

Have Arthritis? Try Eating Healthy

There's nothing good about terminal cancer pain other than the pain finally ending with death. But there's another type of chronic pain, arthritis that goes on and on year after year. It can be a living hell. It's estimated that over 50 million North Americans are afflicted with this disease. Now, a report from Tufts University claims that eating right can help the aching joints of both osteoarthritis, the wear-and-tear type, and rheumatoid arthritis.

Dr. Miriam Nelson, an expert on nutrition, says, "You might be surprised how modifying the diet can decrease stiffness and inflammation". Her first suggestion is to start with water. This liquid provides moisture and structural support to joints. It also carries nutrients to where they are needed, and removes the metabolic waste of metabolism.

Obviously, thirst tells us when we need liquids. And we know that we get water from fruits and other foods. But Nelson begs to differ. Rather, she says, as we age our ability to feel thirst becomes blunted. Moreover, some of the medicines used to treat arthritis can affect thirst.

Nelson stresses it is also crucial to lose weight as it adds extra stress to joints. Losing just 11 pounds can decrease symptoms by as much as 50 percent. For example, a single step triggers a force on the knees and hips 2 to 3 times your body weight. Rising from a chair or walking downstairs increases the pressure 6 times!

But what about nutrients? The Framingham Osteoarthritis study found the progression of osteoarthritis was decreased by 50 percent in people who consumed the most vitamin C, at least 150 milligrams a day, the amount in two oranges. This vitamin is vital in the formation of collagen and cartilage and rids the joint of damaging free radicals that cause inflammation. See the web site www.docgiff.com to see how much higher doses of vitamin C can prevent and reverse hardening of coronary arteries.

This study also showed the benefit of vitamin D. Nelson recommends 400 IU or more daily. D is important in building bone strength and aids in the absorption of calcium.

But during the winter months it's hard to get this amount of D in the diet without taking a supplement.

The oils we consume also oil our joints. But not all oils are equal. Rather, the

oils in our blood contain different types of fatty acids. The good omega-3 fatty acids fight inflammation. Omega-6 acids trigger it

Nelson recommends that it's prudent to cut back on omega-6 fatty acids. This means decreasing the amount of packaged processed foods found in supermarkets, frozen foods, crackers, cookies and many dessert items, along with fried foods. A University of Washington study found that people who ate two or more weekly servings of baked or broiled fish were 40 percent less likely to develop arthritis due to the omega-3 content.

So what is it that causes joint pain? Fatty acids are the forerunners of compounds called prostaglandins. Some suppress inflammation and others promote it and it's inflammation that causes the suffering of arthritis.

The best sources of omega-3 are salmon, halibut and sardines. It's also present in walnuts, beans, tofu, flaxseed oil, pecans and leafy vegetables.

One message derived from recent studies is that our food habits have changed over the years, but not in a way that cuts down on the chronic problems of aging. In the past the ratio of omega-3 to omega-6 was nearly even. Now, people consume 11 times more omega-6 fatty acids than omega-3.

This negative shift in eating habits has major implications for the future. Our aging population will demand more arthritis therapy and more hip and knee replacements, adding further strain to our health care costs.

Remember that the worst treatment for arthritis is to stop moving. Ships tied up too long develop barnacles. We too develop rust in our joints from inactivity. Moderate and continued movement of joints pushes nutrient into cartilage.

Abraham Lincoln once remarked that "I have the best two doctors, my left and right legs". You need only to look around you to see human obesity and immobility. No wonder the joints seize up.

Everyday People

"There is meaning in every journey that is unknown to the traveler." Dietrich Bonhoffer

With that quote I begin the story of a well know person to most of you, that of Maude Bannister Fawcett Colpitts.

Maude Bannister was born in September 1919 at the old farm back on Smith's Road. She was only three years old when her Grandmother Bannister who lived with them, died. Someone kept Maude in the kitchen, but she got away, and saw them bringing her grandmother down the stairs wrapped in a blanket. She saw them lay her out in a casket before she was rushed back into the kitchen. After her grandmother was ready for viewing Maude was lifted to look. She remembers saying, "There's Grandma, poor Grandma." Then she remembers reaching out and touching her hand. Maude was five when her sister Myrtle was born; her father went to get her Grandmother Smith to be the midwife and to call the doctor. The baby arrived before the doctor. Maude sneaked up the stairs and saw her mother sitting up in bed with the baby in her arms - then somebody picked her up and took her to the kitchen, out of the way. At seven years of age she went to the Lower Pollett River School in a horse and cart. When she was eight her family moved to the farm in River Glade; she continued to go to the Lower Pollett River school until

Grade 8. The school teacher boarded with her family and she offered to continue teaching Maude Grade 9 even though the school went only to Grade 8. To go to high school you had to pay tuition and there was no way to travel except by train and most who did continue on, boarded stayed in town. So she stayed at home helping her mother. She attended the youth group at the Glades Baptist Church. Her parents came to faith in Jesus and were baptized in the new baptistery.

Maude was 17 when her brother Claude was born and her mother was sick for six months, so she took care of her mother and the baby. She also washed the clothes with a scrub board and hung them out on cold winter days, she looked after the separating of the cream and churning the butter. Her 12 year old sister quit school for the winter and did the dishes and carried in the wood and water

It happened one day, at the age of 20, she was asked by her father to go to Petticodiac by bus to buy something he needed for his hay mower. On the bus she talked with a girl who worked as a cook at the hotel and was planning on leaving the job. When Maude got home she told her parents that she would like to apply for the job. Her father didn't think it was necessary for her to go to work but gave his consent. Maude went to see the Manager who was running the Hotel, and she hired her. Maude packed up and moved to the Hotel, she had a room on the first floor off the kitchen. The kitchen had a pantry and coal stove, no mixer, you

had to mix by hand. "Can you imagine" exclaimed Maude.

She got up at 6:30 when the train went through and put the fire on, the double boilers on, and the porridge both oatmeal and cream of wheat. Also she got the frying pans and egg poachers ready for the eggs. It was a full menu; in the mornings she made ham and eggs, bacon and eggs, and two kinds of pancakes. The noon menu consisted of soup, stew, roast beef, chicken, pork, and fish. There were potatoes and two kinds of vegetables. For dessert there were three kinds of pies which Maude made and also dessert. Supper meal started at 4:30 and was still going on at 7:00. She took care of the dining room.

During her time working at the hotel she met Eugene Fawcett who was cooking in a lumber camp in Forrest Glenn. He would walk out Saturday night to visit her. When they became engaged she gave her notice and they were married in September at their unfinished home on the Sanitarium Road. Her mother made the cake, her father made an arch for Maude to put flowers on, and Gene's sister Jessie played "Here Comes the Bride".

Later they moved to Riverview - Gunningsville and rented two rooms in a home, but it wasn't long after that the woman's husband joined the military so they moved to Moncton where they sublet for a while. Then they brought and fixed up a little cabin in Lower Gunningsville. Up and across the hilly field was a military base and Maude remembers skiing down those hills, Then

in1942 Bartlett (Bart) was born, 1943 David (Dave) and in 1944 Melvin (Mel). She had her hands full. When Mel turned three they bought a burned out house on Sanatorium Road. Her father helped Gene build a small home with an upper story big enough for the beds and a downstairs with a living room and kitchen. Then Gene was called to go to Windsor Nova Scotia, to a training place to prepare the men returning from overseas for the work force; Gene was to teach refrigeration. They sublet a large, beautiful, old home. They had to return to New Brunswick to take Bart and Dave to the hospital to have their tonsils removed. When they returned to Nova Scotia they moved into an apartment which once was a part of the army hospital. She remembers the sounds of the trains at night; it was an interesting time for them.



Local Man to Represent New Bru

On January 23,2006 I was driving a 18 wheeler transport truck heading to Saint John to unload. On that day it was snowing hard and road conditions were slippery, which caused me to lose control which put me into the ditch and rolled the transport truck 3 times.

I was taken to the Saint John Regional Hospital where the doctors told me that I broke two vertebras and stretched the right side of my spinal cord, which caused no use of my legs at that time. I spent a month at the Saint John hospital regaining my strength by doing exercises daily, to try to regain the strength in my legs.

The doctors thought it would be in my best interest to go to the Stan Cassidy Rehab Centre in Fredericton, where I stayed for 5 1/2 years on and off, I did more physiotherapy and occupational therapy daily. Physiotherapy helped build

my confidence and build strength in my legs and abs to help me sit up on my own and do things more independently. Occupational therapy helped me get back out into the world to get comfortable in the position that I was in.

An Occupational therapist had suggested that I get back into sports to try out wheelchair basketball. While at the rehab centre I played basketball for 2 years to find out that I did not like wheelchair basketball. They helped me get in touch with Poley Mountain in Sussex to try downhill skiing which I love to do.

On February 12, 2010, on my birthday, I was invited to an "Outreach of sports in your community" that was held at the University of Moncton at the CEPS. Gabriel Leblanc was the head of the organization of this event on this day. He asked me to try out wheelchair rac-

ing. I got into the chair, went around the track three times and Gabriel said "I am keeping you".

In the first year I was racing in a borrowed chair from Nova Scotia and was setting provincial records for New Brunswick. I started raising money to purchase my own racing chair, that fits like a glove. Since then, I have been setting national times.

Every year, nationals are held in a city of Canada and you have to set certain times to qualify to go to the nationals. In 2011, I set national times to go to the nationals in 2012 in Calgary, Alberta. There, in my 200 meters I placed 7th at that time out of eight racers. In 2012, I set national times for nationals in 2013 which was held in Moncton, New Brunswick, where I placed 6th in my 100 meters at that time and 6th in my 200 meters at that time. In the three years of racing I have

gone from last place to the top 10 in Canada.

In 2013, I have had a chance to qualify to represent New Brunswick at 2013 Canada Games which is held in Sherbrooke, Quebec on August 13th to August 20th. I qualified in Saint John at the UN-BSJ Track & Field site where I won the 400 metre, 800m and 1500m which qualified me to represent New Brunswick in the Canada Games. My coach Gabriel and I have been trying to improve my technique and stamina to have a chance to podium at the Canada Games.

For getting this far in my racing career I have to give a special thank you to my friends and family for supporting me in my racing as well as the surrounding communities for all of your ongoing support. A big Thank You to all of you for supporting my dream and helping me bring gold to New Brunswick!


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The House is Open

Caleb Dunn – Competitor / Stock Car Racing

"Dunn's the Name and Racing's the Game." He competed in stockcar races throughout the Maritimes, Eastern USA, Florida and Ontario from the years 1951 through 1989. He drove his stockcars to win!

Over the years he won honor after honor and trophy after trophy.

It would take pages to express what Caleb Dunn has done in stockcar racing, but I will try to sum it up in just a few words. He started racing in 1951, on dirt tracks, and was a constant winner and one of the most exciting performers to watch. The second race he was in he was the winner. His first stock car was a 1936 Ford Coupe, powered with a Ford flathead engine. He

set what might be a Maritime record with 11 straight dirt track main events wins, but he easily adapted to the asphalt tracks. The car number that most would recognize

Caleb loved racing and said, "It's like a disease"

as Caleb Dunn was #12.

In his early years, his biggest thrill was in 1953 when he captured the Maritime Championship in St. John, NB.

With more than 15 years experience behind him in 1965, he piled up 136 points on 13 first, 14 seconds and four thirds to come home ahead of the field to win the first points title at River Glade Speedway, NB, that is one of the top honors a stock car driver can achieve. In effect, it means that he was the best driver that season, the most consistent over the long haul.

The International, an event instituted in 1965 at River Glade Speedway, to give local fans a look at the Ontario brand of

racing, grew into the top sports spectacle in the Maritimes.

That was the "big one", the one the drivers geared for. The money was good, but the prestige of winning the International was almost immeasurable.


They came for miles for the International – drivers and fans alike. The locals had always been prominent in the grueling test. The first season saw Caleb Dunn chase John Shirtliff to the wire in the 75-lap main event, but Shirtliff took the lead with Dunn coming in second. It wasn't until 1976 that he would pick up the checker flag for its win.

He won Mid-Season Championship races at Hammond River Speedway, McEwen Speedway, and three at River Glade Speedway in 1966, '68 and '78.

He won the exhibition race in Yarmouth, NS in 1967. The write-up in the paper said, "One of the best of the crop was Caleb Dunn, the dean of Maritime Modified Stock Car Drivers".

In 1980 he won the New Glasgow 250 at Riverside Speedway, James River, NS. Caleb's last adventure in his racing career was the Old Timers race at River Glade Speedway in 1989, and he won that. He had other interest as well such as hockey, softball and snowmobile races, to name a few, but stockcar racing was his passion. In 2001 Caleb received another great honor; he was inducted to the Wall of Fame in Moncton, NB.

In 2006 Caleb was inducted into the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame Inc.
