

Don Biederman Race Car

Don Beiderman's race care is proudly on display at the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame. It was donated to the Hall permanently for one the displays inside the Auto (Trucks, Antiques, Bikes, Motorcycle etc) Museum. The pictures you seeing are from the unloading of the car to the hall. King Freight from Nova Scotia, picked up and delivered Don's car from Ontario to Petitcodiac. Once here Cory's Wrecker then had to be called to help unload the car from the freight truck onto the flat bed then lowered down to the ground and then pushed in to place in the Museum.

Breif History on Don Biederman was a Canadian stock car racer from Port Credit, Ontario.

Since his death in the early 2000s, Don has been inducted into the Canadian Motorsport Hall of Fame.

He has a memorial race held in his honor annually named "The Don Beiderman Memorial." This race is operated under the OSCAAR sanctioning body for Ontario Super Late Models.

Don was also the first Canadian ever to campaign for a full season in the Sprint Cup Series formerly known as the NASCAR Grand National Series.

He won the prestigious Oxford 250 at Oxford Plains Speedway, Maine in 1977, one of only four Canadians to do so, (Junior Hanley, Derek Lynch, and Dave Whitlock being the others)

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

My deepest sympathies to all family members of the Constables as well as the RCMP community.



Local News and Views Garden column

Shady Gardeners

With summer officially here, all of us employ our 'shelter seeking' skills in an attempt to find shade and lower temperatures. All too often I have heard it said by someone or other that they can't garden because, after all, they only have shade in their yard.

There is no reason why you cannot have a great looking garden while living with shade. In fact, shady gardeners will tell you that they have the opportunity to spend more time in their yard and garden than their sunny counterparts.

Where to start

A well-treed lot begs for a woodland garden, if you ask me. A walk in the woods will demonstrate the effects of a natural carpet of green. In an ideal world the cooling effects of a woodland garden can be replicated in your yard. Here is how.

Soil prep. As with all success-1. ful planting, there is no point in planting in second-rate soil. The floor of a mature deciduous forest is dense with a rich, humusy foundation that provides sustenance and water retention. When you haul in soil for the planting of your woodland garden, do not spread the usual triple mix, but look for a compost-rich mix that is weed-free. I recommend well decomposed cattle, sheep, or horse manure that has cured for at least 2 years. Like a good ham, the curing process is essential for the best results. Add about 30% sharp sand by volume to open it up and allow moisture to move thorough it efficiently.

Use lots of it. The new soil can be 2. spread on the existing soil about 8 or 10 cm thick, but do not to put soil up against the

trunk of existing trees. Leave the natural 'flare' exposed, where the trunk meets the ground.

3. Use nursery grown plants. When you are shopping for plants for your new woodland garden be sure to ask your supplier if they have been grown in a nursery. If they have been 'harvested' from the wild don't touch them with a 2 metre planting stick.

Start small. No need to buy the 4 expensive 3 or 5 gallon plants. The small ones cost much less money and will grow in and knit together at alarming speed. What to grow?

Canadian Ginger [Asarum canadense]. A great ground cover that produces a broad, rounded leaf with a natural gloss that makes it attractive all season long. Hardy to zone 2.

Japanese Spurge [Pachysandra]. It is an evergreen, therefore it looks good year round, it spreads by rhizomes, or roots, that create a dense carpet of green when planted about 15 cm apart in a grid formation. It takes about 2 years for the grid to disappear and the carpet to spread out before you. Hardy to zone 3.

Barrenwort [epimedium]. They are not ground covers, as are the perennials mentioned above, but they are low growing, flowering perennials that produce the most interesting flowers. Shaped like bells, they hang in clusters just over the heart-shaped foliage below. Hardy to zone 4.

Solomon's Seal [Polygonatum biflorum]. Another white flowering plant, but this one is a stand out. At maturity it grows to 60 cm high and features a charm bracelet of white flowers that hang beneath the foliage. I have seen Solomon's seal used to best advantage in raised beds, where you can see underneath the foliage. To miss the flowers in early June is a crime. Hardy to zone 4.

As your plans for a beautiful 'shade garden' develop, you will find yourself shaking your head every time someone says to you, "I would garden, but I have too much shade."

What You Should Know About AF

The tick, tick of a Rolex watch is very reliable. The lub-dub, lub-dub of the heart is also reliable, in early age. But a report from Johns Hopkins University says that over age 40, one in four women and men, are at risk of developing atrial fibrillation, commonly known as Afib or AF. How serious is this problem, and how would I treat it if it happened to me?

Currently three million North Americans have AF, and due to an aging population, 50 percent of those over 80 will develop AF.

Getting older is always dangerous and AF is one price you pay for longevity. We know that old cars develop trouble when their electrical system falters and the same problem happens to hearts. The regular heart beat is controlled by an electrical reaction located in the heart's right upper chamber, called the right atrium. AF occurs when electrical activity becomes wild and random, that causes the heart to quiver and twitch.

Electrical dysfunction in the heart can be triggered by several events. One is called the "Holiday Heart Syndrome" when there's been over consumption of alcohol. It can also result from an overactive thyroid. Several years ago President George Bush made the headlines when he required treatment for AF.

People who become obese and develop Type 2 diabetes resulting in atherosclerosis (narrowing and hardening) of coronary arteries, are at increased risk due to decreased blood supply to the heart's muscle. Others, who undergo bypass surgery, are also prone to develop AF. The experience is unnerving and patients complain that the irregular heart beat leaves them feeling that the heart is going to jump out of their chest.

Not all AF is equal. Some attacks of AF last a day or two, or as long as a week, and then for no apparent reason the irregularity disappears. Still others last a year or Many patients who have AF are not aware of its presence and may have no symptoms. Others complain of fatigue, shortness of breath, lightheadedness, dizziness or of an irregular, rapid and pounding sensation in the chest.

Regardless of the type of AF, it results in blood staying longer in the upper chambers of the heart. It's not an ideal situation as the longer blood swirls around in the heart there's an increased risk of a blood clot forming which may lead to stroke.

The question is how to treat AF. For instance, prescription drugs such as betablockers, calcium channel blockers and digoxin are often used to tame AF. In other cases an electrical shock is delivered to the heart, or concentrated radiofrequency waves heat and destroy the abnormal electrical signals. If all fails a surgical approach can be performed.

The ultimate question is whether to place patients on blood thinners such as warfarin (Coumadin) or dabigitran (Pradaxa), or to use Aspirin which lubricates blood platelets making them less likely to clot. But today most patients are given the prescription drugs, Coumadin or Pradaxa.

This decision is based on which devil you pick and which scientific study you believe. For instance, those taking a blood thinner have less chance of a stroke, but greater risk of bleeding than those using Aspirin.

Remember, I'm not your doctor. But if I were to develop AF I would first try natural remedies. This would consist of a daily Aspirin and 800 IU of natural vitamin E which also lubricates the blood. In addition, I'd take one scoop of MagSense powder daily, or the equivalent amount in a pill, since magnesium is essential in helping to regulating the heart's electrical rhythm.

Hell will also freeze over before I'd stop taking 6,000 mg of vitamin C and 4,000 mg of lysine daily, a combination powder available in Health Food Stores which prevents and reverses atherosclerosis. See the dramatic before and after arterial photos on my web site www.docgiff.com which proves this combination works. A heart with healthy circulation is less apt to become irregular.

I'd also continue taking, in moderation, my favourite alcoholic drink before dinner. This also lubricates platelets, increases the good cholesterol and is a great relaxant which is also good for the heart.

Directions to The Mapleton Acadian Forest Trail

From Highway #1, take exit # 233 at Petitcodiac onto route 905 toward Elgin. Drive approximately 15 min (20km) to the turnoff for the Mapleton Road (just before arriving at the Elgin Corner). Turn left on the Mapleton Road (route 895). Follow this road 4.5 km and there will be a sign for the Mapleton Acadian Forest Trail.

Total distance = 3 km Walking time = approx 1.5 - 2 hrs



RICK'S RANT: INFO FOR CAR GUYS AND GALS

I thought this would be a good followup for last month's info on selling a used car. Maybe you are in the market for an interesting older used car and I'm thinking a collector car.... one for just cruisin', showing, or restoring. Not everyone wants a '30's Model A, but maybe an other newer "antique" vehicle.... Any car over 25 years old is considered an antique! If it was built before 1989, it's an antique. My guess is most of us qualify!!!!!!

In 1980, vehicle manufacturers decided to standardize the VIN (vehicle identification number) codes placed on cars and trucks. A simple glance at the VIN plate, usually on the bottom driver's side dash under the windshield, will allow you to decode the "year of manufacture". This is helpful when verifying the vehicle's age when ordering parts, making sure the registration matches the vehicle, or just to satisfy your curiosity.... Below is the chart to be used....just check the 8th digit from the right in the serial number.

Another useful chart to have is the "Speed Rating" for tires included here as well. It's worth checking if you are driving a muscle car or sports car capable of higher speeds, or if you are purchasing tires and want to know if they are suitable for the driving speeds you will be doing. Cheap is not always better. You may be buying a tire only recommended for low, very low speeds. Why not cut out these two charts and keep them in your wallet or purse for easy access in the future...they may come in handy!

News From The Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame

DAVID MOSHER Competitor Drag Racing

Dave Mosher was born in Montague, PEI. He developed his love for drag racing in the early 1960's when he raced his father's Ford on the streets of Montague.

. He bought a 1968 Chev Camaro, drove it on the street for 2 weeks then it was off to the Drags. His car was known as the "Invader". He had his 396 cu.in. engine balanced and blue a machine that many people would be too printed by Frank A. Bash of York, Pennsylvania. The car was inclined to pick its front wheels up coming off the line.

Dave built his own engines and was meticulous.

Shirley and Cheeko the poodle were always following Dave around the strips.

He raced it PEI, NS, NB, Sanair, Cayuga, Englishtown NJ And Gainesville Florida

He broke track records several times in 1969, '70 at Halifax Dartmouth International Speedway and in 1970, '71, '72 he held the season points there.

Dave turned an 11.58 sec. to set a new super stock track record at Drag City Speedway in July of 1969 with his '68 Camaro, to beat out Gil Tremblay's '69 which turned an 11.91.

One article read - Many Maritime drag racers have had to be satisfied with second place since Mr. Mosher began racing last year.

In 1970 Dave won the Maritime Drag racing season points title at the Halifax-Dartmouth International Speedway. He also won the Maritime Championship race and topped the national speed record for his class. He scorched the 1/4 -mile strip in 10.49 seconds at top speed through the traps of 136.77mph. The national record in Dave's class at that time and tech inspection. was 135.95 mph.

Dave picked up the nick name "SPUD", I guess that was because he was from PEI.

A quote from a news article in '72 "Dave Mosher, behind the wheel of his B Modified Production "Invader' Camaro turned an unreal 10.32 sec. elapse time at 134.94 miles an hour ingston, Lifetime member and a Prince 10.32 sec. etapse time at 134.94 miles an hour on a 10.42 National record in the final to defeat Edward Island's Vice-president of Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame. Greg Nickerson."

Dave was a strong booster of the PEI Dragway at Oyster Bed, which officially opened in 1971.

In March of 1971 Dave headed south to the Gatornationals in Gainesville Florida Dave knew the competition would be tough as the best cars and drivers in the world would be there. His "Invader" could probably best be described as a "Monster" of timid to even start up let-alone drive. It had a 450cu.in. open chamber Chevy engine and put out between 650 to 700 horsepower. It wouldn't even idle below 2500 rpms and had to be revved to about 5000 before the engine would smooth out. It took approximately 1.1 gallons of gasoline to make one run down the quarter-mile strip.

A remembrance from Don McNally - in the early days of drag racing, late '60's and named Dave Mosher, with a '68 Camaro Big Block 396 & 427. He was not long changing up Horse Power with after market items to run faster and race other classes At Pennfield Dragway, my home track, he came, I ran very competitively, his Camaro & my 29 Roadster ran close to NHRA records for these classes. His (BMP and my BSR) when we would meet in Eliminator he was tough to beat. But one race day I had him beat until linkage on my Tunnel Ram Intake broke and he still caught me to win. He was good as well as lucky.

He Drag raced until 1973. After that he raced a sailboat and eventually was involved in stockcar racing, building engines

Daves personal motto; "Help out others in any way he could, to keep racers racing".

Dave's wife, Shirley and his son accepted Dave's Induction into the Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame.

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SAFE-DRIVING TIPS WHEN IT IS RAINING !!! GOOD VISION IN A DOWNPOUR

How to achieve good vision while driving during a heavy downpour. We are not sure why it is so effective; just try this method when it rains heavily. This method was told by a Police friend who had experienced and confirmed it. It is useful...even driving at night. Most of the motorists would turn on HIGH or FASTEST SPEED of the wipers during heavy downpour, yet the visibility in front of the windshield is still bad......

In the event you face such a situation, just put on your SUNGLASSES and miracles! All of a sudden, your visibility in front of your windshield is perfectly clear, as if there is no rain. Make sure you always have a pair of SUNGLASSES in your car. You are not only helping yourself to drive safely with good vision, but also might save your friend's life by giving him this idea.. Try it yourself and share it with your friends!!!!

Amazingly, you still see the drops on the windshield, but not the sheet of rain falling. You can see where the rain bounces off the road. It works to eliminate the "blindness" from passing cars. Or the "kickup" if you are following a car in the rain.

They ought to teach this little tip in driver's training. It really does work. This is a good warning. I wonder how many people knew about this???

Another good tip:

A 36 year old female had an accident several weeks ago. It was raining, though not excessively when her car suddenly began to hydro-plane and literally flew through the air. She was not seriously injured but very stunned at the sudden occurrence! When she explained to the Police Officer what had happened, he told her something that every driver should know -

NEVER DRIVE IN THE RAIN WITH YOUR CRUISE CONTROL ON.

She thought she was being cautious by setting the cruise control and maintaining a safe consistent speed in the rain...

But the Police Officer told her that if the cruise control is on, your

car will begin to hydro-plane when the tires lose contact with the road, and your car will accelerate to a higher rate of speed making you take off like an aeroplane. She told the Officer that was exactly what had occurred. The Officer said this warning should be listed, on the driver's seat sun-visor - NEVER USE THE CRUISE CONTROL WHEN THE ROAD IS WET OR ICY, along with the airbag warning. We tell our teenagers to set the cruise control and drive a safe speed - but we don't tell them to use the cruise control only when the road is dry.

NOTE: Some vehicles (like the Toyota Sienna Limited XLE) will not allow you to set the cruise control when the windshield wipers are on.


