
Historic Mapleton Acadian Forest Trail

Nature Trust of New Brunswick and the Elgin Eco Association Protect Historic Mapleton Acadian Forest Trail

(Elgin, NB) The Elgin Eco Association and the Nature Trust of New Brunswick have conserved 160 acres of beautiful Acadian forest in Elgin, New Brunswick. Through an effective partnership, the two organizations, with the help of many supporters, were able to establish a nature preserve before the historic forest was scheduled to be clear-cut. The local Elgin Eco Association will continue to steward this preserve - Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve for years to come.

The 160-acre property features over 3km of trails that span the length of the preserve. With footbridges, a traditional sugar shack, and interpretive signs, the Elgin Eco Association have been proud stewards of the important Acadian forest since the official creation of the organization in 2002. When the property was sold for clear-cutting, the Elgin Eco Association approached the Nature Trust to partner on conserving the land and trail. After months of campaigns and fundraising, the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve was officially protected in December 2016.

"The Elgin Eco Association would like to thank all the members and individuals that so generously supported our cause. You believed in us," says Elgin Eco Association President, Moranda Van



Geest. "Your trust and your generosity will never be forgotten".

The Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve features two brooks, new and old growth forest, ravines and an ecologically sensitive area comprised of giant hemlocks. The preserve is a true Acadian Forest, with a mix of a

variety of hard and soft wood trees including eastern cedar, red spruce, yellow birch and red maple, to name a few. The Acadian forest is classified as an endangered forest type in North America, with less than 5 percent of

pre-settlement area of intact Acadian forest remaining. The preserve is also home to many plant and bird species characteristic of the Acadian forest, such as the northern flying squirrel. The Chimney Swift (*Chaetura pelagica*), a threatened species due to habitat loss, has also been sighted in the preserve.

The Nature Trust of New Brunswick is

excited about the new partnership with the Elgin Eco Association. "The Elgin Eco Association have been long time stewards of this beautiful property. We are thrilled to have the opportunity to partner with them and to protect this important forest," says Executive Director of the Nature Trust of New Brunswick, Renata Woodward. "We look forward to our continued collaboration with the Elgin Eco Association, as they will continue to steward the property for the community to enjoy. We are also interested to speak with any landowner who is willing to work on land conservation surrounding this preserve."

The Elgin Eco Association and the Nature Trust of New Brunswick will be hosting an opening ceremony for the nature preserve in late August 2017 to celebrate the newly acquired preserve. A huge thank you to those who contributed to the protection of the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve, including major funders: Mountain Equipment Co-Op, The New Brunswick Wildlife Trust Fund, Environment and Climate Change Canada and the Nature Conservancy of Canada through their Other Qualified Organizations Program.



In the middle of January the EEA is looking at its coming year with great enthusiasm. We are looking at our accomplishments with great pride. Not only members, but also many other people from our community, New Brunswick, other provinces and USA have helped us in acquiring the Mapleton Acadian Trail Property. It is not a small feat to find seventy five thousand dollars in a hurry. We did it. Please see special media release. We should not forget to thank the former owner for his willingness to sell the property to the EEA/Nature Trust. The Mapleton Acadian Trail will forever be there and the one hundred and fifty acres will now be called Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve. Can you believe it. A Nature Preserve. We are now working on restoring the sugar camp. Volunteers will be a big part of this work. We are actively seeking funding for materials and to put a new roof on the building. This sugar camp will become the cornerstone of educating the public and tourist about the nature preserve and the sugar bush. Soon it will be spring and many of the birds that were identified by Alain Clavette last year will return to their breeding grounds. We are so lucky that we can see them return to this unique piece of forest. Although there were many birds that you might have heard of, some are very interesting birds worth a walk through the woods. We also hope to start giving bird walks and other types of educational hikes. The Ruby Crowned Kinglet is one of the birds nesting in the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve.

Some facts below:
A tiny bird seemingly overflowing with energy, the Ruby-crowned Kinglet forages almost frantically through lower branches of shrubs and trees. Its habit of constantly flicking its wings is a key identification clue. Smaller than a warbler or chickadee, this plain green-gray bird has a white eyering and a white bar on the wing. Alas, the male's brilliant ruby crown patch usually stays hidden—your best chance to see it is to find an excited male singing in spring or summer. In summer, Ruby-Crowned Kinglets are common in spruce-fir forests in the northwestern United States and across Canada. They also live in mixed woods, isolated trees in meadows, coniferous and deciduous forests, mountain-shrub habitat, and floodplain forests of oak, pine, spruce or aspen. These birds nest high in trees, and so prefer older, taller, and denser stands to younger ones. During migration and winter they are common in woods and thickets across most of the continent.

We have added several new members to our membership list this new year. Everybody is looking forward to the new summer season. Don't forget our Little Library in the park and near the W.I Hall. You can exchange books, adult and children's books. Free books, No fees and always open. Any suggestions are welcome to improve the readership

Another Work Day

The house is dark and freezing cold and my nose is cold. Glad I had put on my watch cap so at least my head and ears stayed warm. The heavy wool blankets feel good beneath them and the thought of not getting up is tempting. It's another work day so I flip the covers off and swing my feet to the floor. With long Johns and wool socks on my feet the cold is barely tolerable. First thing is to light the kerosene lamp so I can see what I am doing. The pale light is reflected off the mirror behind it. The next thing is get the fire started. I lift the iron damper and check for hot coals left from last night's fire...there are none. Some paper, then small kindling, a few drops of kerosene and a wooden match lit and thrown in, the fire is soon blazing away; time to put on my heavy pants, shirt and boots. The house is not large, just the main part and two small bedrooms, so it will warm up quickly. The enclosed porch is where the water bucket is kept, so I pull the door open, not a large area but big enough for a pantry where food like a roll of baloney, butter and such supplies are kept. The ice box has no use this time of year so is used as another storage place. A small table is where the water bucket sits with a long handle dipper hung on the side. After the ice on top is broken, the dipper is used to fill the tea pot. The stove is going good so a few heavier sticks will help it along. More water gotten for the wash basin and is placed on the stove to warm up so I can wash up, hate washing in ice cold water. The tea pot is bubbling so a hand full of loose tea and soon will be drinkable. I wash up and pour my tea and sit at the table. It is December 11th twenty more days and it will be 1958 a new year. I finish my tea, put on my heavy outer clothes, check the fire, and then blow out the lamp. It is breaking dawn outside and the sky is a pale blue. The floor creaks and groans as I head for the door through the porch. The morning light makes you squint till you get used to it. The air is still and biting as I walk to the old Ford sitting like a faithful dog. The key hole is frozen, so I hold the key in a gloved hand and hold a match under it till it's hot. I get the door open and slide into the car. The vinyl seats are cold and I insert the key and turn it. A low groan is all that responds. I get out and slam the door. Another day of walking to work, at least the road is bare. The silence is broken by load cracks of the telephone poles and my boot steps on the road. Houses in the distance have smoke coming from chimneys that go straight up in a white column. My nose stays shut each time I breathe in and has turned a rosy pink. Oh well, just four more miles and I'll be in the factory, at least it will be warm. Maybe in the new year I will get another raise, it's been almost a year since the last one. When I started I made fifty cents an hour, now ninety-five cents, almost a dollar. Good thoughts on the way to work.

Time to Change What we Call Ourselves

Take a moment to pull the snapshot that is in your head of a gorgeous garden. It is in your mental hard drive somewhere. Got it? For some this is a brilliant, blowy place full of colour and for others it may be a large expanse of lawn or even a golf course fairway. Chances are the image that you currently have stuck in your head is different from that of everyone else who has made the effort to find their image.

Now think about a gardener. What does she look like? What does she do? Is a gardener simply a farmer on a small scale? Or a designer, an artist with skills like that of a painter?

Truth is, a 'gardener' as we knew it for several generations is no longer the person we once thought. In the 20th century, a gardener cut grass, trimmed hedges, planted plants in large mono-chromatic schemes and generally controlled what nature threw at her or him. We planted rose gardens, collected peonies and planted impatiens by the bucket-load; wide sweeps of the things bloomed en masse at the front of many suburban homes. Gone. All of this is out the window. The incoming generation of 'gardeners' is changing our concept of Canada's most popular outdoor activity in dramatic fashion. The field of gardening is looking much less 'field-like' and more 'condo-balcony'.

Eco Gardening

Take the environment for example. Foremost in the minds of millennials are native plants that attract pollinators. The decline of the honey bee is on their radar as are the declining populations of bats, snakes, frogs and many bird species. All of these are connected to the new gardening experience as we slowly come to the realization that our activity in the yard and garden has an impact on the universe within blocks of our home.

Think of the hummingbird that drinks nectar from your salvia. Then fits over the fence to bathe in your neighbour's bird bath then on to the public park down the road to build a nest, lay some eggs and create another generation. When that hummingbird comes to your salvia, the furthest thought from its tiny little brain is that this is YOUR space, your property and that you hold the deed and legal right to it. Hummingbirds couldn't care less.

Our activity in the garden provides many health benefits to us, the gardeners. And for those who choose to just sit and view the results of our handiwork, there are benefits for them too. Gardeners figured that out generations ago. What is dawning on everyone who loves to garden is that we are connected through our activity in the yard and our interest in creating beautiful and productive (as in food gardening) outdoor spaces with the broad natural world around us.

Gardeners are birders.

Gardeners are conservationists.

Gardeners are hikers, walkers, often bikers and golfers.

We spend a lot of time absorbing the environment in which we do our best work. It is time then to consider another word to describe who we are and what we do. The word needs to connect us to nature and good food.

We are earth-bound naturalists (not necessarily naturists or nudists, though we could be).

We are eco-implementers and designers.

We are water savers, air purifiers, earth rangers (that one is taken) and wildlife habitat builders.

We are food providers and hunger destroyers. We provide the raw material for the most amazing meals on the planet.

We are sustainable thinkers.

We are social connectors and community builders.

We are artists whose work evolves as nature demands it; our work is never done. We are solid citizens. We plant hope.

Prosperity is not measured in monetary terms in our world. Wealth creation happens when we partner with nature to create beauty.

The results of our work are dynamic, ever changing.

People and animals are welcome here.
