SEVENTH ANNUAL MIKE STEVENS MEMORIAL RACE RESULTS

RIVER GLADE, NB - September 20th, 2020) - The following are Quick Results from the Seventh Annual Mike Stevens Memorial Super Late Model/Pro Stock 200 and Late Model Sportsman 100, which took place on Saturday evening. September 19th at Petty International Raceway in River Glade, New Brunswick. Jonathan Hicken (Brudenell, PE) was the winner of the Mike Stevens Memorial Super Late Model 200, his fourth victory in the seven year history of the event. Ashton Tucker (Lyttleton, NB) finished second, which secured the championship in the Petty Raceway and Speedway 660 Home and Home Series. Robbie MacEwen (Sherwood, PE) was third in the 25-car field.

Jordan Veinotte (Porters Lake, NS) also continued his winning ways at the high banked bullring with the win in the Late Model Sportsman 100 portion of the show. Veinotte was challenged in the waning laps by Brandon Carter (Moncton, NB) and Kenny MacKenzie Jr (Salisbury, NB), who completed the podium. For Carter. it was his first career Late Model start. Twenty-six cars started the event.

Support class wins went to Tanton Wooldridge (Summerside, PE - Leisure Days RV Bandolero), Braden Langille (Shubenacadie, NS - Legends Feature Michael Cormier Barachois, NB - Legends Feature Two) and Jim Rankin (Mount Uniacke, NS -Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classics powered by NTN).

After being rained out on Friday the 18th #68 Michael Cormier (Grand-Barachois, NB) had the field covered during the Street Stock 100 Sunday at Petty International Raceway. While challenged in the middle stages by Brad MacLean (Black River, NB), MacLean would break early into the second half of the race, ending the No. 13's bid for the win. Jim Tingley (Moncton, NB), in his first outing of the season, finished second with Kenny MacKenzie Jr (Salisbury, NB) third in the Street Stock 100. MacKenzie Jr was also third on Saturday in the Late Model Sportsman 100. Six drivers finished on the lead lap with the 100 lap feature taking 40 minutes to complete.

JR Lawson (Shubenacadie, NS) appeared to be on his way to a second straight Mike Stevens Memorial Mini Stock win - until the last lap in the last corner. A slow car had spun in Turn Four as Lawson sped towards the checkered through the lapped traffic. Lawson had nowhere to go and struck the spun car while Cody Byrne (Orwell Cove, PE) slid under and raced his way to the victory.

Byrne, now a two-time winner of the event after winning in 2018, raced to the line ahead of Lawson and Jesse Deveau (Greenwood, NS). Thirty-two cars started the feature with 25 on track at the checkered flag, 16 of those finishing on the lead lap.

Chase Livingston (Springhill, continued his winning ways in the Beginner Bandolero class with another victory at Petty International Raceway, holding off Drew Murphy (Summerside, PE) and Daniel Vandenburg (Lower Onslow, NS) in the opening feature on Day Two of the Mike Stevens Memorial weekend

Hannah Gallant (Salisbury, NB) took advantage of a mid-race restart in the Kings County Performance Women on Wheels and held the top spot for her second feature win of 2020. Former track champion Paula Evans (Halifax, NS) and Rease Delahunt completed the podium in the nine car, 15-lap feature. The Legend division competed in twin 25 lap features with the average finish deciding the finishing order for the evening. Braden Langille (Shubenacadie, NS) won the first feature and took home the overall race win with a third place finish in the second 25-lap leg. Michael Cormier (Grand-Barachois, NB) did what nobody could do heads up in the Maritimes this season and bested the No. 51 car in the second 25-lap feature. Craig MacDonald (Waverlev. NS) was second in the second feature, third in the first and second overall for

Historical Tid - Bits Back in the Day of Evan Steeves



Written by the late Mrs. Evans Steeves of Elgin and submitted by Idella

"For haying a team hauled a mowing sides and ends, higher in front and back lying in swath. Raking was done with a horse rake, sometimes one horse and sometimes a team. The rake was a "trip" rake. On some, all the driver had to do to trip the rake was push a bar with his foot. The driver reined the horses so no hav was missed, and to take advantage of the full width of the rake. Some I used had to be tripped by hand. There was a long lever behind and beside the seat that had to be pulled to raise the teeth to release the hay. In heavy going you were very busy. Sometimes the hay would catch and drag and scatter over a clean area. I was afraid of a certain horse Dad had. I remember once I was raking and my younger sister was with me. I thought this horse, named "Tom", was going to run away - teams did that so I got off the rake and held the team by the head and sent my sister to the barn to tell Dad the team was going to take off. Usually the hay was bunched, or cocked, and left over-night. A field of properly bunched hay was a lovely sight. One or two men would pitch it trip rope for another fork-load. onto a wagon. The wagon was high and had steel tires. It had a rack at the

machine which cut the hay and left it The man - or woman - on the load drove the team along the row of bunches and levelled the hay. If the pitchers were good ones, it didn't take a lot of moving. It had to be tramped well near the front and back ladders to hold it on.

At the barn it was unloaded into a mow with a pitching machine, or pitcher There was an iron track along the peak of the barn and a carriage that the fork locked into. The hay was carried along the track and dropped in the mow where wanted. It was tripped by means of a rope which the man who stuck the fork controlled. If it hit a hav chute, that made it very hard to mow away. One person drove the horses on a cable or rope. It was a help to have someone to pull the rope back. The fork had two prongs, perhaps two feet long, and at the bottom were two short prongs on hinges. They were sharp and vertical when the fork was being stuck. By means of a lever they were made diagonal. These held the hay on the fork. The one who stuck the fork pulled it back with the

Propagation for the Nation

Do you like getting stuff for free? Do you enjoy doing your part to provide a positive impact on the environment? If the answer is yes to either question, we have news for you. This is your time.

September and October are the perfect months to propagate the many perennial plants that grow in our gardens. If you do not have a garden, there are opportunities for you to gather seeds now from native perennials and some annuals to sow in early spring to give away to people who do.

Dig and divide.

Perennial flowering plants are winding down their activity levels. In the next few weeks, all above ground growth

will cease while root development continues until the ground freezes hard. The existing root structure is storing natural sugars to help the plant survive our Canadian winter. The results should be a healthy return to the growth cycle come spring. This is why we call them perennials: their life cycle occurs over years, versus an annual that is born and dies in the same season.

Any perennial with thick, fleshy roots is suitable for digging and dividing. The divisions put down roots when planted in another location over the next few weeks. Some perennials best suited to dividing now include bearded (German) iris, hosta, day lilies, bear's breeches (acantha) and peonies.

To divide these perennials, dig the entire established plant out of the ground and cut it in quarters, then eighths (if it is large or mature enough). Plant the divisions in new triple mix and water in thoroughly.

Other perennials also lend themselves to autumn propagation through division, the only difference is their roots are knitted together in a thick layer beneath the surface of the soil. The best way to "dig and divide" in this

Only once was there She thought Dad had an incident. velled to stop - which he didn't - and he went headfirst between the tractor and wagon. He wasn't hurt and she felt terrible. When I drove the tractor, I always prided myself on not missing hay in a windrow.

Marilyn, our youngest sister, walked behind the hayloader picking up any missed hay with a fork, and when she had enough, run up and put it on the wagon. You can imagine how many miles she walked in a summer. She liked doing this in her bare feet! Our fields were neat! The three of us yelled or signaled to Louise when unloading. Sometimes it was just Dad yelling for her to start out. The cable and pitching machine is still hanging in the barn. The cable pulled the bunch of hay to the proper mow. After dumping, Louise unhooked the cable from the tractor and with the rope Dad would pull it back to the load on the wagon. Sometimes we had

a hired man but we all did our part. As I look back, I think Dad eventually realized our strong point and that was our main job.

After loose hay we got a baler and we had to learn how to fit them in the barn without losing space. You had to pick them off the baler and stack on the wagon. Our 2nd baler had a bale thrower and there is certainly a knack to that. Now we are partially into round bales. Times have sure changed!



Propagation for the Nation

case is to use a sharp shovel or spade to literally carve off the size of root mass that you wish to move. Some of these perennials include astilbe, bleeding heart, shasta daisy, rudbeckia (black eyed Susan), echinacea (Purple Cone Flower), monarda (Bee Balm), Baptisia and turtlehead (Chelone obliqua).

Seed collection

Many of the flowering plants in your garden are producing mature seeds that are ready for harvest. Perennial coneflower, rudbeckia, poppies, sweet peas and hollyhocks are common plants that are ready for seed harvest this time of year. Annuals like sunflowers, nasturtiums, pot marigolds (calendula), marigolds, zinnias and snapdragons are producing seeds now too.

To harvest, cut off the finished flower head with scissors and dry the seed pod in sunshine for a few days. The casing that holds the seeds will often open as the pod dries allowing for the seeds to be removed by simply shaking them over an envelope. If the seed casing will not let the seeds go, open them with your fingers or use a sharp knife to slice through the brown membrane.

Label the envelope with the name of the plant and store the seeds in a sealed mason jar over the winter, in a cool, dark place. Come February or March, you can sow these seeds indoors to grow on for use in your garden next year. Or give them away to friends and relatives.

Mother Nature provides a hint of when seeds are ready. When you see songbirds pecking at a finished flower or seed pod, you can be certain that the seeds they are foraging are ready for harvest. Chances are, there will be plenty of seeds for you and birds, so do not be concerned with starving them in favour of your seed storage adventure.

Acorns, chestnuts and other woody trees and shrubs also produce seeds this time of year. Gather some up, place them in the sun for a week or two and store them over the winter in a cool dark place.

By taking these simple actions you will multiply the plant bounty in your garden and of those with whom you share. It is a magic multiplier.

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

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Cooking

• Cooking is the leading cause of home fires and home fire injuries.

Thanksgiving is the leading day for fires involving cooking equipment.

- · The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking.
- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly and stay in the home.
- Always keep a lid nearby when cooking. If a small grease fire starts, slide the lid over the pan and turn off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it's cool.
- · Keep anything that can catch fire away from your stovetop.
- Loose clothing can hang down onto stove burners and catch fire. Wear short, close-fitting, or tightly rolled sleeves when cooking.
- Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 metre) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

Smoke Alarms

- Smoke alarms detect and alert people to a fire in the early stages. Smoke alarms can mean the difference between life and death in a fire.
- Working smoke alarms cut the risk of dying in a home fire in half.
- Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level of the home, including the basement.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month using the test button.
- Make sure everyone in the home understands the sound of the smoke alarm and knows how to respond. Home Fire Escape Planning and Practice Home fire escape planning should include the following:
- Drawing a map of each level of the

home, showing all doors and windows

- Going to each room and pointing to the two ways out
- Making sure someone will help children, older adults, and people with disabilities wake up and get out
- Teaching children how to escape on their own in case you cannot help them
- Establishing a meeting place outside and away from the home where everyone can meet after exiting
- Having properly installed maintained smoke alarms
- Pushing the smoke alarm button to start the drill
- Practicing what to do in case there is smoke: Get low and go. Get out fast.
- Practicing using different ways out and closing doors behind you as you leave
- Never going back for people, pets, or things
- Going to your outdoor meeting place
- Calling 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from a cell phone or a neighbor's

Heating

- Heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fires during the winter months.
- Space heaters are the type of equipment most often involved in home heating equipment fires.
- All heaters need space. Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet (1 meter) away from heating equipment.
- Have a 3-foot (1-metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Purchase and use only portable space heaters listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- · Have a qualified professional install heating equipment.
- Maintain heating equipment and chimneys by having them cleaned and inspected by a qualified professional at least once a year.

Go Ahead and Catch the Travel Bug

William Shakespeare wrote, "In the night, imagining some fear, how easy is a bush supposed a bear!" For many families having lost loved ones to the coronavirus, this has been a devastating year. The death numbers are broadcast relentlessly. Small wonder people have become paranoid about travelling. But does this anxiety make sense?

Normally airports arechaotic and unpleasant. Joyless crowds stand toe-totoe in long lineups throughinsufferable screenings and baggage checks, only to be herded like sheep onto cramped planes.

But now could be the best time to travel. Airports are not crowded and much cleaner. Some flights leave the middle seat empty - a welcome move. Skeptics worryabout contact with the coronavirus while seated for hours breathing shared air on flights.It's understandable given the enclosed space and large numbers of strangers. But the air inside an airplane is cleaner than you think.

Most commercial aircraft use High Efficiency Particulate Air (HEPA) filters, and the air flows in ways similar to an operating room, in one direction with little crossover of circulation patterns. Cabin air is constantly refreshed, with about 60% from the outside and 40% passing through HEPA filters that block 99.97% of airborne particles over 0.3 micron in size. Research by NASA notes that HEPA filters are exceptionally efficient - almost 100% at 0.01 micron at capturing ultrafine particles, including the very small globs carrying SARS-CoV-2 in exhaled air.

Even with this filtration, every three minutes, on average, cabin air is completely changed. That's 20 times every hour compared to 12 times in office buildings. Your airplane ride is far safer than a bus or subway journey!

It is not the air, but certain surfaces on planes where germs thrive - for instance, seatback magazines, pulldown tables and headrests where people put their hands as they walk the aisle.






