#### The Perfect Pass, Self Destruction, then Recovery

What would it be like to be the highest paid athlete in the world, the toast of Boston, the winner of two Stanley Cups, the rich devil-may-care playboy? Then to find yourself broke, alcoholic, drug addicted and sleeping under bridges? In the space of 12 years this all happened to Derek "Turk" Sanderson.

I recently interviewed Derek Sanderson, the NHL hockey player, in Toronto during a dinner sponsored by Healthy Minds Canada. I was interested in his story as I had attended the same school, lived on the same street and watched Sanderson as he started his hockey career with the Niagara Falls Flyers. I knew his loving parents, who tried to instill the right virtues in their son.

Multiple events lead to Sanderson's downfall. He was terrified of flying so the Bruins sent him to a psychiatrist who made two disastrous errors. He first prescribed Valium. This made Turk groggy. The doctor then advised Scotch Dewar's White Label That's when he took "four fingers" for a flight to New York and eight for the trip to the West Coast!

The next disaster occurred when Sanderson, along with Joe Namath, the football star, opened a bar in Boston, compounding his temptation. They decided that attractive airline attendants should have free drinks after landing in Boston. This then lead to free sex, a lifestyle as close to Heaven as a young, good-looking hockey star from small town Niagara Falls could ever imagine.

As a leading star, the rival hockey league soon offered him an unprecedented 2.6 million dollars to be the first NHL player to switch to the WHA league. It was a mountain of money at that time. The owner of the Bruins wisely cautioned him that, for someone not bred to wealth, it would ruin

Sanderson didn't listen. The first thing he did was purchase a burgundy Rolls Royce car and fox-fur coat. Then on the spur of the moment took several women to Hawaii for a weekend jaunt. It was the beginning of the end. Eventually, his off-ice lifestyle, playboy image, booze, women, and drugs became the Frankenstein monster that destroyed his hockey career.

It's amazing that Sanderson didn't die. Doctors diagnosed chronic ulcerative colitis, an inflammatory bowel disease that isn't helped by excessive alcohol consumption. Later, he developed cirrhosis of the liver. Then, while in a drunken stupor, he nearly froze to death sleeping in the snow. He's also a prostate cancer survivor.

So why is Sanderson alive today? Bobby Orr, always a class act and possibly the greatest hockey player of all time, repeatedly tried to steer Sanderson away from his snowball slide to hell. He paid for his care in detox centers only to see him walk away from them multiple times.

So I asked Sanderson what finally saved his life. He claims a counsellor at Hotel Dieu, a rehab center in St. Catharines. Ontario, caught him at just the right time. He convinced Sanderson to accept the role of God in his recovery. For Sanderson, the tough hockey player and ultimate playboy, it must have taken an immense change of heart for him to get down on his knees and say, "God help me, I cannot live this way any longer."

This Christmas Sanderson is a happy married man with two children. He has many to thank for banning alcohol and drugs from his life. Bobby Orr arranged surgery for his hips destroyed by prednisone. On behalf of the City of Boston Sanderson has counselled tens of thousands of wayward children. And for someone who was originally afraid of public speaking, he learned to be the hockey commentator on Boston Bruins broadcasts.

On display in the Motorsport Hall of Fame is a collection of model cars, trucks and antique cars. This collection belongs to David Prosser, who spent many hours putting them together. Now instead of being boxed and stored they are where they can be enjoyed by all model enthusiasts.

David is a native of Petticodiac, his family home was near the Irving Big Stop. He was a middle child with a brother two years younger and a sister twelve years older. He attended the little yellow school house on the hill and from there to the high school on Main Street.

He remembers his brother and himself arguing over who would be first in the garage to take their Saturday bath. The winner would take out the large tub, fill it with warm water and wash up with a bar of "Lifebuoy Soap". In those days there were no bathrooms in the houses. He said that 85 percent of post war homes had outhouses.

David left high school to go to work at the Eaton's in Moncton for a time, and then he took a job with surveyors on the "old road". Before the year was over he went to Alma, Lac St. Jean in northern Quebec to work with a construction crew that was building a powerhouse and tunnel underground. He says it was one part of his life he wouldn't want to have missed, He met a lot of fine people and he didn't speak a bit of French and they couldn't speak English. While working on the water pumps he said he tried to speak French but his mates wanted him to speak English because they wanted to learn English. This job continued for a few years, he went up in September and returned home in May.

Then David got married, so that September he decided to make his home in Salisbury. He had a service station, his wife Isabelle had a hair dressing shop, and they worked there for six years. Then he took a job in Petticodiac driving a fuel truck and a gravel truck; he did that for about four years and then an opportunity came for a government job at the scales.

and moved to River Glade. He said on the whole it was a good job, once and a while there would be someone who was a bit aggressive but he found by talking them down they would soon cool off. He believed by keeping your cool, you could avert trouble. He remembers one fall; their first year in their home, there was a large forest fire that started at the dump in Petticodiac. He said you could hear the fire roaring, it sounded like a train coming.

After 33 years working he retired. David and Isabelle had three children, two girls and a boy.

Their son, who was in the military, was posted in Baden-Baden Germany, so they enjoyed the opportunity to visit there. While there they visited Holland, Belgium, France, Luxemburg, Switzerland, and Austria. David said it was beautiful over there. He found it was amazing that everyone was at peace, no hatred.

While in Holland they stopped to get a motel room; the girl at the desk asks if they had a reservation. David told her no, and she replied sorry no room. David graciously told her that it would be ok and they could sleep in their van if needed. As he turned to walk away she called out and asked if they were Americans, to which he replied, no, Canadians. To that she hollered out to them to come back to the desk. She offered them a coffee and a do-nut and she secured them a room. It was obvious that the people of Holland respected the Canadians, for it was the Canadian military that liberated them from the Germans during the war.

One of their girls lived in Edmonton and she had three children; one of the little girls, Miranda, had won the heart of her grandmother. When she was to be married she wanted to wear her grandmothers wedding dress so Isabelle flew out west to fit the dress, using her talents as a seamstress. They really bonded at that time. Unfortunately afterwards this girl developed cancer and only lasted three months. David and Isabelle went out to spend time with her. Three weeks after that visit Isabelle expressed a desire to go see Miranda, her granddaughter, and she seemed confused as to where she was at the time; David feels the loss of this precious girl brought on the dementia that would overtake her.

During his retirement David busied himself working on his house, replacing windows and restoring the basement. He was involved in his church and the Salisbury Lions Club. As he lost his strength and mobility the Lions Club gave him an electric scooter.

They had a little dog, it was Margaret Mechhefske's, she had to take a trip so David and Isabelle took care of it and it remained with them until it died. After David placed Isabelle in the Jordan he thought a dog would be good for him. Soon a little Shih Tzu became David's companion. Scooter took to jumping on the coffee table, so David just removed everything from the table. One day as he was coming from the bedroom there was Scooter fast asleep on the coffee table. When David goes out Scooter likes to get up on the coffee table and look out the window. Margaret come often comes by to take Scooter for a walk and play with him for a while.

I asked David his thoughts on changes his has gone through the past couple of years and he said.

"Just remember, in the morning when you get up and talk to somebody, they may be having a harder time than you. In that respect everybody has problems, you're not alone. You could get depressed but it's not all bad."











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
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

Bringing baskets of happiness to children so dear







Jessica Hooper will be our 2013 Animal Control Officer for the Village of Salisbury. She has been authorized by the Village Council to sell dog tags door to door. Dog tags are also available at the Village Office and the Salisbury Veterinary Clinic. Please direct any complaints or inquiries to: Jessica Hooper 378-3627.

Every owner of a dog shall before March 31St, each year, register that dog(s) with the Animal Control Officer or the Administration Office.

A \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought by March 31<sup>St</sup> and a \$50.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought by June 30<sup>th</sup>.

Registration fees are:

- \$10.00 spayed or neutered dogs,
- \$30.00 NOT spayed or NON neutered dogs,

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvo virus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter. Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) vears thereafter.

An official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, color, name of dog showing on receipt and also the veterinarian hospital tag number is required. NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A REGISTRATION TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT.


