## Historical Tid - Bits Back in the Day of Evan Steeves

LABOUR DAY

Most farmers had a few foxes in pens on the farm. They pelted them in the fall and sold the skins. Silver black fox was the popular fur then.

There was a gasoline tank in Goshen where the gasoline was pumped from an underground tank by hand. The gasoline flowed into a glass container and you could see it marked off by the gallon, like a measuring cup. The gasoline tank in the car we had was under the front seat. Both driver and passenger had to get out while being served. I believe the battery was also there. On the steering wheel were two shiny levers - one was a gasoline feed and the other spark. No starters then so the cars had to be cranked by hand. If the car did not start readily, the driver had to walk back to the

wheel and give it more spark. Our first car was open. Curtains were snapped on for cold weather but were not air-tight by any means. There were three pedals on the floor in front of the driver. One was a clutch, one for reverse and a brake. The clutch was to shift gears to get up hills the car couldn't climb when in high. Shifting wasn't all that difficult - just press the pedal to the floor. There was only high and low ahead. All our cars had bulb horns. Chains were used on the two rear wheels when the roads were ploughed to help on ice or snow. Cars had running boards and were easier to get into and out of, even though they were higher off the ground. Those cars were not capable of today's speeds, 30 or 40 miles per hour would be considered fast. What we now call the Trans Canada was the Post Road then. It would be the only one paved if it was. Mud holes in the spring would be a source of anxiety and it was not unusual to have to be hauled out."

### Planners & Procrastinators:

Rejoice, it is Still Planting Season

Mark Cullen is an expert gardener, author, broadcaster, tree advocate and Member of the Order of Canada. There are two types of people thinking about planting in the veggie garden right now: planners, and procrastinators. The planners are the people whose yields are out of this world, with a planting and harvesting schedule that beginnings with seedlings back in February and continues with cold frames and heat tunnels into December.

Then there are the procrastinators no shame here. They started out the season with good intentions, and maybe have not yet gotten around to planting anything.

Come together, gardeners - now is a great time to plant for everyone. No frozen fingers sowing seeds into the soil like in early spring, but maybe frozen fingers when it comes time to harvest this crop. That is not today's problem though.

Things to Plant in Late August

-The "Tough Greens" - Lettuce, Swiss Chard, Spinach, Kale and Collard greens. You could call these the tough greens because they will make you strong like Popeye, or because they can get tough in texture if allowed to grow past maturity. We refer to them as the tough greens because they stand up well to cold - with spinach and swiss chard surviving even light frost. In fact, many people report that they become sweeter in the coolers temps as it allows for the sugars to fortify. Perhaps, but no amount of naturally occurring sugars are going to move these greens to the dessert table. Here are some things to consider for late season greens:

\* For those that are not frost hardy, consider your first-frost date and count back from the number of days to maturity. For example, if your first frost is November 1st, a tender green with 50 days to maturity should be planted at the latest by September 10th.

\* Get an extension. This is a lot more fun than bargaining for an extension on



of which for home gardeners is usually a cold frame or "grow tunnel". Cold frames sit on the ground with a slightly elevated piece of glass angled towards the south to catch sunlight, creating a mini greenhouse. Challenge your creativity by sticking to leftover building materials, as Mark did. High tunnels are row covers made affordably using greenhouse poly and simple hoops to elevate it off the crop. The greenhouse effect of a well-designed cold frame or grow tunnel can add up to 6 weeks for frost tender crops and keep your frost hardy crops such as kale or radishes going all winter.

"Some of them are treasured old family recipes; some are brand new, but every single one reflects the love of cooking that is so very strong in this, our Albert Country home of ELGIN." We would like to share just a couple with you. Enjoy!

### **SWEET GARLIC PICKLES**

6 cups of white vinegar, 2 cups water, 4 cups white sugar,  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup salt, 1/4 tsp. turmeric, 2 tsp. celery seed, pinch alum, 2 small pieces fresh garlic cloves in each jar. Heat to boiling. Slice small cucumbers and pack upright in jars. Put in 2 pieces of garlic in each bottle and pour over hot syrup. Seal tight. **SUNSHINE SALAD** 2 envelopes unflavoured gelatin,

- 1 cup cold orange juice,
- 1/4 cup sugar,
- 1/2 tsp salt,

juice of 2 lemons,

I can (14 oz.) can pineapple chunks in juice, 1 can (10 oz) mandarin orange sections (drained),

1 cup coarsely grated carrots,

 $\frac{1}{2}$  cup celery slices (cut in  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch wide pieces).

1. Sprinkle gelatine over cold orange juice.

- 2. Place over low heat; stir until dissolved about 4 minutes. Remove from heat and add sugar, salt and lemon juice.
- 3. Drain pineapple chunks. Stir juice into gelatine mixture. Chill mixture to thickness of egg white.
- 4. Dice pineapple chunks. Stir unto chilled gelatine mixture with mandarin orange sections, carrots and celery.

5. Turn into a 6 cup mold. Makes 8-10 servings.

## Prepare Now to Help with a Second Wave

When the pandemic began in March, nearly everything shut down except that which was essential to our survival - food, medicine, some medical services and the industries that support those needs such as manufacturing, farming and trucking. We at Urban/Rural Rides, also stopped providing transportation until we had safety protocols in place then begin easing back into service by providing delivery of food and medicine. We are now, in addition to deliveries, transporting our clients again for medical purposes.

We encountered some difficulties early on in meeting the needs in our communities. In addition to the restrictions in place because of the pandemic, many our drivers are over 65 or have existing health issues and are hesitant to continue driving until the pandemic has passed. We also found, because every service was limiting what they were doing, it became very tedious to get police record checks done as the RCMP stations were initially closed to walk ins and stopped during record checks for a period of time. They are now doing record checks again at all the RCMP and Police Stations but some still have restricted hours.

If we get a second wave, we are most assuredly going to need more volunteers. Many of those who stepped up wanting in March and April to help were temporarily out of work due to closures to flatten the curve. Perhaps you were one of them. The unfortunate thing was that at that time, we could not get the proper checks and screening done in a timely manner and those volunteers have now returned to work.

WE NEED VOLUNTEERS. We need volunteers willing to drive clients to appointments while observing proper safety precautions and we need volunteers willing to deliver food and prescriptions to those who self-isolate now and during a second wave.

Volunteers are needed throughout Westmorland and Albert Counties including but not limited to - Salisbury. Petitcodiac, Moncton, Riverview, Dieppe, Hillsborough, Alma, Riverside Memramcook, Dorchester, Albert. Sackville, Port Elgin, Cap Pele, Grand Barachois, Shediac and all points in between.

Volunteer drivers use their own vehicle and are reimbursed \$.41/km. Volunteering as a driver is a great way to meet and help neighbors in the community. Drivers are provided with personal protective equipment to use when transporting clients and doing deliveries.

just coming in now?". Correct - garlic is planted again almost as soon as it is planted for next year's crop. You could wait and plant it as late as next spring but allowing it to establish before winter will give you bigger, sweeter it should only take one deep watering garlic bulbs.

\* Like anything, with garlic you will reap what you sow - so find yourself Cover these with 30 cm (1 foot) of straw some big, juicy bulbs of this year's crop and pull them apart into cloves. Look for "Music" variety, as it is proven reliable. Sort out any small, deformed, soft or diseased cloves and save the best ones for planting.

Garlic likes open, sandy soil so if you're on clay, it would be helpful to amend with sharp builder's sand. As a our future selves - so do your future self "heavy feeding" crop,garlic benefits a favour by planting this fall's greens or from generous amounts of compost, so next summer's garlic today. top dress some of that while you're at it.

\* Make a trench 6-cm (2-3 inches) deep and drop each clove pointy-side-up into the trench 20 cm (7 inches) apart, in rows that are 50 cm (1.5 feet) apart.

Close the trench and water deeply, to get going.

\* By fall, you should see green shoots. mulch before winter. Next year in June, you will be able to harvest the scapes, which are delicious and by harvesting, will increase the size of the bulbs, and this time next year you will be telling all your friends how you ended up with the best garlic crop on the block.



## Petitcodiac Community Garden

The Petitcodiac Community Garden, a branch of the Petitcodiac & Area Garden Club, was created in June, of like-minded individuals interested in gardening at the Community Garden, located at the end of Maple Street. We applied for a grant from the Department of Social Development, Wellness Branch, for the Community Food Action Grant, and we were notified on June 15th we were successful applicants for the amount of \$5000. The monies were to transform the Community Garden into an accessible space, for learning and community, by building raised garden beds, to aid in accessibility for seniors and those with disabilities, for an outdoor portable kitchen, to supply food to those in need, and provide workshops and events to teach gardening, agriculture and provide the village with a food source. ## Endangered salmon return early to Fundy National Park

Fundy National Park's biologists recently found six early returning adult salmon in the Upper Salmon River during a snorkel survey. Biologist are encouraged as seeing fish return to the river in July and early August have been a past indicator of above average salmon returns in the fall. Inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon are an endangered population of salmon being recovered through Parks Canada's Conservation and Restoration program. The returning salmon all spent their early lives living in the

On Wednesday, July 29, 2020, the Petitcodiac Village Council welcomed Liberal Leader Kevin Vickers, Liberal Candidate John (Jake) Urquhart and Gagetown-Petitcodiac Liberal Association Treasurer Bethany Thorne-Dykstra to their regular monthly meeting.

The Liberal guests asked to be placed on the agenda to hear the details of the proposed new Petitcodiac Health Centre to replace the current 40-year old facility and any other issues or initiatives in the area.

Mayor Gerry Gogan and Council explained that a Needs Assessment had been conducted and that nearly 10,000 clients from the Greater Petitcodiac area depend on the Petitcodiac Health Centre for their regular primary care. The Village explained that they have obtained the land (with well, septic and parking lot) adjacent to the existing Health Centre to house the new facility and envision using the old building for the Village Office and community Library.

Liberal Leader Kevin Vickers stated that his mother and sisters are nurses and that not only healthcare, but rural healthcare, is very important to him, growing up in rural Miramichi. He stated that he would like to enhance the nurse practitioners in the province and was shocked by Premier Higgs' announcement to cut the emergency rooms of 6 rural hospitals which would only reduce the Health Care Budget by half of one percent.

Liberal Candidate John (Jake) Urquhart had heard about the proposed new Health Centre and wanted to know all the details. Going to the Village Council was the best way to find out. Being very community minded and

family orientated, he said this is his first priority. He asked questions to get the numbers of people serviced by the Health Centre and other specific details so that he could begin working on it as soon as possible. When Premier Higgs announced that rural hospital emergency room had to close within 14 days, that's when John knew he had to run in the Provincial election. Growing up and living in Kars along the Belleisle Bay, he has only known rural life and the realities of trying to get any services. Attacking rural emergency rooms, treating rural people like second class citizens, John could not sit back and just watch it happen. He could not believe there wasn't even a consultation time with the rural citizens and no alternative plan for these New Brunswickers. City hospitals stated they could not handle any more emergency patients, being overwhelmed already, and the increased travel time was really going to put rural people's lives at risk. Thankfully the Opposition stopped it. John knows that our healthcare system can be improved, but to start removing rural emergency services is unbelievable.

The Village Council also stated their need for help with infrastructure projects like upgrading the Village Garage, better high speed internet and roadwork. Mr. Vickers could not understand why the Provincial government would not pass along the multimillions of Federal infrastructure dollars. Liberal Leader Kevin Vickers committed to work with the Village. "I will commit to working with this area", he said.

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### History of Goshen Baptist Church

### 180th Year Anniversary in 2020

The pandemic of COVID-19 has disrupted our lives in many and huge ways. Families, individuals, businesses, charities and churches have all been affected and we have had to adjust to a "new way of normal" as best as we can. Celebrations have been cancelled or revised in some way. This year we were hoping to celebrate 180 years of faithful service at the Goshen Baptist Church with our annual Anniversary Service but felt it was unsafe to do so with proper distancing and people interacting. Attendees often have not seen each other for a number of years and it resembles a reunion, especially for the seniors. The service is typically held in August and as a subsitute we would like to tell you a little about its history. The congregation began in 1840 and the present church was built in 1860. How did it all begin?

After 180 years of history, we reflect back about this little white wooden church, nestled in the valley in the good land of Goshen, built and dedicated in July, 1860.

The surnames of families back then would be Hayward, Stevens, DeMille, Jonah, Graves, Babcock, Geldart, Tucker and Gray which are still visible on the stones in the well-kept cemetery surrounding the church.

In 1824 James Hayward, who is buried in the Old Upper Goshen Cemetery, was the first settler. It is said from sources that the name Goshen came from the biblical name in the Bible. Genesis 47 verse 6 says to give Jacob the best land of Egypt, which was the region of Goshen, for his herds and flocks apparently the best pasture land.

In 1833 Midlands (or Middland) Settlement, or what some call today the Midland Road, was founded - "where the land is partly open but less fertile than other nearby communities". In the 1830's there were enough settlements, families, and interest for local church meetings to be held in homes or a school. Elgin then was called Upper Settlement and early records of the church go back to 1835. In 1839 First Elgin officially began without a "meeting house", as they called a church back then. Previously, they had travelled to First Baptist Salisbury by horseback or water. In 1837 a Pollet River group began which was called the Second Salisbury Baptist Church. Rev. Joseph Crandall was the founder.

In November, 1840, due largely to the efforts of Robert Smith, a meeting house was completed and in about 1850 First Elgin was given its name. About this time members began to meet in Goshen and they were called the Second Elgin Baptist Church. The population is growing and the first census is in 1851. In 1860 a meeting house is constructed in Goshen and dedicated in July.

On March 17, 1859, James Stevens and wife, Mary E., deeded 2/3 of an acre at "Goshen Corner for a burying ground and site for the Baptist Chapel for the sum of 75 pounds". On May 10, 1861, William Henry Stevens and wife, Mary A., deeded 1/3 of an acre next to the first lot to make 1 acre for the sum of 25 pounds. The trustees in Elgin at that time were George Hayward, Frederick Babcock, Frederick W. Steves, Pharez Constantine and James Hayward. In 1960 the church purchased the former school yard, 1/2 acre of land, from the Elgin School District which is used for an addition to the cemetery.

In those days it would have been a great sacrifice for the pioneer menfolk to leave their time-consuming chores of building homes and barns, clearing land, grubbing roots, growing their crops, gathering fuel for winter, haying or operating mills, etc. to build a meeting house. There are some very heavy beams in this chapel and I know they did not have the benefit of cranes

**Dedicated** – 35 years involvement in the sport. His voice has been heard on public address systems at most tracks in the Maritime Provinces.

Talented – What Cyril will most be remembered for is his contagious enthusiasm.

In a sauce pan heat 1 cup milk until bubbly, remove from heat. Mix in 2 Tablespoons white sugar until dissolved Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup cut up shortening to melt Cool to luke warm 105 degrees F. To cook muffins Heat a greased griddle to medium and

or the electrical tools of this age. Two hand-cut stone steps done by Warren Babcock still welcome us at the 2 entrances.

The chapel had white plaster walls and ceiling which was covered later with birch veneer in 1903.

The high pulpit built by Rev. H. H. Saunders in the early 1900's is still being used on the platform.

The straight back pews were sold to members to meet the debt and at one time had doors - there is a sample in the church.

We still have one original kerosene lamp at the back of the church.

There were outdoor baptisms in the Kennebecasis River just down the road. At one time the Goshen Church had their own library.

BYPU held meetings there - the wall hanging is still on the front wall behind the pulpit. In 1867 the first offering was made to Acadia Baptist College in Wolfville, N. S.

Many happy weddings have been celebrated here. In 1891 a lavish one was held for Eliza Abigail Stockton and Azor Jonah. Actually, one local family had a wedding here this summer.

Many sad funerals have also been conducted. There was one instance of a husband and wife within one (1) week of each other. At another time, two brothers were buried the same day. The stones in the surrounding cemetery attest to early deaths of the young. The first cemetery in Upper Goshen at one time was overgrown by forest but is now maintained. The only readable names are Gray, Graves and Hayward. The first Communion Set, which we put on display at anniversary services, was donated by George Hayward who also prepared the Lord's Supper until his death in 1892. His son, Joseph H. Hayward, continued until his death in 1922. In 1893 it was decided that the Lord's Supper would be administered once every 2 months.

In 1893 Lic. H. H. Saunders was paid a salary of \$500 per year.

In 1908 the Pastor was paid \$700 per year with hay for his horses and wood for the parsonage which was purchased in 1888 and located in Elgin. At one time there was a shed for horses beside the church and it wasn't uncommon for men to slip out during the service to check on the horses.

In 1895 the membership of the Elgin, Goshen, and Mapleton fields totaled 375 with three (3) Sunday Schools of 235 members and 19 Sunday School Teachers.

The first Thomas Organ was acquired by the efforts of Mrs. James Steeves - Lena. The first organist was J. B. Babkirk, followed by Lena. My grandmother, Idella DeMille, and others have been organists over the years. We still use a pump organ for our services. Along with playing the notes, you have to remember to pump the pedals.

It is noteworthy that Rev. F. P. Dresser, who pastored 1903-06, baptized 50 new members from the fields of Elgin, Goshen and Mapleton. At the end of his sermons when shaking hands with his congregation, he would pull little packages of candy from the pockets

of his long-tailed coat for each child. What a delight that must have been for them and him!

The Goshen Congregation has completed renovations and improvements over the years including a new foundation, cement basement, windows, furnaces, and inside basement stairs. There is one original rescued window in the basement.

We honor our ancestors from pioneer days who purposed to build this meeting house/chapel/church and we thank the descendants from years past who until quite recently still met every other Sunday contributing their time, talents and energy to keep the doors open. We hold Special Anniversary Celebration Services every year in the afternoon in August.

Who knows, but God, what influences have come from this little white chapel in the good land of Goshen!

Since we are unable to hold this year's celebration, if there is an interest in donations, which go towards church maintenance, you may contact Shirley, a long-time member and treasurer, at 756-2483. Too many of our small country churches have been torn down, left in disrepair, or occasionally renovated to cottages. We lose our history and we need to be reminded of the sacrifice those hard-working pioneers made to have their own meeting house. I think they would be very pleased that their meeting house is still there, much the same as they built it!



#### **Brown Betty** Peeled, cored and sliced cooking apples 1.5L 6 cups (such as McIntosh) **Granulated** sugar 3/4 cup 175mL **Streusel Topping** 300mL All-purpose flour 11/4 cups Brown sugar, packed 3/4 cup 175mL 1/2 tsp. Salt 2mL Hard margarine (or butter), cut up 1/2 cup 125 mL Place apple slices in ungreased shallow 3 quart (3L) casserole. Sprinkle sugar over top. Streusel Topping: Combine flour, brown sugar and salt in medium bowl. Cut

in margarine until mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Scatter evenly over apple. Press down lightly. Bake, uncovered, in 375 F (190 C) oven for about 40 minutes until apple is tender. Serves 8.
