



August 12 is the Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame Golf Tournament at the Petitcodiac Golf Club.


The Salisbury Community Days is being held from August 17-20th with 4 funfilled days of events, exhibitions, concerts, suppers, contests, games, a parade and much more!

Swimming in 20 Gallons of Pee

The Doctor Game - W. Gifford-Jones M.D.

Have you ever wondered what you're swimming in when someone invites you to a pool party? I've always found it hard to turn down these weekend soirees. The weather is usually good, you enjoy cocktails talking to friends, and then a refreshing dip in the pool. Now, an eye-boggling report by Jennifer Clopton in the publication WebMD, shows there's more lurking in the pool than you imagined.

Clopton reports that Indiana Health Officials had to close a water park when two children received chemical burns from chlorine in the water! This resulted when the chlorine equipment malfunctioned. At least this is a fixable problem.

But Clopton's research also shows that fixing human behavior poses a greater challenge. Her study shows that many people pee in pools.

Ernest Blatchley, an environmental engineer at Purdue University, agrees. He's spent 20 years analyzing pool chemistry and claims the public finds it convenient to pee in pools. In fact, researchers estimate that, in a 220,000 gallon pool, there can be 20 gallons of urine! If they knew this fact, how many friends would join me for a dip? But how did researchers reach this conclusion? At the University of Alberta they collected samples of artificial sweetener, acesulfame potassium,

from 31 different swimming pools and hot tubs. Lindsay Blackstock, who was involved in the study, says that the only way this sweetener could get into the water is by human pee.

Putting aside the displeasure of swimming in 20 gallons of urine, how risky is the dip? Blackstock says urine is not a major health risk factor. But urine and sweat can react with chlorine to create toxic compounds known as disinfection by-products. This may trigger asthma in elite swimmers and respiratory and skin conditions in swimmers, lifeguards and pool workers. And it can also make you rub your eyes.

So what's the chance of becoming ill from 20 gallons of pee? Like most medical situations it largely depends on

the dose. The greater the exposure the greater the risk of infection.

What about the presence of fecal matter in pools? Poop is often present as it's washed off the body during swimming. This can cause more trouble than urine because it contains germs such as cryptosporidium. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) says that swallowing a mouthful of this germ can cause nausea, vomiting, stomach cramps and diarrhea, lasting for up to three weeks.

So it's much like the game of Russian roulette when a hot spell takes you to a local pool. For instance, the CDC reports that when 50,000 swimming pools were

Celebrating New Brunswick

New Brunswick Day has been a holiday on the first Monday of August since 1976 and the New Brunswick Day awards were introduced in 1991.

It is a chance for people to strengthen their local communities by celebrating their achievements, history, culture and landscape. Many towns hold "birthday" parties for the province.

The New Brunswick flag is raised in some communities on the day. This flag is rectangular and consists of two parts. The top third of the flag is a gold lion on a red field, which represents the province's links with the Braunschweig (Brunswick) region in central Germany and the monarch of the United Kingdom. The lower part of the flag consists of a Spanish galley and represents shipbuilding, which was an important industry in the province.

The area that is now the province of New Brunswick has been populated by First Nations communities for around 6000 vears. In the 1600s and 1700s, the area was colonized by the French and later the British. New Brunswick is the largest of Canada's three Maritime Provinces. It is located under Quebec's Gaspé Peninsula and beside the State of Maine. New Brunswick was one of the first provinces to become part of Confederation, along with Ontario, Québec and Nova Scotia, to join together to form the Dominion of Canada in 1867. New Brunswick has experienced immigration on a smaller scale from all over the world, and today boasts a varied and increasingly multicultural population.

The Bay of Fundy tides - the highest and wildest in the world - have carved a spectacular coastline. New Brunswick is also connected to Prince Edward Island by the world-famous Confederation Bridge.

An eastern seaside province, New Brunswick has beautiful sandy beaches in the summer, spectacular autumn foliage, wildflowers in the spring and

pure, white snow in the winter. The province is marked by its rolling hills and spectacular valleys, as well as its historic and modern architecture located in many of its cities, towns and

New Brunswick's communities vary from its eight major cities, Bathurst, Campbellton, Dieppe, Edmundston, the provincial capital of Fredericton, Miramichi, Moncton and Saint John ("Saint" is always spelled out), to its many attractive towns and villages located throughout the province that offer a wide range of attractions to visitors and residents alike.

Its rivers, such as the mighty St. John , the magnificent Restigouche or the majestic Miramichi, all possess unique characteristics unlike anywhere else you can find. From rolling farmlands to picturesque forests, river valleys to rocky pinnacles, the beauty and variety New Brunswick offers is unique in the

When Samuel de Champlain and other European explorers began to explore the area that became New Brunswick in the early 1600s, they were met by the Maliseet (Wolastogiyik) and Mi'kmag peoples who inhabited the area and lived along its rivers and coasts. The early French pioneers established settlements at the head of the Bay of Fundy and up the St. John River Valley as far as present-day Fredericton and called the entire Maritime region Acadia.

The area was the subject of numerous conflicts between the French and British empires during the later 1600s and early 1700s. The region was ceded to Great Britain in 1710. Following the final defeat of the French in 1755, more than 5,000 Acadians were forced into exile from their lands by the British. Some of them escaped to what was then a remote and relatively uninhabited coastline along the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Baie des Chaleurs,

where these Acadian settlements grew and thrived. Today, this region is known as the Acadian Peninsula.

In 1783, refugees loyal to the British Crown began to land at the mouth of the St. John River in what was then part of the Province of Nova Scotia . They were fleeing from persecution in the aftermath of the American Revolution and came from as far south as Georgia and as far north as Massachusetts. These refugees were not all of British origin, but included German, Dutch and Black Loyalists. The Black Loyalists included a number of freed slaves, but there were a small number of lovalists who brought their slaves with them to New Brunswick.

Discontentment with the government in Halifax led to the establishment of the areas north of the Bay of Fundy as the new Province of New Brunswick in 1784. By 1785, so many refugees had landed and settled at the mouth of the St. John River that the King granted a charter to the new City of Saint John , the first incorporated city in Canada. The capital was established at Fredericton, 114 km up the St. John River.

Scottish and Irish settlers began to settle in New Brunswick in the early 1800s. A large number of Irish, escaping from the hardships of the Potato Famine, made their way to Saint John and the Miramichi River region in the 1840s. Later immigration included a few hundred Danish settlers in the 1870s, whose communities in Victoria County exist today. A significant number of Jewish immigrants came through the Port of Saint John from the 1890s to the beginning of the First World War. A number of these immigrants remained to form Jewish communities in Saint John , Moncton and Fredericton. Italian, Greek, Lebanese, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Indian, Pakistani and African Canadian communities have been established over the past century in the major cities.



From New Brunswick

<u>Donnie Beers</u>, (deceased) Stock Car Competitor started racing in 1965 at River Glade Speedway. With his popular #3 set a record that may still be in effect today, winning eight features for the season. He was well known for his fierce competitiveness and winning attitude. He could start at the back and soon take over the lead thrilling his legion of fans. In 1965 and 70 he finished the points in second at RGS. 1968 finished first at Shediac. Donnie received the Most Popular Driver trophy at McEwen's Speedway three years in a row, 1966, '67 & '68.

<u>James Cowie</u>, Drag Racing Competitor. Home town Miramichi, started drag racing in 1972. James Cowie is one of the Maritimes most recognized drag racing names. He is active in IHRA and NHRA as well as local Eastern Canadian ET Bracket circuits. His resume includes winning the Super Comp title at the 1991 NHRA Winston All Star Race, Rockingham, North Carolina and the 1994 Quick Rod title during the IHRAs Northeast Nitrous Nationals at Epping, New Hampshire.

Cyril Hall, Stock Car Promotions, Track Announcer. He began his announcing career in 1982 at River Glade Speedway. He went on from there to be the announcer you needed at every conceivable Speedway in New Brunswick until 2015. He also announced at the re-opening of the newly rebuilt Riverside International Speedway 2006. Cyril provided announcing and commentary for races shown on local cable channels, written newspaper articles and press releases of weekly racing results, worked car show booths and emceed numerous year end award banquets.

Kevin Taylor, Tractor Pulling Competitor. He has been active in motor sports for 40 some years. He has competed locally and internationally in tractor pulling, snowmobile and stockcar racing. He started at age 13 in Woodstock, NB pulling with a stock 26HP Cockshutt 40 farm tractor and won. He has become one of tractor pulling's strongest competitors in the region. He moved up to his own built 10,000 pound Pro Stock Tractor, Bad Kitty One; it has a turbocharger 3208 Caterpillar V8 diesel engine. He has developed the tractor over the years by building Bad Kitty Two and Three. It would be very difficult to list all events and his placements.

From Nova Scotia

<u>Cy Harvey</u>, Stock Car Competitor from 1969 until present. Cy is from Enfield and has raced and won in Sportsman , MASCAR, Legend, Trucks, Open Wheel and Pro Stock. He has raced not only in the Maritimes but at tracks in the US, such as Charlotte Speedway, North Carolina; New Smyrna Speedway, Florida. He won the Canadian Championship at Berry Speedway in Ontario in 2002 & 2003.

William (Bill) Clarke, Drag Racing Competitor/Motor Sports Builder, home town Dartmouth NS, dedicated to the sport of Drag Racing for over 35 years. For the 2014 edition of the IHRA Summit Tournament of Champions, he was one of 117 drivers from 22 states and four Canadian provinces who represented their divisions as the best drivers from the 2014 IHRA Summit Racing Equipment Pro-Am Tour. 2015 he drove to victory in the NHRA Lucas Oil Drag Racing Series Super Gas division taking top honors in that class during the NHRA's marquee 46th Amalie Oil Gatornationals event, Gainesville, Florida. 2016 he was runner-up in the Super Rod Class at the IHRA Divisional Event at Bradenton, Florida. Bill has been a most generous financial supporter to local racers, organizations and local racing facilities.

Gary Pozzebon, Drag Racing Builder/Competitor, makes his home in Cape Breton. Gary is truly a valuable asset to drag racing in Atlantic Canada. Since the early 1990's he has been president of the Cape Breton Drag Racing Association. With Gary's knowledge of bureaucratic process and expertise in drag racing along with his leadership drive to organize a team of volunteers and a network of sponsors, their association was able to build the new Cape Breton Dragway. Its grand opening was held in August, 2016. As a racer he was well known all over Atlantic Canada for regularly competing in the Super Pro/Super Gas categories.

From Prince Edward Island

Kevin Power/James Merrill Cronin, Builders of Drag Racing and Stock Car Racing, Track Owners. Kevin started drag racing in the early 1970's with a 1956 Ford sedan. Merrill's greatest contribution was to the establishment of stock car racing on PEI. In 1981 Kevin, Merrill and Doug Young purchased the Oyster Bed Bridge drag track. After a couple of years they bought out Doug's interest. In 1984 the drag building was burnt by arson, they decided not only to rebuild but to expand to include a ¼ mile dirt stock car track. With their earnings they made many upgrades including paving the track in1987. At this point Merrill sold out to Kevin. Kevin sold the stock car track in 2010. The RPM magazine featured his annual "Pinks With a Twist" race which raises money for cancer. Such names as Shirley Muldowney, Barry Paton and others have raced there. The track is the longest running drag track in Canada.

<u>Wayne Gaudet</u>, Builder Stockcar. Born in Charlottetown, started his racing history at an early age with motorcycle drag racing at venues all over the Maritimes with much success. Then he turned his attention to Motorcycle Road Racing with great success. Wayne's stock car career began by doing every job necessary to get the Sherwood Do It Centre car ready for race day for Rodney MacDonald. His next move was to Oshawa, Ontario where he was crew chief for Randy MacDonald. Next he worked with a NASCAR Busch Grand National series team. Then on to the NASCAR Winston Cup team of Chad Little. He was hired by Roush Racing and became manager of the fabrication shop. Wayne was the first PEI resident to be part of a Winston Cup Championship team.

<u>Carl Livingston</u>, (deceased) Stock Car Competitor/Car Owner. He start racing on the dirt tracks on PEI in 1966. In 1985 he moved to the newly built track, Raceway Park in Oyster Bed Bridge, where he raced Street Stock and Modified. There he had multiple triple wins and finished 3rd in the season points in 1987. 1989/90 raced with the MASCAR Tour. When Carl retired from driver due to health reasons he became owner/sponsor for his son Kent from 1992-2007, winning the Modified Championship in 1996. He was co-owner of Livingston welding helping many racers over the years.

Thirty nominations were considered by the MMHF Induction Committee in making their selection; they would like to thank everyone who submitted a nomination.

The formal induction ceremony is set for November 18, 2017 at the Loyalist Country Inn in Summerside, Prince Edward Island.

Gary is a class act anywhere! Gary has been and is a very active competitor, in 2013, at age 62; he turned the fastest lap than any he has made at Atlantic Motorsport Park since he raced there at AMP's inaugural motorcycle



He is a Life Member of the Atlantic Motorcycle Rider's Club (AMCRA) that organized motorcycle road racing from 1968 at Debert, NS until 2006 at AMP.

Beginning in 1971 on a small 250cc Ducati in the Junior class he was promoted to Expert in 1972.

Gary was the first racer to win three Maritime Road Racing Championships - 1974, 1975 and 1984.

In 1980 and 2000 Gary won the "Mack McConney Race, an endurance race where the fastest racers start last and often 3 laps down.

In 1972, 1973 he ran the 24 Hours of Mosport and in 1977 at the Mosport World Championship Formula 750 event, he finished 4th in lashing rain in the 125 GP Honda Challenge.

In 1972 at Bryar Motorsports Park, New Hampshire, Gary started dead last in a



field of over 60 starters and finished 2nd by a hands width behind Pro Rider John Minnond on the BIG D Trinmph from Dallas, Texas.

In 1988 at age 36 he switched to vintage bikes on his Ron Lynds tuned Kawaskaki H-2 750 and his fun began all over again.

Gary, always in the hunt for the winner's circle, raced at Debert and AMP, Nova Scotia; Pennfield

Ridge, New Brunswick; Mosport and Shannonville Motorsport Park, Ontario; New Hampshire Motorsport Park and Bryar

Motorsport Park, New Hamshire; and St. Jovite's Mont Tremblant, Quebec. Gary served as AMCRA Race Organizer at AMP and brought about a major change that improved the safety for all motorcycle racers at APM by insisting that mixed programs of cars and bikes no longer take place, breaking a 20 year tradition.

Gary's ready wit and generous nature brought many new competitors into our sport.

Rural Rides Needs You!

Rural Rides has been in operation since the fall of 2014. Our Ranal Rides mandate is to provide volunteer services which provides affordable transportation to residents of Salisbury, Petitcodiac,

Elgin, Havelock, River Glade and Upper Coverdale and nearby locations to help reduce isolation and to increase independence for those who do not have other access to transportation. Ninety percent of the rides we provide are for medical needs such as tests, doctor and dentist appointments. We serve primarily seniors and low income families so we subsidize a large portion of the rides we provide. Our drivers volunteer their time and we reimburse them \$.35/km for fuel and vehicle costs. In the past six months alone, our drivers have donated 447 hours of their own time and have driven our clients a total of 14,149 km.

Most of our drivers are retired individuals with a passion to help others in their

community. As with any volunteer organization, we are always looking for new volunteers. We have a somewhat pressing need for drivers in the Petitcodiac area as we only have one driver now who is available for the next several weeks. We try our best to make sure every request for transport is met, even if that



means sending drivers from Salisbury to Petitcodiac to meet the need. This of course adds to our cost for each ride as we reimburse the drivers for their actual miles travelled but only bill the client for theactual distance they travel. Like any organization, it is important to keep costs down. Therefore, it is important for us to recruit new volunteers in the Petitcodiac area.



<u>Sunday</u>, there will be music by Judy and the Boys as well as a BBQ. That evening there will be a performance by The







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Let's make New Brunswick the picture province it once was

Once upon a time we promoted and marketed New Brunswick as Canada's Picture Province.

In fact up until 1972 our 'Picture Province' was advertised on our license plates. The website https://mynewbrunswick.ca/ still displays the slogan "Discover the Picture Province".

I want to compliment this website and the folks who run it. They have interesting articles about many of our tourist attractions, including many of our lesser-known treasures. They have lots of photos; even have a drone-cam view of several places.

Should you go and have a look around the website I expect you will notice the same thing I did.

Now, the condition of roads has been the topic of discussion since roads were first built.


Over the years one government to the next has had mixed reviews over their handling of our rural road network, none of them satisfactory.







won't even pretend to be an expert on cars, old or otherwise. I didn't even drive until I was 44 years old. I've never been quite sure whether I actually passed my driver's test or if the instructor just never wanted me back again. On the "Ridge" where I grew up there were few cars, except for those of the once a year visitors. Our American relatives who showed up each summer to 'strut their stuff.'

My grandfather (Daddy) had once, before my arrival, been the proud owner of a Model T Ford, but when the house burned, the depression came and the times called for frugality, that same old car lost its front grill and hood to be recycled into the only genuine Model T woodbox in the country. That woodbox lasted forever. Red, air conditioned and it needed no gas or license plate. Uncle Herman Price bought a new car in the 40's. I have no idea what make it was. All I remember is that it was in the back seat of that wonderful vehicle that first tasted "Lime Rickey." Never did I realize there was a fizzy drink to top buttermilk.

Uncle Herman's brother Ott also owned a car and I suspect that since the two men were mill-wrights they could easily afford them. Ott's wife also being a school teacher. I recall the end of the school year in 1949/1950. The school (all ten of us) as well as parents and siblings celebrated with a field trip to Fort Beausejour. The two cars were loaded down with kids and parents and off we headed with trunks full of food, kids on laps and men on the runnin'boards. We must have been a sight! Of course the cars were a lot slower then, there were no big highways and few paved roads. We were getting a great history lesson, little realizing that we ourselves were becoming part of history.

My Aunt Frances Dunstan once told me of a trip they made in the early 40's to the "Ridge". Going back home to Mont Eagle at the end of day as they descended the Mill Pond hill, on the 126, their son informed them that the baby had fallen out the back door. Uncle Warren stopped the car and they walked back and picked up little Jimmy. He was asleep so they stopped in Salisbury to let Dr. Stewart have a look at him. He seemed to be O.K. so they were told that if he didn't wake up by morning to bring him back. The next morning Jimmy was wide awake and hungry. Much to their relief!

While old cars were slower their door latches were not as dependable. When I reached the romantic age of 15 I went on my first date and wouldn't you know it, the door latch on that old G.M.C. truck wouldn't catch and I had to spend the evening en-route from Butternut Ridge to Petitcodiac holding the darn door shut! Oh well, when I got home at 10:00 my first kiss compensated for all that frustration.

As I've said, I don't know much about old cars, but I can tell you that it IS possible to get eight teenagers into a V.W. Beetle!

One day a fine gentleman and I drove off after our wedding in a Dodge, shaped like a rocket, and never looked back. After 12 kids (and don't even ask me about their cars), I've seen that 7 sons can do terrifying things to vehicles! Until I bought my first little red Chevy, I had no idea how easy it was to hit 5 deer in one year. "Forgive me Lord", but they can't seem to resist the colour red. I should have stuck to wood boxes!
