

RICK'S RANT

Well now that we have had a few "storm days", and people are getting excited about outdoor cruising in the winter wonderland, I felt that a few comments on that subject were in order.... The world of winter cruising the snowmobile and atv trails has just begun, and already the Maritimes have seen a few fatalities and serious injuries associated with these machines. The laws on the books in NB, NS, PEI, and NFLD regarding sleds, utvs, and atvs are fairly decent....its just up to drivers and riders to heed them.... our trails would be a safer place for all users. But the "stupid" operators are not the thrust of my rant today....they are stupid and will remain irresponsible no matter what I, or others might tell them... it's their right and don't infringe on their territory!!!!!!!!

I want to talk to the majority of operators who are responsible "users" of their machines and the trails. This may be the year you have decided to "upgrade" your snowmobile or utv/atv, or buy one for the first time. I'd like to give you a few hints for that major purchase. The new machine will, no doubt, be a more advanced unit than the one you are replacing.... so you should consider a few things that maybe weren't available when you bought or drove the last one. And do you really need all the extra "do-dads" that are available. I realize that often these are standard equipment, but if they are not, maybe less is better....certainly for the pocketbook! And for sure fewer things to break!!! Many of the options are great....for added reliability, comfortable riding, and most important, safety. From

as "machines".....
Before buying any machine, take it (or one similar) for a test ride. Better yet, rent one for a day and really get to know it's features. Is it too big?, too powerful?, too small for 2 riders?, too heavy or awkward to maneuver?. What about warranty, repair costs, reliability and availability of parts? Is a new riding suit or helmet due with this purchase. A wind resistant and waterproof snowsuit and face shield

this point on, I'll just refer to snowmobiles, utvs, and atvs or goggles are in order, and remember there should be no bare skin when you are riding as frostbite can happen quickly. Its certainly better to have extra layers to remove than wishing you had more to put on!!! And always have spare gloves, and even socks in case the originals get wet....

Your machine should have storage for a sealed container to hold the extra gloves and socks; a few basic tools are in order, as well as a set of "new" spark-plugs and the tool to remove them; spare headlight bulb and an LED flashlight; a working cigarette lighter; a good, sharp knife; a spare drive belt; some gas and oil; simple first aid kit; a couple of energy bars; and a tow rope are all things that with a little forethought can be incorporated into storage areas on your machine. It is better to have things with you had them in the event of a breakdown, or changing weather conditions.

Lastly, obtain copies of the laws for your province....they may have changed since you bought your last machine. Join a local club, purchase the proper trail pass, insure your machine, and get a proper provincial license. By knowing the "rules of the road", being legal, and being prepared for many situations, you and your family will have hours of outdoor fun, exploring those parts of our province only available to responsible snowmobile, utv, and atv riders.....

DATE SQUARES (Old Fashion)

Mix together

- 2 cups oatmeal
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- ½ teaspoon salt

Dissolve

1 teaspoon soda in ½ cup sour milk and stir in first 5 ingredients. Beat 1 egg and add to mixture. Put half dough in a greased pan, spread with filling, cover with remaining dough.

Bake 25 minutes at 350 degrees F.

Cut 1 pound of dates in pieces Cover with water Cook until soft and has thickened



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Plan For the Best Birding Year Ever

Looking out my office window right now I would never have guessed that some species of birds are in steep decline. I have 12 feeders and every one of them is well populated on this cold winter morning. My supply of quality seed is depleting quickly but it is a good thing that I stocked up with a bulk purchase of the stuff early in the season.

This time of year, the greatest activity in our gardens occurs around the bird feeder. More accurately, it is the ONLY action out there! It is the perfect time of year to make a plan to attract insectivores when they 'fly past' come April. The more tree swallows and blue birds that I can attract to my property the better for the mosquito population and many of the flying insects that enjoy munching on my fruit trees. These birds have an appetite for flying insects that borders on legendary.

This past summer, I had the pleasure of hosting Susan Poizner to my 10 acre garden. We have a lot in common, including our mutual interest in orchard fruits and birding. As we strolled through my small orchard of apples she told me the story of Joe Krall, a fascinating person.

It seems that Joe developed a fascination with insectivore birds several years ago. In

1992 he created a 'nest box trail' which grew to over 500 birdhouses near Guelph Lake in Wellington County, Ontario. His goal was to attract nesting blue birds and tree swallows (members of the 'swift' family). He had no problem building the bird boxes: with his technical skills as a tool and dye maker he created boxes that would easily stand for a lifetime, complete with metal roofs and a side hatch for easy cleaning.

The hard part was cataloguing all of the activity in the nesting boxes over 23 years. Whenever he could, he would hike the trail with his notebook in hand and record what he found. The results?

- over 32,000 birds were born in his 500 boxes
- these included over 2,000 Eastern Blue Birds and close to 30,000 Tree Swallows
- many of the houses attracted House Wrens and Black Capped Chickadees (hey, they need habitat too!)

He would often open the side of a nesting box to inspect the contents, even during the nesting period of April through July. It is important that you do not disturb or touch young hatchlings but it is ok to have a peek, he explains.

Why would you want to attract insectivore birds to your yard? According to Susan Poizner (author of 'Growing Urban Orchards' www.orchardpeople.com), there are lots of reasons:

- 1. they eat huge numbers of flying insects
- 2. many organic orchardists mount nesting boxes to help protect their fruiting trees from

damaging insects.

- 3. insectivore birds are an important part of the web of biodiversity in the natural world
- 4. many are declining in population: they need all of the help that they can get.

Observing bird-activity around nesting boxes is fascinating. Here are some facts:

- a. the female usually lays between 3 and 6 eggs at one time.
- b. they use grasses, feathers, plant stems, pine needles and other natural materials build their nests
- c. they arrive in mid to late April every spring, mate and build their nests in the first few weeks and lay their eggs in May/June or early July. Occasionally they will hatch a second brood.
- d. It is important to clean out your nesting boxes twice a year: after the first brood has 'fledged' (pushed out of the nest) and after the second brood, which can involve a different bird species.
- e. The best location for insectivore nesting boxes is 5 to 6 feet above ground, out of prevailing winds and in an open meadow or grassed area. We see a lot of these birds on golf courses with nesting boxes for this reason.

While Joe is very passionate about his birdbox project he is moving away from the Guelph area and trees have grown up in the meadows where the boxes once stood in the open. He has pulled most of them up and is moving a few of them to his new home.

As you gawk at the population of feeding birds on your bird feeders this winter, plan

to attract some migratory birds to your yard this spring.

Will a Tax On Sugar Cure Obesity?

The Doctor Game W. Gifford-Jones M.D. did the number of people suffering from

35 years ago I warned readers about the dangers of excessive sugar consumption and labelled sugar the "white devil". The sugar industry was not amused, and complained to the College of Physicians and Surgeons that I should be disciplined. I won, after a trying, difficult battle. How things change!

Five countries currently have a sugar tax. Now the British are debating the merits of a 20 % tax on high sugar products to help fight the epidemic of obesity and Type 2 diabetes.

Why this change of heart? Dr Simon Capewell, UK vice-president of health policy, says, "public opinion on a sugar tax is shifting. The majority of parents are angry that their children are being made fat". He adds, "It's a matter of when, not if it's going to happen."

Dr. John Yudkin, professor of physiology at London University, reported in 1972 that sugar (sucrose) is dangerous as well as sweet. He showed that as the intake of sugar increased worldwide, so


heart disease.

In another experiment, prisoners in a locked ward were given different diets with and without sucrose. This proved that whenever sucrose was added, it increased the level of blood cholesterol. Can you imagine the hue and cry of libertarians if this experiment were tried today!!!

The sugar bowl is not the main problem. It's the hidden sugar in so many products. For instance, the publication Consumer Reports on Health says, "Who would think that one slice of whole wheat bread would contain almost one teaspoon of sugar." It adds that food companies toss added sugar into almost 75 percent of packaged foods, including nutritious sounding names such as instant oatmeal.

So can you lose weight by decreasing the amount of dietary sugar? In one study, 43 obese children ate the same amount of calories, but decreased added sugars from 28 percent of their daily calories to 10 percent for nine days. There was no change in weight, but their cholesterol, triglyceride, fasting blood sugar and insulin

levels all dropped. Their weight remained the same, as the amount of calories did not change. No one should ever forget the word "calorie".

But does a tax on sugary drinks guarantee less obesity and Type 2 diabetes? According to a Mexican study, a tax had no effect. Why? It helped to decrease consumption of sugary drinks, but you may have guessed it, Mexicans simply switched to other products, ending up with the same number of calories. A lose/ lose experiment.

I'm no friend of the sugar industry.

Soft drinks are really liquid candy. But in all fairness to it, obesity results from too many calories in all types of food. I see this when I travel to the U.S. and see restaurants with signs advertising "All you can eat."

My patients must have become tired of me saying, "Buy a bathroom scale and step on it every day." Of course this is not the be-all-and-end-all solution to obesity. But you never have to face the surprise that you've gained 40 pounds!

One thing is certain. You need to be a nutritionist to understand the sugar labels on food products. But it would help if labels showed what we all understand, what a teaspoon of sugar looks like.

Maybe some people would then think twice about consuming too much sugar when a cola can contains a picture of 9 teaspoons of sugar, a chocolate bar

6, a bowl of raisin bran or frosty flakes 9, sponge cake 8, and even a banana 4.

The fact is that, unless you have been living on Mars, you don't have to be a nutritionist to know that rich desserts, cookies and other goodies like ice cream contain large amounts of sugar. And unless you learn to say "no" more often than you say "yes", you will never beat obesity and Type 2 diabetes.

BROCCOLI ON THE BRAIN

You can learn to crave healthy foods

Here is some good news for those that are choosing to eat healthier in 2016. People tend to assume that they were born with a yen for high-calorie junk food, because it's so much easier to turn down a serving of broccoli than a batch of french fries. But a small study done at Tufts University last fall showed that our appetites are formed in response to learned behavior. "We don't start out in life loving french fries and hating, for example, whole-wheat pasta," says Professor Susan Roberts, Ph.D., director of the Energy Metabolism Laboratory at the Human Nutrition Research Center on Aging (HNRCA). "This conditioning happens over time in response to eating—repeatedly!—what is out there in the toxic food environment." Once established, these patterns can last a lifetime. To determine if the same process of conditioning can train our brains to select healthy food, Roberts' team studied 13 overweight and obese men and women, eight of whom were already enrolled in a weight-loss program at Tufts and five of whom were in a control group. Participants in the weight-loss program were put on healthier diets while also being educated about better food choices. The idea was to build up an association in their minds between healthful foods like broccoli and living a better life. Results after six months were impressive. MRI brain scans of the test subjects revealed changes in the area of the brain reward center associated with learning and addiction, showing an increased sensitivity to healthy choices and decreased sensitivity to the high-calorie options the study subjects formerly craved. Roberts is cautious about the findings: "There is much more research to be done here involving many more participants. long-term follow-up and investigating more areas of the brain." The study was published in the September Journal of Nutrition and






Atom Flyers Capture Dieppe Atom AA Championship
