each ear for 21 days. This remedy also smothers the ear mites. My favorite is Aloe and Calendula essential oils. They are very soothing to the kitty's ears and have worked wonders for getting rid of the ear mites.

Both oils are available at your local health food store. Add several drops to the kitty's ears once daily for 21 days. The oils have a healing effect so if your kitty has inflamed or painful ears, this will help.

These are the best remedies for cats with ear mites and now you can choose the conventional or the holistic approach. Your cat will feel much better and she will love you for it.

Great Vegetarian Soup Broccoli Apple Soup

2 cups diced broccoli
1/4 teaspoon crushed lemon thyme
(optional)
1 cup chopped onion
1 cup peeled apple. cubed
1/2 cup diced celery
Sprinkle of garlic (optional)
4 cups apple juice
1/2 cup raisins
Sour cream for garnish

Garnish with minced parsley

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

Heat the oil in 6-quart pot. Add the next 6 ingredients, cook while stirring until vegetables are partly cooked. Add apple juice and bring to boil, then simmer 30 minutes. Remove from heat and cool. Put in blender, puree in small batches until smooth.

Return to pot, add raisins and heat. When serving add dollop of sour cream and sprinkle of parsley.



Vicky Crossman-Thank you for Greeting everyone with your friendly smile as they entered the building!


To the "Vanna Whites" of the night-Vicky Ogilvie and Lynn Tozer-You were Awesome! Thank You!

The Vernal Equinox


Ah, spring! This season brings increasing daylight, warming temperatures, and the rebirth of flora and fauna.

The word equinox is derived from the Latin words meaning "equal night." The spring and fall equinoxes are the only dates with equal daylight and dark as the Sun crosses the celestial equator. At the equinoxes, the tilt of Earth relative to the Sun is zero, which means that Earth's axis neither points toward nor away from the Sun. (However, the tilt of Earth relative to its plane of orbit, called the ecliptic plane, is always about 23.5 degrees.)

Signs of Spring

Spring is also the time when worms begin to emerge from the earth, ladybugs land on screen doors, green buds appear, birds chirp, and flowers begin to bloom. The vernal, or spring, equinox signals the beginning of nature's renewal in the Northern Hemisphere.

They have been authorized by the Village Council to sell dog tags door to door. Dog tags are also available at the Village Office. Please direct any complaints or inquiries to: NB SPCA 381-0300. Every owner of a dog shall before

March 31st, each year, register that dog(s) with the Animal Control Officer or the Administration Office.

A \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought by March 31st and a \$50.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought by June 30th.

Registration fees are:

\$10.00 spayed or neutered dogs, \$30.00 unspayed or unneutered dogs, Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

An official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, color, name of dog showing on receipt and also the veterinarian hospital tag number is required.
NO ONE WILL BE

WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT.



News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame

JACK CANFIELD

Competitor/Motorcycle/Car and Builder

Inducted November 15, 2008

Jack was both a racer and an organizer

Racing bikes was his life long passion.

He started racing at age 14. In the 1950's he gained recognition. Jack raced scrambles, dirt track, hill climbs and observed trails with such bikes as a 1945 Harley in a Norton chassis and a 1959 Matchless 250.

Jack was a member of Halifax Motorcycle Club, racing in Walton NS. He won 2 hill climb races, a win for the observed trails feature and first place victory in open class. He also rode with the Dartmouth Road Aces, a local street touring club.

The Maritime Motor Racing Association was formed in 1959. Jack started racing with the club on old airstrips along the Bay of Fundy and the Maitland track in Nova Scotia.

1959-1967 he did road racing on the Scoudouc airstrip New Brunswick, racing a BSA Gold Star 500 and a Suzuki 250 home-modified bike.

1961-'62 he raced at Mosport International Raceway in Bowmanville, Ontario.

1967 – Mosport – Jack raced to a win in the Canadian GP, on his home-modified Suzuki 250, and against the new factory sponsored Suzuki's. For this Suzuki offered him a sponsorship.

Jack raced Daytona International Speedway and took a victory on a Borrowed Bike, ironically owned by another Canfield racer from New England that Jack met at the racetrack that weekend.

In 1967 the local riders decided to form their own club, Atlantic Motorcycle Competition Riders Association. He also started racing on stockear ovals in 1967.

In September 1968 he won the Maritime Road Racing Championship, racing at the Yarmouth oval on a 250 Ducati. In August Jack had crashed at Seabreeze Raceway and he went on to win the Championship three weeks later, with a broken collarbone and hand.

Over the years Jack raced at the Briar Motorsport Park, Loudon New Hampshire, USA. Today the site is known as New Hampshire International Speedway. In 1996 he was the feature rider for one of the Vintage weekends, and for his many years of dedicated passion to road racing and being the oldest active road racer in North America, he was also awarded the key to the local town of Laconia, the original site for motorcycle racing before the Loudon track was built.

1973 Jack, with his experience as manager for various construction firms, headed up the construction of Atlantic Motorsport Park in Shubenacadie, NS. – August 2, 1994 the first official lap on the track was rode by Jack on a race bike.

In the mid '70's Jack decided it would be fun to try his hand at car racing at the Atlantic Motorsport Park. His first racecar was a formula V open top. During a private practice session the engine exploded and he crashed. Jack suffered a broken leg and black eye. He credited Bell Helmets for saving his life, and to this day that helmet sits in his garage in Oakfield Nova Scotia, with a hand written Thank You to Bell.

Jack purchased a Datsun 510 for \$200.00 at a local junkyard and rebuilt it, he raced it approximately 5 years. He won the Maritime Road Racing Championship. He also raced the Canadian Molyslip Series, along with mechanic Burt Page and co-driver Peter Zwicker, they won the first place trophy in sedan class and third overall.

He sold the Datsun and bought an Omni Hatchback, having to start at the back again, but being the incredible determined driver he was, it didn't take long for him to be back at the front and winning another two

He decided to sell the car and go back to only racing bikes. Over the years Jack raced various bikes, to name a few, he had two 1974 Kawasaki 400 triples, a 750 Honda, a Honda NS400, and a mid 1980's Honda Interceptor. He was the AMCRA rider chosen to ride the Benelli of the late Mack McConney.

Jack's children grew up at the racetrack. Sons Wayne, Steven and Mark all raced, with Jack as their instructor. At age 14, grandson, Cory raced beside him in the same class. Canfield racing was formed. To their knowledge they were the only threegeneration race team in North America

In 2003 Jack was honoured at the 10th annual vintage TT weekend, which has been renamed to also be called the "Jack Canfield Memorial" weekend. A 650 pound plaque, made of granite, was unveiled to honour Jack for his endless contributions to the racing community, over the past 40 years.

In 2004, one year after Jack passed away he was inducted in the Canadian Motorsports Hall Of Fame in Toronto.

The government is currently preparing for the event of a shrinking population in rural areas

The municipalities want their rural counterparts taxed because we use their facilities etc.

If the municipalities are growing. Is it because aging rural citizens are unable to find more age suitable accommodations in their own communities. Many move closer to an area with easier access to healthcare facilities. That doesn't mean that the smaller communities have to carry the burden of the growing population in the cities. Most citizens wished they would be able to stay in their own communities .That is where their family and friends live. It also provide jobs means for rural areas.

The voice of the municipalities is much stronger. More money, more people. There is a council that decides on big projects. They calculate the population in surrounding areas into their estimates. Building large new facilities that will probably stand empty twenty years from now.

It might be an advantage to the government to review their strategy.

Rural areas have a lot to offer. From small to big advantages. Lower taxes would possibly bring businesses to these areas. {This is not stimulated by the government}Immigration can help the rural areas. Immigrants are often not aware of the rural area with its very affordable housing. The open spaces with the large plots of land are very attractive to many. A lower tax rate makes starting a small business a lot easier. People from other countries are very familiar with the driving to work and standing in traffic jams for hours. A drive to the city here is more a joy then a burden. This makes living in rural areas very pleasant. The immigration office does not make the newcomers to our country aware of the rural communities. They immigrants usually stumble upon these places by accident.

Many communities have beautiful Halls .They can often be rented for a fraction you'll pay in any city .This helps the local economy. There is a strong community bond. Many projects are completed by community members themselves. Parking space is no problem .Houses often are large and can accommodate a business as well as being a home.

The way the province has been divided it seems that non of the concerns of the LSD's or rural citizens have been heard.

Many in this area have close ties to Sussex. Even in the 1950 and 1960 people from Elgin brought their butter cheese and eggs to the markets in St.John. The connection with Sussex area is still very strong.

Moving Services to the larger centres is problematic for many.

Farm Credit currently serves more farmers in the Sussex area then the Moncton area. This office brought business to Sussex and easy access for the people that use their services.

Unfortunately that office is slowly phased out and moved to Moncton.

Amalgamation of districts is understandable .Cost cutting is necessary .But why are Moncton ,Dieppe and Riverview not amalgamated????

If all the recent negative news about rural New Brunswick wasn't enough this week. The morning paper read

"Communities told to co-operate".

The following might have a more positive effect

Citizens and companies can work together just fine. You can do a lot more at the local level if the government facilitates the playing field instead of dictating the rules of the game. (-Anne Stykel, creator, farmerseeksneighbour)

In the Netherlands A national organization for community development ,works with local organizations around the country to facilitate community-led neighbourhood development. The government set aside \$195 million for 40 neighbourhoods for a period of four years .A local council decides what is best for these neighbourhoods .Usually small activities are proposed. Events that bring people together. Often related to festivals, sports and markets .Most of these areas can receive up to \$430.000 per year.

Money might be tight for our government but putting a nooze around the necks of rural areas is definitely a lack of vision and a lack of trust.
