



Dogs are People, Too

As the youngest of the four kids, Ben hasn't blazed too many trails in the family.

Last to graduate school, last to get married, and still hasn't bought a house. But don't feel too bad for him, because he finally got his 'first' first in the family - dog ownership.

Around Christmas last year, Ben and his wife Sam met Ruby the dog at Pearson Airport. Their "potcake" arrived from an adoption agency in St. Lucia. They call them potcakes on the islands because they eat the food burned to the bottom of the pot. Ruby was a stray at the local dump. Upon landing in Canada, she traded burned rice for kibbles, and a city dump for the backyard of Ben and Sam's rented house, with daily trips to the off-leash park.

After Ruby arrived, Ben and Sam looked at everything with a new perspective: daily schedules, summer plans, and gardens. What was an expression of their veggie-plot wishes and plant-sale whims all changed post Ruby.

We recommend that you consider the following when accommodating beloved fur-friends in your garden:

-Plant toxicity. One of the most common questions we get is whether certain plants will kill a dog or cat. Generally, a pet needs to eat plants fairly compulsively to suffer any effects from the "standard" mildly toxic plants such as Alocasia and Aloe. Garden plants such as Autumn Crocus, Azalea, Cyclamen, Kalanchoe, Lilies (Tiger, Day, Asiatic, Easter and Japanese Show), Oleander, Dieffenbachia, Daffodils, Lily of the Valley, Sago Palm, Tulips and Hyacinth have the potential to be much more harmful. Not all dogs or cats are plant-eaters, but if you have seen this tendency in yours, it would be worth finding no-risk alternatives such as Dogwood, Smoke Tree, Forsythia, Spirea or Lilac. -Designated "Business" Zone. Sounds like an economic-development plan, but if you've ever donned a housecoat at night in January so your dog can do her "business", you know what we're talking about. A smart dog can be trained to contain this to an area, so it's good to plan somewhere discreet, tidy often and minimize the odds of "stepping in it".

-Made in the Shade. It's easy to underestimate how the heat affects pets. Even with Ruby's Caribbean lineage, she really slows down in the summer heat. Make sure you have a tree or shrub where they can flop down, and a patch of grass or ground cover for them to flop into. Growing in the shade can be difficult, especially when a small beast has made that shady spot their favourite place, but it's worth it to maintain ground cover there for a few reasons. Bare dirt absorbs heat when it's exposed and tends to follow the pets into the house when they've been laying in it, not to mention a bed of foliage is just more comfortable. We recommend pachysandra, Irish moss, or Winter creeper (euonymus fortunei) which will grow just about anywhere. Providing a cool place to hang out can also minimize the amount of doggy digging.

-Happy and Hydrated. Some dogs just know how to find the water that is going to upset their stomachs. Puddles, ponds and even birdbaths can all play host to bacteria which can affect your dog, so it is best not to tempt them if they're thirsty. Have a bowl of fresh water available to them in the yard just outside your back door if possible.

-Remember our Feathered Friends. Chances are if you love your pets, you love birds too. Bird Studies Canada finds that the biggest threat to wild bird populations is domesticated cats, which kill over 100 million birds in Canada each year. Studies find that cats are just too stealth to be stopped by bellcollars, so it is recommended that they be kept inside. If your dog is also a bird hunter, best to leash them in the yard or remove those bird feeders to avoid tempting birds into the danger zone. Magnesium: A Natural Remedy to Treat Migraine

Migraine attacks have plagued human kind for centuries and they are still a major cause of disability worldwide. During a recent reunion at the Harvard Medical School, a professor told me of an interesting study. He said that Dr. Stephanie W. Goldberg, a neurologist at Tufts Medical Center in Boston, has reported that magnesium can be helpful in treating these debilitating headaches.

Migraine attacks are not your typical headache. Rather, they're associated with an intense throbbing pain, usually on one side of the head, accompanied by nausea, vomiting, and an increased sensitivity to light and sound. Patients may also complain of visual disturbances, such as flashes of light, zigzag lines or stars.

It's not surprising that Statistics Canada finds 63% of those with migraine attacks suffer from mild depression and 20% moderate to severe depression. This has a major effect on their quality of life. Women are affected more than men. And a study at the University of Maryland showed that more than half of migraine patients also have a family member who had this disease.

The University of Maryland Medical Center reports that in patients who were deficient in magnesium there was a 41.6% decrease in the frequency of migraine attacks when treated with magnesium. In addition, there was a decrease in drug use.

Dr. Carolyn Dean, a world expert on magnesium, says in her book "The Magnesium Miracle" that magnesium deficiency is related to migraine attacks in several ways.

Magnesium has been called nature's major relaxant. This helps to relax spasms and constrictions of arteries that can trigger migraine. Magnesium regulates the action of neurotransmitters and inflammatory substances which are believed to play a role in migraines. It also oils platelets, small particles in the blood, which decreases the risk that a tiny blood clot will form blocking an artery and causing pain. And it prevents the buildup of lactic acid that triggers head pain. So what do experts say about the various ways of treating migraine attacks? In order to break the cycle of pain, Dr. Goldberg says an intravenous injection of magnesium is typically done in an emergency room setting. Other studies show that an oral route can also be effective.

For instance, Carolyn Dean reports that in a study of 3,000 patients who were prescribed 200 milligrams of magnesium daily there was an 80% decrease in migraine symptoms.

What about the safety of magnesium? A 2018 report, published in the journal Headache, evaluated the effects of several studies on patients 18 to 65. It concluded that supplementation with high levels of magnesium is safe, cost efficient, and possibly effective in preventing migraine.

Dr. Goldberg cautions, "There is an impression that over-the-counter magnesium supplements are safe to use and that people believe they can use as much as they want. But magnesium in high quantities can have toxic effects such as muscle weakness, cardiac problems, loss of reflexes, trouble breathing and diarrhea."

But Goldberg adds "the chance of experiencing these side-effects is small. However, people should be aware of them."

I would offer this advice. It's been said with justification, that "he or she who treats himself has a fool for a patient."

This is always sound advice, as being your own doctor can result in unintended consequences. As another wise sage remarked, "Too much of anything can sometimes be worse than none at all!" Since evidence indicates that about 50% of migraine sufferers are helped by this natural remedy, it's worth discussing the possible benefits of magnesium with your doctor and with the experts in natural health stores.



slide and bouncers were a hit, along with a little sugar rush, yummy treats and great music. Special thanks to all who helped make tonight a success.




Sudoku

This Summer, New Brunswick's Horizon Health Network officially announced the opening of the Salisbury Primary Health Care Office. Located at Salisbury Pharmacy at 3154 Main Street and staffed by Nurse Practitioner Jaelle Poirier and Administrator Krista Ogilvie, the office is open two days each week with a mandate to serve residents of the region who are currently without access to a primary health care provider; that is, a family doctor or nurse practitioner. Potential patients must register in advance via Patient Connect NB, which can be accessed by phoning Tele-Care (811) or visiting Tele-Care online (https:// www2.gnb.ca/content/gnb/en/departments/health/Hospital-Services/content/ Patient_Connect_NB.html). Patients are seen on Mondays and Fridays between the hours of 9:00am and 4:00pm by appointment only, while Tuesdays will be administration days. There will be no after-hours or walk-in appointments offered. In a press release, Kathleen Buchanen, Horizon's Director of Primary Health Care for the Moncton Area, says patients who have registered with Patient Connect NB "are being contacted and the reception has been positive." Horizon Vice President Community Jean Daigle notes that "none of this would have been possible without the collaboration from the Village of Salisbury." Nurse practitioners are trained to diagnose and treat common acute health problems, monitor and manage chronic diseases, and prescribe diagnostic testing, medications, and other treatments.


