





The following is an edited article titled "CANADIANIZATION" written for the Home and Country, the provincial paper of NBWI in January of 1933 by Mrs. Coy Goggin of the Elgin Branch.

"Canadianization is a big word, the name of a subject that is far-reaching; it stretches from shore to shore. I will take it for granted that we all love Canada as a home, for where can we find natural scenery to compare with that of Canada? And as for climate, we have a variety of climate to suit all. Both the climate and scenery are traits that need no improvement, even had we the power to do so. But I would like to deal with the subject, Canadianization, from four different standpoints, namely:

1st - The fostering of a love for Canada and things Canadian.

2nd - Pride in Canada's achievements, both past and present.

3d - The building up of true citizenship among old and new Canadians alike.

4th - Preserving to some extent the history of our pioneers.

In fostering a love of Canada, it is well to begin with the flag of our country, the emblem of Loyalty. It is our duty to see that our school is provided with a flag, and that it is flown from the school flagpole every fine day and on all public holidays. Ask the teacher to explain from time to time the object of the different colors.

This brings me to the second point, pride in Canada's achievements, both past and present. There are several seasons on the gardener's calendar and one of the longest ones is the "dreaming" season. We are currently in the middle of it. If you are a gardener, now is the time to dream of the gorgeous and productive garden that can be.

Everything that we know in the real world starts with a dream or, at the very least, an idea. So, it is with your garden.

Which raises the question, "How do I ensure success in creating the garden of my dreams?"

Here are the answers:

1. Start with what Mother Nature gave you. Whether you live with a condo/apartment with a balcony or acreage, the secret to finding the path to the fulfillment of your garden dreams is to watch nature. Take note of where the sun comes up (in the east), where it goes down on your property and how it illuminates your property mid day. Though the longest day of the year is 5 months away, mid day in June is not much different than mid day in January, except the sun is higher and stronger.

Also note how the wind moves across your property. West and north-west exposure will limit your plant selection

somewhat. Be informed about your natural environment as this will help you make intelligent plant buying decisions later.

2. Design around Nature. Once you have taken note of what Mother Nature has given to you, consider how you can use it. For instance, frame a great view using plants. And avoid obliterating a good view by planting a tree that will grow through it.

If you have a naturally rocky terrain, incorporate some large rocks into your landscape.

Do you have elevations to deal with? Use them to your advantage to create natural beauty at the bottom of a decline, or at the top of an incline. Either way, you will improve the view that you currently live with by drawing the eye to nature, rather than letting a benign or unnatural feature dominate the landscape.

3. Where do you want to go? The most important decision you will make regarding the design of your garden will be the path system. As you step out of your door, where do you want your paths to take you? Deep into the yard, or straight to the barbecue? On a piece of paper, draw an outline of your yard and then create lines of the path or paths that will lead you to key destinations - and think of the elements you can dot along the way, such as unique plants or water features. Remember not to have any dead-end paths as visitors will hesitate to go down them.

4. Honour your past. All of us have childhood memories of plants and gardens somewhere in the back of our minds. Our sense of smell is located high up the nasal passage,

Rx: For Christmas make a Telephone Call

What's the most important gift you could give this holiday season? The Greek philosopher, Plato, once remarked, "Whoever likes being alone must be either a beast or a God". I'd say Amen to that statement. Crisis workers tell us that at this time of the year, depression and suicide risk is highest. So what can we all do to decrease holiday melancholy?

I've never seen it in the index of disease in medical texts, but loneliness should be listed in big print. It's an illness that sooner or later disrupts the lives of many people. Chopin, the great pianist and composer, must have been deeply depressed. He complained of being, "alone, alone, alone".

Some people deny loneliness. One man who hated mankind was found laughing to himself. "Why do you laugh?" he was asked. "There is no one with you". "That" he replied, "is just why I do". It is indeed a hardy soul who rejects companionship during the holidays, or any time of the year.

We often make the error of believing that the rich and famous are immune to depression. But Winston Churchill, British Prime Minister during World War 11, suffered from his "Black dog of depression". Repeated thoughts of self-destruction were never far away. This, in spite of the fact that during his early years in South Africa, he faced death's door in wartime several times.

During World War 11, Sir Charles Wilson (later Lord Moran), was Churchill's personal physician and constant companion. Lord Moran later published a book, "Churchill, Taken from The Diaries of Lord Moran". It was criticized by the medical establishment for divulging personal information about a patient. But Moran defended the book arguing Churchill was a public figure and a part of history.

The book depicts how Churchill's "Black Dog" was always nearby. He told Lord Moran that he feared selfdestructive urges when standing near the edge of a train platform when an express train was passing through. On another occasion he worried about standing by a ship's railing and looking down into the water. A sudden compulsion would end everything.

Only weeks ago I wrote about Anthony Bourdain, the famous TV personality, wealthy, a world traveler with many friends. He ended his life by hanging. To my knowledge no one knows why.

Dante, the Italian philosopher, may have answered one of the reasons for holiday depression. He wrote, "There is no greater misery than remembering happier times". Another philosopher wrote that "man is forever terribly, utterly, alone".

The Skaters Waltz in Green Plaid By Gloria Scribner

As I ponder the arrival of January and neither of us danced, but for the life of deep winter, my mindset arrives at Moonlight Lake, and it's 1962. Boredom from midwinter blues has set in and my 19 year old dream world is as frozen as last night's icicles. I take the youth group's advice and despondently dig out my skates. I even buy a pair of green plaid slacks to try to get my spirits to rise to the occasion. Our church was joining with the Reformed Baptist group and we were going skating at Louis Gosselin's Moonlight Lake, a few miles north of town. There was a warm little shack for putting on skates and to just get warm. A record player with loud speakers enhanced the evening as we skated, arm in arm, with anyone who asked us.

I remember being pulled up off a snowbank by a young man who asked me if I would like to skate. Duh! Why did he think I had skates on? Even though I was the proverbial wallflower, or should I say snowflower? I let him take my hand and onto the ice we went. The music played "The Skater's Waltz". The moon was shining and the rest is history. I married him a year later. As strict Baptists

me I can't see the difference.

The earliest I recall skating was as a preschooler, on double bladed bobskates. They strapped on over your boots. Later they were replaced by brown regular skates. Not too many girls wore figure skates yet, even though the fame of Barbara Ann Scott filled our heads with 'wanna be' as we attempted pirouettes, axels, and twirls. The boys were much braver and showed off their moves, much to our disgust. In the country none of us had even seen an indoor rink. We headed for the nearest pond or river, and after a big rain and freeze we headed for ditches or long strips of frozen pasture puddles. Boys made hockey rinks in their back yards and others always managed to find a patch of ice somewhere.

I recall skating on Humphrey's Pond when whole families turned out and spent the day. It seemed like that pond went on forever, and there were no T.V. sets to entice us home. We had no music con't on pg. 12

transportation in the Salisbury Petitcodiac area since 2014 and in Tantramar since 2017 and is part of the WA Transpo expansion covering all of Westmorland and Albert Counties. Rural Rides has been providing help. Ben is extremely grateful for the kindness he has been shown by the volunteers and speaks highly "They go above and of them. beyond to look after me" says Ben "some of them have even become friends not just volunteers."

I don't have to worry about navigating streets, finding parking city and then finding my way to the appointment from there. They drop me off at the door and when I am done, they are there to take me home. I just get in the car and it is all taken care of." said Ben. "It has been essential in helping me get the surgeries I need in Halifax and for ongoing medical appointments."

I hope the holiday season has been one of comfort and joy for you and yours. It is time to reflect on what we have accomplished and experienced in 2018 as we look ahead with hope and optimism to 2019.

In spring of 2018, we were again reminded of the unpredictable and awesome power of nature with the worst spring flooding in our part of New Brunswick in more than a generation. The devastation was so bad that many people have not yet fully recovered. In predictable New Brunswick fashion, the outpouring of assistance by friends, neighbours and complete strangers was inspiring.

In our province, 2018 will be remembered as the year that chocolate milk was outlawed and marijuana was legalized. It will be remembered as the year that Willie O'Ree was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame and it will be remembered for a provincial election that produced a minority government for the first time in 100 years.

I was honoured and humbled to be re-elected in Gagetown-Petitcodiac with the help of many wonderful volunteers.

On November 9th, I was sworn in as Minister of Agriculture, Aquaculture and Fisheries.

Since becoming Minister, the last few weeks have been filled with meetings

I spent an afternoon visiting Beckelm Farms, a new 20 million dollar dairy farm located in Second North River. Think about that for a moment-a 20 million dollar investment featuring robot milking stations. Our dairy farmers continue to make major investments as they keep pace with technology.

I was very pleased to be invited to speak at the Dairy Farmers of New Brunswick AGM and share the good news that the chocolate milk moratorium of the previous government would be lifted. I also attended the AGM of Potatoes New Brunswick. Here again, the unpredictable power of nature had a negative impact. The wet October weather combined with the early freeze and snow in November resulted in the loss of some of the potato and soybean crops. Such is farming. I am told of one Carleton County potato

farmer who summed it all up in three words: 'It's a challenge'.

In closing, I want to wish you a Happy New Year. 2019 will bring its share of challenges and triumphs for all of us. Let's stay positive and help one another as best we can.

Your Sleep and Mental Health

Obstructive Sleep Apnea (OSA) is a very common sleep disorder. It is marked by snoring, pauses in breathing, gasping for air and daytime sleepiness. Other factors in OSA include morning headaches, a large neck, being overweight and high blood pressure. Those with untreated OSA are at greater risk of high blood pressure, diabetes, heart attack, stroke and early death. But people experiencing sleep apnea

are not just affected by its physical effects. They also experience mental health problems.

Having poor sleep quality can affect your mood and having a serious health condition itself is enough to cause some to feel depressed. Sleep apnea can interfere with mental health because of the reduced oxygen supply to the brain and frequent arousals from sleep. This alters brain function.

Not getting enough quality rest makes it very difficult to deal with routine daily task and cause anxiety. People with untreated sleep apnea also tend to feel anxious before bed as they know that they would like to have a restful sleep but will most likely spend the night tossing and turning without knowing the cause.

Even the most supportive spouse can get fed up by being awoken night after night with loud

snoring and tossing and turning. This can cause sleeping in separate rooms, resentment and decreased opportunity for intimacy.

Dreams are an opportunity to process emotions and events of the day freeing up your brain to deal with tomorrow. People with sleep apnea are constantly being disturbed out of their dream



sleep. When someone does not get the proper amount of undisturbed dream sleep they experience anxiety to difficulty with memory.

Concentration and memory problems are one of the most significant repercussions of sleep apnea. Exhaustion during the day causes trouble focusing on important tasks like work, school, and driving. You may frequently feel agitated or quicktempered further causing relationship problems and activities of daily living. If you think you are having mental health issues such as depression or anxiety and you snore or feel you have trouble with your sleep be sure to talk to your doctor or nurse practitioner about having a sleep test. Your mental health may depend on it.



DOG TAGS

Just a reminder that your 2019 dog tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid a late fee. A \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st.

Registration fees are:

- \$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs

- \$30.00 for unspayed or unneutered dogs

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s)vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

An official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number is required.

NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT.

Dog tags can be purchased at the Village Office (located at 56 Douglas Street), at the Silver Fox Veterinary Medical Centre, or from the Animal Control Officer. "The presentation will give a little background on how volunteerism in Citizen Science can facilitate the collection of baseline environmental data and make it possible to measure how our natural world is changing. The Maritime Marsh Monitoring Program is the most recent member of a series of similar wetlands monitoring programs that are almost country wide. I will provide a description of how one volunteer can contribute to the data collection for the Program. Though this Program is just beginning; I will show the kind of results that will be available with some extracts from a report of the longest running Great Lakes Marsh Monitoring Program that has been ongoing since 1996."
