Did you know?.....WI members belong to the same organization as Queen Elizabeth. The Queen joined the Sandringham Branch of Women's Institute in 1943 when she was still Princess Elizabeth and attends the January meeting every year.

"On January 24, Her Majesty joined her local branch at West Newton Village Hall, located near her Sandringham Estate. The Monarch enjoyed chatting with the local ladies over a cup of Yorkshire Blend Tea and gingerbread while participating in an educational program."

Women's Institute organization began in Canada in 1897 and spread to the UK and other parts of the world. The founder of WI movement was Adelaide Hoodless. The following is background information that saw a need for women to work together for "home and country".

"Adelaide (Hoodless) was born on an Ontario farm in 1867, the youngest of 12 children. Just eight months after her birth, her father died and her mother was left with the task of managing the farm and looking after children on her own.

Her mother showed great strength and determination, and Adelaide learned valuable life lessons through her mother's example. She went to college, married and started her family. Her life

changed in 1889 when her youngest son died at the age of 14 months from drinking unpasteurized milk.

Adelaide then set out to ensure that women had the knowledge to prevent childhood deaths and began to dedicate her life to helping other women. She started the first Women's Institute group in Ontario and within 10 years there were more than 500 branches throughout Canada.

Adelaide was co-founder of the National Council of Women which meets with the Federal Cabinet to advocate for policies that affect Canadian families. As a co-founder of the Victorian Order of Nurses, she would be proud to know that the VON is a daily presence in the lives of many Canadians.

Adelaide was also the co-founder of the YWCA in Canada."(Yvonne Kennedy, Homeville, Cape Breton)

<u>The Doctor Game</u> <u>W. Gifford-Jones M.D.</u>

Will Dr. AI Eventually Be Your Family Physician?

How much will artificial intelligence (AI) play in the future when you require medical care? Today, millions are being spent to produce cars that drive by themselves. Will the same be spent on Dr. AI, your family doctor?

Ironically, this column wasn't triggered by reading a medical report. Rather, it originates from an article written by Matt Harrison, Contributing Editor of the Park Avenue Digest, an economic news publication.

Harrison writes that we're getting closer to seeing a robotic doctor than one would think. For instance, the Ichan School of Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York already has a robot able to pick up pneumonia in chest X-rays, with the final diagnosis made by a human doctor. But I wonder how long this will last?

Harrison adds that countries such as Switzerland are quickly adapting to AI. After all, robots have a flawless memory, never get tired, suffer from burnout, get ill, or need time off from work.

Moreover, today the volume of new medical information is huge. And anyone who believes a doctor can keep abreast of all this knowledge, as well as looking after a busy medical practice, is living in Disneyland.

But this advancement is not just happening in Switzerland. Robots have been sneaking into operating rooms here in North America without much fanfare. And I haven't heard any surgeons complain that their robotic assistant wasn't a great asset.

Not everyone is applauding this new intrusion into medical practice. Dr. Vanessa Rampton, at the McGill Institute for Health and Social Policy in Montreal, along with Professor Giatgen Spinas, at the University Hospital in Zurich, Switzerland, claim it's a step in the wrong direction.

So, would I ever wish to be attended by Dr. AI? It depends on the circumstances. If I had a rare disease, and since no doctor knows everything, I'd be reassured if my doctor askedDr. AI for an opinion.

But I do see a major problem. Many years ago a young mother, a patient of mine, was dying. Her nurse called to ask me if I could see her. When I arrived, she wondered if I would allow her to kiss me, as thanks for all the medical care I'd given her. I've never forgotten that tragic moment and never will. How would Dr. AI cope with this situation?

Medicine to me will always be a profession where great compassion is required of the doctor when patients face serious illness. So I hope we will never reach a point where robotic doctors become the only bedside attendant.

But it would be naïve and unrealistic to deny that Dr. AI will not have a major effect on medical practice. Since robots can assemble cars, surely they could take your blood pressure. In fact, their pressure gauge might even be more accurate. We've known for years that patients become tense when doctors appear in their white coats. This often triggers a false increase in BP (the white coat syndrome).

Today, a major problem is the short time doctors have during an office visit to resolve long-standing health issues. For instance, they would have to be magicians to quickly solve the problems facing an overweight patient, with hypertension and Type 2 diabetes.

But Dr. AI, working as a health care assistant, could discuss the Gifford -Jones Law that states that one serious problem leads to another and another. How this lifestyle problem, if not corrected, will lead to heart attack. And Dr. AI would never tire of repeating this message over and over to hundreds of patients.

Conventional medicine has brought us many great advantages. But it has also failed, otherwise we would not be in such a mess today, with people dying of diseases that should never happen.

Robots may be the very thing that doctors need. They could help busy doctors convince patients that in the past we died of infectious diseases. Now, it's a totally new ball game. We face an epidemic of degenerative lifestyle disease, the likes of which the world has never seen, and it's increasing every year. If unchecked, it will bring our health care system to its knees.

So, keep an open mind about robotic doctors. They could save us all from self-inflicted disease.

• To change the perception of farming to ensure more young people are interested in looking at agriculture as a sustainable profession of the future.



There is a lot of noise about fertilizer and plant food out there and it can be confusing.

We are here to demystify the idea of "feeding your plants".

Do you need to fertilize?

Some plants are born hungry. Take roses for example. They thrive on welldrained, rich soil and perform best when they are fertilized in spring.

Many other plants do not need fertilizer. If your soil is rich in natural nutrients, and it contains loads of microbes and organic matter, the chances are you won't have to fertilize. Most of us do not have perfect soil, so the idea of fertilizing your hungry tomatoes, for instance, is a good one.

<u>The formula</u>

Every package of fertilizer sold in Canada has a three-number analysis printed on the package. The numbers always appear in the same order and express the percentage of each in the package: nitrogen, phosphorous and potash. These elements have been determined to be of greatest demand by plants.

Fertilizer Demystified

<u>What do they mean?</u>

Nitrogen (N): promotes green vegetative, leaf growth. A spring lawn fertilizer like 18-0-8 is designed to produce a fast green up. Some fertilizers contain an ingredient that slows the release of the nitrogen over a long period of time. Plant Prod produces a popular fertilizer for hanging baskets, 16-16-16 with controlled release nitrogen. Apply once and you are done.

Phosphorous (P). Promotes root development and blossoms. Many fertilizer products for fruiting and flowering plants contain a high level of phosphorous. You will not find phosphorous in most lawn care products for environmental reasons: phosphorous or phosphates should not ever make their way into fresh water.

Potash (K): An enabler. Potash helps nitrogen and phosphorous do their jobs. Analysis has shown that this element is a general assist to all the elements that a plant requires to perform best.

Micro-nutrients

NPK, listed above, are the elements in highest demand by plants but they are not the only ones needed to encourage plant health. Micro-nutrients like boron, magnesium (found in Epsom salts) and iron are just three of many. Each provides its own list of benefits and a deficiency of any one of them can create maladies in plant health. A soil test will tell you if your soil is lacking in one of them. Soil test kits are sold at most garden retailers.

<u>Chemical or natural?</u>

Truth is, plants do not know the source of these basic nutrients. The mantra

of organic gardeners is, "if you feed the soil, it will feed the plants". In other words, synthetic fertilizers (or "chemical" fertilizers) do nothing to enhance the character and value of soil. They merely sustain plant growth as the plant requirements demand it. If you only apply synthetic fertilizer to your lawn and garden plants, in time, the soil will be deficient in organic content that includes microbes, beneficial insects like earthworms and the micronutrients mentioned above.

We use copious quantities of compost each spring, to enhance the natural ingredients in the soil. Mark has a six cubic yard composting bin in his 10acre garden. Ben trucks in a pick-up load of aged compost each season to his allotment garden.

When to use fertilizer?

As a rule, we use fertilizer or "plant food" when a plant demands it.

Potted plants, including hanging baskets and window boxes, benefit from fertilizer as the soil mass that they grow in is limited, compared to those grown in the garden.

Lawns benefit from an early dose of quality lawn fertilizer, especially after a long, cold Canadian winter. Like a bear, grass plants crave the nitrogen and a dose of iron, which produces a very deep green. Some quality forms of iron can produce an almost "blue" green, like that of a golf green.

Plants with a low demand for fertilizer include most native plants, perennials and ornamental grasses.

Knowing what plants to feed, when and with what, will help lead you down a path of successful gardening this season.

How Does a Volunteer Driving Program Impact Your Community?

Rural Rides is a volunteer driving program. Volunteer drivers, who use their own vehicles, help their neighbors access medical, food and life needs by offering transportation. Drivers pick up the client at their home and take them where they need to go and then take them back home again. There are many beneficial impacts on communities serviced by volunteer driving programs.

1. Access to transportation allows people to stay in their rural communities. Often when people develop illness or are under financial strain, they are forced to move to more urban locations where they can access public transportation. Having a safe, affordable transportation service helps people, seniors especially, stay in their community. Our seniors are a valuable resource, rich in knowledge and experience, who help make our communities a great place to live.

2. Shortens medical wait times by reducing missed appointments. Many of the doctor and hospital appointments that are missed or cancelled at the last minute each month are because of a lack of transportation. Not only is the first appointment a missed opportunity for someone to get medical attention but the rescheduled appointment also takes up the doctor's time. The ability to book transportation in advance helps minimize missed appointments.

3. Provides support for adult children caring for their parent(s).

Salisbury, Petitcodiac, Havelock, Elgin and surrounding areas are rural and therefore un-serviced by any form of public transportation. How then do people who cannot drive for either physical, medical or financial reasons

4. Helps reduce loneliness and isolation for those who do not have transportation by giving them an opportunity to get out of the house and interact with others by going to recreational activities, running errands or even chatting with their driver. Improves overall quality of life.

5. Increases the appeal and value of our communities attracting new residents because there is an affordable transportation option.

6. Gives volunteers a sense of purpose and a way to give back to their community, help others and meet new people.

Rural Rides has been providing transportation in the Salisbury Petitcodiac area since 2014 and in Tantramar since 2017 and is part of the WA Transpo expansion covering all of Westmorland and Albert Counties. Rural Rides, a volunteer driving program, has seen explosive growth in the need for transportation in the past couple of months.As the demand for service increases, our need for more volunteer drivers increases as well. Village of Salisbury News

GENERAL OPERATING ACCOUNT Total Budget \$2,241,742 Tax Base \$179,275,400 **Total Revenue** \$288,755 Community Funding and Equalization Grant (Provincial) \$175,941

The 2019 property tax rate for village residents has been set at \$0.9912 per \$100 of assessed property value, an increase from the 2018 rate of \$0.9858. This means a house valued at \$100,000 will pay \$991.20 in property tax.

UTILITY (SEWER) OPERATING ACCOUNT

The sewer rate for 2019 remains the same at \$305.00 per unit. After March 1st, interest of 2% per month will be added to all overdue sewer accounts beginning in January.

OVERDUE SEWER ACCOUNTS

By-Law 45, Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System allows for disconnection of services on overdue accounts. Any unpaid portion of sewer charges after the due date can be subject to refusal or discontinued at any time without notice. Where a sanitary sewerage system has been discontinued, the owner of the premises shall rectify the violation to the satisfaction of the Municipality and pay a sum determined by the Administrator/Clerk, as well as any costs associated with the reconnection of the sanitary sewer supply, before the sanitary sewerage is reconnected. This applies as well to any accounts currently outstanding. Arrangements for a payment plan with respect to delinquent accounts must be made.

REMINDER FOR DOG OWNERS

Jessica MacDonald is the 2019 Animal Control Officer for the Village of Salisbury and is authorized by Village Council to sell Dog Tags door-to-door. Dog Tags are also available at the Village Office and Silver Fox Veterinary Medical Centre.

REGISTRATION OF DOGS

Dog Tag fees are:

- \$10.00 spayed or neutered dogs,
- \$30.00 unspayed or unneutered dogs,

A \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for Dog Tags not purchased by March 31st.

No person shall own or harbour any dog commonly known as a Pit Bull or Bull Terrier.

VACCINATIONS

In order to purchase a Dog Tag, the dog's vaccinations must be up to date, specifically for distemper and canine parvovirus beginning at the age of three months, and rabies starting at the age of four months.

An official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour, and name of dog showing on receipt and also the veterinarian hospital tag number is required. NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL **RECEIPT.**

Of note, the schedule does not include any stretches in the schedule where the Tour would race three consecutive weekends in a row.
