

According to a recent article in Gardens Illustrated (U.K.) magazine, Robert has achieved a great deal in partnership with David Austin (who died in 2018). He boiled the complex scents of the rose world into five categories: fruity, tea (as in the rose by the same name), old rose, myrrh (as in the herb Myrrhis odorata, not the Biblical Gold and Frankincense myrrh which was derived from the sap of a thorny tree), and musk, a scent that originally was derived from the scent gland of a small deer native to the Himalayas and east Asian. It's amazing the stuff we put on our bodies to make us smell attractive, but we digress.

The good news for Canadian gardeners, with a desire to design fragrance into their garden scheme, is that you can do that in June quite nicely. And roses are

### Our Past - The New Brunswick Car - The Bricklin

Production: 1974-1975

Malcolm Bricklin, a brash but charming promoter. His

automobile credentials were limited but he was confident he could establish a company to manufacture a car using his name "Bricklin". Three years and 20 million dollars later, he began to give it to them. He was a believer in franchising. After quitting University in 1958 he started with his fathers hardware/plumbing supply business in Florida building a franchise. That business went bankrupt after franchise lawsuits; there he claimed he made his first million before he was 25, so the story goes. He went on to do other franchise businesses. In 1965 he sold franchise for Rabbit motor scooters from Japan's Fuji Heavy Industries. Fuji also made the tiny Subaru 360 car, under a 1000-pound weight. He with his partner, Harvey Lamm, started Subaru of America and imported the Subaru 360. The sales went well until the car was deemed the "Most unsafe car in America" then the sales plummeted and they were soon out of business. His settlement included 1000 Subaru 360s. Now what to do with all of them? He tried franchising small racetracks to rent the 360s for racing but his financial backer soon sued him for misappropriation of funds.

In 1971 young, rich Malcolm Bricklin decided America needed a revolutionary new sports-safety car, and he was determined to make it a reality. This was when he decided to found his own automobile company; not a 'one-of' a kind, a kit or repli-car, but a production car; his own car company. The factory had huge backing by the New Brunswick government, with \$23 million, hoping to provide jobs at two plants one in Minto and one in Saint John. But even with thriving factory.

Bricklin's initial intention was to sell the cars for \$4000. That price went to \$6500, then \$7490 by the time the first 1974 model was actually bought. The 1975 model skyrocketed to \$9980. Production by 1975 was supposed to be at the rate of 1000/month. In the 2 years production took place, the best month saw 429 Bricklins come off the line while January and February of 1975 saw none. The Bricklin SV-1 is a two-seat sports car. It was noteworthy for its gull-wing doors and composite bodywork of color-impregnated acrylic resin bonded to fiberglass Since the drive train, suspension, and many other components were from Detroit, Bricklin was continually fighting a losing supply battle. It became increasingly difficult to obtain more money from the New Brunswickgovernmentformanufacturing when the production volume just wasn't going up. The lack of additional capital,

along with poor quality and high scrap The Bricklin was the "Brain Child" of count body panels, the troublesome electro-hydraulic door system, leaky door weather-stripping, and generally inferior manufacturing quality when compared to Detroit, all lead to the demise of the Bricklin as a production

> There were 780 produced in 1974 with a V-8 engine. Because of short engine supply from AMC, in 1975 a switch was made to the Ford 351W V-8. The 1975 model year saw 2062 cars come off the assembly line. Bricklin went into receivership in Sept of 1975 with 12 cars left on the line that had VIN plates issued as 1976's. There still seems to be guite a bit of discrepancies in reported production numbers. Several cars were completed years later, making the production figure even more fuzzy. Clarkson Company, the courtappointed receiver in Canada, sold the last 287 75's and the 12, 76's to Bill Byers of Columbus Ohio along with all stock and rights to the Bricklin name and trademark. A final figure of 2854 is generally accepted as the production count for the General Vehicle. Some cars were assembled from parts and may have VINs that exceed the 3000 mark.

Unfortunately, the cars seemed to have forgotten the "sports" part of sports car. The early 1974 cars used 220 horsepower AMC 360 V8s, which provided decent acceleration for mid-'70s standards. But a combination of supply problems at American Motors and tightening emissions regulations meant that all the 1975 and '76 cars were sold with pathetic 175-horsepower Ford 351 V8s. To make matters worse, the fourspeed manual transmission couldn't pass smog regulations, so a three-speed automatic was the sole transmission offered.

its investment it didn't exactly buy a But the power-to-weight deficit was only one of the Bricklin's maladies. The cars produced were poorly assembled even by 1970s standards. Electrical problems, warped body panels and a general aura of shabbiness dominated early Bricklins.

> The Bricklin remains an ambitious but flawed sports car. Though only 1,500 cars are estimated to have survived, the brand (model?) has a devoted following and many owners have found ways around the original car's shortcomings. "Time" magazine records it in its list of the 50 worst cars ever made. But this negativity doesn't seem to hinder enthusiasts' devotion to the strange safety sports car.

> Everyone who gets a ride in an SV-1 leaves with a smile on his or her face. Maybe it's time we reconsidered the little sports car from New Brunswick. Malcolm Bricklin is perhaps most remembered for his self-named, Canadian-made sports car, the Bricklin




### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH
