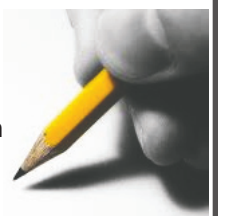

Down the Garden Path

When it comes to garden design, we would never lead you "down the garden path". At least, not in the sense of going astray.

However, we often ignore the very paths that lead us through our garden. That is, until all else is planted. A garden path that functions at its very best is an integral part of a garden scheme.

Fall is an excellent time of year to plant and, by extension; it is a wonderful time of year to consider where your paths lead.



Why a path at all?

The path not only provides a guide for your feet, it also leads your eyes. Truth is, you will likely look down a path many more times than you will walk it.

Where does your path lead your eyes? There are two primary goals in creating a path: to lead the eye to a destination, or to lead around a corner. Either way, you are enticing visitors to move through the garden.

Destination

Nothing moves people down a path like a place to sit. A park bench or permanent, comfortable garden chair at the end of a path pulls the visitor through the garden, with a reward at the end. Many other garden features can motivate people to move down a path. A water feature, especially one accompanied by the sound of moving water, works like magic. A large piece of art or statuary can be powerful motivators too.

Mystery

If you choose to hide the destination around a corner, make sure that the path is sufficiently wide to make the trip tempting and easy to navigate. Changing the colour of foliage at the corner can help to create some intrigue about what is out of sight. Choose a variegated hosta or series of plum coloured Coral Bells (heuchera). A bird feeder or bird bath can work too.

What is it made of?

The material that you use to create a path is as important as where it goes.

A layer of pea gravel announces the visitor's arrival with a crunch. Not a bad idea when there is a skunk lurking around the corner. The sound of feet on gravel reminds us of where we are (a garden) and where we are not (an asphalt road).

Patio slabs are making a come-back. They are generally framed in gravel or fine bark mulch and the path itself bordered by stone sets or bricks half-buried on either side of the path. Framing concrete slabs in this way takes your attention away from the slabs and

settles your eye on the landscape. Kind of like using an expensive steak sauce on an otherwise pedestrian steak.

Flag stone is making a come back also. Random flag stone looks great with creeping thyme or Irish moss growing between the slabs. Place quality soil at least four centimetres deep before squishing the plants, roots and all, between the stones.

Square cut flag stone works well with fine bark mulch settled between the slabs. Avoid using mortar between them. This works well in Britain and Florida, where long, deep ground frost is not an issue. But here in Canada, the cement mix always heaves and cracks over time. The extra expense of mortaring the stones always leads to disappointment.

Grass can be a path. Many gardens are so intensely planted with trees, shrubs and flowers that a narrow strip of grass



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becomes a break and an invitation to walk through the garden. There is virtually nothing as cool as walking on green grass bare foot (or not) and it is generally easy to maintain.

Go Home.

The one cardinal rule of paths is this: it should always lead you home. The idea of taking a walk through your own garden is one of adventure: what is flowering today? Are there any interesting bugs? What birds might you see? The more walking through gardens we do, the more sensitized we become to the green world around us. This is the real world and the path will bring you home from this escape to reality.

Summer has come and all but gone. In spite of a relatively dry summer, we seem to have received enough rain to produce good gardens. Many of you probably watered those plants that would suffer most from drought conditions but overall we are enjoying the "fruits" of our labour.

It is definitely the time of year when we are gathering in what is left in our gardens. Good ways of storing or over-wintering vegetables and plants is labour intensive but beneficial in having access to good food all year round. I recently read that "gardens provide the most affordable and accessible sources of vitamins and nutrients." "A very small mixed vegetable garden can provide 20% of your protein, iron and calcium needs, 80% of required vitamin A and 100% of required vitamin C." Fill your stomach, stay healthy and save money!

If you are not in the habit of saving seeds perhaps now is the time to consider collecting a few for next year's planting....or how about consider saving a few extra for a seed exchange event. This is one of the ideas we are exploring in our WI for next spring. Go online for inspiration and information about seed gathering and storing. Maybe you have extra roots or bulbs that you could share. Take stock as you prepare and manage your flower gardens for winter. Find suitable packaging....label....take a picture (oh dear, have I gone too far...?)

We are always eager to know what is of interest to the women of our community. We welcome input from you as to what you would like to see for programs, short seminars/workshops and even field trips. (Our summer visit to the Cedar Café at the Corn Hill nursery usually finds someone checking out the beautiful selection and purchasing a new plant, shrub or flower).

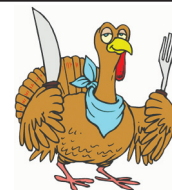

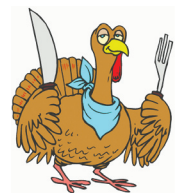

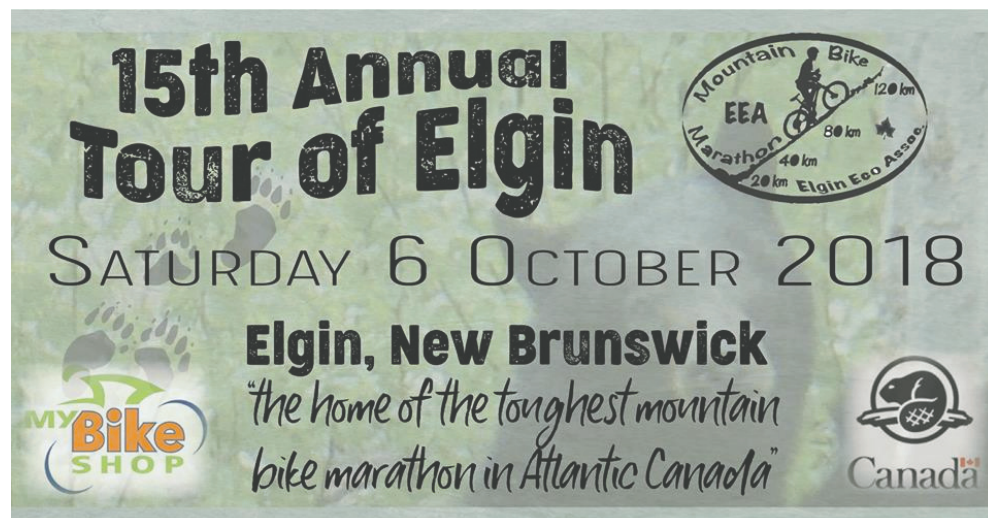

When Are Heart Stents Lifesaving? When Not?

Every year over 300,000 North Americans have a stent implanted to increase the flow of blood to heart's muscle. Stents have been inserted for decades because of cardiologists' concern that, without a stent, a heart attack may occur. Or, a coronary attack may have already caused angina, due to inadequate blood supply. Now, a study published in the medical journal, The Lancet, reports that some stents are life-saving, while others could have been avoided.

But this is not the first review that has cast a shadow over stents. In 2007, the highly respected New England Journal of Medicine reported second thoughts about the value of stents. A survey of 2,287 volunteers showed that adding stents to drug therapy had no effect on heart attacks or death, compared to just using drugs alone.

This debate will not end quickly as doctors' habits rarely change overnight. Moreover, these studies could be wrong. So I'm sure that more will follow. In the meantime, when the heart's muscle is not getting enough blood and angina occurs, what is the best treatment?

There are two kinds of angina, stable and unstable. Stable angina causes chest pain when walking, exercising, or during emotional stress, and is relieved by resting. Coronary arteries have to be about 70 percent blocked to trigger angina.

Unstable angina in contrast can occur without exercise. For instance, it can suddenly waken you during the night, and is not quickly eased by resting or using nitroglycerin. This is a critical condition, as heart attack may occur in a short time. In this case, the insertion of a stent can be life-saving.

In spite of this analysis many cardiologists continue to use stents. They reason that, even if stents do not save lives, they at least reduce or relieve angina pain. Now, even this conclusion is being questioned by further interesting research. For the first time, researchers decided to see if the power of placebo treatment could match the success of stents. This was a double-blind study, in which neither researchers nor patients were aware of who had been given a stent, and who

had not received one.

200 patients in their sixties were followed. They had obstruction of coronary arteries causing chest pain. They were given six weeks of drug therapy to decrease angina. Then another group was treated with stents. Lastly, a third group was given sedation, catheters were inserted, but no stents were deployed. It was sheer sham, fake therapy without the patients' knowledge.

Six weeks following the procedure, patients were tested on a treadmill to evaluate the result. What was found shocked the researchers. For years they had known that a sugar pill could often help those in pain. But it was a surprise for them to discover no statistical difference between those who had received stents, and those who had the phony procedure. So, never underestimate the psychological power of sham therapy, and its effect on the accuracy of clinical trials.

So what is the solution? It makes sense to try drugs first as they could be as effective as using stents. But if drugs fail, stents should be considered. And remember, if a stent is inserted, drugs to keep the stent open are needed, and more drugs to stop blood from clotting. But what is the initial risk of having a stent inserted? Doctors have inserted millions of stents and the risk is small. But as I've often stressed, there is no such thing as risk free surgical procedure. So what can go wrong?

During and following the stent insertion bleeding can occur. This can happen at the area where the stent is inserted, and a hematoma (blood clot) can form. It's not a serious complication, but it worries patients as it may take several weeks to resolve. There's also the risk of allergic reaction or stroke. And always the chance that the stent will become blocked in the weeks or months following its insertion.

Remember, if chest pain occurs at rest and lasts over five minutes, forget everything and call 911. An immediate stent can be life-saving.

Leave to marinate for 1 hour.

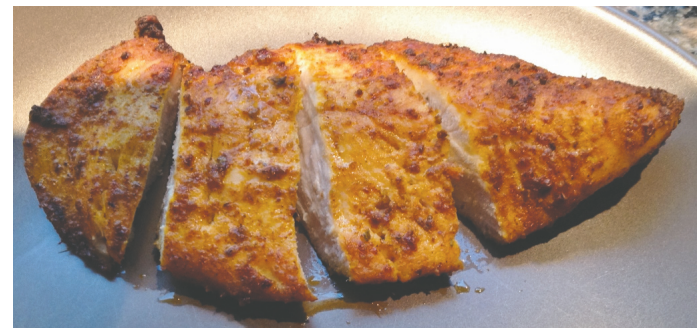
Set oven for 350.

Fire Prevention Week | October 7-13, 2018 This year's Fire Prevention Week theme focuses on three fundamental actions people can take to be fire-safe:

LOOK for potential fire hazards around your home. Take action to prevent fire from starting:

Always stay in the kitchen while cooking. If you must leave, turn off the stove. Encourage smokers to smoke outside. Always extinguish cigarettes in large, deep ashtrays that cannot be knocked over.

Check electrical cords for damage such as fraying or nicks. A damaged cord can expose wires and result in a potential shock or fire hazard.

LISTEN for the smoke alarms in an emergency. Make sure everyone knows the sound of the smoke alarms and can hear them in an emergency. Early detection of fire provided by smoke alarms gives you the extra seconds you need to get out safely.

LEARN two ways out of every room. Practice a home fire escape plan with everyone in your home before a fire starts so you and your family can get out quickly.

TEN TIPS TO STAY FIRE SAFE.



1. Install at least one smoke alarm on every level of your home, test it monthly and change the battery yearly.
2. Never leave cooking unattended.
3. Don't overload electrical outlets.
4. Never leave candles unattended.
5. Stub cigarettes out completely and dispose of them safely.
6. Never store gasoline indoors.
7. Prevent arson by keeping your property clean of trash and flammables.
8. Keep flammable materials such as curtains and furniture at least one metre away from space heaters.
9. Store matches and lighters in a child-proof drawer or cabinet.
10. Create and practice a fire escape plan with your whole family. Get out, stay out and call 911.

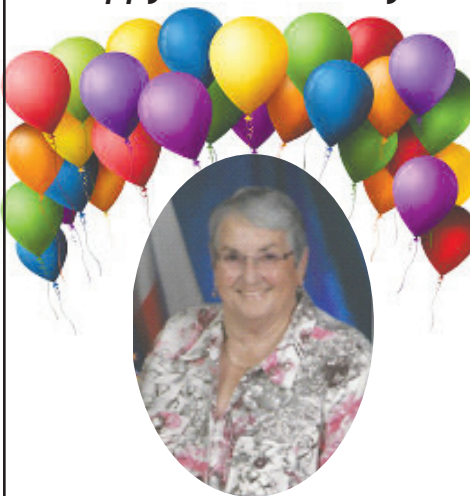

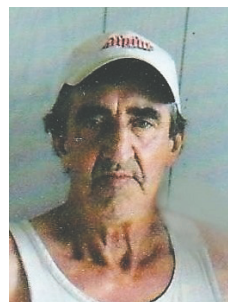

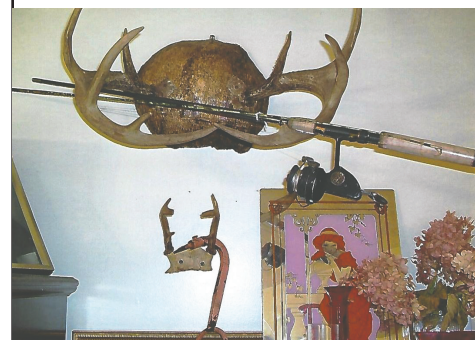

5th Annual Mike Stevens Memorial 200 Weekend at Petty Raceway

The Fifth Annual Mike Stevens Memorial was one of the biggest season-end race events in Atlantic Canada presented by R. Stevens Mechanical, Carnahan Property Management, Roadway Systems Limited and NAPA Auto Parts Salisbury and Petiscodiac took place over two days, highlighted by the Mike Stevens Memorial Super Late Model 200 on Saturday, September 22nd. The race served as the final race in the Bumper to Bumper \$5K Petty Pro Stock Challenge (PPSC), where the top three in the final standings will share in cash and prizes from Bumper to Bumper and Lonnie Sommerville Racing. The weekend got kicked off with racing at 7pm on Friday evening and again on Saturday at 4pm.

Dylan Blenkhorn (Truro, NS) drove to the win in the Fifth Annual Mike Stevens Memorial Super Late Model 200 at Petty International Raceway on Saturday evening. Blenkhorn, who won the season opening Lucas Oil 150 in May, led 119 laps en route to the victory on Saturday night. The win was worth \$7,500 but with additional lap money and bonuses, Blenkhorn walked away with over \$13,000. Robbie MacEwen (Sherwood, PE) chased Blenkhorn for most of the second half of the event and finished in second. Darren MacKinnon (Charlottetown, PE) completed the podium with Silver Fox Special Care Home Halfway Leader Ashton Tucker (Lyttleton, NB) and Dylan Gosbee (Cornwall, PE) rounding out the top five.

The lead was exchanged in the race five times. Gosbee, Tucker and Blenkhorn took home heat race victories in the 23 car field. The Mike Stevens Memorial 200 took one hour, 58 minutes to complete.

Cole Butcher (Porter's Lake, NS) clinched the Bumper to Bumper \$5K Petty Pro Stock Challenge with a seventh place finish in the Mike Stevens Memorial 200. MacKinnon and Blenkhorn joined Butcher as podium finishers in the five race mini series.

Laurie Cormier (Riverview, NB) took home the 75-lap Limited Late Model feature for the A.E. McKay Builders Late Model Sportsman division. Cormier raced to the win ahead of River Glade International Winner Jordan Veinotte (Porter's Lake, NS) and former track champion Luc Bourgeois (Memramcook, NB). Current track champion Brady Creamer (Miramichi, NB) and Matt Rodgers (Smithtown, NB) rounded out the top five of the 28 starters in the field.

Creamer, Bourgeois and Cormier took home qualifying heat race victories. The Mike Stevens Memorial Limited Late Model 75 took 56 minutes to complete.
