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
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## Sudoku

## "But Roosevelt Knows How to be President!"

72 years ago I arrived in Boston. I'd been accepted as a student at The Harvard Medical School. That night a full moon shone on the school's white marble buildings, an awe-inspiring sight I've never forgotten.

I recently returned for a 68threunion, attended lectures, and as a former student was interviewed by a film crew. At one point the interviewer asked, "What are your thoughts in this robotic age of medicine?"

His question reminded me of a comment I'd heard years ago. A White House reporter once asked an assistant working with U.S. President Franklin D. Roosevelt, "Does the President really understand all of the economic bill he's presenting to Congress?" The aide thought for a moment and replied, "Possibly not, but Roosevelt understands how to be President." He implied that some presidents never learn this important role.

Today, in an increasing electronic world, some doctors never learn to be doctors. In the computer age it's understandable. For instance, many readers have probably encountered this situation, young doctors so weaned on computers they spend more time typing reports into a screen than talking to, examining, or looking at the patient!

This lead to another question, "What did I think medicine would be like 50 years from now?" I replied that we were already witnessing a dramatic change in how medicine is practiced. Today, the average family doctor spends barely a few minutes with each patient. This is not the doctor's fault. It's the fault of the harried system.

For example, when a vastly overweight person enters the office, doctors know a number of problems are either present or imminent. There's a good chance that type 2 diabetes will occur somewhere down the road. The doctor also knows that with Type 2 diabetes, there's a 50 percent chance of heart attack.

So how can any family doctor, in a few minutes, solve that problem? The point is he or she can't. In the future, doctors will have assistants. One that will advise what's wrong with food in the patient's pantry. Another will prescribe a shopping list for good food choices. And another will arrange an exercise program in the gym. Some corporations are already paying for this new approach as they realize it will prevent tons of medical expenses later on while treating chronic disease that never should have happened.

Since I spent my medical life in surgery, I was asked what would happen in the OR down the road. Even today some surgery is done by robotics. I have no doubt this will increase and benefit patients in many ways, by reducing time and error.

I left this Harvard trip knowing the future of medical care is in good hands, but both doctors and patients will have to adapt. Patients will have to accept that computer medicine is here to stay. Doctors will hopefully learn that patients still exist who have fears and need eye to eye contact.

Harvard is educating more students who become professors and researchers. But family physicians must still have a major role. During the filming I told the story of one such case. One morning after surgery I returned to the recovery room to check on my patient. I noticed three doctors leaning over the bedside of another patient. They were worried about the patient's breathing.

The surgeon, anesthetist, and an ear nose and throat specialist had been summoned for an opinion. All believed the patient was suffering a serious respiratory obstruction and were arranging emergency tracheotomy. The family doctor suddenly arrived.

He listened to their opinion and then listened to the patient's breathing. Stepping back from the bed, he laughed. "I've known George for 40 years" he said, "and he always breathed this way." Surgery was cancelled. In this, a computer could not compete!

A return to HMS always confirms my early decision to become a doctor. I still believe it's the noblest profession of all. And that regardless of how medicine changes it must follow the advice of one of Harvard's great teachers who remarked, "The secret of caring for the patient is caring for the patient."

We don't yet know whether the computer can learn to do that.

## Rural Rides Welcomes a New Dispatcher

Rural Rides has been providing affordable transportation in the Upper Petitcodiac River Valley since 2014. Over the years, it has become apparent that there is a need for such a service in other parts of Westmorland and Albert Counties. Despite Tele-drive offering the service in Albert County and the Volunteer Center of Southeastern NB providing a modified version of the service in Moncton, Riverview and Dieppe since 1999 there are areas in the region without the service.

In a collaborative effort of the three groups, a pilot project was launched in Tantramar in June of 2017 and it was a great success. Tantramar continues to grow and needs more volunteer drivers to support the increasing demand in that region.

The three groups: Rural Rides, Tele-drive and Volunteer Center of Southeastern NB, formed an association named WA Transpo. In July of 2018, WA Transpo will add service to the remaining uncovered areas - Shediac, Cap Pele, Grand Barachois, Shemogue, Haute Aboujagane, Cormier Village and Memramcook. In order to provide service in those areas, a fluently bilingual person is required to answer the phones so service can be provided to both Anglophone and Francophone clients. On June 4, Mary Ann Ross was welcomed to the WA Transpo team as the new dispatcher who will be booking the rides for all clients in the Westmorland and Albert Counties. Having a dispatcher handle the day to day calls will also free up the managers to work on new projects, continue to look for funding options and explore



options for enhancing the services offered.

Rural Rides continues to exist as an independent charitable organization but is part of the WA Transpo team sharing resources and a dispatcher with the other organizations. More information can be found on the the website at http://watranspo.org

#### At Gasthof Old Bavarian Restaurant

Take the Knightville Road (behind Anagance Ridge) until you come to #1130 and you have arrived at a most unique place. It is a restaurant, farm and butcher shop all run by the same family. This enterprise is owned and managed by three German girls and their mother. Claudia oversees the restaurant and she looked after us when we went for lunch on this Friday. We did not have a reservation but there was lots of room. It is advised to have a reservation for the evening sittings. They are only open Friday, Saturday and Sunday, and their hours change for summer and winter. The phone number is 433-4735. They also have a website



oldbavarian.ca. You can pay with cash or cheque only-important to know before vou go.

I had been looking forward to this visit for some time as I lived in Germany as a young girl. Food evokes memories, and I was curious what foods would make me remember my short time eating authentic fare. I remembered the names of the food but not the flavours. And oh, those flavours are delicious!

The atmosphere was very cozy with music playing softly in the background, covering the conversations of those around. The wood décor and colourful fabric and knick knacks was very peaceful and interesting. This restaurant was featured on an episode of the television show "You Gotta Eat Here".


Charley ordered the Sausage Platter and I the Bavarian Schnitzel Dinner. These came with Soup of the Day which was Potato and Leek-one of the best I have tasted. Also included was a basket filled with three kinds of homemade bread. This is what was on my plate: green cabbage coleslaw, purple cabbage coleslaw, mashed potatoes, greens salad, potato salad, tomato, cucumbers in sour cream and dill (now I don't care for dill but I ate all of it) and 4 good size pieces of pork schnitzel. Schnitzel is meat that is thinned by pounding with a meat tenderizer, breaded and fried. Charley enjoyed his meal very much, too. His plate was similar to mine except he had three homemade sausages, all different flavours and added sauerkraut. We could not manage to eat dessert but will order that first when we go again. The bill came to \$52.35 tax included. This was our most expensive meal so far, but certainly worth it.

Another place I ate out this month was Elgin Eats. Held at the Women's Institute Hall in Elgin, this is free to all. You must preregister so Samantha can have enough prepared for everyone. The first "class" I attended we learned how to cook without sugar. I say class, but it is not like school. We are all sharing ideas and participating in the cooking and tasting. Samantha told us that there is hidden sugar in a lot of our foods, even salt. What? I went home and checked the ingredients of my box of Windsor table salt, and sure enough, sugar! The next class I attended was how to cook with rhubarb which is so applicable at this season. So if you want to eat out, but your budget doesn't include it, then check out Elgin Eats. I hope to see you there when we can eat out together!

Bios for the New Brunswick Inductees of the Class of 2018 below the rest will follow in the next edition of the Local News & Views.

Gerard 'Gerry' Clow - In 1983, Gerry purchased a 1969 Mustang 428 Cobra Jet convertible Stock Eliminator and went drag racing. In 1986 he joined a group of 16 top Maritime drag racers to redevelop the Maitland NS drag strip. In May 1987 he became the first New Brunswicker to win an NHRA Division event (Old Bridge Township Raceway Park, Englishtown, New Jersey). In 1998 Gerry achieved perhaps his greatest success in drag racing; while still a participant he became a promoter of which he continued until 2010 - by then local interest had expanded from less than 12 racers to over 24. 2008 was a highlight when he partnered with sponsors at Miramichi Dragway to host the richest Stock/Super Stock race in the Maritimes, with over 20 cars registered. In 2010, he retired.

Robert 'Bob' Duncan - Bob Duncan raced in New Brunswick at Brookside Speedway, Hammond River Raceway, River Glade Speedway, Petty Raceway and Speedway 660. In 1989 he raced two full schedules, a late model with MASCAR and a sportsman at Hammond River Raceway; he won the division championship at Hammond River. In 1991 he became owner/crew chief for his sons, Dana and Chris. For a time he had three cars running at Speedway 660, for his sons and himself. As a crew chief, Bob's cars won championships in 1993 at Hammond River and in 1994 at Speedway 660. From 1998 to 2005 the Duncan family had the only two-car pro stock team in the Maritimes. Bob still helps his son Chris in his racing career at Speedway 660.

James MacKinnon - He competed from 1956 to 1969 as a motorcycle racer, road racer, drag racer and a great club supporter. He held the Maritime Road Racing Championship for three years. In 1961, riding his Norton 99, he won the Grand Prix Motorcycle Race at the Scoudouc airfield, taking home the Frank Buxton trophy and \$50.00. Besides Scoudouc, he raced at McEwen's in New Brunswick; at Atlantic Park and Maitland in Nova Scotia, and at Mosport in Ontario. \_

I believe for many New Brunswickers health care will be an issue whether it is hospital overcrowding, wait times, getting a family doctor or ambulance service.

In this segment, I would like to concentrate on the ambulance aspect of health care. Ambulance issues have been in the news pretty much continually since Brian Gallant became Premier In April of 2015. CUPE revealed that the

Gallant government directed Ambulance NB to cut one ambulance in Chipman. On September 1st, 2015, a Minto resident had to be driven to hospital by her husband as there was no ambulance available when a doctor at the Queen's North Health Centre ordered one. It didn't take long for the warnings from the community, union and Official Opposition to Brian Gallant regarding the removal of an ambulance to come true.

In August of 2017, the Mayor of Saint Quentin spoke about the death of a teenage girl and wondered if quicker ambulance response might have saved her life. The mayor said it was the third ambulance delay incident in a year. Failing to provide ambulance coverage to communities was back in the news last month when CUPE Local 4848 President Greg McConaghy told reporters that due to staffing shortages, Nackawic, Harvey and McAdam are


> On June 14th the Telegraph Journal reported the heartbreaking story of parents in their 70's trying to save the life of their 54 year old son who

> had suffered a heart attack. While they waited for an ambulance and life-saving paramedic care.. an ambulance with defibrillator sat just 3 minutes away unstaffed.

> Investigative reporter Michael Robinson had a series of reports in the Telegraph Journal regarding secrecy, staffing and lack of service. We read headlines like: 'ANB tries to block media request for information', 'The secrets you can't know about NB ambulances', 'Favourable ambulance data raises transparency concerns', 'Ambulances unstaffed 14,000 times in three years'. All very troubling. Even more troubling were the headlines - '10% off job due to stress, strain of intense job', 'Paramedics overtime hours jump 22%' and the heartbreaking - 'He always had a smile on his face, but he was crumbling inside' about the suicide of one of our paramedics.

> The health of New Brunswickers and the health of our paramedics has been put in jeopardy by the inaction of the Gallant government. I hope this fall while folks are considering who should govern New Brunswick for the next four years, they will consider Blaine Higg's commitment to ambulance coverage and to addressing the staffing shortage by 'hiring for skill, and training for language'.



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



## A New Breed of Show Garden

A new era of "garden tourism" is upon us. This is an exciting time in our history to explore recently opened, public attractions with a botanical theme.

Canada's great public gardens are diverse and offer a new emphasis on native plant species, biodiversity and sustainability. As you tour around the country this summer, here are some of the newer horticultural attractions that are worth checking out:

-Whistling Gardens bills itself as "Canada's Newest Botanical Garden" and has the claim to fame "North America's Largest Peony Collection", with just over 1,000 varieties in addition to a rock/alpine garden, a marsh garden and an aviary or "bee colony" (among other attractions). Located just outside Brantford, Ontario. (http://www. whistlinggardens.ca/)

-Quinte Botanical Gardens might challenge Whistling Garden's claim as the newest public garden, having opened only last year. It features a Bee, Bird and Butterfly Garden in addition to "the world's largest colour wheel garden". Located just north of Trenton in Frankford, Ontario. (http://www. qbgardens.ca/index.html)

-Harriet Irving Botanical Gardens opened at Acadia University in Wolfville, Nova Scotia in 2002 after nearly three years of construction. There are 6 acres divided into 9 habitats specific to the Acadian Forest Region, as well as the Walled Garden, Experimental Garden, Medicinal and Food Garden and the Conservatory.
