

Historic Mapleton Acadian Forest Trail

Nature Trust of New Brunswick and the Elgin Eco Association Protect Historic Mapleton Acadian Forest Trail

(Elgin, NB) The Elgin Eco Association and the Nature Trust of New Brunswick have conserved 160 acres of beautiful Acadian forest in Elgin, New Brunswick. Through an effective partnership, the two organizations, with the help of many supporters, were able to establish a nature preserve before the historic forest was scheduled to be clearcut. The local Elgin Eco Association will continue to steward this preserve - Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve for years to come.

The 160-acre property features over 3km of trails that span the length of the preserve. With footbridges, a traditional sugar shack, and interpretive signs, the Elgin Eco Association have been proud stewards of the important Acadian forest since the official creation of the organization in 2002. When the property was sold for clear-cutting, the Elgin Eco Association approached the Nature Trust to partner on conserving the land and trail. After months of campaigns and fundraising, the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve was officially protected in December 2016.

"The Elgin Eco Association would like to thank all the members and individuals that so generously supported our cause. You believed in us." says Elgin Eco Association President, Moranda Van variety of hard and soft wood trees including eastern cedar, red spruce, yellow birch and red maple, to name a few. The Acadian forest is classified as an endangered forest type in North America, with less than 5 percent of



Geest. "Your trust and your generosity will never be forgotten"."

The Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve features two brooks, new and old growth forest, ravines and an ecologically sensitive area comprised of giant hemlocks. The preserve is a true Acadian Forest, with a mix of a pre-settlement area of intact Acadian forest remaining. The preserve is also home to many plant and bird species characteristic of the Acadian forest, such as the northern flying squirrel. The Chimney Swift (Chaeturapelagica), a threatened species due to habitat loss, has also been sighted in the preserve.

The Nature Trust of New Brunswick is

excited about the new partnership with the Elgin Eco Association. "The Elgin Eco Association have been long time stewards of this beautiful property. We are thrilled to have the opportunity to partner with them and to protect this important forest." says Executive Director of the Nature Trust of New Brunswick, Renata Woodward. "We look forward to our continued collaboration with the Elgin Eco Association, as they will continue to steward the property for the community to enjoy. We are also interested to speak with any landowner who is willing to work on land conservation surrounding this preserve."

The Elgin Eco Association and the Nature Trust of New Brunswick will be hosting an opening ceremony for the nature preserve in late August 2017 to celebrate the newly acquired preserve. A huge thank you to those who contributed to the protection of the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve, including major funders: Mountain Equipment Co-Op, The New Brunswick Wildlife Trust Fund, Environment and Climate Change Canada and the Nature Conservancy of Canada through their Other Qualified Organizations Program.

A Bit About Our Canadian History as we near 150 years of confederation

Two centuries before Confederation a pair of resourceful Frenchmen named Radisson and des Groseilliers discovered a wealth of fur accessible via the great would not back them. From its long-time headquarters at York Factory on Hudson Bay, the company controlled the fur trade throughout much of the English and later British controlled North America for several centuries. Its network of trading posts formed the authority in many areas of Western Canada and the United States. Called Hudson's Bay point Dalankets, for the beaver pelts trapped by aboriginal hunters. By 1700, point blankets accounted for over 60% of the trade. In 1821, the North West Company of Montrelal and Hudson's Bay Company were forcibly merged by intervention of the British government to put an end to by the mid-19th century, the company evolved into a mercantic business selling everything from furs to fine home ware. The retail era had begun as the HBC began establishing stores across the country.

In the late 19th century, with its signing of the Deed of Surrender, its vast certroty became the largest portion of the newly formed Dominion of Canada, in July 2008 HBC acquired NBCC Equity Partners, who also owns U.S. Itusury (Department store chain; Tellers, a mass-market department store; Heno Quitters, a home decor retailer; and Fields, a variety store chain. The house is dark and freezing cold and my nose is cold. Glad I had put
on my watch cap so at least my head and ears stayed warm. The heavy


