

in the park. It also has a beautiful flower garden with a LIBRARY where anybody can pick and / or exchange a book. Lots of children books make the round. It all is FREE. Of course don't forget THE MAPLETON ACADIAN FOREST NATURE PRESERVE this is a gem with many birds being observed nesting this year. The public is asked to let us know when they do spot a 'CHIMNEY SWIFT' flying in the preserve and note where you saw it. This is an ongoing study by Canada Bird.

Swallow like

Size & Shape

Chimney Swifts are very small birds with slender bodies and very long, narrow, curved wings. They have round heads, short necks, and short tapered tails. The wide bill is so short that it is hard to see.

Color Pattern

They are dark gray-brown all over, slightly paler on the throat. At distance and when backlit against the sky they can appear to be all black.

Behavior

Chimney Swifts fly rapidly with nearly constant wing beats, and often twist from side to side and bank erratically. Their wing beats are stiff, with very little flex at the wrists. They often give a high, chattering call while they fly.

Habitat

Chimney Swifts nest in chimneys and on other vertical surfaces in dim, enclosed areas, including air vents, wells, hollow trees, and caves. They forage over urban and suburban areas, rivers, lakes, forests, and fields.



Over the Edge: An Experience I'll Never Forget

Why would anyone in their 94th year, without consulting a psychiatrist, agree to descend from the top of Toronto's City Hall on a rope? My wife thought I had gone mad. Surreptitiously, I momentarily agreed with her! So what was it like descending (rappelling) lo it?



My son is one of many volunteer WISH Grantors for Make-A-Wish Canada. It grants wishes to children who have life-threatening illnesses. Since 1983 it fulfilled all kinds of requests for 6,800 children. And each year 600 more are granted the wish of their dreams. I discovered that my son was rappelling not only for a great cause but also for his current wish child, Kyle. It occurred that I might join him in this worthy cause.

So what wishes do these children seek? You may have guessed that many young children want to go to Disneyland and meet Mickey Mouse. Some ask for the experience of meeting a fire-fighter. Others who hope to become a ballerina want to meet one.

One wish child experienced an epileptic seizure. Unfortunately, his diagnosis was a life-threatening brain tumour. Until then, he had dreamed of being a naval pilot. However, this dream being impossible, he was granted the experience of landing on an aircraft carrier.

This boy's dream caught my attention. As a boy I had never dreamed of landing fighter planes on an aircraft carrier. But years ago, the U.S. navy flew me as a medical journalist onto the deck of the nuclear aircraft carrier U.S.S. Nimitz during its maneuvers in the Atlantic. I was sent to report on its medical facilities. I'm sure this young boy's heart rate increased, as did mine, prior to landing. He would have had the experience of sitting in the Admiral's chair overlooking the activities of the flight deck, see the surrounding escort destroyers and cruisers and how, by using a flight simulator, he could land one of the fighter planes. He would have witnessed the drama of seeing night patrols taking off and landing on the carrier.

So this boy was on my mind on June 9th as I approached City Hall. I could see people already descending the building by rope and my first thought was "Holy Cow! I'm going to be up there soon!" which left me with a combination of excitement and considerable apprehension.

Once on the roof of City Hall, I was struck by the incredible view of Toronto, possibly too good a view as I considered the height! Then the highly trained staff from OVER the EDGE began fitting my son and me with harnesses. Instructions followed. What to do with hands and feet on the way down, and just as important, what not to do.

I've never listened to instructions more carefully. I hoped the staff monitoring my descent were not tired. I also hoped no critics of my column were present who would love to cut the rope.

Finally with much preparation I climbed cautiously over the top of Toronto's City Hall. Then, with my son beside me, we descended slowly down the wall for the next 20 minutes.

Now that I've landed safely on Terra Firma I can hardly believe it's happened. My hope is that this column will make more people aware of the good deeds of Makea-Wish Canada. Consider the experiences many of us have had over a lifetime. These children with life-threatening disease are asking for just one single wish. How could any refuse?

So in the end my decision, crazy as it may have been to drop down the side of a tall building in my 94th year, ended well. And as the oldest one to do it, it resulted in a spectacular and gratifying day.

I have also never received a better medal placed around my neck. The medallion reads "I DID IT, ROPE FOR HOPE".

It's our birthday. Our country is 150 years old. What are you doing to celebrate? If travel is in your future and you are wondering where to go, I have a suggestion: Canada's great gardens.

The Butchart Gardens

Let's start with the grand daddy of them all. Suffice to say that more people visit The Butchart Gardens, near Victoria B.C. than all public gardens that require paid admission combined. But I don't know that for sure.

What I do know for sure is that this is the most spectacular Canadian garden that you can imagine. Management are meticulous in their maintenance of the place. There are many concerts, night illuminations, Saturday night fireworks, a new (2009) Rose Carousel and Children's garden.

Admission is about \$33 for adults. It is a bargain. When I travel to Britain, to visit gardens, this is a very low fee, indeed. I paid over \$100 Canadian to go to the Chelsea Flower Show last month.

Tofino Botanical Gardens

While you are on Vancouver Island, why not drive up the east coast and head west about half way up to visit an extraordinary garden in Tofino. Selected by Jane Perrone, the gardening editor for the UK's Guardian Newspaper, as one of the best public gardens in the world.

This garden features 12 acres of shoreline, gardens, forest and ongoing activities. Take your time here and be mindful that his valuable property is part of the UNESCO Biosphere Reserve: the Clayoquot Sound. http://www.tbgf.org/

Annapolis Royal Historic Gardens

When celebrating Canadian history this public garden should top your list. This garden reflects life during a time that we have almost forgotten about: the early to mid 1600's. The design and layout walks you through a rich, historic tale of life as an Acadian in one of the first European settlements in North America.

In addition to the history celebrated, there is a rose, evergreen, azalea and winter garden. Kids are catered to in a big way with special activities throughout. Look for 'Workshops for Kidz' on their website. Admission is only \$14.50 for adults. For details go to www.historicgardens.com.

Halifax Public Gardens

This is the finest example of a Victorian style garden in North America. Created in 1867, it has a rich history that pre dates Confederation. 14 acres featuring meandering paths, a gazebo for public performances (of which there are many), giant rhododendrons, amazing water foul and a great place to people watch in the centre of the city. Free admission. http://www.halifaxpublicgardens.ca/

Montreal Botanical Garden

The Montreal Botanical features extensive greenhouses (with a tropical rain forest), an orchid and Aroid collection, bonsai, a fern collection, lots of educational and fun activities for kids and one darn good walk. Plan to visit the library, a decent restaurant and a special exhibit called 'Space For Life' in the Biodome: a participatory movement and exploration of the planets biodiversity through science, you have to see it. At 190 acres it is a darn good walk too. www. espacepourlavie.ca Adult Admission \$20.50.

In Ontario, there are many great gardens worthy of your time and sometimes a small entrance fee. In the City of Toronto, there is High Park (http://www. highparktoronto.com/), Allan Gardens (http://www1.toronto.ca/parks/prd/ facilities/complex/41/), and of course the Toronto Botanical Garden that just gets better every year. http://torontobotanicalgarden.ca/

Of course there is only one ROYAL Botanical Gardens in North America, in Burlington/Hamilton, with almost 2,000 acres of formal gardens (including the new \$18 million Rock Garden), nature trails, Coots paradise, extensive greenhouses, a restaurant and more. http://www.rbg.ca/ Happy horticultural birthday Canada!!!

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"Ask Your MLA" - Ross Wetmore, MLA Gagetown-Petitcodiac

Bravo once again for New Brunswick's Auditor General Kim Macpherson.

When the people of New Brunswick need a champion of openness and accountability, they can depend upon our Auditor General to defend the interests of the taxpayers. On May 9th, the Auditor General advised the Gallant government's self-created and self-appointed Audit Committee that she would be tackling the property tax scandal.

The Audit Committee was announced last September and consists of the Premier's Chief of Staff, the President of the Treasury Board (Minister Melanson), the Deputy-Minister of Finance, the Clerk of the Executive Council among others; hardly a non-partisan and independent body. The formation of this committee did not get a lot of publicity and many people are unaware of its existence.

In a hastily thrown-together press conference on Monday, June 5th Environment Minister Serge Rousselle revealed that former Justice Joseph Robertson had resigned from the Gallant government's internal review of the property tax scandal. Good for Justice Robertson.

The retired judge had been given a mandate that was designed by those responsible in large part for the scandal. The powers given to Justice Robertson were severely watered down compared to those now available to the Auditor General under the Inquiries Act. In short, he was not given the tools to do a job worthy of his credentials and credibility.

From the time the Premier announced this self-serving inquiry, our leader Blaine Higgs and the Official Opposition have repeated the message that this inquiry was not independent and was reporting to the wrong body, namely the Executive Council. The Executive Council is headed by Premier Gallant, the central figure in the property tax scandal. There was no possible way that the exercise would have the perception of fairness and impartiality to the taxpayers and victims of the scandal. Our criticism was ignored and/or insulted by the government as per their usual practice.

On Friday, May 5th the Gallant government shut down the legislature and ran from the property tax scandal. On Tuesday, May 9th the Auditor General took responsibility for getting to the truth of the matter. We wish her well on her mission and hope that the Premier's actions and involvement will form a chapter of her final report.

The Auditor General's report on the property tax scandal will be presented sometime this fall, as will her report on ATCON.

The problem-plagued Premier and his MLA's have a rough summer ahead.Just lately, the Gallant government's new electronic recycling fee came into force. Many people are viewing this new fee as another hidden tax. Consumers will be hit with a hidden fee of up to \$46 depending upon the device.

Recently, we also learned that our driver's licenses will no longer be printed on the spot at Service NB offices. The Gallant government has joined the other Atlantic Liberal governments and awarded a contract to an Ontario firm to print the licenses. Now, you will no longer walk out of Service NB with your new license, but will have to wait for 10 days or more for your license to be mailed from Ontario.

Once again, the Gallant government is sending more work out of province. Add driver's licenses to snow plows, hydro poles, construction work and road salt. When the government ships more work out of province, the end result is more of our workers are leaving the province as well. It's a simple concept that seems to be lost on the current government:

Keep work here, keep workers here.!!

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

Rural Rides was incorporated in 2014 with a mandate to provide affordable transportation to those who do not have access to transportation in Petitcodiac, Salisbury, Havelock, Elgin and all points in between with the help of volunteer

drivers. With a sizable grant from ESIC, the service was launched. At that time, we knew there was a need for the service and many had hoped that with the modest fees charged for rides that over time, it would become self-sufficient. Over the past few years through experience, growth and collaboration with other door to door driving groups in the province, two things became evident:

 Many could not afford even the modest rates of \$.70 per km for rides
 Rural Rides would never be self-sufficient and would always need grants and donations to continue to meet the transportation needs in the area.

In May 2016, the board of directors voted to establish a subsidized rate for those who qualified financially. Since the introduction of the subsidized rates the number of rides and frequency of use has increased dramatically. The cost of subsidized rides for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2017 was \$8230.07. Rural Rides provided 850 rides last year of which 684 were for medical needs. The remainder were for needs like banking, grocery shopping, food bank access and some social activities. More than 90% of our clients currently qualify for the subsidized rate. Our clientele is primarily seniors as well as some disabled residents and low income families.

We have been fortunate to receive ongoing funding from ESIC and additional donations from The Village of Salisbury, The Village of Petitcodiac, The Salisbury Lions Club, The Salisbury Lions Villa, a sizeable donation in memory of Chris Leaman and donations from local residents. As use of the service continues to increase, the need for funding to subsidize rides will increase as well. Additional sourcing of funding will be an ongoing need. Charitable status was applied for in 2014 and was rejected with some suggestions from Revenue Canada. As part of the reapplication process, we fine-tuned our purpose to that of relieving poverty by providing affordable transportation to area residents and relieving conditions associated with aging such as loneliness and isolation by providing transportation to the elderly for medical appointments, grocery shopping and social or recreational programs. Reapplication was made in 2016 and with a few revisions. Charitable Status was received effective April 1, 2017, the beginning of our current fiscal year. Charitable Status allows us to apply for grants we previously could not apply for as a non-profit. Charitable Status also means that when you, a member of the community, make donations to support this worthy cause, you will receive a tax receipt.





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Cruising to the Motorsports Hall of Fame


