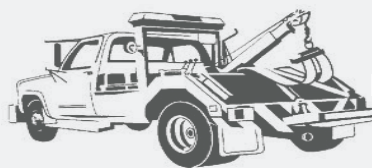

## A Little History of Elgin, NB

Elgin is a community lying at the foot of Gowland Mountain along the Pollett River, where Albert County people claim as one of its beauty spots. In the fall, looking down the hills at you is the beautiful color of millions of colored maple and birch leaves. People drive for miles to see this explosion of color. The Elgin Eco Association (EEA) picked this time of year to have their now famous "Elgin Mountain Bike Marathon", the toughest Mountain Bike Race in Atlantic Canada!

According to the Elgin history the first settler came up the Pollet River just over two hundred years ago, in 1811 by the name of John Geldart. More settlers arrived a few years latter and here you will still find descendants of the Geldarts, Smiths, Colpitts, Grays, Constantines, Stewarts, Magees, and Gowland of which the Gowland Mountain was named after, that is just to name a few. These people spread out to what is known as Church Hill and Maitland. They cleared the trees with hand tools, using the wood to build their homes and for firewood. The trunks of the larger Pine trees were used to make their canoes, as travel was mostly done on the rivers.

Sheep became one of their main farm animals, as it was very useful for their meat as well the women would spin and weave the wool to make clothes and blankets.

The community was first known as Upper Settlement, until after the first election held in Albert County in 1846 and then the name was changed to Elgin in 1847 in honor of the Earl of Elgin.

One of the first industries started in Elgin was he making of maple syrup, which still goes on today.

Lumbering became another of their industries; the Colpitts family started a sawmill a few miles down the river. To get the trees that were cut near or above Elgin the men would stream-drive them down the river to the mill.

In 1875 the right of way for the railway was surveyed and in 1876 the first train ran between Elgin, Petiscodioc and Havelock. This railway was a great convenience for shipping the lumber and maple syrup as well as for receiving

many of their supplies.

A spool factory was built at Mapleton Road End, this provided employment for the local men.

A tub factory was built and operated for a number of years until it was destroyed by fire. In 1896 a cheese factory was built to replace the tub factory. The Maritime Dairy Company built a butter factory.

Fred and Joseph Steeves operated one of the first stores. The first school was built of logs. The second school had two rooms with a large space between them that could be opened up to make an auditorium. Several fires in Elgin consumed these buildings.

A new school was built and opened in 1948 known as the "Elgin Superior School".

For sometime there were three stores, two services stations, a restaurant, post office, two black smith shops, a woodworking shop and hotels. Today the children are bussed to Petiscodioc to attend school, and none of the above businesses are operating. The post office remains and the café is being operated from the seniors building.

Church services were first held in the homes, later in the little log schoolhouse, with Reverend Joseph Crandall as the minister. In 1840 Robert Smith had the first church built, this church became the First Elgin Baptist Church.

The Elgin area became known for its great hunting and many private camps have been built.

Many, many activities took place in Elgin in the early days!

The Elgin Women's Institute (WI) is still an active community organization; they have purchased the building known as the Agricultural Hall and have brought it back to life with many renovations including a completely renovated kitchen. This hall is a place for many community activities. The WI in conjunction with the EEA will hold their annual Elgin Day celebration August 18th this year.

The EEA have purchased land and have made a park for the community. With the invention of the automobile, Elgin like many other communities have lost there stand alone existence.

## Communities in Bloom Awards Night

A rising tide raises all boats, as the saying goes. Recognizing the individuals that shape this community not only gives credit where credit is due, but it empowers people in reminding them that their work is appreciated and valued. Following the villages participation in the Communities in Bloom non-competitive category last year, it was recommended that the village host an event to recognize distinguished members of the community and celebrate community accomplishments.

On July 15th, the Petiscodioc Historical and Cultural Society, in partnership with the municipality and Petiscodioc Kiwanis, hosted the villages first Community Awards Night at the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame. The Awards Night was in conjunction with the villages participation in the Communities in Bloom nationwide competition, competing in the population under 2500 category. To say the event was well received is an understatement! The sold out event filled the room to celebrate 57 distinguished individuals in 6 categories. While the list of qualified and deserving individuals was a long one, the following were recognized:

**Volunteer of the Year** - Laurie Stewart, presented by Rick Brown, President of Petiscodioc Kiwanis

**Garden of the Year** - Clinton and Pauline Steeves, presented by Bob Osborne, owner of Cornhill Nursery

**Youth of the Year** - Ben Thorne, Presented by Sherry Wilson, MP of Moncton South

**Business of the Year** - Petiscodioc Foodland, presented by Ross Wetmore, MLA Gagetown-Petiscodioc

**Villager of the Year** - Harry Wheaton, presented by Mayor Gerald Gogan

On behalf of the Petiscodioc Historical and Cultural Society, we would like to extend our deepest and most heartfelt thanks to those who took the time to nominate, those who were nominated, and all those who helped to make this event happen. ## Growing Agriculture in Westmorland County

When thinking of August in New Brunswick, our minds turn to end of summer activities, garden harvesting, berry picking time and late summer farmer's markets, festivals and fairs. I thought I would introduce our readers to a kind of berry being grown in the area of Fawcett Hill, NB.

Spruce Lane Farms is a Haskap berry farm operated by Glenn Van Agten that was started in 2013 and has grown to include early and late varieties of the oval-shaped berry that begins to be harvested in July.

Haskap's botanical name is Lonicera Caerulea and is actually a kind of honeysuckle and grows natively in New Brunswick, but the wild variety tastes awful. The berry plant originated in Japan and takes the name "Haskap", word which means "little present on the end of a branch". The berries do enjoy the cooler summer temps and do not flourish in hot temperatures. They are not grown in places like California or Florida.

The berries are rich in anti-oxidants

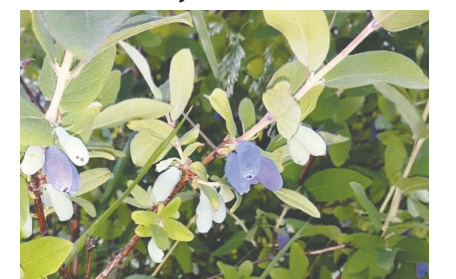
even more so than blueberries. They ripen from the outside inward, so simply looking purple doesn't mean they are tasty yet. It's tempting to pick them too soon, but patience is rewarded.

The shrubs on which the berries grow do need to be netted so as to keep the birds at bay during the harvesting month of July and August.

Van Agten's Haskap berry farm is part of a growing co-op where the co-op is like a broker. 100% of the berry revenue goes to Spruce Lane Farms and they guarantee the co-op a minimum quantity in order for the co-op to take care of selling the berries.

Van Agten states, "Once the bushes are more mature and the yield is up, I do plan to be selling my berries locally. This summer I am selling my berries at the Moncton Farmer's Market and I'll be manning the Hazzberry Farms booth. They'll also be available at Kredde's Market in Hampton."

A student drove seniors with limited mobility, or who had become tired from all the walking, up and down the hill in a golf cart. ### From the Desk of Your MLA Hon. Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

#### Ross Wetmore Agriculture Commentary

In mid-July I attended the annual Conference of Federal-Provincial-Territorial Ministers and Deputy Ministers of Agriculture. We gathered to talk about issues facing our agriculture and agri-food sectors and to make decisions on how to address these issues.

While individual problems challenging our farm community vary from coast to coast to coast there are far more issues our producers have in common, not the least of which are the weather and a lack of understanding by the rest of the population.

In New Brunswick our farmers endured an early winter last year and a late spring this year.

Already there have been accounts from some strawberry producers that the 2019 crop has been below average and across the agriculture industry we have been hearing reports of fields planted weeks later than usual.

For the sake of our farmers I hope that the remainder of the growing season and the harvest season will be better than average because goodness knows farmers have enough to worry about in the best of times. Drought, flood, illness, injury, rising costs, changing technology, crop yields and prices are among the myriad concerns that are never far from the minds of our farming community. Farming is a business as well as a way of life and as a business person I am very familiar with the shared challenges of business.

Farmers need our support, encouragement and understanding. I was troubled by the recent campaign targeting our dairy farmers, but such is the reality of living in a country

where there is the freedom to push one's agenda (within boundaries) onto everyone else.

I am confident our dairy farmers and all New Brunswickers who rely on milk for strong bones and a healthy body will move beyond the noise of a few. There is no time and little appetite for engaging those with closed minds and a set agenda.

Recently a third-generation Australian grain farmer named John Gladigau wrote an open letter to the non-agricultural community seeking "understanding, empathy and stronger communities". Mr. Gladigau tackles the issues of animal welfare, climate change, GMOs and the use of Roundup (glyphosate) and offers an insightful view into the perspective of a member of the agriculture community.

All too often and with increasing frequency only one side of any story is gaining attention in mainstream and social media, namely the loudest side. I would encourage you to take a moment and learn another side of the story. "If you search, 'Farmer John Gladigau letter', it tops the list".

We can never forget that feeding the world is the job of farmers and there can be no doubt our New Brunswick farmers are well educated and informed about their business.

I believe they have earned our support and respect.

New Brunswick is in the enviable position of being able to feed our population on our own if necessary. There are many jurisdictions that cannot profess the same.

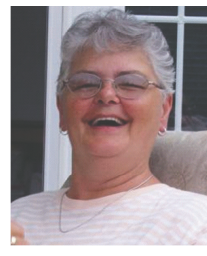

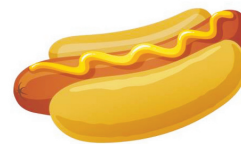
