

#### Tests That Prevent Severe Disablitity or Death

It's been said that if the U.S. Constitution may lower blood pressure as much as were rewritten afresh, it would not medication. stress the pursuit of happiness, but the pursuit of health. Today, when people get together, discussions eventually turn to health concerns, such as losing weight, blood pressure, bone density or other issues. Now there are tests to indicate the condition of your health. And if tests show an early abnormality, rule #1 is prevention. Rule #2 is never forget rule #1.

#### Blood Pressure

Hypertension is one of the main causes of heart attack, so what number should you try to maintain? Dr. William Dale, spokesperson for the American Geriatric Society, says "regardless of age, North Americans should shoot for a blood pressure of 130/80. But if you're over 65 then 150/90 should be fine." Over this number does not always mean medication.

Dr. Steven Nissen, chief of cardiology at the Cleveland Clinic, suggests it's prudent to first change your lifestyle such as losing weight, exercising 90 minutes weekly, and reducing salt intake below 1,500 milligrams daily. He adds a diet of more fruit, vegetables, high fiber cereal, fish, and poultry

As I've advised for years, good health is all about lifestyle. Or as a Chinese proverb says, "He who takes medicine and neglects to diet wastes the skill of his doctor."

#### **Blood Sugar**

Today 25% of North Americans over 65 suffer from Type 2 diabetes (better called Lifestyle diabetes). Years ago, Type 1 diabetes, due to genetics, was the main problem. The Diabetes Association recommends everyone should be screened at age 45. A test called HbA1c evaluates what happens to blood sugar over a long period of time. Levels below 5.7 are considered normal. So what should you do if it's higher?

You must lose weight and the reward is significant. Dr. David Lam, medical director at the Mount Sinai Diabetes Clinical Diabetes Institute in New York, writes in Consumer Reports on Health that patients with pre-diabetes who

# Giving Green During the Holidays

There are a lot of things that a gardener might wish for, which you are not able to give, during the holidays.

Perfect weather, ideal soils, 100% germination and a permanent solution for the neighbourhood squirrels. We have talked to a lot of experts on these topics, but there is no quick fix.

We can, however, help you find something else the gardener on your list might be wishing for, with our 2019 Holiday Gift ideas:

-Garden Clogs. Yard activity of any kind can require good "garden footwear". A good garden shoe or boot has a comfortable sole, is water-proof and easy on-and-off. The on-and-off is important because it makes it that much easier to step outside when you just need to deadhead for a few minutes, or even for bringing out the trash without bringing the dirt on your shoe back into the house. Sloggers (https://www. sloggers.com/) are a popular Made-in-USA brand available online and at many garden retailers, or you can do like Ben and opt for the Birkenstock "Super-Birki", a waterproof clog designed for chefs who are on their feet all day. We note that many professional gardeners prefer wearing Blundstone boots. Made in Tasmania (of all places), they are waterproof, easy to slip on and off, comfortable and they are available in a steel-toed version.

-A New Lawnmower. If you love someone enough to spend a few hundred dollars on a gift and it you love our planet, consider an eco friendly lawn mower. We only recommend an electric lawnmower for most sized lawns even while Ben sticks to his all-manual Mark's Choice reel mower. Cordless electric lawnmowers have come a long way in recent years. Like your cellphone or Mark's new Tesla, electric mowers on the market now employ lithium-ion batteries, which are lighter and more powerful than the old nickel-hybrid units. We have both tried

MarkCullenisanexpert and like the Stihl brand of lithium-ion cordless mowers, which are available only through their dealers. If you're a real "techie", check out their iMow robotic mower - no gardener required (and therefore no boots).

-A Potato Bag. No, not a "bag of

potatoes". Growing potatoes in a eliminates the need to find yard space for them. It works remarkably well. The potato bag has a "trap door" which makes harvesting easy. It also warms up quicker than the potatoes in the ground due to its' dark colour. A wallet-friendly gift item that really makes growing one of our favourite vegetables a joy.

-New Pots. Too often we see beautiful plant material in garish-looking plastic pots. It's easy to cheap out on pots, but there are better quality alternatives out there. At craft fairs across the country there are local potters cranking out stunning pottery. Any natural material - clay or wood - is an improvement over the plastic alternative.

-Green Orgs. Why not donate in the name of a family member or friend to an organization that is committed to changing the world. There are many not-for-profit organizations that are dedicated to planting trees in the urban environment. Check out Tree Canada https://treecanada.ca/ and our favourite Highway of Heroes Tree Campaign (www.hohtribute.ca ).

In addition, consider World Wildlife Fund http://www.wwf.ca/, Nature Conservancy Canada http://www. natureconservancy.ca/, Nature United Canada https://www.natureunited.ca/ and ICFC (International Conservation Fund of Canada) https://icfcanada. org/.

If you are interested in saving the planet by conserving the ever-decreasing Amazon rain forest, our favourite charity is ICFC or International Conservation

Fund of Canada. They partner with the native Brazilian people of the Kayapo nation to protect Amazon land that is legally theirs.

Now is a great time to act when celebrating a green holiday.

#### From the Desk of Your MLA

#### Hon. Ross Wetmore, Gagetown - Petitcodiac

On November 19th Lieutenant Governor 10-year funding agreements with the Brenda Murphy delivered the Speech from the Throne, prefacing another legislative session and outlining the goals of our government. The speech highlighted the road map for the future of our province and the six priority areas we will be focusing on, namely:

- Affordable and responsive government.
- Dependable public health care. ...
- World-class education. ...
- Energized private sector. ...
- Vibrant and sustainable communities. High-performing organization.

New Brunswickers can look to our first year of government for positive action on several of these priorities.

With his keen eye for finances and with a cooperative essence to his personality, Blaine Higgs stated early that we needed a more transparent government body, one that included the people being able to see how he was working for them, how he would use their hard earned dollars to make life better for today and the generations to come.

Our PC team wasted no time zeroing in on healthcare by wrangling the Ambulance issue, creating a separate service for transfers freeing up bilingual paramedics for emergency calls with a goal of reducing response times.

We are removing the physician billing numbers to allow an easier flow for movement of physicians within the province.

In July we released a nursing resource strategy focused on recruitment, retention, promotion of the nursing profession, and enhancing nursing education and employment and worklife balance.

On November 18th it was announced the provincial government reached University of New Brunswick and the Université de Moncton to implement bridging programs for licensed practical nurses (LPNs) at those institutions. The programs help train LPNs to become registered nurses.

Seeing our future generations have a "world class" education was demonstrated through the Education green paper and following summit. Your government wants education to be at the centre of everything New Brunswick does. That means including citizens in the process of developing new ways to manage our education system

We didn't stop there, for the first time in almost thirteen years New Brunswick has a balanced budget and has made a payment on our provincial debt.

Energizing the private sector means reducing red tape, making it easier for entrepreneurs to expand and flourish in their businesses, further growing the economy. Our PC government also acted immediately on crippling increases to WORKSAFE premiums while remaining mindful of the rights and needs of injured workers.

Premier Higgs and our PC team made great headway this past year and we acknowledges there is a lot more to be done.

As always, I remain grateful for your feedback, encouragement and support. I hope you have the opportunity to visit my Facebook page to stay current with goings-on in our riding and in our provincial legislature.

It is hard to believe that the next time I put together an update we will have celebrated Christmas 2019.

In parlours, hallways, windows and front yards across the nation stand these symbols of the yuletide season. Some with twinkling lights, blue, yellow, green, and red glowing from among branches of (would-be) evergreens, announcing the age-old warmth and message of Christmas.

In this land where spruce, fir and pine are abundant we're all familiar with that intoxicating, pungent aroma. I imagine the log cabins of long ago settlers, hewn from the forests, lulling young and old asleep each night in the safety of those

sturdy little moss stuffed walls.

I feel the warmth of old field-stone alive with the leaping orange, yellow, and red of wood carried from the "chopping", adding its own comfort to those long winter nights; Nights of the hoot-owl, the wolf and the winter winds.

I see the table and sturdy benches, the remnant of "the old country", gone forever yet kept alive in memory on the face of mantle-clock, a treasured desk or ornate armoire as necessity unites with the familiar and time marches on. Cedar shares her insecticidal potency

with hope-chests. The country is built an age-old tradition as sparkle and light of wood and stone, and the sturdy backs of men and women who shaped their dreams into handles for axes and cross-cut saws; Everything from cradles to flag-poles harboured dreams of a country whose future they may never see yet began with a dream and a single tree; Hardwood, softwood, river reeds and roots all played a part in the building of a nation.

And as Christ himself in one beautiful moment stated, when Roman soldiers asked Him to order his friends to be silent, "If they were to be silent, the rocks themselves would cry out". Today the trees still announce His coming.

Over the centuries trees were used as stakes to burn the martyrs, one was used to crucify the Son of God himself; but today His most persistant creations still "cry out" in the celebration of Christ. "An evergreen" - maker of cradles, cradler of nests, summer shade, shadow of moonbeams, beams for foundations, from forests of sustenance, from ploughshare to yuletide - portrays His blessings as a reminder that "There'll always be a Christmas".

And may each day bring joy your way in the year that follows after!







Tests That Prevent Severe Disablitity or Death

dropped 7% of their weight, slashed their risk of diabetes by 50%. This should make everyone take notice, as it means a decrease in the risk of coronary attack, blindness, kidney failure and amputation of legs.

**Bone Density** 

Women 65 and older and men 70 and older should have a bone mineral density test done. Your doctor can determine whether your bone density is normal, shows a slight decrease in density (osteopenia), or looks like Swiss cheese (osteoporosis) with risk of fracture.

The American Journal of Nutrition advises women older than 50 and men older than 70 to take 1,200 milligrams of calcium daily, 600 IU of vitamin D daily and follow a diet rich in fruits, vegetables, fish, high fiber cereals, skim milk, and nuts, along with 30 minutes of lifting weights and walking more. This will slow bone mass loss within a year and decrease the risk of a broken hip and possibly spending the rest of your life in a wheelchair, or death.

Colonoscopy

Large bowel malignancies are the third most commonly diagnosed cancers today.

So it's prudent to give colon cancer your attention, and earlier is better than later. If you wait for symptoms, you may already be in serious trouble. My advice is to get a colonoscopy as early in your midlife as possible. The fecal occult blood test (FOBT) detects blood in the stool, the signal of a problem, but this test can miss an early cancer.

It's been said if you don't take care of yourself, the undertaker will. We must all remember that the greatest wealth is our health. And that looking after yourself is not being selfish. It's a matter of survival.







But it would be oh so pleasant to be around at 88.


I will have seen so many thing and had a wonderful time,
