Home Turf

Now that June is here, summer weather will come calling, with high temperatures followed, no doubt, and a lack of water. According to the North American Lawn Institute an 'average' sized suburban lawn produces enough oxygen to support a family of four. A lawn is a high functioning, living, breathing colony of oxygen-producing plants that are knit together to form a low-growing welcome mat to your home.

You can give your lawn a boost and help it do its job more efficiently by following these few simple steps:

1. Cut your lawn high. 6 to 8 cm will do the job. For generations we cut our lawns much shorter, not realizing that tall grass blades produce deeper roots that are more drought-tolerant. Also, the taller the grass blades the fewer the weeds as weed seeds are 'shaded out' by the grass before they get a chance to germinate.
2. Use a mulching mower. The cut grass blades are regurgitated up into the cutting chamber of the mower where they are re-cut before being thrust down into the root zone of the grass plants. As they decompose they add precious nitrogen to the soil: the element that grass plants crave the most.
3. Fertilize three times a year. Quality lawn fertilizer provides nutrients to the soil that are used by the grass plants to grow and thrive. Nitrogen is the primary ingredient in a spring/early summer application of fertilizer, and is always represented by the first number in the three number analysis on the bag.
4. Slow release nitrogen. The nitrogen that produces the best results in your lawn is most useful to it when it is released over an extended period of time. One of the most sophisticated forms of slow release

nitrogen is sulphur-coated urea. It releases nitrogen to the root zone as rain falls, temperatures rise, and microbial activity occurs in the soil. Iron also plays a role, as it helps to produce green chlorophyll, deepening the colour and enhancing the appearance of your lawn.

5. Overseed. Spread triple mix or lawn soil over areas where bare patches occur and apply quality grass seed by hand at the rate of 500 grams per 40 sq meters. Rake smooth, step on it to bring the soil and seed in firm contact, and water well until the roots have taken firm hold. Remember that a thick lawn is your best defence against weeds.

6. Water less. As we approach the summer season, the temptation to get out the lawn sprinkler will pull at you. I urge you to hold off until there is a real need. A lawn will grow nicely without water for up to 7 days. If it hasn't rained for a week by all means give your lawn a drink and apply about 2 cm to make sure that it moves down to the root zone where it is really needed. Keep in mind that a lawn that is never watered will generally survive, though it will not thrive through a drought.

7. Don't water. If we get into a drought situation, forget about watering all together. Your lawn will stop growing and it may go brown, but for the most part it will be dormant, not dead. That is, unless the drought continues for 4 weeks or longer at which time my theory of 'dormant not dead' could prove erroneous. I argue that watering at that point is not going to solve the problem of dead grass.

If you do experience dead areas in your lawn this summer, plan on overseeding in mid August. By late September your grass will have revived and will be looking good again.

Boomers Now Know the Pain of Arthritis
Psst! Do you want a tip on how to make millions of dollars? Buy a company that sells painkillers. Why? Because the boomer generation is starting to hurt more with each passing year. And they expect effective relief from the agony of arthritis. What boomers want, they expect to get. But how successful will they be?

Several years ago, Dr. Nicholas Di Nubile, a Philadelphia orthopedic surgeon, added a new word to the English language, "Boomeritis". He said boomers were the first generation to become obsessed by exercise, and they are paying the price by becoming banged-up boomers.

Today, there are 76 million boomers in the U.S and six million in Canada. By pushing their bodies too hard they've developed bursitis, tendonitis, arthritic hips and knees and a host of other traumatic problems.

The generation following the boomers could benefit from a lesson from them, and from Aristotle, who, centuries ago, preached the value of moderation. But by keeping a stiff upper lip when intense exercise starts to hurt, today's determined health fanatics are on the road to eventual pain. I've yet to see a happy looking jogger. And the bandaged knee, elbow or wrist has become, for the boomer, a badge of honour.

So where will joggers and other banged-up baby boomers find relief? For some of

their degenerative joints, deterioration has progressed so far that the only hope is a joint replacement. Other boomers may, with luck, ease the pain and reverse joint damage by lesser measures and more modest activity.

During an interview with Dr. Julian Whitaker, a California expert on natural remedies, he stressed the aim is to restore damaged cartilage. He says that boomers should take 2,500 milligrams (mg) of vitamin C daily which slows the development of osteoarthritis and eases pain. Vitamin C is needed to produce collagen, the major component of cartilage. Vitamin D3 400 international units (IU), Beta carotene 15,000 IU and natural vitamin E 800 IU are also helpful.

Whitaker adds that 1,500 mg of glucosamine daily in divided doses along with chondroitin sulfate helps to build new cartilage. Chondroitin sulfate, like glucosamine, is abundant in cartilage. It works by holding onto water which gives cartilage its cushioning effect and also inhibits enzymes that break down cartilage.

The Whitaker Wellness Center also uses a combination of acupuncture, chiropractic procedures and magnets to ease the pain of arthritis. In addition, a number of herbs are used such as Tumeric which promotes strong anti-inflammatory activity, along with ginger, the common cooking spice, and several other herbs.

A procedure called viscosupplementation is useful for some patients. Our joints contain synovial fluid to cushion the impact

between bones. As we age this fluid is weakened but an injection of synovial-like fluid can ease pain for up to six months.

What about rub-on ointments to ease pain? One cream with a mile long name "Preferred Nutrition Celadrin Joint Care Relief Cream", is an effective, natural anti-inflammatory compound, a mix of esterified cetylated fatty acids, derived from bovine tallow oil. It works by adding oil to the cell membranes, restoring fluids and improving joint flexibility. In addition, fatty acid esters are combined with natural menthol to provide relief of pain in the joints and surrounding muscles.

What about the science behind Celadrin? A double blind study at the University of Connecticut evaluated the effect of Celadrin cream 30 minutes after it was applied. This revealed decreased pain within 10 minutes. Additional studies were done 30 days later after the cream had been used twice a day. This showed decreased pain and stiffness, better mobility, strength and balance.

Studies also show that Celadrin works similar to, but much more dramatically than, the essential fatty acids EPA and HDA derived from fish oils.

The suggested dosage is applied to the affected area three to four times a day. But the cream should not be applied to wounds or damaged skin.

Lastly, don't neglect to fight obesity. If you weigh 150 pounds, the pressure on the joints increases to 450 pounds on movement. When going down stairs, it reaches 900 pounds. Weight loss can also help to preserve the joint function of banged-up baby boomers.



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Everyday People

On a winter's day in January eighty seven years ago Lena Steeves Clarke was born. Her father, Rotsford Alfred Steeves had to take the horse and sleigh and go down the valley two miles to the nearest telephone to call the doctor who came by horse and sleigh 18 miles from Pettitcodiac to deliver Lena Delia Beaman Steeve's baby. Lena Edna Pearl was the seventh child at that time.

In the spring of 1929, at a gathering of the clan at her grandfather's, Lena at two years and four months old wandered down to the bridge at the Little River. She was very tiny and it was very windy and while she looked down into the water the wind blew her over into the water. Its thought because she had so many clothes on that kept her above water; under the bridge she floated until her

brother Fred went into the water, grabbed the hem of her dress and pulled her to the river bank.

One of her older cousins remarked, "It's kind a cold for a swim."

Len's father planted buckwheat in the spring on what they called "Buckwheat Hill". In the fall he would take the bags of buckwheat in the "Market Sled" with the team of horses and go to the Mill in Have-lock to have it ground into flour of which they made their pancakes in winter. Her mother made a big stack of pancakes every morning for breakfast, and they would have pancakes, leftover potatoes and fried pork for supper. Lena still has the spatula her mother used. A pig was killed every fall and with the rendered fat they would make doughnuts.

In the winter they had sauerkraut, made from cabbage and in bins in the cellar they stored potatoes and turnips. Hens provided

eggs all year around. In the spring her mother made salad from dandelion leaves, until the lettuce was big enough. A mixture of cream, sugar, vinegar, salt and pepper was used on the salad, also the cucumbers and the mashed potatoes. When the new beans, peas, little carrots, and the new potatoes where ready they added cream, butter, salt and pepper to enjoy what they called Hodge Podge. They also had lots of biscuits with "West Indie molasses"; they used a gallon jug to get it from the big barrel at the store in Forest Glen.

Sometimes a young cow would be slaughtered giving them meat for the winter. When the salmon came up the river to spawn in the spring they would enjoy an occasional supper of fried salmon. Also they had trout in the spring.

Lena's father died of "Bronchial Pneumonia". He was 49 on the 16th of December and he died on the 20th. Her mum was 44 at the time, and Lena five.

At Christmas in 1933 Lena received her doll "Barbara Frances" in her stocking. Christmas 1935 she got a doll she named "Delia" and in 1936 a doll she called "Peggy Ann"

Christmas time the children for a treat got Kellogg's Corn Flakes and a stocking with an orange on the bottom, a little bag of candies, then in the middle a story book or a scribbler rolled up, and sticking out the top was a toy or something appropriate for their age.

Delia, Lena's oldest sister was her teacher in grades 3 to 5, ages 8 to 10. She was an excellent teacher, they always had fun at recess and lunch; and they had great Christmas concerts.

At 10 year old she got "Phyllis Audrey" for Christmas; the most beautiful doll she ever owned. Her mother took a pre-Christmas excursion to Boston and she brought the doll back with her; she hadn't gone to Boston since she was married.

Later Lena's mother took sick with kidney problems and needed an operation. Lena and her brother Robert went to live with Delia and her husband. Their mother got better and returned home in the spring; that fall the first grandson, and nephew was born.

Nursing Sister. She was discharged to be married. They had three children born to them in Tatamagouche NS. In 1958 she worked in The Jordan Memorial Sanatorium, in 1980 moved to Edmonton. In 1986 she retired from full time nursing and moved back to NB. She opened the Doll Museum, and closed it as a business in 1999.

Lena has traveled extensively. She has done 16 cruises; Three Caribbean, Three Mediterranean, and two Transatlantic. She has been to Northern Europe, Bermuda, Alaska, the Hawaiian Islands, The west Coast/Panama Canal twice and South America. Her last trip was to The Land of the Midnight Sun; up the coast of Norway to Cape North- then on to Spitzbergen...250 miles from the North Pole, on the QE11

Lena attends Merry Makers, Senior Clubs, Women's Institute, and Bowls three times a week during the season, and she attends all the seniors meetings and dinners in the community and the surrounding areas, and she is a member of the Legion. She is an avid gardener, scrabble player, card player, scrap booker, quilter and photographer.



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RICK'S RANT....**YOUR BEST RETURN ON YOUR OLD CAR**

Now that "spring fever" is over and you found that "new-to-you" vehicle, it's time to get rid of last year's "winter-beater"..... Yes, it may not be looking its best, but don't just put an ad on Kijiji and hope to get a few bucks. Why not get more than you planned for a very minimal amount of dollars and very little elbow grease. When selling anything, you usually want the most you can get. Automobiles are the easiest item to get a few extra dollars for....a quick look at used car lots will verify this!!!! Are the cars they put on the lot "scuzz-buckets"? No, they usually look pretty good for their age.....

So, before putting that ad on Kijiji, or in the paper, or park it with a "For Sale" sign in the window, here are a few tips for getting top dollar. I've personally owned over 180 vehicles, and each time I sell one, this is what I do. And let it be known that I take my own advice very seriously.

First, gather up all important paperwork... the registration (current), insurance card (which shows it has been used to present), the safety inspection document, any work orders or parts receipts to, any valid warranty cards, and put these all in a large envelope or file folder. If there is a "wheel nut lock", put it in the cleaned out glove box with the factory owner's manual.

Secondly, clean the vehicle.....throw out the Tim's cups from the back seat, wipe down the interior, vacuum and clean the carpets as best as possible, and clean or replace the floor mats (less than \$20 if you shop a bit). You know the possible buyer will hop into the driver's seat.... so make sure the steering wheel, shifter, controls, and gauges are clean to the touch, as well as both the inside and outside of the windshield. Next wash and wax....yes wax the exterior as best as possible. A \$10 can of paste wax will go a long way, for presentation is everything!



Next are the mechanicals.... A \$15 can of spray engine cleaner will do wonders under the hood. Follow the instructions on the can and you will be surprised! The buyer will start the car, so have it "warmed up" if possible, as you want it to come to life instantly. Maybe a minor tune-up should be considered? Have the keys ready, and show that all sets are included. Change the oil (a

\$30 cost) as clean oil should show on the dipstick. Make sure all lights work....often it's only a low cost bulb. The trunk must be empty, as they will want to look under the floor mat, and check the spare, and see the jack and tools. If you have spare parts that will be included, or a set of winter tires, put them out of sight and use them as a "bonus bargaining chip" during negotiations. "What they see is what they expect to get for the advertised price!"

If there are any known issues with the brakes, engine, transmission, etc, tell the person up front. If there is something seri-

ously wrong with the vehicle, don't try to cover it up. Be truthful about its condition, and what it needs. Otherwise serious issues may arise later on, which could lead to a lawsuit due to misrepresentation of the vehicle's condition, especially if it's one of safety. Honesty is always the best policy! You wouldn't want to buy a vehicle that turned out to be a piece of junk, or unsafe, after it was described as a great investment, so why do it to someone else. The "Golden Rule" should take priority.... "Do unto others as you would have them do to you!"

So in conclusion, spend a few dollars to clean and detail, do minor repairs, and above all else, be honest in your dealings, and your wallet will thank you. And maybe the buyer will want the car you just purchased when it's ready to be sold!

News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame



GREG SEWART – competitor Stockcar Racing

Greg started his racing career in the pits turning wrenches for his brother Jim in 1974 and '75.

He purchased his first sportsman car form Jim in 1976. In his first race at Atlantic Speedway, Hammonds Plains, NS he won. For the next four years, the Sewart Brothers dominated the Sportsman division at Atlantic Speedway. Because of his success in the Sportsman, according to rules at the Atlantic Speedway, he had to move up to the Modified Division. Soon it was decided that the brothers would only field one car and that Greg would be the driver. Greg won the 1980 Modified Championship.

To quote a bit of an interview that was done back in 1995 with Greg – “I began racing in 1976 when I won my very first race. My father died in July that year in the stands while watching me and Jim race. I went on to win my first championship and took rookie of the year. I dedicated that year to him. Since then I’ve won over 100 feature races. I know he is still looking down on me, I guess that’s why I try to do my best – each and every race I am in.”

In 1982 Greg won the Late Model Championship at Onslow Speedway, NS, after winning 11 of the 13 Modified features. That feature win record stood until the track closed in the mid '90's.

Also in 1982, Greg tested his driving skills in Ontario, competing against the regions best drivers: Don Beiderman, Junior Hanley, Don Hawn, Bill Zardo to name a few. He raced at tracks in Delaware, Barrie, Flamboro and Sauble Beach. He finished the Ontario trip with several top 5 runs.

In 1983 he moved to the new MASCAR tour. They purchased a brand new race car, built by Blair Crookes of Crooks Racing. Greg enjoyed instant success as he won the first points championship and was named Most Popular Driver.

He won the MASCAR points Championship again in 1987, '92, '93 and '95.

In 83, 84 and 87 he beat out such racing names as Beiderman, Hanley, Rollie Macdonald, Frank Fraser and Caleb Dunn to win the prestigious Twin 100 International races at River Glade Speedway. Greg was MASCAR Driver of the Year in 1985 and 1992.

In 1989 he was the winner of the Halifax 300 at Scotia Speedworld. For most of the 300 laps, Greg ran nose to tail with fellow racers, Fraser and Beiderman with only inches between them.

Another Memorable experience was when Sewart Racing won the opportunity to represent Nova Scotia and wave the flag proudly at the 1989 Nashville 400. A race that brought together the best short track sanctioned associations in the United States. Gregs weekend ended with a bent car when a nudge from a fellow competitor in turn 4 put him in the wall during a qualifying heat.

Greg started the 1990's with a first in Maritime racing history. Sewart Racing put Greg in the winners circle at the inaugural Stockcar portion of the Moosehead Grand Prix, winding through the streets of Halifax, in 1991. This was an exciting moment, for both driver and crew, as they received their first taste of National recognition. He won the Moosehead Grand Prix again in '92 and '94

He raced at Oxford Plains Speedway in Maine in 1994, where he placed 2nd. He considers this accomplishment a career highlight. He started in 42nd place in a field of what was considered the “Best of the Best” from eastern Canada and the New England States. In the last several laps he was running in the top 5. He passed Mike Maietta Sr. and Mike Rowe to finish 2nd behind Canadian, Derek Lynch from Ontario. This was his largest take home pay, winning \$13,000 in US funds.

Gregs racing career ended in 2002 after a very serious accident at the Oyster Bed Speedway. His career took him over a 28 year period. He had the support and dedication of many pitcrew and builders to help put him to the front.

I now ask Greg Sewart to come forward and be Inducted into the Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame.

Presenting the award is Ernie Ledwidge, a Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame Lifetime Member.
