



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The Elgin Women's Institute is pleased to be partnering with and hosting the ELGIN EATS program in our community. The project coordinator, Samantha Christensen, has written a detailed description of the project. Please take note and consider participating.

"Elgin Eats is a government funded, community outreach project that is working in partnership with the Elgin Eco Association, the Elgin Seniors Club and the Elgin Women's Institute. The mission of this project is to socialize the community members of Elgin in an intergenerational setting, all the while, increasing food skills and knowledge through sharing of traditions and recipes. The heritage enrichment and focus on from scratch cooking will be an asset to individuals both young and old. This will be achieved through weekly community cooking sessions. These gatherings are overseen by the program facilitator and coordinator, Samantha Christensen.

Initially the times and themes for the sessions will primarily cater to the seniors in the community, with an emphasis on whole foods, one pot meals, cooking for 1-2 and diet restricting factors such as diabetes. Though as the summer and program evolves, more and more mixed gatherings will be created, in hopes to pass on community history to younger residents. Included will be a disco soup and cookie exchange. On this note, it is also important to stress that these sessions are not to be confused with formal classes. Samantha Christensen will lead the direction of the group, but it is a sociable, learning and sharing experience for all involved. Therefore, further connecting and strengthening the community.

Each series of cooking sessions will feature an "All About ____ " gathering, were the focus of the day will specifically be spent on one type of produce that is in season locally. Sharing of one's favourite recipes will be strongly encouraged. Self sufficiency and preservation skill sets like canning, lacto-fermentation and maintaining a sourdough starter, will be included in the late summer and early fall series of sessions, in order to take advantage of the bountiful harvests available and in hopes to avoid canning on very hot days. Suggestions for future themes and subjects are always welcome, and discussions at each gathering will help shape the program into one that is truly tailored to its community members."

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<u>The Doctor Game</u> <u>W. Gifford-Jones M.D.</u>

Marijuana for Gifford-Jones

Why would I, at my age, want to start smoking pot, when I'd much prefer a glass of chardonnay? It's because I've suffered annoying neck pain for years due to an old injury which happened in Japan. Besides, my experience with the plant may help others who suffer from chronic pain day after day, and find no relief from other painkillers.

My interest in marijuana dates back many years. At that time several readers asked for my support to obtain medical marijuana. Some patients had found that marijuana decreased nausea while undergoing chemotherapy. Others with spinal cord injuries, accompanied by painful muscle spasm, also reported relief. But many could not find a doctor to prescribe marijuana. So I argued in my column, without success, that the government should make medical marijuana available for patients.

Now, Dr. Margaret Gedde, a Stanford University trained pathologist, relates how she became disenchanted with conventional medicine. She reports that when medical marijuana was legalized in Colorado, a sizeable influx of patients moved to the state, even though many had never previously used it! She added that data suggests the increased use of medical marijuana resulted in fewer people dying from opioid overdoses.

What shocked Gedde the most was her discovery that this natural remedy helped so many patients. She knew that patients who continue on painkillers too long suffer increasing risk of complications. But, according to Dr. Gedde, patients can stay on marijuana for months or years without adverse effects.

Why is this the case? In 1992 the Journal of Science reported that in all tissues of the body there are receptors to marijuana. This means that, unlike prescription drugs, our bodies are prepared to make good use of this ancient plant.

There are two kinds of marijuana. The THC type creates a "high". The other, CBD, is associated with pain control. Gedde, and other experts, refer to the "sweet spot" when discussing the effects of marijuana. Namely, that in some cases, a combination of the two provides the best relief of pain.

So it becomes a matter of finding the right dose and combination of strains of marijuana that are most effective

Why would I, at my age, want to start for the individual. In other words, the shoe does not fit all feet. Or, as it's been aptly said, "different strokes for different folks."

My research shows that the medical use of marijuana has been underestimated, underused and grossly misunderstood by the majority of North Americans, including doctors who remain resistant to natural remedies. And one has to ask why it has been so vilified.

Some reports say that smoking pot was looked on as an act of disobedience during the Vietnam War. That it was heavily targeted by the U.S. government to get rid of hippies who were looking for a "high". Some even suggest that it provided a reason to put questionable elements of society in jail.

So, am I going to be smoking pot while writing this column? Hell will freeze over before that happens. Inhaling smoke in any form is an unhealthy habit. In fact, those still smoking tobacco should see a psychiatrist. But I could easily accept marijuana in my smoothies, if it relieves pain.

Luckily, there are more ways to get the benefit of medical marijuana than smoking it. For instance, marijuana oil can be rubbed on the skin. And there's an oral oil preparation as well.

I have recently completed my personal medical documentation for the application of legal, medical marijuana. As you might suspect, I can hardly wait to see if it has any effect on my neck pain.

But I admit to being highly skeptical that it will ease pressure on a nerve. After all, I've tried acupuncture, manipulation by chiropractors. I've had repeated red and infra-red therapy and massage without relief. In fact, I've joked that the only cure for me would be the guillotine!

But I keep an open mind for new ideas. One thing is certain. Regardless of what happens, you will be the first to know the result.

Next week, what shocked me at my first visit to a medic to obtain medical marijuana. It proves once again that commonsense is an uncommon commodity, even in 2018.

4th Annual AGM a Success



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Let's Eat Out at the Cedar Café

Have you ever travelled somewhere and the scenery just made you go WOW? Well, that happened when I took Route 890 from Petitcodiac to Cornhill. I marvelled at the beauty of the valley and how everything was greening up. The hymn writer, John W. Peterson, wrote the words and music to "He owns the cattle on a thousand hills" in the 1950's and I think he was inspired by travelling through this area! We passed a farm on our way and saw the name "Jimmy Flynn" on the sign—a celebrity in the area!

When you get to the Corn Hill Nursery, the first building you come to is the Cedar Café. It opened April 28 for the season. "The two foodies" wrote their article about this Café in the October 2017 edition of the Times and Transcript Moncton. When Bob and Kathy Osborne, the owners of the Cedar Café, put their dream on



ground, it began with a 10 x 12 hut with a cash box. Then, with some inspiration from European architecture, they built the present building which is 24 x 36, has two floors and a basement, and opened in 2000. There is an outdoor patio for dining, but check out the inside and upstairs, too. The railing is made from the curly pear tree and is quite beautiful. 

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Buy By the Rules

It is finally time to get planting. But before you plant, you shop. With garden retailers preparing for the predictable spring surge in business, shoppers need to prepare themselves for the best shopping experience ever. Here are our tips for getting the very best plant value while shopping this spring:

1. Perfect is imperfect. All of us do it: we automatically reach for the perfect flowering plant. A hydrangea in full bloom, a pot of pansies brimming with colour. Fact is, a plant brimming with colour is soon in decline. This is true of plants that bloom at their very best once a year, like a hydrangea, but not so much a season-long performer like a geranium. Choose plants that are in flower bud, not flower, and enjoy a longer bloom cycle.

2. Avoid root-bound plants. Often plants have been grown past their peak. The easiest way to determine the quality of the plant you are buying is to pull it gently from the pot. Retailers won't mind that you do this, if you are careful not to spill soil everywhere. The pot should be 50 to 70% roots, the balance a quality potting mix. If the roots twirl around the inside of the pot, they are likely to sit in your garden in shock. Pull tightly wound roots apart before you plant or avoid root bound plants in the first place.

3. Autumn stock is a good bet. Some retailers store their left-over stock from last fall and bring it out for sale early in the spring. This stock may perform very well in your garden as the plants are generally more established and 'hardened off', therefore more tolerant of frost than new stock fresh from the greenhouse.

4. Imperfect may be temporary. Experienced gardeners know that some of the best plant deals are at the back of the store, where less than perfect specimens are often offered at discount prices. Like a broken branch or a scar in the bark that can be overcome with time or pruning. In a few years a tree or shrub that is imperfect at time of purchase can look great. Patience and pruning can pay off.

5. Seeds save money. Many plant shoppers forget to go inside the store to peruse the seed racks. Truth is, many herbs, annuals, vegetables and perennials grow easily from seed and they always cost much less than plants. You will have to wait a few weeks for seeds to germinate and grow, but often they catch up to their potted brethren in time.

6. Divide and save. Some of the best plant deals this time of year are not at retailers but local horticultural society or Master Gardener meetings, even some garage sales. The divisions from someone else's hosta or daylily can take root and perform very well in your garden this season and save you a lot of money.

For that matter, if you have perennials of your own in your garden that are several years old, chances are many of them can be dug up, divided with a sharp spade or knife and planted around your garden. For free.

And it is hard to beat free.

There goes a story of a man who was very lazy! How lazy was he, you ask? He used to put pop corn in his pancakes so they would flip over by themselves !!



NEW FIRE BY-LAW

Salisbury Village Council has approved a new Fire By-Law (By-Law No. 48), which you can read in its entirety at <u>www.salisburynb.ca</u> (under the tab Inside Your Village Office (By-Laws)). The new Fire By-Law follows the direction of Provincial burning advisories/bans. The By-Law also outlines exactly what items can be burned and in what way; ie. in approved appliances only (open fires in the municipality are prohibited). Salisbury Fire Rescue reserves the right to order any fires that are not in compliance to be extinguished, and are authorized to issue tickets as they may deem necessary to enforce this By-Law.

EMERGENCY MEASURES EXERCISE

The Village Office will be closed on Wednesday, June 13 as the Municipality the participates in a province-wide Emergency Measures Organization training exercise called "Exercise Brunswick Alpha." It will be a full-response exercise to a mock disaster in order to test provincial and municipal emergency plans. The Village thanks you for your patience and understanding.

- splash pad is not supervised, and children must be supervised by parents or guardians at all times

- no glass containers on the splash pad

- no person shall pollute the splash pad, this includes allowing children to pour sand, mulch or rocks from the play ground and garden areas on the splash pad

- persons with open sores or rashes should not use the splash pad
- pets are not permitted on the splash pad

- bicycles, roller blades, skateboards, or scooters are not permitted on the splash pd, however strollers, walkers and wheelchairs are welcome

- in case of emergency always call 911

Detailed usage rules will be posted on the splash pad.

We are happy that Highland Park playground, natural playground, splash pad, wetland and walking trails are very popular all year around but especially in the summer. We hope to keep it a safe, fun, and relaxing place for everyone!


be planted this summer and we will have a tree dedication ceremony in early fall.
