Federal and Provincial Governments Refuse to Meet With Community

On April 14th, 2014 the Clark Covered Bridge (Cherryvale Covered Bridge) located in Canaan Forks N.B. was washed away in the spring Freshet. The bridge turned off its abutments and travelled 12 miles down the Canaan River coming to rest under the Moncton to Fredericton Bridge crossing the Canaan River at Coles Island. As our icon travelled down the river it stayed mostly intact and months later was removed from the river. The bridge was 87 years old at the time of this devastating loss to our community.

We inquired about having our bridge replaced. We wrote e-mails to government, individuals wrote letters to DTI expressing the need for our bridge to be replaced. For two years the reply was "no decision has been made". Finally, Mr. Bill Fraser, Minister of DTI, replied to a letter written by a concerned citizen and stated the bridge would not be replaced. The reasoning for this decision was another route existed and the financial position of the government would not allow for a new bridge.

The community was very disappointed

with this decision. We knew this bridge was needed. The Cherryvale Road floods each year and our residents on the south side of the river are unable to get in or get out. No medical services, no vets, no hydro trucks, or fire trucks etc. Everyone isolated until Mother Nature allows the river to recede. The McDonald bridge which is 6 km away also floods and usually damages the floor of the bridge and that route can be out of service for two to three weeks after a flood. The only route in or out is through the Salem Road which is a 40 km detour when the other routes are impassable.

The provincial Liberal Government decided to make improvements to the Salem Road to make it accessible year round. They built the road up and chip sealed the road. Prior to the work commencing we explained to local MLA Wetmore that this would not rectify the problem for 3 reasons

1) When Cherryvale Road floods the residents on the southside of the river can't get to the Salem Road;

2) Thornes brook bridge only rated for 15 ton resulting in service vehicles needed in an emergency would not be

able to reach stranded individuals; 3) Loss of provincial snowmobile and atv trails if bridge not replaced.

Mr. Wetmore took concerns to Minister Fraser and requested Minister come meet with community but Minister refused.

As a community we felt we needed to be proactive in getting a bridge. We formed a committee and started investigating different opportunities for funding for a replacement bridge. We discovered Disaster Financial Assistance was a Federal program designed to replace Infrastructure lost due to weather events. It is based on a funding formula and we qualified for 90% funding towards a replacement bridge. To obtain the funding the Department of Transportation replaces the infrastructure and then Federal Government reimburses Provincial Government based on formula. If Provincial Government does not replace the infrastructure, then funds go to other provinces. Funding has a 5 year deadline.

The community was very excited knowing that the biggest hurdle was funding and we felt we had a reasonable solution. We felt we had a viable opportunity to have a replacement bridge which the Province would own and the Federal Government would pay 90 % of the cost. We started contacting government departments asking them to come to our community so we could explain our findings and explain how the bridge was essential for Tourism due to Snowmobile and AtV use. We e-mailed several Ministers and asked them to attend a public meeting. We expressed our desire to meet with the Ministers or staff in our community. We felt this was very fair as other communities had lost bridges and Minister Fraser went and met with their communities. We invited MP Lockhart or her staff and no one from her office would attend either. It is not fiscally responsible for the Provincial Liberal Government to not access Federal funds based on a 90% Federal- 10% Provincial split on funding

for a replacement bridge. Disaster Financial Assistance funding exist for this very type of situation. It should not matter if it happens in a rural area or an urban area. The fourth anniversary of losing our bridge is on April 14th, 2018. After 4 years we still have not had a public meeting with any represented from DTI or from MP Lockhart in our community. As tax payers we feel the liberal governments are turning their backs on Rural N.B. Our committee is starting a petition to have Minister Fraser and other Government officials come meet with our community at a public meeting. We are planning a rally at the bridge site at 1pm on April 14th. In the coming weeks you will see lawn signs at the end of residents driveways that say "Rural Lives Matter". All communities in rural N.B. have their own concerns and we hope others will help us by signing our petition or purchasing a lawn sign. Any support would be greatly appreciated.

snowmobiles parked in the yard...quite an endorsement!

Mediterranean Diet for a Long Life

Leonardo da Vinci once remarked, "Trifles make perfection and perfection is no trifle." Trifles can make a huge difference in surgery, when building rockets, in nutrition, or in life generally. For instance, a report in the publication Life Extension shows that a Mediterranean Diet prolongs life. As we all age, this is no trifle.

For years doctors and nutritionists have known the Mediterranean Diet is a "Five Star" one. But no one knew why this diet had such remarkable benefits. Now, researchers have discovered its success is due to polyphenols (a plant based compound). They lower the risk of cardiovascular disease (CVD) by an amazing 60 percent! This means fewer heart attacks, strokes, hypertension and less inflammation.

The author of the report, Michael Downey, says that most people fail to obtain sufficient polyphenols in their diet. Authorities agree that people should eat 10 servings of fruit and vegetables every day to reduce CVD risk. Unfortunately, for most people, it's impossible to consume this amount of fiber, nuts, artichokes, lentils, grapes, pomegranates, olives, fish and wine each day.

The Mediterranean Diet also affects the risk of dying. In 2016, at the European Society of Cardiology conference, a study showed that the number of those who followed the Mediterranean Diet were 37 percent less likely to die than those who ate a non-Mediterranean diet.

One researcher made the sage remark that "the Mediterranean Diet provides more protection against heart disease than most of today's prescription drugs!" And this isn't a trifle!

Since so many North Americans suffer from hypertension, one study is of particular importance. After a year on two types of Mediterranean Diets, subjects showed that blood pressure had declined. Equally important, researchers discovered that increased amounts of polyphenols and nitric oxide were being excreted by the kidneys.

Nitric oxide (NO) is nature's natural arterial relaxant. I've previously reported that, as we age, less NO is produced by our bodies, causing constriction of arteries, hypertension and erectile dysfunction. 

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

“Ask Your MLA” -

Ross Wetmore, MLA Gagetown-Petitcodiac

With my years of experience in the private sector, I am keenly aware how hard it is to meet a payroll, pay increasing property tax, and sign those ever increasing cheques to Work Safe even when no one has filed a claim.

New Brunswick businesses pay the highest taxes in Canada and they don’t get a very good return for their money. The Canadian Federation of independent Business prepared a chart that showed of thirteen financial actions taken by the Gallant government between 2015 and 2017 which affect businesses, 10 have had a negative impact. Increases to gas, diesel, property, land transfer, and large business tax along with HST, Workers Comp Premiums and three increases to minimum wage have had a suffocating effect on growth. As Robert Jones of the CBC reported, New Brunswick’s economic growth is expected to be the worst of all ten provinces in 2018 at 0.9625%.

On February 26th, as a result of the latest provincial budget, Dominion Bond Rating Service warned investors that the New Brunswick government is becoming susceptible to future economic shocks. One day later Finance Minister Cathy Rogers said they will not change spending outlined in the budget.

In the 2018-19 budget, Finance Minister Rogers stated “We have restored fiscal order to the provincial government budget”. Yet, the Gallant government is projecting their fourth consecutive deficit (\$189 million this year) and announced that they now have no plan to balance the budget until 2022. This despite record levels of revenue from taxes.

On page 21 of the budget we learned that the net debt as of this year-end is \$14,359,474.00.

Expressed on a personal level, this is more than \$18,900 for every man, woman and child in New Brunswick and climbing. This year we will pay more than \$700 million in interest payments.

When will this end?

Hopefully, the end of out-of-control taxing and spending will end on September 24th of this year. The coming six months promise to be a non-stop campaign of election promises and fear-mongering by Brian Gallant and his Liberal team. For our part, Blaine Higgs and our PC team will be presenting the facts after four years of Gallant government.

New Brunswick is the highest taxed jurisdiction in Canada. Our students lead the country in student debt. New Brunswick residents report the lowest net worth of any province. On a per capita basis more people file for bankruptcy than in any province. We have the longest health wait times in the nation and a health care crisis in overcrowding and ambulance service as well as critical levels of stress, PTSD and mental health and trauma claims among our paramedics.

While our people have been suffering, the Gallant government has used their majority in the legislature to ram through a record number of tax increases and every Liberal MLA has voted in favour of every tax increase that has been introduced.

We can do better, we must do better and we will do better.

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RECIPE OF THE MONTH**Chicken Fricot****Serves 6****Ingredients**

- 1 chicken
- 2 tbsp. (30 ml) butter
- 1 large chopped onion
- 1 tbsp. (15 ml) flour
- 12 cups (3 L) water
- 1 tbsp. (15 ml) summer savoury
- 5 cups (1.25 L) diced potatoes
- 2 cups (500 ml) carrots, sliced (optional, to taste)
- 1 cup (250 ml) celery, chopped (optional, to taste)
- Salt and pepper

Preparation

Cut the chicken into large pieces and brown them in butter, making sure that all sides are golden brown. Remove the chicken and sauté the onion in the butter. Add the flour and sauté the onion for another 1 - 2 minutes. Add the water, the chicken, salt, pepper and summer savoury. Simmer the mixture until the chicken is tender (about a half hour). Add the potatoes, carrots and celery. Cook for another 20 minutes.

Variation: Pâtes (see recipe below) are frequently added to fricot. When using pâtes, omit the flour from the traditional recipe, and add the dumplings to the fricot about 7 minutes before the fricot is ready to be served, taking care not to uncover the pot while the dumplings are cooking.

PASTA

In a bowl, mix 1 cup (250 ml) of flour with ½ tsp. (3 ml) of salt and 1 tbsp. (15 ml) of baking powder. Gradually add ½ cup (125 ml) of cold water.

Drop the mixture into the fricot or pot-en-pot a spoonful at a time. Cover and simmer for 7 minutes.

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NASCAR Star Kenny Wallace Announces Entry in IWK 250



One of NASCAR's most popular personalities, Kenny Wallace, will be at Riverside International Speedway this July for the IWK 250 presented by Steve Lewis. Wallace, whose infectious personality and trademark laugh have made him a long-time fan favourite, announced his entry into the event this afternoon on his Twitter account.

"Hello Canada," said Wallace in the tweet. "I am excited to come see the beautiful area of Nova Scotia and race on asphalt Saturday, July 14 at Riverside

(International) Speedway. I will see you this summer."

Wallace will drive a car out of Antigonish's Nova Racing stable; 2016 IWK 250 winner and track owner Donald Chisholm will be a teammate.

"We are extremely happy to have Kenny follow a long list of great drivers to race the IWK 250," said Chisholm. "He has a ton of energy and will do a great job promoting and building the event. We are already working on preparing a car for him that is capable of winning the race. I reminded Kenny how tough it is to win the 250 and I think that only made him more interested to come and be a part of it."

Wallace, a native of St. Louis, has 905 starts in NASCAR's top three series and holds the all-time record for the most starts in the XFINITY Series, showing his longevity in the sport. He retired from a 25-year NASCAR driving career in 2015 after scoring nine wins in 547 XFINITY Series starts, one of which came at Bristol Motor Speedway (TN) - which Riverside's 1/3-mile oval is modeled after. Wallace is still involved with NASCAR as an analyst with FOX Sports Racing and still drives race cars, mostly dirt, at short tracks throughout America.

"It is true I race dirt a lot but asphalt racing has been my whole life," said Wallace in a phone interview. "I still run a handful of them every year and I take a lot of pride in that."

He's especially excited about the IWK 250 being one of the asphalt races he's hand-selected for this year. It was last year's guest celebrity driver, NASCAR legend Mark Martin, who sold him on being a part of the IWK 250.

As part of his visit to Nova Scotia, Wallace will make an appearance at the IWK Health Centre in Halifax where he will visit with patients and their families.

"I've heard so much about the IWK," he said. "I have three daughters, two grandbabies and two more on the way. I am very passionate about children so I'm really looking forward to the hospital visit."

This will be Wallace's first visit to Nova Scotia; he's looking forward to it - and he feels an affinity for Canada.

"As much as I love racing, I love to travel," he said. "I was lucky enough to race in other parts of Canada when I was younger. My mother's family was from Canada so we heard lots about it growing up - I feel a connection to Canada. I've never been to Nova Scotia and am excited to see it."

Wallace is the son of a well-known Midwest racer, the late Russ Wallace, and brother of fellow NASCAR racers Rusty Wallace and Mike Wallace. Kenny Wallace started his racing career as a fabricator for Rusty before moving into the driver's seat himself. He won the first race he ever entered, in 1982, in a street stock. In 1986 he raced with the American Speed Association (ASA) winning rookie of the year honours. In 1988 he got his break in NASCAR driving for Dale Earnhardt (Sr.) in the XFINITY Series at Martinsville Speedway (VA) where he finished seventh.

With his win in 2008, Regan Smith is the only guest driver to take the checkers at the IWK 250. Other NASCAR racers that have challenged the region's best in the event include Aric Almirola, Marcos Ambrose, Matt Crafton, Ricky Craven, Brad Keselowski, Joey Logano, Mark Martin, and David Reutimann.

The IWK 250 is a championship points race with the Parts for Trucks Pro Stock Tour (PST), round six of 12 for the 2018 campaign. Truro's Dylan Blenkhorn is the defending champion of the IWK 250.

Since its inception in 2007, the IWK 250 has helped raise awareness and more than \$500,000 for the IWK.

The IWK 250 presented by Steve Lewis is one on Canada's biggest stock car races and the culmination of a four-day weekend that sees the population of James River grow drastically with the influx of close to 1,000 RV's on-site at Riverside. The weekend kicks off Wednesday (July 11) with practice for support classes, on Thursday (July 12) it's pro stock practice and the IWK 250 Tailgate Party, Friday (July 13) will see racing action with the Napa Sportsman Series and Maritime League of Legends, and Saturday (July 14) is the IWK 250.


