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
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The Honourable Filomena Tassi, Minister of Seniors visited Fundy Royal alongside MP Alaina Lockhart August 16, 2018 Salisbury, New Brunswick

On August 16th the Honourable Filomena Tassi, Minister of Seniors and Alaina Lockhart, Member of Parliament for Fundy Royal spent the day with seniors in the Village of Salisbury MP Lockhart welcomed the opportunity to introduce Canada's new Minister of Seniors to several initiatives undertaken in Salisbury to improve the quality of life for local seniors. In addition, the two listened to the concerns and priorities of local seniors.

This was a wonderful way for Minister Tassi and MP Lockhart to talk with the seniors in attendance on matters most important to them and their community.

Communities, like Salisbury, are making a difference in the lives of seniors. Today's tour highlighted the meaningful action our government and our communities have taken to support seniors, here in Fundy Royal. After a lifetime of hard work, seniors deserve to enjoy a secure and dignified retirement.





Let's talk TURKEY!

But, before we can talk turkey, we have to talk chicken.

In the early years of the Elgin Agricultural Fair, fundraisers such as suppers were held to offset the cost of serving such a very popular event where farmers from the area displayed their prize animals and produce. The fair was held in and around The Hall. In those days (1920's), the suppers were held upstairs and water had to be carried upstairs in barrels. Farmers donated chickens as well as other produce for the supper which cost only 25 cents for adults and 10 cents for children.

Today, the tradition continues but in a much different way. The Elgin WI Turkey Supper has been an important fundraiser, not only for upkeep of The Hall, but also to enable the WI to support the Royal Canadian Legion, St. John Council for NB Inc., Sussex Health Foundation, Petitcodiac Air Cadets, WI Home Co. Ltd., Victoria's Quilts, Elgin Fire Rescue, and local high school graduates.

We have taken special care to ensure that the supper is not only traditional and delicious but also safely prepared. (Several in our group have taken a food safety course.)

This year the supper will be held at The Hall on September 29 at a cost of \$12 for adults (\$8 for children under 12). Tickets go on sale and the supper starts at 3 pm.

The home style supper consists of roast turkey, traditional potato-bread stuffing, mashed potatoes, peas, carrots and turkey gravy. On the table you will find coleslaw, cranberries, pickles, and rolls. Your server will bring you tea or coffee and your choice from a long list of desserts.

Please plan to attend. Your support is so helpful to continue with our work. Perhaps, if you would like to help for a couple of hours on the day of the supper, either as a server or on the kitchen assembly line, please give us a call at 756-2531. See you there!





Four Fun Facts about Hot Air Balloons

Up, up and away! Have you ever wondered what it would be like to fly in a hot air balloon, soaring among the clouds? Hot air balloons have been around since 1783, making them the oldest form of human flight - and probably one of the most beautiful to watch, too.

Fact: The first hot air balloon was invented by the Montgolfier brothers in 1783.

The Montgolfier brothers, Joseph-Michel and Jacques-Etienne, came from a family of paper manufactures in France. Joseph, who liked to invent things, was watching a fire one evening and noticed the embers rising up into the air. He thought that there must be a special gas within the smoke of the fire that was doing this lifting (he called it Montgolfier Gas after himself) and started to experiment with how to reproduce it. After many attempts, the brothers landed upon a globe-shaped balloon of sackcloth with thin layers of paper inside, held together by buttons and cord and powered by heat. The first hot air balloon was born.

Fact: The first hot air balloon passengers were not people, but animals.

After several modifications to their initial hot air balloon design, the Montgolfier brothers decided to test out a new adaptation using passengers. The first passengers to take a ride in a hot air balloon were a sheep named Montauciel ("climb to the sky"), a duck and a rooster. The flight lasted about eight minutes and the balloon rose about 460 metres. All the animals came back safely, with some excellent stories to tell about their trip. Baa! Quack! Cock-a-doodle-doo!

Fact: Unlike other modes of transportation, you can't steer a hot air balloon.

There are 3 main parts to a hot air balloon: the 'burner' creates heat that rises; the hot air fills the 'envelope' (that's the balloon part); when it's full, it lifts the 'basket,' which rises off the ground. But there's no steering wheel! The pilots are at the mercy of the wind direction. Because wind speed is different depending on how high up in the air you are, the pilots listen carefully to the weather report, and turn the burner on and off to keep the balloons hovering at the right speed.

Fact: 700 balloons take flight at the largest annual hot air balloon festival in the world (Albuquerque, New Mexico)


Scott is a passionate about owls, especially the Barred Owl. Owls are generally nocturnal and many of us never have an opportunity to see them. In NB we have 6 regular species of owl and a couple more infrequent visitors. They are an important part of the natural balance of our environment. On his own time, Scott builds and erects nest boxes for owls throughout many area of the Province. This requires a great deal of effort and knowhow. Scott will be providing the Naturalist Club with one of his nest boxes and the specifics on where and how to erect them.

The Barred Owl is the only owl with brown eyes. It is a cavity nester in old growth deciduous and mixed forests. There habitat is threatened due to the destruction of suitable sized deciduous trees. Our NB forests are being clear cut and replaced by coniferous plantations rather than the Acadian Forest of mixed coniferous and deciduous trees.

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What does the Government ever do for us? with Gagetown-Petitcodiac Liberal Candidate, Brigitte Noel

What does the government ever do for us? Every time I hear that it bothers me. It bothers me on a few levels: for one thing, I don't expect the government to do everything. But then again, I don't want the area I live in to be neglected. And is it true or is it just an exaggeration that we don't "get anything". So I decided to find out.

I went to the official news website for the Government of New Brunswick. This is where all official government announcements are recorded. It goes back many years, through many governments, Liberal and Conservative. The stuff there is on the record, for better or worse. It's not word of mouth or rumour or complaint, it's fact.

Being the Liberal candidate for Gagetown-Petitcodiac in the upcoming election, I wanted to see for myself, what was recorded over the past 4 years of the Gallant government, for our riding, just our riding. Here's what I found:

- 2014 \$4 million to upgrade The Narrows bridge on Route 695 in Cambridge-Narrows
- 2014 \$2.5 million for Long Creek Bridge No. 2 at Coles Island
 2014 New salt shed in village of Gagetown
- 2015 \$291,257 for upgrade to wastewater collection system for Petitcodiac under Small Communities Fund

 2016 \$39,500 from Environmental Trust Fund for the Petitcodiac Watershed to build water quality monitoring capacity in Petitcodiac River and to document the evolution of the river with local ecological knowledge

- 2016 \$1.1 million to upgrade the storm drain system in the village of Gagetown and revitalization of Front St.
