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# Introduction to SCAN Sta (Safe Communities and Neighbourhoods)

\* A division of public safety Enacted in 2010

\* 90% of their work involves drugs

\* Program is dependant on community involvement and reports

\* A name is required for a statement but information is not shared and you are not required to go to court

\* SCAN deals with the property in question, RCMP deals with the individual getting them out of the neighborhood

\* Judge can remove complainant from residence for 3 months

\* SCAN does not deal with criminal court

#### Questions from the floor

Q: RCMP vs SCAN, who gets involved? How do you determine who to call?
A: Call both. SCAN cannot seize drugs or arrest people as they only deal with properties. The RCMP can use evidence that SCAN obtains for warrants and arrests. People need to come forward if they have information.

Q: When do the RCMP get involved with SCAN?

A: As soon as a complaint is made

Statement from Mayor: The Boys and Girls Club and The House have greatly reduced vandalism. Security cameras have been very effective as well. They are expensive and the village is looking at upgrading the technology and installing more.

Town Hall Meeting Summary held in Petitcodiac on April 14, 2016

Crowd Concern: A slow process overall, too many channels, regulations, and complications with privacy acts.

Q: Is SCAN provincial or federal? A: SCAN is a provincial program while the RCMP is federal. More information can be obtained by searching SCAN on the GNB.ca website or this link:

Statement from Christina (The House): Overall very pleased with the work of the RCMP and SCAN. They have been following through with complaints and ensuring they gather the proper evidence to obtain a conviction, not just a slap on the wrist. Going in too fast will not solve the problem, we need to get it right the first time to ensure there are convictions made.

Q: There is a lack of communication, many of the people in the room have not heard

of this program. How do we fix this?
A: SCAN has visited Petitcodiac 2 times prior to this meeting. There doesn't seem to be interest in this program until big events like this happen. They will continue to promote the program. There are also barriers set from the previous government that will hopefully be removed soon.

Statement from Mayor: He understands the frustration that people are feeling but people have been invited on numerous occasions to these kinds of meetings and very few people show up. Hopefully this will be a start of our community working together to a common goal. People also need to understand that the process is in place in order to gather the proper evidence to obtain a conviction.

Q: If a citizen sees the signs of trouble and they call the RCMP, will the RCMP refer SCAN?

A: Yes and if not, they will forward the information to SCAN and a case will be opened.

Citizen Statement: Citizen is surprised at the drug activity in the village, does not notice it on the surface. Anything suspicious is mostly ignored and doesn't personally see the need to call in. Will keep eyes open now.



#### The trial of the Mapleton Acadian Trail

The Elgin Eco Association operates a unique Acadian Forest Trail in Mapleton Elgin. Due to unfortunate circumstance the property has been sold. The new owner has it slated for a clear-cut. This is a very sad turn of events. The Elgin Eco Association has contacted the new owner to give the Eco Association a chance to buy it back. This comes with a price tag

The goal of the Elgin Eco Association is to promote the conservation of the Acadian forest Ecosystem by providing a better understanding about the Acadian forest habitat and the environmental services they provide. This particular property / trail is an unique piece of land where old and new growth shows the beauty of the Acadian forest. Our trail not only provide vistas, it also weaves along ravines and brooks. Studies have been done on the flying squirrel. Birds of prey are often heard whistling flying above and many other songbirds have been spotted and nesting on this property. On the trail you will find Ecological Sensitive Forest Communities. It also has significant historical value. Once upon a time a manganese mine was on this property and the remnants are still visible. Last but not least it houses a sugar camp and a sugar wood. We feel all this is very worthy of saving for the next generation.

The Acadian forest is under great threat of disappearing because of the constant clear cutting taking place. The Mapleton Acadian trail will see the same faith unless the Elgin Eco Association can come up with enough funds to purchase the property. We have decided we will try to accomplish this goal by various means.

An Application for funding has been send to The New Brunswick Wildlife Trust Fund. We will be setting up a special page on our website and face book to raise funds to buy the property. We hope that you are interested in helping us. It is sad that it is slated for being cut down. In order to save this exceptional property for the next generation, we will have to take action "Immediately". Not trying , is letting down the next generation of people. We want to offer them the same opportunities to enjoy and experience nature the way we do today. These opportunities are dwindling fast unless we act.

Heat oven to 400 degrees F. In saucepan heat to rolling boil ½ cup water

1/4 cup margarine or butter
Stir in 1/2 cup flour vigorously over

# **Soil Preparation**



his new best seller, 'The New Canadian Garden' published by Dundurn Press. Follow him on Twitter @MarkCullen4 and Facebook.

#### To Do

It's time to get growing. As you contemplate your options in the yard, allow me to help you get organised. It is always more effective to approach a project with a plan.

This is one of my now famous 'fridge' stories. Read it, post it.

1. Veggies. It might surprise you that this is an excellent time of year to start a vegetable garden. Don't wait until the May 24 weekend to get started. By then you will have missed the best time to sow many of your favourite crops including: peas, carrots, onions, lettuce, broccoli, cabbage, Brussels sprouts and garlic (though fall is better for garlic).

With cool April temperatures, this is a great time of year to prepare the soil of your garden by spreading 3 to 4 cm of Bio Max manure (or reliably high-quality compost). You can turn this under the soil or plant right in it.

2. Start from seed indoors. Sow tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, leeks, zinnias, asters and the like now. With 5 to 6 weeks until our last frost date, your timing will be perfect. Come late May/early June, you will be ready to plant in warm soil and your transplants will take off. You will save a small fortune too, as you won't buy transplants at your garden retailer.

Use a quality seed starting mix (I use 10 parts Pro Mix with one part worm castings. Magic!) All seedlings need plenty of light to grow properly: sunlight or fluorescent lights work best.

- 3. Lawn. My recipe for the best lawn on the block:
- a. Rake lightly with a fan rake to remove winter debris.
- b. Fertilize with a quality lawn food. One which contains slow release nitrogen and chelated iron. The nitrogen for a long lasting green colour and the iron for the deepest possible green.
- c. Where weeds occur or thin spots exist, spread lawn soil 4 cm thick and rake smooth. Broadcast quality, Canadian grass seed at the rate of one kg per 100 sq. meters. Rake this smooth (again), step on it with flat soled shoes and water until germination. Keep reasonably well watered until new roots are established (about 4 to

6 weeks). Look for the new Pro Mix Ultimate Condition grass seed, using mycoactive technology. It germinates in temperatures as low as 4 degrees C.

- d. When you are ready to cut your lawn, set your mower at 6 to 8 cm high. Any lower allows weeds to establish and weakens your lawn. Use a mulching mower.
- 4. Plant trees, shrubs, evergreens and roses. All of the 'winter hardy' stock that you find at garden retailers this time of year can be planted in the garden, unless it has already flushed new, soft growth: an indication that it was forced in a greenhouse and is now frost-tender. All woody plants that are dormant at the time you purchase them are ready to plant this weekend.
- 5. Dig and divide. This is a great time of year to dig up perennials and divide them into sections to replant around your yard or give away to friends and neighbours. Hosta, monarda, daylilies: you name it.
- 6. Soil prep. Whatever you plant, be sure you prepare the soil well before you place your newly acquired plants in the ground. 90% of your success depends on it. If you are making a new garden in clay-based soil, be sure to remove existing soil 30 to 40 cm deep. Replace it with triple mix, mounded 10 cm higher than the current grade, as the new soil will settle. If you are planting in an existing bed, add 4 to 5 cm of new, quality soil and either turn it under or let earthworms do it for you.

Note that 'quality' soil is the key. Don't use 'black earth' (basically peat-muck) or cheap manures which are often not manure at all. Producers have been known to cut corners in production to keep costs low. The results are never good. Quality soil and compost is alive with nutrients, is safe (teaming with beneficial bacteria) and is high octane fuel for everything that grows. Look

for composted manure that is certified by the Composting Quality Alliance. I spread 4 cm of well-composted manure over my entire garden each spring. Yes, I use over 40 yards of the stuff.

I also use worm castings whenever I plant: one part to 10 parts soil. Earthworm castings are nitrogen rich and teaming with a concentration of nutrients and mycorrhiza. I can see the difference in plant performance when I use worm castings.

And finally, after you have returned your garden furniture to its summertime place, be sure to sit on it. Enjoy the bird song (put out feeders and nesting boxes), the wind and the sunshine. It may not have been the longest, coldest winter on record but you have none the less earned a break from the indoors.

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

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
# A True Local Human Interest Story



It is still very inactive but continues to live on Gatorade soaked kleenex, flexing its wings now and then. Lois would like it to live to experience the lilacs, but Pauline has faint hope that will ever happen.

# **ROY BLAKNEY**

Motorcycle Competitor Rider/Restoration/Specialties "Roy Blakney, has had a long and varied background in motorcycling". Born Sept. 8, 1931 Moncton, NB.

His contribution as businessman, official, promotor, sponsor, media and clubs in motor sports has been local, national and international and is not a short story. 1951 to 1966 the list of 1st and 2nd finishing is amazing. And the list goes on and

Roy's aggressive riding netted him several Maritime Championships. Unofficially he has ridden about 71 years and at least 2 million miles. Roy and his brother Bob started the first motorcycle club in New Brunswick in 1952, the Moncton Motorcycle Club.

In 1952 Roy, Bob and Lloyd Pollock designed a motor playground and dirt track in Petitcodiac, 'The Ranch' for amateur club competition and racing events for several years.

They became more professional with CMA sanctioned races at Scoudouc Airfield and Charlie McEwens track and several Nova Scotia locations. They raced at St. John Raceway, Rothsay Scrambles, Magnetic Hill, The Gorge, Grand Lake, Roden Hills, Maitland and Debert, any place the Moncton Motorcycle Club, Scoudouc Club, the St. John and Halifax Clubs could find places to play and compete.

He competed in Obstacle courses, Road Rally's, Ice Racing and Trails in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, in the United States, Australia and New Zealand.

In 1961, at the new speedway in Daytona Roy placed 12th. Roy says he is still riding.



# CAN FIBER DECREASE THE RISK OF COLON CANCER?

The Doctor Game - W. Gifford-Jones M.D.

Humans don't learn from history. Dr. Denis Burkitt, a British researcher, showed years ago that African natives, consuming large amounts of fiber, did not suffer from constipation, appendicitis or problems of the large bowel, such as diverticulitis (hernias of the colon). Now, a new British report states an increase in dietary fiber decreases the risk of large bowel malignancy.

Being of Scottish heritage, I always consider ways to save money for our health care system. Luckily, there's no need for expensive MRI's to determine whether the diet contains sufficient fiber. A rectal examination that finds rock-like stools quickly provides the answer. Stools that don't float are also a good sign more fiber is needed.

Students of history may remember the World War 2 story of the battleship King George V chasing Germany's battleship, the Bismark. But how many know that constipation was rampant among its sailors? The ship's surgeon, T.L. Cleave, was also constipated and hated to take laxatives. Faced with this problem, Dr. Cleave decided to experiment on himself. For several days he consumed raw unprocessed bran. It cured his and his sailors' constipation.

Studies show that North Americans consume only 15 grams of fiber daily. This is a failing grade as it's less than half of what people should be eating.

So what's so vital about fiber? Fiber holds onto water, thus creating large soft stools. This means fewer grunts with bowel movements, less risk of hemorrhoids, and pain due to the irritable bowel syndrome. It also seems logical that by fighting constipation, cancer causing substances would be removed quicker. The trouble is that most studies have failed to prove this is the case.

Now Dr. Dafinn Anne, at the Imperial College of London, has reported what may be the largest study ever conducted of fiber. It involved two million participants who were followed up to 17 years. The study showed that those who consumed a high fiber diet had a 12 percent lower risk of developing colon cancer. It appeared that the benefit was greater with cereal fiber and whole grain intake than from fiber in fruits and vegetables.

Dr. Nicola McKeown, an epidemiologist at Tufts University, says," Most people are consuming refined grains and missing out on the fiber and the nutrients concentrated in whole grain".

Natural products are always superior to refined manufactured food. Besides, there is no debate that fiber is one of the best ways to fight the epidemic of obesity and Type 2 diabetes, now reaching epidemic proportions in North America. With the control of these two problems, the risk of developing other major killers such as heart attack, hypertension, stroke and the complications of surgery is decreased.

Fiber's secret is its capacity to fill. For instance, no one with an ounce of sense would put eight teaspoons of sugar in a glass of water and drink it. Yet children and others are drinking cans of cola that contain this amount of sugar and no fiber. These drinks have little effect on the hunger reflex. On the other hand, an apple contains three grams of fiber. A second one is rarely needed as the stomach feels full and the hunger reflex diminishes.

The best time to start increasing fiber intake is at breakfast. Look for high fiber cereals that contain 15 grams of fiber per serving and the least amount of sugar. Be sure to buy brown rather than white rice, whole wheat pasta rather than regular pasta and whole wheat bread rather than white bread. Also add lentils, black beans, green peas, tomatoes, celery, prunes, pears, broccoli, bananas and roasted almonds to your diet, all high in fiber content.

I admit I sometimes prefer bacon and eggs or French toast with maple syrup for breakfast. But as Sidney Howard, the playwright, remarked, "Knowing what you want is also knowing what you must give up before you get it'. So a bowl of high fiber cereal seems like a small sacrifice if it will prevent a deadly colon malignancy. Besides, who enjoys being constipated?

# LIGHTING OF DRY GRASS AND OPEN FIRES

By-Law 40 states:

The lighting of any open fire to dispose of dry grass, brush, hay, straw, leaves, buildings, construction materials, automobile or garbage in the municipality is prohibited.

Other than in a properly constructed incinerator approved by the Department of Environment and Local Government and its successors, no person shall light a fire outside a building for the purpose of disposing of any refuse or waste material. No person shall set a fire that is likely to cause inconvenience or discomfort to others.

No person shall burn on the pavement or road allowance, which would interfere with traffic.

The Fire Chief or his designate reserves the right to order any open-air fires to be extinguished.

This By-Law does not apply in relation to live or training fires conducted by the Village of Salisbury Fire Department.




