

Scott Lutes is campaigning to represent Canada in the Sonar class at the 2012 London Paralympics. The Millar/Campbell/Lutes team has a strong shot at a medal in the 3 person class.

Lutes started sailing competitively in 2007, racing in the Paralympic one person 2.4 mr class. In August 2011 he tried out for a position on the 3 person Sonar and joined the team full time in November 2011. The team has been working hard to prepare for the big push to the September games. Championship Regatta show good potential for the podium at the 2012 Paralympics.

Lutes became a wheel chair rider in 1974 after a motor vehicle accident. He grew up in Petitcodiac, living with his aunt and uncle, Brenda and Graham Newcomb, and currently resides in Montreal. Lutes has a true love for the sport, "there's an amazing thrill in racing sailboats. Disability doesn't matter, you find ways to adapt and bring all your abilities into play."

Lutes acknowledges that the only drawback regarding this sport is the lack of funding for amateur athletes. Along with the expense of the sailboat and adapted equipment, there's the necessity of travelling and the time devoted to training. Although fundraising is not Lutes primary concern, he graciously accepts donations towards his efforts. That is, to win Canada a PARALYMPIC MEDAL!!!

Every Day People.... submitted by Sheila Boissonneault A look in the life of the oldest resident of River Glade, Ernest (Poque) Gourley



On the 3rd of December 1929 at 6 years of age Poque Gourley arrived in River Glade with his father, mother, and five surviving siblings. His father purchased a General Store across the track on Sanatorium Road already stocked and ready, the family was in business. The back rooms of the store were unfinished having only paper on the walls, but soon those rooms and the three bedrooms upstairs were finished and the family settled into a good life in the village of River Glade

Pogue's mother took on the job of tending her family and the store. They sold everything from molasses to wash tubs, pails and brushes to curry for horses. Pogue remembers the first order was fifty dollars. Along with the store Pogue's father opened a slaughter house and butcher shop.

In 1941, at the age of seventeen Pogue en-

listed in the military, he spent time in England, Sicily, Italy, and France. Like many of the soldiers who came back from the war he doesn't talk too much of what happened during his time, but we know he learned about survival and how to handle weapons. In 1946 he was discharged from the army and he took a job with the CNR as a charge hand and a boiler maker's helper. It was during this time that he met Jean Campbell, a widow with one child. They married and Pogue built his family a home and raised five children.

In 1952 Pogue left the CNR and worked for the Forestry, then in 1957 he brought his parent's store, later moving it to the Texaco Garage on Highway 106. Because he worked late hours at the Texaco he decided to carry a gun, although he never let it be known. He never had to use his gun, but late one night he stopped a fight in the store and he did that quickly and efficiently. Because of his experience with guns in the military those who may have tried to steal from him probably knew better than to try. He worked seven days a week there until the company told him they were raising the rent on the space for the store. Pogue didn't agree with that so in 1975 he built a building on his property and moved his store there. At that time there were four stores in the village.

After the children left home Jean decided to open a restaurant in the store and she would be the cook. She proved to be a good one and the community enjoyed her fare keeping her busy between a counter and a dining room. Pogue went into the scrap business, and he also trapped and sold rabbits going every weekend with a load of rabbits to Sydney Nova Scotia to sell them to the boats from Newfoundland. He also brought and sold furs, he had his own fox ranch of 250 females, raising silver, reds and crosses. When he couldn't sell his furs right away he would salt them. He enjoyed hunting and fishing and always had fresh game on hand.

It's men like Pogue that make our country strong, hard working men and their small business meeting the needs of the community, not to get rich and famous, just to live well. Men who love their families and share what they have with them. I am pleased to call Pogue a neighbour and friend.


GRAND OPENING OF ELGIN PARK






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Harvard Beets

The Doctor game – W. Gifford-Jones M.D. Sorry, But What We Told You Is Wrong

Winston Churchill, Britain's wartime Prime Minister, once remarked, "To every question there is a clear, concise, coherent answer that is wrong". In medicine there are also many questions, and all too often the answers from experts are found years later to be wrong, sometimes with devastating consequences.

A report in the Archives of Internal Medicine found that 13 percent of research articles published in the prestigious New England Journal of Medicine in 2009 reported reversals in medical findings involving drugs, screening tests and invasive procedures!

For example, for years we've been told that increasing good cholesterol is a prudent move. But new research shows it does nothing to protect against heart attack, strokes and early death.

Here's another hummer. Doctors have urged men to have regular PSA testing. Now, it's reported that routine prostate-cancer screening is less likely to save lives and more likely to cause substantial harm from the treatment.

Do you ever cringe when you're with a friend who has a knuckle-cracking habit? Since we've been told this leads to arthritis, why not bite the bullet and bluntly tell them to stop it. But in a research study that reviewed hand X-rays of 215 people aged 50 to 59 the incidence of arthritis was about the same in those who did or did not crack their knuckles.

We've also been warned by health nuts, and everyone else, that for good health we must drink at least eight glasses of water a day. This feeling persists in spite of the fact that there's never been any scientific evidence of its benefit. The Institute of Medicine reports that most people get the water they need by letting thirst guide them.

No doubt many of those reading this column will be heading for the gym this week. There's little doubt that they will stretch before and after exercising. After all, this prevents injury. But does it? A study presented at the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons found that stretching before running had no effect in preventing injuries. However, they did conclude that doing an easy 5minute warm-up to increase range of motion makes exercise easier.

Here's the most recent example of reversal. Today millions of North Americans are taking bisphosonates, such as Fosamax and Aclasta, drugs designed to decrease the risk of developing brittle bones. Consumers have been told by doctors that this medication is effective and safe. But now the U.S. Food and Drug Administration reports that these drugs may not be of much advantage

for many women.

This is followed by a report in the Archives of Internal Medicine that women taking bisphosonates are more likely to develop serious and unusual fractures of the femoral bone. This is admittedly a rare occurrence, but if it happens to you it's a 100 percent hit. What is more worrying is that these fractures are not the result of a fall or accident. Rather, the thigh bone snaps for no apparent reason. In addition, it is not known why these drugs are linked on rare occasions to degeneration of jaw bone.

A professor once started his lecture by saying, "All this has been said before, but must be said again because no one listened". I've often stressed in this column that there is no free lunch when taking prescription drugs. But not enough people listen, so I too have to say it again.

So how many more medical reversals will hit the headlines in the years to come? I have no crystal ball to know the exact number, but history shows there will be many more.

I will make one prediction, that sooner or later there will be convincing evidence that cholesterol-lowering drugs do more harm than good and may be one of the greatest medical errors of modern times. I realize it's close to heresy to make this remark, like damning Motherhood and apple pie. And I'm wise enough to know that in making such a rash statement, I too may be 100 percent wrong. Time will tell.

The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame (MMHF) Inductees were chosen Sunday, July 15th for the 2012 induction. This will bring the total enshrined to seventy-two. They include talent of many facets in Motorsports, from Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

In the Antique category: **Gordon Armstrong**, NB, deceased. Gordon was affectionately known as "The Father of the New Brunswick Antique Auto Club", he was recognized not only throughout NB, but also PEI, NS and Maine. Gordon collected and restored over 15 vehicles. Gordon was recognized as an authority on asphalt paving both in NB and NS.

In the Club category: (1) **The Valley Cruisers Car Club**, **NB**. Saint John. The Club was started in February 1981; they are a member of the MMHF and NAACC. The Club has over 150 members. The Club has donated over \$75,000 to local Children charities. (2) **The Luxor Shriners Club**, Moncton NB. The Mini Kar Unit was started in 1977. Over the last 25 years, the Unit has assisted in raising over \$100,000 to support Shriners Hospital Transportation. The Provincial Shrine Executive in Saint John and Shriners International recognizes them. The Unit has won many awards.

Drag Racing category: **Gregory Allan Nickerson**, Lower Sackville, NS. Started racing in 1972. In 1985 was first Maritime to win a NHRA sanction in SanAir Quebec. In 1986 Greg led a project team to re-open Maitland Dragway. In 2011 Greg went 14 rounds undefeated and clinched the Stock/Superstock Championship, yet again.

Media category: **Dizzy Dean Murray**, deceased, formally from NB, became the Motor Sports entrepreneur in Ontario, where he remained. In 1965 he founded one of the first Racing papers (Wheelspin News) in North America. Was an announcer at many tracks and sponsored races, including River Glade Speedway. He began and ran Motion Car Shows. He was a Motor Sports consultant. He was inducted into the Canadian Motorsports Hall Of Fame in 1995.

Promoter/Builder category: **Cecil Vance & Harry Poole**, Dartmouth, NS. They have been involved with racing over 35 years. They built Scotia Speedworld that has kept stockcar racing in the Halifax area for 25 years. They have sponsored races, took over the Maritime Pro Stock Tour, the top racing tour in Eastern Canada, 10 years ago and made it what it is today.

Road Challenge category: **Garry Sowerby**, Dartmouth, NS. In 1978 he left his job and set out on a six-month journey through South and Central America. Dubbed by the media as the "Indiana Jones of adventure driving". He made a career out of personal challenge and high adventure by embarking on the longest drives on the face of the planet and completing them in incredible record-breaking times. He has set four world records for endurance driving and has been entered into the Guinness Book Of Records.

Stockcar category: (1) **Paul Lewis**, Salisbury,NB, deceased. Raced from 1965 to 1996 and was a Most Popular Driver eleven years. Won numerous races and was a points champion five times. (2) **Donald Wooldridge**, Charlottetown, PEI. Nickname "Duckie". Started racing at age 14 in 1962. His motto: "Win, Crash or Blow is the only way to go". He was one of the main people that started the Prince Edward Island Street Rod Association. He now pits for Darren McKinnon. (3) **Smokin' Joe Albert**, Minto, NB. Won his first championship on a dirt track in 1966. Was most popular driver many times. Was inducted in the Minto Sports Wall Of Fame in 2007.

News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame



GORDON (BOO) KING Inducted November 15, 2008 Competitor/Drag Racing Boo King Racing - home of the "Nuclear Banana"

Gordon (Boo) King is one of those individuals who eat, sleep and breathes drag racing.There isn't a too fast in his vocabulary.

Boo worked three jobs when he was a teenager, this allowed him to buy his first car at age 16. A 2 door, 1957 Chev..

Next he purchased and installed a 396 cu. in. engine and 4-speed transmission in the Chev. He heard of a drag strip starting at the old Blissfield Airstrip and decided to try it. He won his Class with a time of 12.9 sec.. He was hooked.In the early '80's thought Bikes would be faster. He bought a box of bike parts and created a very fast drag bike.

On Bikes he was a winner, claiming 3 or 4 Championships. He raced tracks in Quebec, Ontario and down the east coast of the United States as far Maryland.

His wins caught the attention of National dragsters several times. His skills as a bracket racer were known far and wide.

Boo and a few friends saw the issue of illegal street racing and decided to find a positive solution. "Noonan Nationals," created to mimic the excitement of street racing within the safety net of track safety, tech, and safety crews, Boo was the first president. This greatly reduced the street racing in the Fredericton area. The "Noonan Nationals continues to this day.

He wanted a car with a Chrome Molley frame so bought Steve Carrier's Pro-Street '68 Camaro. He thought that the bright yellow Camaro looked like a very fast banana thus the name "The Nuclear Banana". He recruited a team of old and new friends, the 'Team Nuclear Banana" was formed. In 2005 Boo decided to go to Cayuga, Ontario for "Canada's Fastest Street Car Shoot out" he entered the "Pro Outlaw", this pitted his street driven Camearo against Fibreglass blown alcohol race cars. He qualified fifth and finished third.

Boo also set the Canadian streetdriven record of 7.20 seconds.

On October 1st, 2005, which happened to be Boo's 50th birthday, at Miramachi Dragway he reset the record that still stands of 7.092 seconds at 199.2 miles per hour.

The "Nuclear Banana" appeared on the cover of Rpm Magazine as well as news reports by ATV News, CBC TV and CBC radio.

In 2006 he decided to try street tires and returned to Canada's Fastest Street Car Shoot out capturing the title "Real Street Outlaw". This title still stands to day.

The Nuclear Banana is Canada's Fastest Street Driven Car.

Gordon (Boo) King has been successful as an ambassador of this sport and the Maritimes. Lots of free t-shirts and interviews are given to young fans that are the future of the sport. Everywhere he races, his easy laid back style and professionalism leave a lasting and positive impression of "those guys from eastern Canada".

Boo has had a lot of fun racing and plans to have a lot more, he intends to race until he can't shift anymore. He will talk racing with anyone.

Gordon (Boo) King was presented his award by Pat Donova inducting him into the Maritimes Motorsports Hall Of Fame.






