

Exercise Can Kill You

The Earl of Darby once remarked that from mild forms of rhabdomyolysis "Those who don't take time for wellness, will eventually have to make time for sickness." Like many doctors, I too have advised patients and readers to exercise as part of a healthy lifestyle. Now, Dr. Maureen Brogan, Associate Professor of Medicine at New York Medical College. reports that intense, repetitive, motion exercise can cause rhabdomyolysis. And in rare cases it can kill.

Brogan explains that when muscle is damaged, it dumps myoglobin, an iron and oxygen-binding muscle protein, into blood circulation. Excessive amounts of myoglobin can obstruct the kidney's filtration system and cause serious damage.

I have mentioned in previous columns that, in rare cases, prolonged use of high doses of cholesterol-lowering drugs can cause rhabdomyolysis. I have also stressed that excessive exercise has been associated with fibrosis of cardiac muscle. But I was never aware it could cause rhabdomyolysis.

According to Dr. Brogan, over-exercising triggers the problem. This can occur when you push yourself too far in cycling, running, or lifting weights.

For instance, Brogancites the case of professional snowboarder, Amy Purdy, who in 2016 was hospitalized after participating in a CrossFit class for the first time. So why was hospitalization needed when she was well-conditioned?

The problem was she had not done pullups for several months. So thehigh intensity pullups during class caused her medical Waterloo.

She remarked, "It wasn't until 72 hours later that my arms would not straighten out all the way. I also had swelling of my elbows on both arms. Tests showed I had rhabdomyolysis. It shows if you push your body to failure, and keep going, you're at risk. Listen to your body as it knows best."

possible Other symptoms of rhabdomyolysis are nausea, vomiting, fever, intense shivering, confusion and fainting. And urine can be scant and dark.

When I read this report I thought about friends who routinely run several miles every week. And others who participate in long distance cycling races. Some who exercise regularly are quite surprised when told of this diagnosis. So I wondered if any might be suffering

without realizing it.

We also know this condition can result from accidents that injure muscles, prolonged immobilization, drug side effects and genetic disorders.

Brogan claims that high intensity cycling has produced dozens of cases ofrhabdomyolysis, particularly among "newbies", just beginning the sport, and pushing their bodies beyond capacity. One New York City hospital reports 29 cases of rhabdomyolysis during a four year period.

She adds that no one is immune to rhabdomyolysis, as there is a fine line between exercising to capacity and overexerting yourself.

So what's the message? Like many medical problems, prevention is better than cure, particularly when there's a small chance of dying. Cycling seems to be one of the major hazards. Brogan says that when she started to research this matter, 42 of the 46 cases of rhabdomyolysis involved patients attending cycling classes for the first time.

These patients are at big risk as they are often not conditioned and using untested muscles at an intense rate. But if you're a runner and decide it's time to switch to cycling, remember, you will be using a different set of muscles for the first time, which could result in rhabdomyolysis unless you gradually increase the intensity overtime.

Insufficient physical training, along with severe dehydration and/or extreme body temperatures, also increase the risk of rhabdomyolysis regardless of the type of exercise.

Always start slow. Take frequent breaks, keep well hydrated, and listen hard to what your body is telling you, as no one is immune to rhabdomyolysis. Brogan reports that 7 to 8 out of 100,000 military recruits are affected every year. Even professional athletes suffer its consequences. The mortality rate is five percent, but can be higher if kidney function fails.

Of course it's not the intention of this column to worry people about exercising, have them become couch potatoes, nor to make time for illness. Rather, the best advice is to keep moving, but stress that moderation in most aspects of life usually wins the day.

The Magic of Roots and Tubers

You don't have to be a magician for a kid in your life to think you are. Just dig up a potato and watch their eyes widen in wonder.

Mark Cullen is an of Irish descent who ended up in Canada in the 1840's as a result of the Irish Potato Famine.

We love potatoes.

As with all things in the garden, growing potatoes starts with the proper soil preparation. They need about 50 cm (a foot and a half) of well-drained, loose soil that is rich in nutrients. Amend clay soil with compost and sharp builder's sand. Add compost to very sandy, nonfertile soils.

Start potatoes from seed-tubers, or "seed potatoes", purchased from a garden centre or hardware store. Seed potatoes differ from the potatoes in your frig as they are bred for growing, not eating. They are virus indexed and specially grown and stored to prepare



Witnessing a familiar vegetable reveal them for planting in your garden. itself from under the soil is one of the earliest memories many of us have in the garden, because it makes such an impression. When we grow up we forget this magic. The experience of buying potatoes at the grocery store soon conditions us to think of them as nothing more than a cheap staple for the dinner table, harvested in paper bags. We forget the thrill of digging our own. Adulthood can be too practical that way

That's why it is important to try a new twist on your favourite vegetables. Not only does growing your own root crops yield fresher, healthier and more environmentally responsible produce, there is more variety available at your local garden retailer than in any grocer.

Here is what and how to grow to put the root vegetable and tuber magic back into your soil, and onto your plate: A Family Favourite, Potatoes

During the 1840's, roughly two-fifths of Ireland's population was solely reliant on potatoes as a primary source of nutrients. When a potato blight swept across Europe wiping out crops, the resulting starvation, disease and emigration became known as "The Great Famine", or often, "The Irish Potato Famine". As Cullens, we count ourselves among the many Canadians Chitting

If you leave potatoes in a warm room for a few weeks they begin to "chit". The knobby bits that grow from a potato produce creamy white sprouts that grow a centimeter or two, these are chits. This time of year, most potatoes purchased from a retailer have begun to chit. Cut the pieces so each has one or two sprouts per piece for large potatoes or slice the potato with more sprouts per piece for a higher quantity of smaller potatoes.

Plant potatoes as early as two weeks before the last frost date. Place the segments in a furrow about 25 to 30 cm deep. Choose the spacing based on the size of potatoes you are looking to harvest at the end of the season. To produce larger potatoes, plant 25 to 35 cm apart; for smaller potatoes space 15 to 20 cm apart.

They will begin to sprout through the surface of the soil within two weeks of planting in warm weather. As they are growing, hill up soil around the stem to keep the soil from drying out quickly. This is an excellent time of year to grow all root crops. Consider sowing carrots, beets, onions and parsnips from seed. Planting potatoes with kids is a great idea: they grow quickly, have attractive flowers by early summer and harvesting is a treasure hunt. Pure magic.



"Ask Your MLA" -

Who would like to sell a carbon tax to everyday New Brunswickers? Who would even care to try?

Who would like to tell a rural citizen that they need to pay 10 or 15 cents more per litre for fuel to travel because Justin Trudeau has decreed that it must be so?

Who would like to explain to a room full of residents who complained about huge NB power bills this winter that they must pay even more because paying more for electricity will stop further global damage from climate change?

Who would care to inform a family struggling to put wholesome food on the table that the cost to do so must increase 15 or 20 percent because a group of economists said in 2017 that \$4 trillion per year of carbon tax is needed to save us from global warming?

Not me, because I don't believe it!

I do believe the climate is changing and I do believe we are responsible for the pollution of our air, water and land. But I do not believe in taking more money away from people who are already taxed out.

I do not believe that giving more tax revenue to any government is what's needed to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions. We give the government plenty of money to look after roads, schools, health care and social programs and how have they been doing? Why should we expect a different result if we give money to government to reduce greenhouse gas emissions? The notion does not pass any measure of logic. prize winners, and has raised monies to resulted in fatalities along with a to be used to purchase life saving equipment for Salisbury Fire Rescue. The initial investment to purchase the lottery equipment was \$20,000...but after a couple years the equipment is paid off and now the profits are being applied to purchasing additional lifesaving equipment.

Recently the Salisbury Volunteer Firefighters Association purchased a \$14,000 piece of equipment known as a Hurst Edraulic Ram, used in conjunction with the Jaws of Life to extricate victims from vehicle accidents; with proceeds from the 50/50 Draw. The Salisbury Volunteer Firefighters Association continues to raise funds with the 50/50 Draw, to be put toward supporting the cost of a new \$460,000 fire truck, that is currently on order and expected to be delivered in September.

It might be easy to say "just let the taxpayer pay"; the volunteer firefighters dedicate thousands of hours to their community as a way of giving back....and the fund raisers are just another way of giving back.

Salisbury Firefighters have responded to more than their share of serious emergencies; in the past 4 months alone two of the house fires they responded

fatal motor vehicle accident. In 2017 Salisbury firefighters responded to 182 emergency calls including 8 structure fires, 60 motor vehicle accidents, along with a variety of other emergency calls. This was an increase by 26% from 2016. This represents over 5000 man hours of volunteer service and training by the 25 firefighters at Salisbury Fire & Rescue.
