

#### **A Moment of Silence**

The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month. Do we understand the meaning and ceremony behind this special time?

Many of us know or we were taught in school. The end of World War One is 1918, but what does it mean to us in today's world?

Young people are still taught the cold hard facts in school, but with each passing year fewer and fewer Canadian Veterans are with us to help us remember.

Remember...but what are we remembering? Their sacrifice, their bravery, the sudden change in the way of life that so many had to deal with? An entire generation of Canadian civilians were also affected by the War. Rations, shortages of materials, women leaving the home to work, children taught to identify enemy planes and ships. What a different world they lived in.

During World War Two news of their loved ones and events of War were days or weeks old, sometimes months would pass before any letter were received by a family waiting to here from a loved one. Now we hear of events as they happen. Instant information is only one of the things we take for granted today.

The 11<sup>th</sup> hour of the 11<sup>th</sup> day of the 11<sup>th</sup> month..a minute of silence. Do we understand why? Why silence? Why not joyous celebration? An entry from a platoon diary dated May 3, 1945, just two days before the end of World War Two, may allow us some insight as to what was happening in Europe at that time.

"Thousands of prisoners have passed us on route, looters run wild, every man has a German pistol by now and a couple of watches. This will go down in history as the broken, tattered remnants of the super race, beaten and sullen looking. The German civilians are flowing through our lines in hundreds, in total silence, dreading a meeting with the Russian army. We are taking hundreds of prisoners at our outpost."

#### May 5th, 1945

"Germany has collapsed this morning. All the northern part has surrendered at 0800 hrs., Denmark included. The civilians are scared to death. The Russians may owe the Germans a debt, but it's being paid now."

Another soldier's letter home, written on May 5<sup>th</sup>, 1945 describes one soldier's reaction to the end of the War.

"Dear Mother and Dad"

"It's strange up here tonight, everything is so quiet and peaceful, not a sound to be heard anywhere. Sometimes I wonder if I am in the same world as I was, but a matter of 10 hours ago when the shrick of shells passing overhead kept up a steady hum. Our batteries fired a shell every thirty seconds from 7 a.m. to 7:59 a.m., just one minute before 8:00 a.m., the surrender time for Germany. Then came a deadly silence; like when one of our machine gun batteries are wiped out and you know what happened and why. The shooting has stopped. Yes this unearthly silence really does not seem correct, yet we know why it is. You know when you get used to living so near death and deadly weapons you get quite familiar with them and take them as everyday things. Then when they disappear or go out of action it's as though you lost something. Well that's the way I feel right now, and there are many more like me. Men are walking about saying things like "Are you sure this isn't another phony rumor?" Yet it can't be because you can't hear the shells anymore. Well that's it, we can't hear the noise of War any more and in a way it's frightening, the deadly silence of a world at peace. I often wondered how it would be on this day when battle ended. I thought we might go crazy and raise Cain. But, now it's here and almost 12 hours has passed and I have found that is has rather stunned me in many ways.

"So you see we didn't go crazy with glee here at the front, yet we were happy and glad it was over. We perhaps made less fuss here than anywhere else in the world, right here a few hundred yards from the German lines. It's a strange world isn't it?

This letter from Capt. W. Wood of the 1<sup>st</sup> Canadian Army, Overseas written so long ago may now help us understand why we have the minute of silence on November 11<sup>th</sup>.

We wear our poppy proudly on the left, near our heart, and we remove it after 11:00 a.m. on the

11<sup>th</sup>, but how many of us pause in our busy, noisy world for that so important minute of silence?

How many of us really, truly understand the respect paid in that one silent minute?

Perhaps it is time to remember in a different way, maybe we should take that one minute of our so very busy lives and choose to think of just one soldier, sailor, or airman to remember and respect. Perhaps we are just overwhelmed by the numbers lost?

Perhaps we too are overwhelmed by the "deadly silence of a world at peace"?

Whatever you choose to do, please pause at 11:00 a.m., remember in silence, respect their sacrifice and wear a poppy.


#### RICK'S RANT (FOR NOVEMBER)

### <u>The Doctor Game</u> W. Gifford-Jones M.D.

Vitamin C and Lysine Powder Help Prevent Heart Attack

Why is heart attack the number one killer in this country? 99 percent of doctors say it's due to atherosclerosis (hardening of arteries) and that cholesterol lowering drugs are the primary way to treat it. But I say it's because cardiologists have closed minds and are ignoring facts that could save thousands of North Americans from coronary attack.

History shows mankind is not kind to new ideas. In 1847 one maternity patient in six who entered the University Hospital in Vienna left in a coffin. Why? Because esteemed professors ridiculed Dr. Semmelweiss, a colleague, for showing that by simply washing hands after doing an autopsy, deaths were prevented.

Years later Dr. Linus Pauling, two-time Noble Prize winner, is ignored for reporting that large amounts of vitamin C and lysine are needed to prevent coronary attacks. 25 years ago Pauling reported that animals make vitamin C and humans do not. That's why sailors died of scurvy during long sea voyages, but the ship's cat survived.

Vitamin C is required to manufacture healthy collagen, the glue that holds coronary cells together, just like mortar is needed for bricks. Lysine, like steel rods in cement, makes collagen stronger. Pauling claimed it takes a mere 10 milligrams to prevent scurvy, but several thousand to prevent heart attack.

Williams Stehbens, Professor of Anatomy at Wellington University in New Zealand, proved Pauling was right. Stebhens' research showed that coronary arteries closest to the heart are under the greatest pressure. This causes collagen to fracture resulting in the formation of a blood clot and death.

Dr. Sydney Bush, an English researcher, has now proved that vitamin C can reverse atherosclerosis. Bush took retinal photographs, then started his patients on high doses of vitamin C and lysine. One year later additional pictures showed atherosclerosis had regressed in retinal arteries. This also occurs in coronary arteries. So what has happened to these monumental findings? Bush, like Semmelweiss, has been ridiculed by cardiologists. One has to ask whether cardiologists, by ignoring his results, are condemning thousands of people to an early needless coronary heart attack. Fourteen years ago following my own coronary attack, cardiologists claimed it was sheer madness for me to refuse cholesterollowering drugs. Instead, I decided to take high doses of vitamin C plus lysine with breakfast and the evening meal, for several reasons.

I knew that Dr. Graveline, a physician and NASA astronaut, had twice developed transient global amnesia from taking Lipitor. I was also aware that patients have died from CLDs. Others have developed kidney, liver and muscle complications. I also believed the research of Pauling and Stehbens irrefutable. Now, the work of Dr. Bush has convinced me my decision was prudent.

But to take large doses of vitamin C and lysine requires swallowing many pills daily. It's a tall order for those who dislike swallowing one pill. So for several years I've been trying to find a company that would manufacture a combination of vitamin C and lysine powder. Now Medi-C Plus is available at health food stores. Its sales will help support The Gifford-Jones Professorship in Pain Control and Palliative Care at the University of Toronto.

The dosage for the Medi -C Plus combination is one flat scoop with breakfast and the evening meal with either water or orange juice. Those at greater risk should take one flat scoop three times a day. If high doses cause diarrhea, the dose should be decreased.

This column does not recommend that those taking CLDs should stop them. This is a decision that can only be made by patients and doctors.

Most of today's cardiologists are impervious to persuasion. They continue to believe that cholesterol-lowering drugs are the be-all-and-end-all to prevent heart attack. They've been brain-washed by millions of dollars worth of promotion by pharmaceutical companies. It reminds me of the saying that cautions "It's not what you don't know what gets you into trouble, it's the things you know for sure that ain't sol"

It's time for cardiologists to have an open mind and stop ignoring this research. As for me, I bet my life on it. web site www.docgiff.com For comments info@docgiff.com

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#### Prepare a Personal First Aid Kit for Pets

If you are like most pet owners, your pets are valued members of your family. It is a documented fact that many have risked life and limb to save their precious pets during a disaster. Statistically, however, it is more often small cuts and scrapes that occur that require immediate attention, rather than major disasters such as an earthquake or flood. For this reason, every pet owner should have easy access to a first aid kit specifically created for pets.

What would you need immediately if your puppy fell of the bed and started whimpering? You'd need a first aid kit for pets. Supposing your cat had an altercation with the neighbor's dog and the vet was twenty minutes away? You'd need a first aid kit for pets.

A well-stocked first aid kit for pets is not a substitute for veterinary care, but it could save your pet's life, or at least make him more comfortable, until you can get your pet to a veterinarian. The likelihood that your animals will survive an emergency depends largely on emergency planning done today. Therefore, a first aid kit for pets is a necessity.

What should a first aid kit for pets include? To some degree, that will depend upon the type of pet. However, the basics include the following:

- 2 Paw Tip Bandage (Knuckle)
- 2 Fingertip Bandage
- 1 Tape Roll
- 1 Trauma Pad (5 x9)
- 4 -Gauze Pad 4" x 4" 4 -Gauze Pad 2" x2"
- 4 -Gauze Pad 2": 1 -Gauze Roll 2"
- 2 -Examination Gloves
- 1 -Instant Cold Pack
- I Instant Cold Pack
   1 Tweezer
   2- Antibiotic Ointment
- 10- Alcohol Pads10 Antiseptic Towelettes1 Bag

- 1 Pet First Aid Guide 4 - Leg Splints/Tongue Depressors
- 10 Cotton Tip Applicators 1 -Elastic Bandages 2" ("Ace" Type)
- 2 Splinter Removers (Lancets)
- 3 -Sting Relief Pads


Assemble an emergency supply pack which includes the first aid kit for pets, pet food, water, medications, medical records, leashes, a well-fitting muzzle, ID tags and other appropriate supplies. Put this kit in a central location in your home. Remember to take this pack with you when going on an outing, or else prepare a second pack for the car.

The Red Cross offers a Pet First Aid booklet with suggestions on creating a first aid kit for pets.

What should you do to ensure your pet's survival and to avoid those feelings of panic when an accident or illness occurs? Plan, purchase, prepare and practice. Obtain a first aid kit for pets, and then review the materials it contains. It isn't sufficient to simply have the supplies; you must know how they are used. Learn the necessary skills so your actions become instinctive...even when you are under stress

Planning ahead is the key to keeping your pets safe when disaster strikes.



#### The Accident Report




**People Who Laugh a lot Live Longer**



There's no better way to honor the veterans of WWII then to spend time with them and listen to their story. That's just what I decided to do on a Sunday afternoon and I feel privileged to have spent those moments with Bertram Bishop, a soon to be 94 year old veteran.

Bertram was born in Hillgrove on December the 27, 1918. We will begin his memories with the visit of his 20 year old brother, who resided in the US. He invited Bertram to return to the US with him for a season. Then upon his return home to Hillgrove Bertram discovered that many of his peers had joined the army. He took a job in a lumber yard for \$2.00 a day, but soon got tired of that, so he went in training for the army. He married his girlfriend and they started a family. Then in 1941 he officially joined the military and went to Woodstock for training. He found a boarding house for his wife and son; a daughter was born there in 1942. Afterwards he was called up to go overseas.

The troops left Halifax on the Queen Elizabeth escorted by jets overhead and corvettes in the water for the first few days. Then alone at sea she changed course every seven minutes, for it took seven minutes to line up a torpedo. Near 20,000 souls were on that ship; an interesting fact was the turning of the swimming pools into mess halls. The ship ended up in Gourock Scotland where the troops were loaded onto barges that took them to port and then from there onto trains to their destination.

Bertram said that on the Front lines, it was every man for himself. You put your life on the line every day, and in the dugout you persevered until the end. You dug a trench and that's where you stayed until relieved; some mornings you'd wake up lying in water. Even the Captain and the Lieutenant did their part doing the graveyard shift.

The battle continued and their breaks from it were few. He had three close calls, one he vividly remembers. A sniper, he didn't see, shot at him; the bullet passed by his ear, the retort of that bullet followed resounding in his ear for some time. The sniper didn't get a second chance. On a better note, they

looked forward to getting mail from home, and the cigarettes. They didn't know the dangers of smoking then. It's a serious proposition today.

Speaking of cigarettes he recalled the time Hitler's men, dressed as American soldiers and speaking perfect English, went amongst the troops giving out cigarettes. But the men asked them questions about the Baseball Series back home and discovered by their answers just who they were.

Bertram operated the big Mortar machine guns and with these guns they supported the infantry, if they needed help they would call on them. Unfortunately he saw one blow up and two men were killed.

D Day was declared when Bertram was in Oldenburg Germany, he remembers that because at home they had two apple trees that produced Oldenburg apples, and he assumes that they originated in Oldenburg. That was the fifth of May and they departed the last day of December 1945. They returned on The Duchess of Bedford, she had the nickname "The Drunken Duchess" and rightly so because most everyone was seasick and would pay to have somebody shoot them, that's how bad it was. Nothing like the

#### Queen Elizabeth, that was an easy ride.

Bertram served in Labrador, Cape Britain, and Scotland until he got his discharge papers. He carried his Department of Defense papers for 60 years, even though Bertram was spelled wrong.

Bertram spoke fondly of his wife, of 70 years, Ruby his children and grandchildren and showed me their pictures.

He told me about his two oldest grandchildren's visit to Military Day at the Army Base in Oromocto. They excitedly told him about the big tanks at the base and how they got to take a ride in one. Bertram told them they did well because he was around hundreds of them and he never got to ride in one of them.





News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame



#### Ledwidge Family - Ernie, Cathy and Mike

Inducted November 14, 2009

The Ledwidge Family worked together at a sport they were devoted to.

Ernie worked at helping to promote and build the sport of Stockcar racing for 32 years. Cathy and Mike both worked at it for 25 years. They all had other jobs as well.

It was 1977 when Ernie started scoring for Riverside Speedway. It was at their Riverside 250. Art Steeves and Jerry Lawrence were operating the track at that time. He worked there 3 seasons and introduced a tape recorder into his scoring system.

In 1980, '81 he scored at Onslow Speedway, working for Russell White.

1982, '83 he was race director and scorer at Onslow Speedway working for Ken Packham and Peter Johnstone. This was when Cathy started scoring.

In 1984 they started Maritime Raceway Services with Norman Thompson. This was the same year Riverside Speedway reopened with weekly shows, promoted by Ernie McLean with Ernie Ledwidge as Race Director, Cathy tape scorer and Mike manual lap scoring. They ran only one class of cars, "The Dukes", on Saturday evenings. The first event saw only 11 cars but by 1986 the field grew to over 50 cars.

Ernie Ledwidge also started a Newsletter to send out information to the racers and fans throughout the Maritimes. Those Newsletters today would make interesting reading.

In 1988 Scotia Speedworld opened by the Halifax Airport, not far from the Ledwidges home so they went to work for Cecil Vance, Harry Poole and Jack Osmond, doing what they did best. Mike was now using the computer for the scoring.

In 1994, '95 they helped Jerry O'Leary with the construction and opening of the New Brunswick International Speedway. It opened in August with three divisions: Pro Stock, Sportsman and Street Stock. Ernie was race director, Mike computer scorer/handicapper and Cathy moved to assistant flag-person.

They returned to Scotia Speedworld for the 1996-2000 seasons.

2001 the Maritime Pro Stock Tour began. Ernie, Cathy and Mike took on even more work, touring with the Tour as well as working at Scotia Speedworld.

2002 – 2008 they became full time Tour Officals: Ernie as race director until 2004, he then took a new position as Competition director as well as consultant to Scotia Speedworld. Cathy did tire inventory, track steward and the line-ups from 2003-2006. She was diagnosed with cancer prior to the 2007 season. From 2002 – 2006 Mike was AMB scoring and assistant race director. In 2007 and '8 he was race director.

Only someone with great dedication could do what they did for that length of time.


