

#### I've Never Forgotten One Grave

Today, we face a recurrence of measles because some parents have refused to have their children vaccinated. This error reminded me of a time several years ago when I interviewed Professor Etienne-Emile Baulieu, the discoverer of the AIDS virus, at the famous Pasteur Institute in Paris. Today, parents and children should be grateful for the discoveries of this great scientist.

Before Pasteur's time, the world was ravaged by plagues. Women in childbirth died of puerperal fever, and surgical operations frequently caused death due to infection. Not too long ago infections had control over us, now we usually, though not always, have control over them.

Pasteur's initial experiments showed that cultures of organisms lost their strength with age. And by inoculating fowl with weak organisms, he could produce immunity against virulent ones. This was a huge discovery.

Butskeptics did not believe his research. And since large numbers of sheep were dying of anthrax, Pasteur was challenged to conduct a dangerous public experiment that could have gone terribly wrong.

A flock of 50 sheep were assembled and 25 were marked so they could be distinguished from other sheep. Pasteur claimed, by his experiments, that the marked sheep would be saved and the others would die of anthrax.

On May 2, 1881 sheep raisers, veterinarians and doctors watched as Pasteur inoculated only the marked sheep with his vaccine. He asked that all the sheep be brought back in two weeks. This time they were all exposed to the anthrax virus. Farmers were told to bring the sheep back again in another two weeks. But only the marked sheep were alive. All the others had died. Pasteur had proven his point and the science of bacteriology had begun.

Later, shortly after he had developed a vaccine for rabies, Pasteur faced a difficult decision. A shepherd boy had been badly bitten by a rabid dog when he tried to save friends from the animal. Pasteur was asked to inject his vaccine. But he hesitated as it had never been tested on humans. But since the boy was destined to die, he was persuaded to provide the vaccine. The boy survived. Today there is a statue in the courtyard of the Pasteur Institute in Paris showing the shepherd boy struggling with the

rabid dog.

Pasteur died in 1895. Fortunately, he lived to see his work recognized around the world. Equally important, Pasteur's scientific achievements were soon followed by the discovery of germs that caused tuberculosis, diphtheria, typhoid fever, tetanus, cholera, pneumonia, and gonorrhea.

Following my interview with Professor Baulieu, he asked if I'd like to visit the tomb of Pasteur that lies below the Institute. Cemeteries and tombs have never been high on my list of priorities, but this is one grave I've never forgotten. It brought back my days as a young boy when I read the book, "Microbe Hunters", the story of Pasteur and other microbe researchers. No doubt it was one of the reasons I became a doctor.

Engraved on the walls of Pasteur's tomb are scenes of his many discoveries. It's an awe-inspiring atmosphere capturing a great moment in history. The statue is not one that celebrates a war that resulted in the loss of millions of innocent lives. Rather, one that shows how vaccination has saved millions in the past and continues to do so.

As my visit to Pasteur's tomb ended, a group of young school children entered. No doubt for a history lesson on how infectious disease can affect humanity and how Pasteur saved it.

Since then this memory makes me wonder why we have not used the same approach in Canada and the U.S. to honour great scientists. Years ago, during my pre-medical training, I worked on a research project at The Banting Institute in Toronto. Banting, discoverer of insulin, had also saved millions of lives from death due to diabetes.

But Banting is buried in a Toronto cemetery. What a wasted opportunity for history. Children cannot come to The Banting Institute, visit his tomb, and learn about historic research engraved on its walls.

#### Stuff You Didn't Know - You Need to Know

Dorothy Dobbie is a Canadian classic. An entrepreneur, Dorothy started Pegasus Publications in Winnipeg in 1996, a member of parliament in the late 80's and early 90's and a passionate gardener. Together with Shauna Dobbie, her daughter, Dorothy is responsible for a great Canadian book called The Book of 10 Neat Things (2).

We call it "Everything you didn't know but you need to know about plants". It is informative and fun.

Here are some highlights, with our editorial musings:


Basil (Ocimum basilicum). A native of India, where it was traditionally used to treat asthma, arthritis and diabetes. Growing basil can be simple. It loves heat and sun, not too much water but it does not like to dry out either: it rehydrates badly. It is very cold sensitive, among the very first plants to succumb to fall frost. Remove flower stems before they blossom and go to seed. This will encourage young, oil-rich new growth for future use in your cooking.

Basil, like verbena and geraniums, can be purchased in a variety of flavours that include lemon, cloves, peppermint, licorice and anise. It is an ambitious plant that seems unsure of what it really wants to be. We prefer plain ol' basil.

**Daisies**. There are many daisies and only one Shasta daisy: leucanthemum x superbum. Don't make the mistake that Mark made for years by pronouncing the last three letters alone, as in superbum. The correct pronunciation is superb-um.

The word daisy comes from "days eye", as in English daisies. Dandelions are members of the daisy family (they are European imports, brought here as a cheap substitute for coffee about 300

Daisy is the birth-month flower of April A Canadian treasure.



By Mark and Ben and the flower of the fifth wedding anniversary. It symbolizes cheerfulness, innocence, modesty, purity and sympathy. Shasta daisies, when cut in a bouquet, last a very long time, up to a couple of weeks. Our favourite variety is "Becky" as it blooms for up to 6 weeks in a sunny garden.

> Pick a daisy and pull the flower petals to determine if you really love someone: she loves me, loves me not. We really hope that you don't push up daisies any time soon. An expression Ben's grandfather used in reference to dying. **<u>Cedars</u>**. According to the book, Canadian cedars are not real cedars, they are members of the cypress family. Thuja occidentalis or white cedar is the most popular evergreen hedging plant in Canada. It is reliably green, winter hardy to zone 3 (Regina) and lends itself to pruning for a generation or more. It even smells good, like an evergreen should, when you prune it. Birds nest in cedars and cedar wax wings forage for mature cedar seeds late in the season. Cedars do not attract mosquitoes, despite the rumours. Swamps and low-lying land attract mosquitoes. Sometimes native cedars will grow naturally in such places. Thus, their reputation.

> If your cedars turn brown, this is usually an indication that they are overwatered or too dry. You determine. If they are dead within a couple of years of planting, chances are they are Emerald Cedars bought on the cheap. It is possible to buy a 125 cm tall Oregongrown Emerald cedar for \$25 or so. They are strip-mined down there, force-fed with goodness knows what and grown to salable size in a couple or three years, versus 5 to 7 years on Ontario farms.

> The secret to successful Emerald cedar planting is to plant the more expensive, better performing Ontario grown stock. There is much more in the book. For instance, you shouldn't eat kale more than two or three times a week or the oxalates that it contains can have a negative effect on your liver or gall bladder. Good news for those of us who hate the stuff.

> Not just about plants, the book is handy if you want to learn about clouds and ladybugs, Lyme disease and deer ticks, it is all here in The Book of 10 Neat Things (2). Published by Pegasus Publications.


It can be difficult to access fresh fruit and vegetables when you are experiencing food insecurity so

#### From the Desk of Your MLA

#### Hon. Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

Our new PC government, sworn into office November 9th, recently concluded our second legislative session.

We started governing as we intend to continue, with a rapid-response approach focused on the needs of the people of our great province.

As soon as we became government we went right to work on the ambulance and paramedic issues. When presented with the challenge of getting homeless people in out of the cold we took action right away.

We made sure victims of this year's flooding saw a substantial increase in advance payments from \$4000 to \$15,000.

Our government brought forward important kinship legislation to protect our most vulnerable children. Families will have a greater opportunity to share in the care for children whose parents are unable.

When this kinship bill passed into law on June 14th it became a critical first step that had been years coming.

Over the course of our first 7 months in office we have balanced the budget and paid on the debt, which led to an improvement in New Brunswick's credit rating. This decision impacts the New Brunswick of the future for our children and their children.

At present, our province pays \$675 million in interest each year. This is interest on money borrowed by previous governments. It would be great to have that kind of money at our disposal to put into health and education and other important programs. Every million dollars in extra interest added to that total will be another million our next generation does not have for their social programs. I believe we should be trying to drive interest payments down, not up.

Our government increased funding for the office of the Auditor General and we have been implementing her recommendations on Worksafe as we address skyrocketing premiums.

We also passed legislation that we would not be taxing our business people more with the federal government's newly created passive income tax.

Also passing into law on June 14th was our bill to re-instate the tuition tax credit.

As of July 15th it will no longer be required to have a front license plate on vehicles under 4500 kg.

Over the summer months, as the federal election draws closer and closer, the forces in favour of carbon tax on New Brunswickers and against resource development in our province will mount an increasingly aggressive campaign.

Our PC government has been crystal clear on our position and on our resolve.

We will fight the carbon tax until the end and we will promote the safe and responsible development of our New Brunswick natural resources.

We will continue to promote a pan-Canadian corridor to get resources to market and to support our New Brunswick and Canadian economies.

I hope summer brings you the chance to spend some leisure time with family and friends.

I look forward to meeting with many of our New Brunswick Agriculture, Aquaculture and Fisheries people and their families over the next few months. As I have frequently stated, these industries have incredible future growth potential for our province.

I want to close by thanking everyone who is volunteering their time and expertise to put on our many summer fairs, festivals and community events. Some of our upcoming events include: July 1st/19 - Canada Day activities in many communities



Bios for each of the members of the Class of 2019 follow (in alphabetic order):

\* Joseph 'Joe' Baker \* raced stock cars from 1966 to 1970, travelling many miles to compete at most of the tracks around at that time. On August 3, 1972, CJCH Radio (Halifax) and announcer Jerry Lawrence paid a special tribute to Joe with "Be Kind to Joe Baker Day." In 1998, he started the Pioneer Coal 250 at Riverside Speedway - this time in a much bigger rig -the Freightliner tri-axle tractor dump truck he drove for Pioneer Coal. It was the pace vehicle and loaded with 35 tons of coal, thrilling fans who were in attendance. This tradition continued for the next three years and still is the only former race car driver to have done so.

\*Tom D. Borcherdt\* built his first motorcycle at the age of 14 using a lawn mower engine and a bicycle.

He bought a new 650 BSA and spent a summer touring Britain and Europe. In 2000 he took the race riders school at Atlantic Motorsport Park. He had success in setting two world speed records at the Bonneville Salt Flats. In APG-500 and in APS-PG on a special build, partially streamlined, pushrod, gas, 500cc he set the record at 118.6 mph. Tom went to Loring, Maine and

set a record of 117.5 mph, prior to the Bonneville Salt Flats. He holds several records and in 2004 was the Maritime Vintage Road Racing champion.

\*Paul Chenard\* started creating his artwork in 2006, with Formula 1 race cars. Since then he has been the recipient of numerous awards in the Maritimes, nationally, and internationally. He is represented in the U.K. by perhaps the most important automotive art gallery in the world, the Historic Cars Art Gallery. He has written and illustrated two books "Silver Clouds" and "Ferrari in Art." His articles and artwork have been featured in many magazines. He is diverse having been commissioned to create works of art featuring motorcycles, aircraft, and

\*Trueman Copp\* hasn't been without a snowmobile for over 47 years. The SoutheasternNewBrunswickSnowmobile Associations first executive meeting was held September 22, 1986, with Trueman as a founding member, serving as a Director for many years. He was a Team Captain with Snow-White/Blanch-Neige for nine years. In 1991, the last



year for Snow-White, he was award Team Captain of the year. His snowmobile travels include NB, NS, NL, QC, ON, NH, ME, and Yellowstone National Park. He is also a member of the Moncton Corvette Club.

\*Ken Cunning\* is a car guy. To him, a car is not just a mode of transportation, it is also something to enjoy and care for. He enjoys attending car shows in Florida or Moncton or a drag race in Greenfield or Miramichi or a stock race anywhere along the eastern seaboard of North

America. Since 2004, Ken has worked as general manager of Scotia Speedworld & the Maritime Pro Stock Tour when he spends every weekend from mid-May until mid-September at the track or with the tour, or both. In the off-season he has meetings with drivers and schedules events for the next year with tracks in Maritime Motorsports Hall Fame class of 2019

New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia. He also serves as Vice President of the Maritime Motorsports Hall Of Fame for Nova Scotia.

\*O'Blenis Auto Body Repair & Paint **Shop\*** was established in 1960 and is still in operation by the O'Blenis family. Back in the 60s they were involved in stock car racing, it was then the new thing in town. They sponsored such well-known drivers as Walter Dunfield, Caleb Dunn, and Jerry Campbell as well as supporting the sport as a sponsor. The O'Blenis' were a great help with the building of Petty Raceway. Allan, Ray and Roy had show cars, winning many trophies at shows. The family tradition continues today with the younger generation continuing to be involved in the stock car racing.

\*Bill Sheppard\* began drag racing in 1978 and has raced constantly ever

since. He has competed with success in bracket racing in the Pro class and in the Stock Eliminator class racing. He is one of the very few Maritimers to earn a NHRA National Event Wally, at the 1994 NHRA Summernationals, arguably competing against the best racers in the world. He is always a threat to win. In his more than 40 years of drag racing Bill has raced and won all over eastern Canada and the north eastern United States. He is still racing and winning, and a true ambassador of the sport.

\*William (Bill) Snowdon\* started with motor mechanics in high school. In 1959 he received his Journeyman certification as the first apprentice in Canada to receive the Red Seal. In 1960 he enrolled in teacher training.

From 1961 to 1980 he taught at the Moncton Community College. After that he worked at Dorchester Penitentiary in prison education. In 1963 he joined the Moncton Speed and Custom Club at Scoudouc Dragway doing car classifications operating the cheater kit it. In 1965 Bill received his N.H.R.A. technical director certification. In 1969 he joined the New Brunswick Antique Auto Club, served as President, South East Region Director and Historian. He has written technical articles for the Maritime Drag News and N.B.A.A.C.'s magazine, as well as "The History of the N.B. Antique Auto Club" commemorating the Clubs 50th anniversary in 2016.

\*Greg & Claudette Turner\* have been producing the Speed Sport car show in

Moncton for five decades. They have brought in many celebrity guests from NASCAR, drag racing, cars from the movies, as well as car performance products. It is this show that has helped to bring better-prepared vehicles to the local stockcar and drag tracks, as the car owners showed their vehicles to be judged. To keep the Speed Sport show to the high standards of other major shows in North America they have been affiliated with the International Show Car Association (ISAC). The show has brought many dollars into the city of Moncton. Greg and Claudette Turner have made a lasting impression in the Motorsport world of the Maritimes.

\*Wendall Taylor\* spent many years around race tracks, starting with his father as he competed at many dirt tracks in PEI. When Raceway Park opened its dirt oval in 1985 Wendell was there competing. The first year he won the Dukes championship, his second year he finished in the top three. He stopped driving when the team moved to the modified division, instead he crewed for drivers competing with MASCAR, the Maritime Pro Stock Tour, and the Moosehead GrandPrix.
