On May 31st, the Honourable Jim Flaherty, Minister of Finance, MP Rodney Weston and I were at the St. Martins Volunteer Fire Department to praise the hard work Canada's volunteer firefighters do and to highlight the federal government's support for these vital first responders.

In Budget 2011, the federal government announced a 15% non-refundable tax credit on an amount of \$3,000 effective for the 2011 and subsequent taxation years for volunteer fire-fighters who perform at least 200 hours of service for their communities during a year.

The Volunteer Firefighters Tax Credit is another example of our Government delivering concrete results to Canadians to ensure that they get to keep more of their hard-earned money.

June 11th was Tax Freedom Day, the date Canadians earned enough money to pay all the taxes they owe to all levels of government. In 2005, Tax Freedom Day was June 26th. Today, Tax Freedom Day is over 2 weeks earlier due to the efforts of our government to reduce taxes and ensure that Canadians can keep more of their hard earned money. In fact, we've reduced the overall tax burden on Canadians to its lowest level in nearly 50 years saving the typical Canadian family over \$3,100.

Our government has made over 140 tax reductions which include cutting the GST from 7% to 5%, providing the Working Income Tax Benefit, the Child Tax Credit as well as the Children's Fitness Tax Credit. We have lowered personal taxes, reduced business taxes and introduced the landmark Tax Free Savings Account.

RICK'S RANT

As every motor vehicle owner knows, once a year we must dig out the old cheque book, or rid our wallet of "hard earned dollars" to pay for renewal of our vehicles' registration.... you can't escape it!!!! However, at a recent car show, I noticed several owners who were trying to beat the system, and in a way they were....but illegally. Each of these show vehicles were sporting "Antique" licence plates. Why is that breaking the law to save a few dollars?

If you check out New Brunswick's "Motor Vehicle Act", the very first definition, on the very first page is "Antique Vehicle: a motor vehicle that is at least twenty-five years old and restored to original condition.". If your vehicle is registered as an "Antique", the annual fee is \$18.00. As a regular vehicle, the fee is based on weight/mass and starts at \$55.00 for vehicles up to 1000kg, \$98.00 up to 1600kg, and so on..... That results in a saving of 80% or more on your average full sized old car.

At the aforementioned car show, I decided to do a survey of "Antique" plated vehicles. There were 76 vehicles which were at least 25 years old and therefor could be considered "antique" vehicles. Of these, 8 (approximately 10%) were wearing NB Dept. of Motor Vehicle "Antique/Ancien" registration plates. Upon observation, only 2 (being 20%) seemed to fit the correct rule of "restored to original condition", in other words NO MODIFICA-TIONS!!! One had only new aluminium wheels, a minor infraction; two others had new wheels, modern engine, transmission, etc but still had the appearance of an "original" vehicle; and that left three. One of those was a highly modified, blower sticking out of the hood, fat tired street racer! The other two were pro-street/pro-touring, high horsepower muscle cars..... So none of these six conformed to the intentions of the rules for "Antique" vehicle as set out in the "Motor Vehicle Act".

My original 1928 Ford Tudor does have an "Antique" designation.... the 4,346th vehicle in New Brunswick to have an AA plate. If statistics hold true, than only 20% or less than 870 are true "antiques"!!!! That means 3,475 illegal vehicles are travelling on New Brunswick roads. With each one costing the government an average of a \$100 in lost revenue, that results in \$347,500 for road repairs, will have to come from your other pocket.

Want to place a bet on how many will be issued tickets this summer? I'll say one just in case??!!??, but I expect it to be less..... Why not, as I do, confront those lawbreakers when you see them at events.... and maybe you'll help by embarrassing them enough that they will "legally" register their vehicle. And guess what? It will save YOU some hard

earned cash!!!!!



BY COLLEEN B. HUBERTIN THAT LONG AGO TIME WHEN THINGS WERE SAVED, WHEN ROADS WERE GRAVELED AND BARRELS WERE STAVED, WHEN WORN-OUT CLOTHING WAS USED AS RAGS, AND THERE WERE NO PLASTIC WRAP OR BAGS, AND THE WELL AND THE PUMP WERE WAY OUT BACK, A VERSITILE ITEM, WAS THE FLOUR SACK.

PILLSBURY'S BEST, MOTHER'S AND GOLD MEDAL, TOO STAMPED THEIR NAMES PROUDLY IN PURPLE AND BLUE. THE STRING SEWN ON TOP WAS PULLED AND KEPT; THE FLOUR EMPTIED AND SPILLS WERE SWEPT. THE BAG WAS FOLDED AND STORED IN A SACK THAT DURABLE, PRACTICAL FLOUR SACK.

THE SACK COULD BE FILLED WITH FEATHERS AND DOWN, FOR A PILLOW, OR T'WOULD MAKE A NICE SLEEPING GOWN. IT COULD CARRY A BOOK AND BE A SCHOOL BAG, OR BECOME A MAIL SACK SLUNG OVER A NAG. IT MADE A VERY CONVENIENT PACK, THAT ADAPTABLE, COTTON FLOUR SACK.

BLEACHED AND SEWN, IT WAS DUTIFULLY WORN AS BIBS, DIAPERS, OR KERCHIEF ADORNED. IT WAS MADE INTO SKIRTS, BLOUSES AND SLIPS. AND MOM BRAIDED RUGS FROM ONE HUNDRED STRIPS SHE MADE RUFFLED CURTAINS FOR THE HOUSE OR SHACK, FROM THAT HUMBLE BUT TREASURED FLOUR SACK!

AS A STRAINER FOR MILK OR APPLE JUICE, TO WAVE MEN IN, IT WAS A VERY GOOD USE, AS A SLING FOR A SPRAINED WRIST OR A BREAK, TO HELP MOTHER ROLL UP A JELLY CAKE, AS A WINDOW SHADE OR TO STUFF A CRACK, WE USED A STURDY, COMMON FLOUR SACK!

AS DISH TOWELS, EMBROIDERED OR NOT, THEY COVERED UP DOUGH, HELPED PASS PANS SO HOT, TIED UP DISHES FOR NEIGHBORS IN NEED, AND FOR MEN OUT IN THE FIELD TO SEED. THEY DRIED DISHES FROM PAN, NOT RACK THAT ABSORBENT, HANDY FLOUR SACK!

WE POLISHED AND CLEANED STOVE AND TABLE, SCOURED AND SCRUBBED FROM CELLAR TO GABLE, WE DUSTED THE BUREAU AND OAK BED POST, MADE COSTUMES FOR OCTOBER (A SCARY GHOST) AND A PARACHUTE FOR A CAT NAMED JACK. FROM THAT LOWLY, USEFUL OLD FLOUR SACK!

SO NOW MY FRIENDS, WHEN THEY ASK YOU AS CURIOUS YOUNGSTERS OFTEN DO, "BEFORE PLASTIC WRAP, ELMERS GLUE AND PAPER TOWELS, WHAT DID YOU DO?" TELL THEM LOUDLY AND WITH PRIDE DON'T LACK, "GRANDMOTHER HAD THAT WONDERFUL FLOUR SACK

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BUTTERSCOTCH PUDDING Mix together: 1 cup flour 2¹/₂ teaspoons baking powder ¹/₄ teaspoon salt 1/3 cup brown sugar Add ¹/₂ cup milk ¹/₄ cup Butterscotch chips Stir well and spread in a 4 cup baking dish Next mix ³/₄ cup brown 1 tablespoon butter 1 ³/₄ cups boiling water Pour over batter and bake at 375 degrees F. for 20 minutes. Makes 6 servings. May serve with milk or whipped topping.

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WEDDING PLANNING

The first thing is to buy a zippered 3 ring binder to hold all samples, colours, and pictures, etc. Use zippered snack bags to hold these. If you keep it in the car or take it with you each time you go out you will always have a chance to pick up things you need cheaply.

THINGS TO DO

Obtain Marriage License:

Usually available at city hall, but you will need your dates.

Book Church:

Most churches require booking well in advance to avoid double booking.

If you have a friend, who is a minister, that you want to perform the ceremony; don't forget to ask the minister of the church as a courtesy.

If you choose an outdoors or hall wedding you need to book a justice of the peace that will do it. They can be found by contacting city hall.

Book Reception:

The time of the wedding will determine the type of reception.

Early morning or late afternoon usually requires a sit down meal.

Early afternoon or early evening could require sandwiches, cheese, crackers, etc.

A late evening wedding could have a reception of nibblers and wedding cake.

A buffet could also replace a sit down meal for some people.

Some halls provide the meal; others just provide the hall.

Some halls are all inclusive: they provide hall, food, decoration, and music for dance

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etc. They are usually more expensive than non all inclusive.

Most receptions don't need a desert because you have wedding cake.

Book Photographer:

This should be done very early so you can get the photographer that you want.

A photographer should provide shots they have done for you to see; many professionals have a set schedule that they follow.

The photographer should be with the bride and/or groom from getting dressed to couples dance and cutting the cake.

Book Cake:

You need to know how many guests and, if you are not serving other food, you will need more cake.

Usually the top layer is saved for the 1^{st} anniversary of the couple.

Cakes today usually reflect the theme of the wedding and the couple's favorite flavors.

Cakes can be various sizes, shapes, levels, styles and flavors. They are one way to make your wedding really memorable.

Invitations:

Computer generated or professional invitations.

They should be mailed at least 6 weeks before the wedding; the RSVP should be due at least 3 weeks before the wedding





Attendants Dresses:

Pick the number of attendants you want and can afford.

Colours are often the bride's choice, but may be a compromise. (Redheads cannot wear pink or red)

Attendants usually pay for their own dresses, shoes, hair, etc.

If the bride insists upon a specific style she may have to pay for them herself.

If dresses are rented, remember that someone, somewhere, sometime before had your style of wedding.

Today, shoes do not have to match dresses unless the wedding is very formal.

Tuxedos:

The grooms can be the same or different from all the others.

The fathers of the couple could opt to wear them or not, but it should be the same for both and they should match the attendants.

Decide if you want cummerbunds or vests, both could be used with the groom wearing one and the attendants wear the other.

The guys usually pay for their own tuxedos.

If the bride's dress is off white, make sure men's shirts are off white also.

Flowers:

These need to be ordered at least 3 months



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in advance.

Decide on silk, real, dried, etc.

The style is determined by the formality of the wedding.

Colours reflect the season, dress colours, and bride's choice

Hold several styles in front of you; look for size and ease of carrying, before you decide.

f using real flowers, find out how long they will last before falling and how strong a scent they have.

The flowers needed are:

Bridal bouquet and throw away bouquet,

Attendants bouquets, usually similar in style and shape to those of the bride but smaller.

Boutonnieres for the groom, male attendants and fathers of the couple.

Corsages are needed for mothers of the couple.

If grandparents are present they should also have flowers.

Wedding Make-up:

The bride should have her dress bridesmaid's colours, ideas of flowers, etc. before her makeup consultation: since these determine the style, colour and intensity of the makeup. Wedding makeup for the bride and her attendants will be pushed to the limit for endurance with hugs, kisses, and tears; so it needs to be good quality, well applied and long wearing while still looking natural with a boost. This notch above natural is what you are looking for so that wedding pictures will, for years to

come, show your true happiness and beauty on the big day. No heavy eyes, no super strong colour lips that will need constant touch ups, and of course, only water proof mascara

Decorations:

These break down into two groups:

Church:

Flowers for the front of the church, if an arrangement is used it is often left for the churches' use. Large candelabra are usually rented and decorated.

Pew markers can be simple or elaborate and reflect the style of the wedding, the colours and the couples taste.

Reception:

Center pieces for the guest's tables and head table.

Basket or holder for cards and gifts of money should go on the gift table,

Decorations for around hall such as helium filled and anchored balloons, bushes with mini lights for a soft look, a back drop for the head table for picture purposes, bells, candles etc.

Napkins and plates in colours determined by the rest of the wedding.

Table cloths for head and cake tables will be needed if not provided by the hall.

Pictures of the bride and groom during their relationship or life could be put at the front.

Weddings are a reflection of the couple and should be individual. If you want



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News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame



LEWIS (JUNIOR) KELLY Inducted November 15, 2008 COMPETITOR/STOCK CAR

Junior Kelly, from Lower Sackville, was one of the many drivers that gained their first racing experience on the then popular dirt oval, Green Acres Raceway.

His first race car was a 1949 Chev, number 13. The year was 1963; he didn't even have a driver's license.

Many race fans will remember the number 13 with the words "Bad News" that raced in the '70's.

Monday, August 9, 1976 - The headlines in the Chronicle Herald read "Kelly beats Fraser to win the Modified Feature".

Junior finished third in the Late Model Bob McDonald 100 at Atlantic Motorsports Park September 8, 1979. Only the late Don Biederman of Ontario and Terry Clattenburg of Dartmouth finished ahead of him.

Junior, like all other drivers, had his up's and down's in his racing achievements. One of his best races came back in 1979, at Atlantic Speedway, he won the first 50 laps of the Twin 50's, then having to start at the back in the second 50, he thought he didn't have a chance to get to the front, but he came through to win. This made him the over-all winner.

One of Juniors biggest disappointments was in 1981, on Saturday night at River Glade Speedway NB. He over heated the engine and ruined it. That caused him to miss his biggest weekend of the season.

In 1982 he enjoyed a successful season finishing in the top five ten occasions.

Junior was one of the drivers in the inaugural MASCAR race at Riverside Speedway on May 22,1983, an association formed in an effort to keep the Late Model Modified class alive and it worked as the Pro Stock is a benefit of that.

1983 Junior made Onslow Speedway his home track and on August 13 the Daily News read, "Junior Kelly showed the capacity crowd that he came to race as he won both heats plus the 30-lap Late Model feature.

In '84 he finished second in the MASCAR points. 1985 he was Point Champion when he clinched first place in the \$10,000 MASCAR Miller Life points fund.

May 29, 1988 Junior Kelly was the big winner in front of a crowd of 4000 at Scotia Speed world on its grand opening weekend. Driving his Spryfield Auto Parts number 50 Firebird, he led the final five laps of the Hunt Personnel 100 to pick up the checkered flag.

Most of Juniors success came after teaming up with Bob Riley, the man who built his engines.

He and his team added class to the Nova Scotia stock car racing scene. He would show his car in several car shows to promote his sponsors and the sport of auto racing.Lewis (Junior) Kelly received his award from Rudy Foster to be inducted into the Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame.



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


