

RHUBARB MUFFINS Combine 1 cup finely chopped rhubarb ¹/₄ cup soft butter 1 cup brown sugar in a small bowl and mix with a fork to blend. Then spoon mixture evenly in 12 prepared muffin tins. Next beat 1/3cup soft butter, 1/3 cup white sugar 1 egg together until fluffy. Mix dry ingredients together $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups flour 2 teaspoons baking powder $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt ¹/₂ teaspoon nutmeg Combine dry ingredients with butter mixture alternately with $\frac{1}{2}$ cup milk. Stir just to blend. Spoon into muffin tin over rhubarb. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 20 - 25minutes. Turn out on rack and let stand few minutes.







Why do so many people suffer from seasonal allergies? Some cough and wheeze, others fight joint pain and stiffness. Is it due to just too much pollen in the air? Or is it also the result of a badly stressed and depleted immune system? 
The University of Guelph carried out a randomized, double-blind, placebocontrolled study of sterols using the remedy "Immuno-Care". Researchers concluded that this product had a positive effect on the immune system. For instance, the clinical study showed a decrease in basophil blood cells. These release histamine that is normally responsible for allergic reactions. There was also a reduction of interleukin-6, the cause of inflammation and pain.



The ingredients are also products of non-genetically modified soy, proanthocyanidins, fruit and essential fatty acids from oil producing seeds. All are contained in a 100 percent vegetable derived capsule.

The dosage for this dietary supplement is one capsule daily 30 minutes before a meal, on an empty stomach with water or fruit juice, but not with milk or drinks containing fat. Women who are pregnant, nursing or are diabetic should consult their doctor before taking this supplement.

Taking Immuno-Care prior to a meal also helps to block the intestinal absorption of cholesterol. Recent studies have shown that both phytosterols and Enzogenol can decrease low density lipoprotein (LDL), the bad cholesterol, and increase high density lipoprotein (HDL), the good cholesterol.



Havelock Homecoming!

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In 1812 James Keith and James Price moved from New Canaan to Butternut Ridge, named for the abundance of Butternut Trees in the area. There were also numerous maple and beech trees, in March of that year James Keith built a sugar camp, a few weeks later Mrs. Keith joined him in a handsled drawn by her boys. A short while later Mr. James Price settled near James Keith. Mr. George Price was the next to settle, he dammed what is known today as the Ridge Brook and built a saw mill, which produced much needed lumber for the expanding community.

The first school was built where the Soldier's Monument now stands. It was a log building about 17 feet square. In 1825 the first place of worship was built, before the first church, services were held in private residences

One of the most notable stories from our past is the disappearance of the two Keith girls, aged 7 and 5. They had gone out to drive the cows a short distance home. When they didn't return, their father and a number of neighbours went out looking for them, but returned home with no sign of the girls. Some 25 years later a woman appeared in town and claimed she was one of the sisters. Many of her friends and relatives asked her to stay, but since she had established herself with the native people, she decided to return to her Micmac family. There is a monument on Route 880 dedicated to these two girls.

Wolves had become a problem for the settlers of Butternut Ridge. One night there was a fire at the home of James Keith and he had to leave his sheep out to pasture, come morning the wolves had demolished his herd. It was decided that the settlers would rid themselves of the nuisance. They armed themselves with guns, clubs, pots, and sticks. Lining themselves up shoulder to shoulder they marched through the woods making noise, and driving the creatures from their lands. They weren't bothered by wolves again.

In 1858 the parish of Studholm was divided, and the parish of Havelock was formed. It was named for General Havelock, a British general well known for his military service in India, and the Indian Rebellion of 1857.

In the 1890's, Havelock had a number of enterprises, the village contained two large stores, three blacksmith shops, a carriage shop, and boot and shoe shop, a cheese factory, a match factory, and the Havelock Mineral Springs Company. The railway brought many people to our community and needing a place to stay a hotel was also established

In the mid-1920's lime was first manufactured in Havelock. It started with George Downey setting up with a lime-crushing business in Havelock. The lime was brought up from James Coates farm, the employees

would then break the pieces with sledgehammers small enough to fit in the crusher. In 1933 the operation moved to Springhill, then in 1938 Mr. Roy Alward bought the lime-crusher, and in 1944 the plant was moved back to Havelock. The plant continued to expand, and in 1987 the first vertical shaft kiln was built, the only one of its kind in North America. The plant is now owned and operated by Graymont.

This year we'll be celebrating these stories and much more of the past 200 years in Havelock. Please join us for a day of family fun!

News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame

Greater Moncton Street Rods Inducted November 15, 2008 Club

In the summer of 1983 Bill Merkley, who had just moved to Moncton from Ontario, was looking for some street rodders to associate with. He met Fernand LeBlanc, Bernie Melanson and Terry LeBlanc and a meeting was held around Fernand's dining room table and a blueprint for a new car club was formulated. A club was initiated with a proper constitution, meeting format and membership criteria so a solid foundation was laid for future structured growth. They also spent a lot of time on the name of the club, which proved wise, as it has become a significant and recognized identity. That was the beginning of Greater Moncton Street Rods. The first club event was participation in the Speed Sport Show in April 1984 with a 4-car club display. This was memorable event because they had to drive their street rods in a major spring snowstorm, which pained them tremendously. That summer GMSR had several club outings locally and a couple of out of town rod runs to Nova Scotia and PEI as well as the Sussex Antique Auto Flea Market. During this time period a couple of new members, Al and Peter Beaumont were invited to join the club. The first Greater Moncton Street Rods "Fun Run" was held in June of 1985. Substantial preparation and planning went into this event but the fact that a hurricane breezed thru on Saturday affected the outcome on Sunday and limiting participation to about 20 cars. Later in the summer GMSR participated in several other Rod Runs with the Club and continued to attract new members. Terry Malley joined that year, and he was later to become the longest running club president. (11 years) Planning for Fun Run #2 was under way and the club never looked back. More and more street rodders joined with an ideal club size of about 25 member families-Greater Moncton Street Rods is very active and have hosted many successful outdoor car shows during the last twenty- five years. Their popular series of annual Fun Runs were acknowledged as the high point in the region's summer car show series for many years. In 1994, in co-sponsorship with the Canadian Street Rod Association, GMSR hosted the Canadian Street Rod Nationals, known as "Canats 94", which was the largest and most successful outdoor car show in Atlantic Canada. This show drew participants from all parts of Canada and the United States; approximately 1100 families brought their street rods, muscle cars, customs and antiques to participate in that four-day event. In 2000, the GMSR membership decided that they had the talent and resources to hold an annual national

scale car show which lead to the birth of the Atlantic Nationals Automotive Extravaganza. In eight short years it has become the largest automotive event in Canada drawing street rods from all over Canada and the US, almost 1800 participants and an estimated 140,000 people. Show participants began lining up at 4 a.m. in anticipation of finding a prime parking space to show their vehicle in Centennial Park. When the gates opened to the public at 8 a.m., the park was already filling up with show cars. Events at the Park included a model boat regatta in Centennial Park Lake, a model car exhibit, music at the bandstand, a huge vendor show sponsor area, specialty food vendors activities for children and much more. Thousands of spectators filled more than one mile of Moncton's Main Street and adjoining side streets from early morning until well past midnight for the Atlantic Nationals Downtown Cruise-in-Street Party. It is almost impossible to see the vintage cars for all the people. Every restaurant and pub in the area was filled to capacity. The caliber of the show has also attracted automotive celebrities' such as Dennis Gage from "My Classic Car" and Chip Foose from "Over-Haulin". As a not-for-profit organization, over the years, Greater Moncton Street Rods has donated proceeds from all of it's shows to a variety of deserving charities including, the Children's Wish Foundation and the IWK Children's Hospital to name a few. In 1994 GMSR used "Canats 94" to launch a fiveyear fundraising program to raise money to help purchase playground equipment for disabled children in Moncton's Centennial Park. This commitment to Centennial Park and disabled children has continued with the Atlantic Nationals, with the recent completion of an automotive-themed. wheelchair accessible water theme park. As GMSR celebrated its 25th Anniversary, in 2008, it continued its commitment to community projects and continuing to support the automotive hobby in our region. The Greater Moncton Street Rods has proved that not only can motor sports be fun but can also help fund many worthwhile programs in the community, as well as provide entertainment for many people.Because of the Greater Moncton Street Rods hard work and devotion to motor sports it is fitting they should be inducted into the Mar itime Motorsports Hall Of Fame. President
