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Village of Petitcodiac Receives Funds to Enhance Community Infrastructure

All Canadians deserve to live in inclusive and vibrant communities where they can connect with their friends and neighbours. Alaina Lockhart, Member of Parliament for Fundy Royal, on April 27, 2017 announced an investment of \$7,850 for Petitcodiac. The work involves upgrades to the Syd Crandall Memorial Ball Field.

The announcement was made on behalf of the Honourable Navdeep Bains, Minister of Innovation, Science and Economic Development, and Minister responsible for the Atlantic Canada Opportunities Agency (ACOA).

This project is being partly funded through the Canada 150 Community Infrastructure Program (CIP 150). Funding in Atlantic Canada is delivered through ACOA. 

"Ask Your MLA" Ross Wetmore, MLA Gagetown-Petitcodiac

Another session of the provincial legislature was brought to a close on Friday May 5th. Once again, the Gallant government used their majority to force closure of debate and closure of the house.

It is accepted as tradition in our Westminster parliamentary system that the government decides when the legislature opens and the Opposition decides when the legislature closes. This has not been the case with this government. Fans of democracy must find this behavior disappointing and disrespectful.

When the most recent sitting of the legislature commenced last November, our new Leader, Blaine Higgs, guided Her Majesty's Loyal Opposition into the people's house. Blaine immediately made fixing our broken Education system a priority

During this session of the legislature we witnessed the evolution of the Parlee beach and property tax scandals. In both cases the government employed denial, diversion and distraction as New Brunswickers sought the truth. In both cases had it not been for the persistence of the media, the government may have managed to cloud the truth. In both cases the actions of Ministers of the Gallant government should have resulted in their resignations. In the case of the property tax scandal, it is Premier Gallant himself who should tender his resignation now that his dishonesty in the matter has become a matter of public record.

The session commenced under the cloud of carbon tax and the recent revelation that the Premier had backtracked on his commitment that any such tax would be revenue neutral. The position of the PC Opposition on carbon tax is clear and unchanging. Carbon tax in New Brunswick is unnecessary and will do nothing to reduce emissions or fight climate change. A carbon tax will cost jobs and raise the highest taxes in North America even higher. The emission levels will remain the same, but will come from south of the border as businesses are forced to relocate to remain competitive.

We all recognize that the frequency and severity of weather events is changing, but when the only solution a government offers to any problem is to raise taxes, we have to question their motivation.

In January our province fell victim to a devastating ice storm. Two people died and many were hospitalized as the result of carbon monoxide poisoning while trying to keep their homes warm. In February, I introduced a motion asking the government to emulate the provinces that have allowed Meter Based Transfer Switches and allow them to be installed in New Brunswick residences to avoid a repeat of the tragic deaths during the ice storm. These transfer switches are now available in

Each day this session I was again honoured to carry the fight of the Save the Gagetown Ferry cause to the legislature in the form of petitions. The Minister of Transportation, Bill Fraser, has stated that the Gagetown ferry is not coming back. The people I am hearing from are saying that it is the Gallant government that is

In the last few days we have learned that the government will not replace the Cherryvale Bridge. Again, it was Minister Fraser who announced this latest insult to the people of my riding and to southern New Brunswick as a whole. I hope the minister does not think the matter is closed.

We recently learned that the government has diverted over \$5 million of Canada 150 funding away from the Tourism budget for parts unknown. I submit that \$1.5 million of that money can go to replace the Cherryvale Bridge with a new covered bridge, constructed by a New Brunswick company, from New Brunswick timber, hewn by New Brunswickers in our own forests.

I can't think of a better Canada 150 project than a new covered bridge that will last 100 years, honoring our past and serving us for the next century. Albert County's Dan Tingley of Wood Research and Development Ltd. has already expressed a willingness to use his world famous expertise to solve some of our bridge problems.

As we travel through spring and into summer there are a number of issues that will remain top of mind for the members of our Opposition team. The softwood lumber dispute, the problem with the SEED program and the Gallant government's continued mismanagement of our provincial affairs will continue to dominate conversations. One observer on social media remarkedthis government will go all the way to the Supreme Court to keep the people from buying cheap beer from outside the province, but they are more than happy to buy road salt and power poles outside the province, while putting our people out of work.

I have purposely saved the brightest and best for last.

During this legislative session we were visited by Becca Schofield and her family. By now everyone has heard the story of this inspiring young woman and her #beccatoldmeto campaign. While facing the end of her own life, 17 year old Becca, has taken precious time to selflessly spread the message of kindness and caring to improve the lives of others. I am proud to say that the third Saturday in September will henceforth be honoured as Becca Schofield Day.

A Bit About Our Canadian History as we near 150 years of confederation

ANADA 150 A Bit About Canada Continued

War of 1812

The War of 1812 (which lasted from 1812 to 1814) was a military conflict between the United States and Great Britain. As a colony of Great Britain, Canada was swept up in the War of 1812 and was invaded a number of times by the Americans. The war was fought in Upper Canada, Lower Canada, on the Great Lakes and the Atlantic, and in the United States. The peace treaty of Ghent, which ended the war, largely returned the status quo. However, in Canada, the war contributed to a growing sense of national identity, including the idea that civilian soldiers were largely responsible for repelling the American invaders. In contrast, the First Nations allies of the British and Canadian cause suffered much because of the war; not only had they lost many warriors (including the great Tecumseh, the Shawnee chief, leader of a First Nations confederacy, military leader in the War of 1812 (born c 1768 in south-central Ohio; died 5 October 1813 near Moraviantown [Thamesville, ON]). they also lost any hope of halting American expansion in the west, and their contributions were quickly forgotten by their British and Canadian allies.

The term "First Nations" is used to refer specifically to Indigenous peoples in what is now Canada. The term "First Nations" does not include the Metis or Inuit peoples of Canada.

plant' in the centre? We don't do that any more. Bell bottoms and sideburns are out too.

Today, the rule is 'almost anything goes'. Indeed, we are now mixing food plants with perennials, annuals with miniature roses and herbs with everything. The only rule is to make sure that you place your containerized plants in an exposure that works for them. A sun loving petunia does not do well in the shade. My favourite 6 plants for containers:

- 1. Coral Bells [Heuchera]. There have been so many new introductions in this family of winter hardy perennials in recent years that I have had trouble keeping up. The foliage of Coral Bells can be spectacular so the flowers are a bonus. They mature to between 15 cm and 65 cm in breadth and width. Stick with the more compact varieties for best performance in containers. My favourite varieties are compacted, Blackout and Caramel all of which are perfectly named as they look as their name suggests. I am going to try the new Root Beer this year as I appreciate roots and really like beer. Sun to part shade.
- 2. Hosta. Another plant that you will grow for the foliage and consider the flowers a bonus. Again, stick with the smaller varieties. Hostas will tolerate being dry between water applications. The flowers attract hummingbirds and the foliage is to die for, in many cases. My favourites include June (yellow/green mid-sized), Striptease (green chartreuse) hosta of the year in 2005 and Guacamole (green) hosta of the year in 2002. My friend Paul Zammit, from the Toronto Botanical Garden, has perfected the art of growing and overwintering hosta in his garden. He recommends that you place the pot and all in your garage over winter. Part sun or shade during growing season.
- 3. Million Bells. Remember petunias? They are still popular. However, million bells look like petunias with smaller flowers but they actually produce more colour. They flower longer and do not require pinching or cutting back, as petunias often do. They don't know when to stop blooming, which is why they look great late in to fall when many other annual flowers have pooped out. They do need to be fed. Be sure to apply a Feed and Forget fertilizer at the time of planting. One shot, good for the whole season. Available in brilliant, bold colours on the hot side of the colour wheel (orange, red and rose).
- 4. Boston Fern. Not the old Boston fern that dropped leaves everywhere when you bumped into it, but any of the new varieties that hold their foliage and fill out all season to create a relaxed, country feel wherever they grow. I put 8 of these at the front of my house each summer in hanging baskets and large clay pots and they never disappoint. They forgive me when I don't water them regularly and they look their very best when the frost arrives in late fall.
- 5. Roses. Not just any rose but everblooming, disease resistant, small to medium in stature bush roses. Look for Oso Easy from Proven Winners. They are great garden performers in containers. Knock Out roses are equally colourful and reliable. I recommend that you remove roses from containers in the fall and plant them in the garden over winter where they are better insulated. Come spring, dig them up and place them back in containers. Repeat.
- 6. Herbs. All herbs lend themselves to container growing, except a giant like dill. Most herbs originated in the Mediterranean region and enjoy being on the dry side, do not like to be fertilized and thrive in the hot, blazing sun. Place your herb pots near the kitchen door to ensure easy access.

My list of great performers in containers goes on to include geraniums, dusty miller, dwarf zinnias, sweet potato vine, spider plant, bacopa and virtually any plant that is compact, does not mind becoming dry between water applications and is suitable to the sun/shade exposure in your yard or condo balcony.





Mud bogging on Pollett River raising concerns



A yearly event along the Pollett River is raising concerns among many environmental groups, as well as the mayor of the village of Petitcodiac.

Each year, people participate in the Pollett River Run where people go down the river on homemade vessels and at the end of the run, drive around in off-road vehicles just next to the river. This year's event took place almost 5 weeks ago. More than 5000 pounds of trash litters landscape following Pollet River Run But the last part of the run is where the mayor and other groups take issue. Petitcodiac Mayor Gerry Gogan said the concern is over potential damage caused

by the last stretch of the yearly event, called mud bogging. "They get in there, they stir the mud all up, and people tell me they don't go

in the river, but we've had rain for a whole week, where do you think that mud goes? In the river. You cant keep it out of the river, "Gogan said.

Christine McLaughlan of the Petitcodiac Watershed Alliance agrees.

"If there's mud that enters this clean river, it can settle over the cobbly bottom that salmon need, and if there is salmon eggs, where they're nesting, which is about this time, that mud can settle over the salmon eggs and smother them," McLaughlan said.

Every year McLaughlan and her team take a few days to help clean up after the river run. In years past, they removed thousands of pounds of debris left behind from partiers, and though things are getting better through awareness campaigns on social media, she thinks the mud bogging is still a concern.

It's not an eco-friendly event by any means, cause you've got trucks and ATVs and all kinds of machinery going through water, being immersed in water and no doubt leaving vehicle fluids behind right next to this river," McLaughlan added Gogan said he hopes to get a group together before next year's run to help explain how damaging the mud bogging can be and offer an alternative.

"We're even looking at perhaps offering the mud-boggers an optional site, away from the river. If they want to mud bog, then mud bog, but do it in a place where it won't affect the river."

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
