## Improving Seniors' Quality of Life

The Honourable Filomena Tassi, Minister of Seniors visited Fundy Royal alongside MP Alaina Lockhart August 16, 2018 Salisbury, New Brunswick

On August 16th the Honourable Filomena Tassi, Minister of Seniors and Alaina Lockhart, Member of Parliament for Fundy Royal spent the day with seniors in the Village of Salisbury MP Lockhart welcomed the opportunity to introduce Canada's new Minister of Seniors to several initiatives undertaken in Salisbury to improve the quality of life for local seniors. Minister Tassi and MP Lockhart did a Rural Rides "ride-along" which included a stop at Highland Park to view the Government of Canada funded upgrades. The ride concluded at Legion #31, where Minister Tassi and MP Lockhart attended the Senior Day festivities during Salisbury's Community Days.

This was a wonderful way for Minister Tassi and MP Lockhart to talk with the seniors in attendance on matters most important to them and their community.

Communities, like Salisbury, are making a difference in the lives of seniors. Today's tour highlighted the meaningful action our government and our communities have taken to support seniors, here in Fundy Royal. After a lifetime of hard work, seniors deserve to enjoy a secure and dignified retirement.

## Let's talk TURKEY!

But, before we can talk turkey, we have to talk chicken.

In the early years of the Elgin Agricultural Fair, fundraisers such as suppers were held to offset the cost of serving such a very popular event where farmers from the area displayed their prize animals and produce. The fair was held in and around The Hall. In those days (1920's), the suppers were held upstairs and water had to be carried upstairs in barrels. Farmers donated chickens as well as other produce for the supper which cost only 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children.

Today, the tradition continues but in a much different way. The Elgin WI Turkey Supper has been an important fundraiser, not only for upkeep of The Hall, but also to enable the WI to support the Royal Canadian Legion, St. John Council for NB Inc., Sussex Health Foundation, Petitcodiac Air Cadets, WI Home Co. Ltd., Victoria's Quilts, Elgin Fire Rescue, and local high school graduates.

We have taken special care to ensure that the supper is not only traditional and delicious but also safely prepared. (Several in our group have taken a food safety course.)

This year the supper will be held at The Hall on September 29 at a cost of \$12 for adults (\$8 for children under 12). Tickets go on sale and the supper starts at 3 pm.

The home style supper consists of roast turkey, traditional potato-bread stuffing, mashed potatoes, peas, carrots and turkey gravy. On the table you will find coleslaw, cranberries, pickles, and rolls. Your server will bring you tea or coffee and your choice from a long list of desserts.

Please plan to attend. Your support is so helpful to continue with our work. Perhaps, if you would like to help for a couple of hours on the day of the supper, either as a server or on the kitchen assembly line, please give us a call at 756-2531. See you there!

## Rural Prosperity is Possible for Albert County



Although born into a Dutch sea-faring family, I've been a farmer all my life. When we came to Canada in 1981, we had little more than a dream, a vision and a goal. We saw potential in a rundown, neglected farm in Elgin. Through hard work and attention to the needs of the land—and with strong community support—we restored it to a thriving dairy farm. Watching our forests become clear cuts and our lumber profiting off-shore tax havens while people in my community struggled to earn a decent living compelled me to run for political office. To continue destroying our natural environment serves no one. Neither does repeating the same mistakes over and over, hoping for a different outcome.

There are lessons here for our province. As I travel Albert Riding talking with residents, many say they feel helpless to create the change they want to see. But we are the government; we can take charge of our destiny. By working together and reclaiming our right to local decision-making, we can build rural economies based on our strengths; we can manage our assets to meet community needs. A new forest management plan would

enable woodlot owners to earn a living and allow communities to benefit from Crown resources, thus creating meaningful work. How long would our fishery remain sustainable if it was managed by a corporation instead of local fishermen?

Supporting local business keeps wealth circulating here instead of disappearing elsewhere. Local decision-making would give us greater control over infrastructure maintenance, healthcare and educational resources.

Because farming, fishing and forestry are inherent to Albert Riding, our programs should support our farmers and food suppliers. Tourism offers endless opportunities with a continually-evolving, expanding market. But tourism, too, depends upon the health of our environment. No one visits an industrial zone.

These principles are at the heart of Green Party policy. We believe governments should be collaborators and supporters of sustainable, community-led goals and initiatives, not top-down dictators.

A community thrives when residents are able to meet their own needs and realize their full potential in a sustainable manner. It takes good governance—representing the people, not corporate interests—to realize this goal. We need old wisdom, forward vision and ethical leadership to make this happen. It's time for change.

## Children and Grandchildren - Headed for Liver Transplants

Who hasn't heard of the "Mayflower", the ship that brought pilgrims to the U.S. in 1620? What is rarely known is that towards the end of that voyage, it was necessary to ration beer, and some pilgrims died as a result. In those days beer was safer to drink than water. It's still a safe drink when used moderately, but excessive amounts can cause cirrhosis of the liver. And how many know that too much food can also cause nonalcoholic fatty liver disease (NAFLD) in young people, and eventually require a liver transplant?

Today, the worldwide epidemic of Type 2 diabetes is well known. But liver disease rarely gets headlines. Yet, according to the American Liver Foundation, and some experts, 10 percent of all children, particularly those with belly fat, and half of those who are obese, suffer from NAFLD.

This should not come as a surprise to anyone who isn't blind. Walk around any super market and witness obesity in adults. Then see how often their children are obese. The end result is that children are now developing adult diseases because of too many calories.

The Gifford-Jones Law states that one medical problem often leads to another and another. In this situation, as fat builds up in the liver it becomes inflamed. Scarring occurs just as it does in alcoholic cirrhosis, and this may lead to either liver failure or malignancy. It's ironic that excessive amounts of food can cause the same microscopic findings in the liver as alcohol. In fact, pathologists say that these changes are indistinguishable.

It's also tragic that experts predict it will not be too long before NAFLD will be the top cause of liver transplants. The next problem is there are not enough livers to supply the need. Moreover, we have already reached the point where our health care system is crying for more money.

The good news is that if NAFLD is suspected before inflammation and scarring occurs, it can be reversed by weight loss.

But here's the bad news. Doctors dealing with this problem say that children with NAFLD often return to the clinic heavier. And that only one in four loses a significant amount of weight. Moreover, the majority of children and adults with NAFLD go undiagnosed for years as it's a slow silent killer. The only definitive diagnosis is by liver biopsy. A blood test of liver enzymes can identify those developing this condition.

So we have to get over the idea that only alcohol causes liver damage. In fact, in the past, adult patients were thought to be lying when they denied consuming alcohol.

Is there a possibility that North Americans will get smart, and finally

realize what the number one killer is? I doubt it, as history shows the number of obese North Americans continues to increase year after year.

It's often said that heart attack tops the list as the most frequent cause of death. But I've claimed for years it's really obesity, as it leads to so many medical complications that shorten lives.

The secret for longevity remains the same. Following a healthy lifestyle early in life and sticking with it. Too many attempt it unsuccessfully at the end of life.

Add it all up, and it's moderation throughout life that wins the day. Just consider alcohol. At least 20 studies show that moderate drinkers live longer than either teetotalers or alcoholics. Alcohol lowers blood cholesterol and decreases the risk of a fatal blood clot.

So beer in moderation never killed anyone on the Mayflower, or anywhere else. In fact, beer contains no cholesterol, fat, triglycerides, sugar, and is low in sodium. It also contains vitamins, calcium for bones, potassium to lower blood pressure and magnesium to regulate the heart's rhythm.

The government doesn't prevent the sale of cars because some idiots drive too fast. Yet ironically, and possibly criminally, it prohibits beer and liquor companies from stating that moderate drinking is a healthy habit.

My advice. Buy a bathroom scale and step on it every day. This will help to keep you a moderate consumer of food, alcohol, and exercise. But, if the scale continues to show increasing weight?

WA Transpo



On July 18th WA Transpo launched in Westmorland and Albert Counties providing affordable transportation to all its residents. WA Transpo is a collective effort of existing volunteer driving programs (Rural Rides, Rural Rides Tantramar, Volunteer Center of Southeastern New Brunswick Driving Program and Tele-drive Albert County) pooling their resources to provide service to the whole area instead of just the regions previously served. By combining resources, the existing groups obtained a single dispatcher to book rides for all regions. Doing so, has freed up the manager's time to focus on the expansion of services.

WA Transpo always welcomes new clients. Once registered they can call the dispatcher 48 hours in advance at 962-3073 to book a ride. Once the dispatcher has matched the client with a volunteer driver, the driver will pick up the client at the designated time, take them to their appointment, wait for them, and then take them home. Drivers do not handle money, clients are billed directly at the end of each month. The rates for transportation are the same as they were before the partnership was launched and are \$0.70 cents per km while the subsidized rate is \$0.25 cents per km for low income individuals. Nearly all our clients fall into this subsidized rate range. Volunteer drivers are always needed! To become a volunteer there are a few minor requirements. All drivers must have \$2 Million liability insurance on their vehicle, have a clear criminal record check, sign and oath of confidentiality, and have a safe, well maintained vehicle. WA Transpo is more than happy to reimburse our driver's up to \$80 a year for the extra cost of insurance to increase liability from \$1 million to \$2 million. Drivers are reimbursed \$0.35 cents per km to offset the expense of using their own vehicle. If you would like to volunteer as a driver, please call Kelly at 215-2100

Although Rural Rides is now a partner in a larger group, WA Transpo, Rural Rides' service has not changed. We are still dedicated to providing reliable, safe, and affordable transportation to those in need. Rural Rides is happy to be a part of WA Transpo and we hope that this expansion will continue to be a great success. Thank you to our clients and our volunteer drivers for your patience during this transition and we extend a warm welcome to those joining us both in the Salisbury/Petitcodiac region as well as the remainder of Westmorland and Albert Counties.

### Remembering The Petitcodiac-Elgin-Havelock Rail line

These sections of railroad were nicknamed "The Prong".

In 1874 the Petitcodiac-Elgin Railway Co. was incorporated and they began laying tracks 14 miles from Petitcodiac to Elgin, a thriving community supported by farming and lumbering. The line was completed and opened in 1876 with a celebration that included a free ride for Elgin residents on flat cars equipped with seats.

In 1882 the railway expanded to become the Elgin, Petitcodiac and Havelock Railway. Construction of the 12 mile line to Havelock was begun and completed in 1885. On September 7 a picnic was held at Killam's Mills to celebrate the event.

Arthur H. Robinson, a native of Elgin, took the first train into Havelock. The engineer was LeBaron Dimock, of St. Martins.

The train left Havelock every day at 8:30am and returned at 4:30pm, barring any accidents. There were accidents

almost every day, because the railway had little money to maintain the line properly. The engine would ride off the rails and into the mud, however it never tipped over, the train crew would spend a couple of hours to get it back on the rails.

In 1860 the Intercolonial Railway from Saint John to Moncton and beyond was completed, and one of the most prosperous points on that line was Petitcodiac, where a lot of lumbering activity converged.

In the early 1870s Petitcodiac was considered the banner shipping station on the line; its shipments were more than double those of Moncton, Sussex or Hampton.

In 1955 it was decided it was too expensive to maintain the tracks to Elgin so they were taken out. However the line to Havelock was left for awhile longer as it was supported by the cement plant and the lime works.

## Four Fun Facts about Hot Air Balloons

Up, up and away! Have you ever wondered what it would be like to fly in a hot air balloon, soaring among the clouds? Hot air balloons have been around since 1783, making them the oldest form of human flight — and probably one of the most beautiful to watch, too.

**Fact: The first hot air balloon was invented by the Montgolfier brothers in 1783.**

The Montgolfier brothers, Joseph-Michel and Jacques-Etienne, came from a family of paper manufacturers in France. Joseph, who liked to invent things, was watching a fire one evening and noticed the embers rising up into the air. He thought that there must be a special gas within the smoke of the fire that was doing this lifting (he called it Montgolfier Gas after himself) and started to experiment with how to reproduce it. After many attempts, the brothers landed upon a globe-shaped balloon of sackcloth with thin layers of paper inside, held together by buttons and cord and powered by heat. The first hot air balloon was born.

**Fact: The first hot air balloon passengers were not people, but animals.**

After several modifications to their initial hot air balloon design, the Montgolfier brothers decided to test out a new adaptation using passengers. The first passengers to take a ride in a hot air balloon were a sheep named Montauciel ("climb to the sky"), a duck and a rooster. The flight lasted about eight minutes and the balloon rose about 460 metres. All the animals came back safely, with some excellent stories to tell about their trip. Baa! Quack! Cock-a-doodle-doo!

**Fact: Unlike other modes of transportation, you can't steer a hot air balloon.**

There are 3 main parts to a hot air balloon: the 'burner' creates heat that rises; the hot air fills the 'envelope' (that's the balloon part); when it's full, it lifts the 'basket,' which rises off the ground. But there's no steering wheel! The pilots are at the mercy of the wind direction. Because wind speed is different depending on how high up in the air you are, the pilots listen carefully to the weather report, and turn the burner on and off to keep the balloons hovering at the right speed.

**Fact: 700 balloons take flight at the largest annual hot air balloon festival in the world (Albuquerque, New Mexico)**

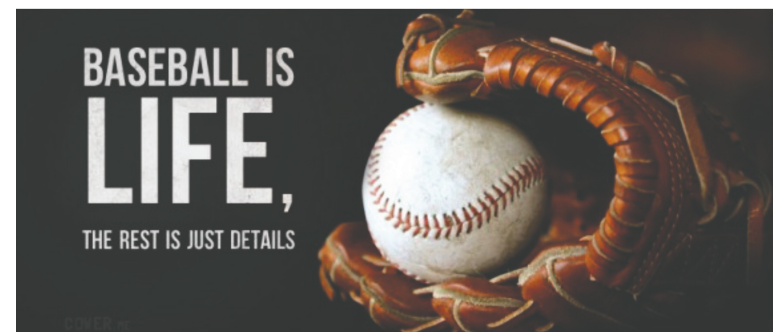
Scott is a passionate about owls, especially the Barred Owl. Owls are generally nocturnal and many of us never have an opportunity to see them. In NB we have 6 regular species of owl and a couple more infrequent visitors. They are an important part of the natural balance of our environment. On his own time, Scott builds and erects nest boxes for owls throughout many area of the Province. This requires a great deal of effort and knowhow. Scott will be providing the Naturalist Club with one of his nest boxes and the specifics on where and how to erect them.

The Barred Owl is the only owl with brown eyes. It is a cavity nester in old growth deciduous and mixed forests. There habitat is threatened due to the destruction of suitable sized deciduous trees. Our NB forests are being clear cut and replaced by coniferous plantations rather than the Acadian Forest of mixed coniferous and deciduous trees.

This summer the Liberals with great media fanfare have announced a long list of new Nursing Homes and plans to renovate many others. Three weeks ago, however they publicly acknowledged that they do not have the money budgeted to cover the cost of the majority of this promised work. Petitcodiac has for several years recognized the need for a new Health Centre, they have consulted extensively and done the homework necessary to prepare a strong evidence-based service-oriented proposal for a Centre to best meet the health needs. The people of Petittcodiac and its surrounding communities need this Centre, their lives and livelihoods depend on it.

It is time to stop the political games. We can no longer afford empty promises and backroom political deals. Political leaders need the courage and fortitude to tell the truth, to be transparent, to collaborate and to champion a future based on innovation, fairness and the strength of communities, both urban and rural. 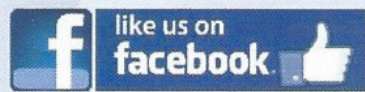
