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211 NB Now Accessible Across The Province

FREDERICTON (GNB) - 211 NB, a free, bilingual, confidential resource to help New Brunswickers navigate the network of community, social, non-clinical health and government services was launched today by the provincial government in partnership with the federal government and the United Way.

"I am thrilled to see 211 arrive in our province after being successful in jurisdictions across Canada," said Social Development Minister Bruce Fitch. "This much-needed service will equip New Brunswickers with information on the support available in their communities."

New Brunswickers can call 2-1-1 and trained staff will work to connect callers with services for both everyday needs and times of crisis.

"211 NB is a much-needed service and will help fill the gap of navigating social and community services and resources across New Brunswick - from basic



needs like housing and food access to support for youth, seniors, mental health and more," said Debbie McInnis, CEO of United Way Greater Moncton and Southeastern New Brunswick. "As a new, provincial service 211 NB will be able to reach all of our communities and give them the support they need. We are thrilled to be a partner and are proud to champion this vital service."

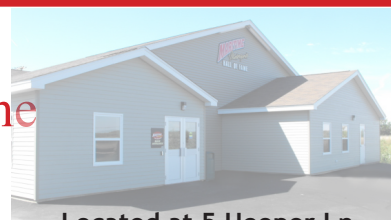
The service is now fully active, providing information and referral services 24 hours a day, everyday.

"Extensive exploratory work had previously been carried out by the Economic and Social Inclusion Corporation to develop and implement 211 in New Brunswick, but the COVID-19 pandemic highlighted the urgency for action," said Fitch. "This project will fill in the gaps identified during the first wave and help equip us to deal with the second wave."

Residences along the route have been asked to participate with some Hallowe'en decorations and or a picture of a black cat, visible from the street for the children to count.

The route would begin at (1) Saint Andrew's Anglican Church, then follow Church Street to the location of the former (2) Primary School, a pause across the street from Fawcetts Rest Home, to the (3) United Church, then past the (4) Funeral Home to the area of the (5) "Bottomless" pond at the corner of Academy and Old Post Road. Then the walk would proceed to the (6) Kodiak Place and Dr Mellish Buildings, with a brief stop across the street from these buildings. Then follow Railway Ave. to Main Street to the (7) Petitcodiac Fire Department parking lot for another short pause. Following a route down Main Street, on the east side next to (8) Veteran's Park with another stop at this location. Working Together to Overcome Poverty

Poverty is not something that can be fixed overnight but it is something we can all work together to minimize the impact and effects of. There are many families and seniors living in poverty in our province. A good number of them live in rural areas where the impact of poverty is increased because of an inability to access resources that are often centralized in cities like hospitals, specialists, government programs and agencies and other essential life needs. Over the years, it has become evident to many that we can have lots of fantastic resources in place to help people but if they cannot get there to access them, they are of no use. Even in urban areas, transportation can be an issue. While there may be buses, for some, they may be physically unable to walk to a bus stop and if they also cannot afford a taxi, they are in the same situation as someone who lives 50km from the city who does not have a vehicle or cannot drive. That is where Urban/Rural rides comes in. We utilize volunteer drivers with their own vehicles to pick up people at their home anywhere in Westmorland and Albert Counties, take them to their appointments and then drop them back at their home when finished.

COVID 19 has brought on new challenges for transportation and safety protocols developed in conjunction with Public Health are in place for each possible phase of restriction. The safety of our volunteers and our clients is top priority. Delivery of food and medications has also been added as a service. There are many who are either self-isolating

or who simply do not feel comfortable going out to the store or pharmacy, but still need help accessing life needs.

WE NEED YOU - Our volunteer base has been greatly diminished as many of our volunteers are unable to assist during this time. Volunteers can live anywhere in Westmorland and Albert Counties including but not limited to - Salisbury, Petitcodiac, Moncton, Riverview, Dieppe, Hillsborough, Alma, Riverside Albert, Memramcook, Dorchester, Sackville, Port Elgin, Cap Pele, Grand Barachois, Shediac and all points in between.

Drivers are reimbursed \$.41/km. Volunteering as a driver is a great way to meet and help neighbors in the community. Drivers are provided with personal protective equipment to use when transporting clients and doing deliveries.

If you or someone you know has a few hours a month or more and want to be part of a team working together to overcome the effects of poverty, please call 215-2100 or email r.r.ruralrides@gmail.com for more information. Drivers need to be over the age of 21, have a valid driver's license, have a reliable automobile, carry \$2 million liability (we will reimburse the extra charge up to \$80 per year), sign an oath of confidentiality, clear a police record check, driver's abstract and provide two references.

Also, we are selling tickets on a quilt. It is an embroidered old fashioned lady, done in black, white and cream and is named Annabelle Gay.

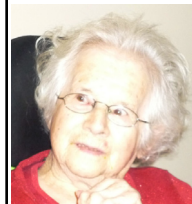

Historical Tid - Bits Back in the Day of Evan Steeves

At the store you took your own container for molasses and vinegar. Margarine was unknown and everyone used butter. Yeast cakes were used instead of the yeast we have today. They were flat, hard and about one third of an inch thick. They were in a box and would keep for some time.

There were blacksmith shops. A blacksmith, besides shoeing horses, made things from iron by heating and pounding into the desired shapes. He could put shoes on sled runners, for instance. Instead of paying a certain tax, the farmers did statute labor; that is, work on the road without pay. Men paid a poll tax. Road graders were hauled by two or three teams. A man stood on the grader and turned iron wheels to tilt the blade. Later they had motors and rubber tires on graders.

Farm families killed a pig for themselves and pickled it in a barrel for winter meat. Turkey was a delicacy. We couldn't afford one for Christmas. We would have our own chickens, hatched at home, and fattened in pens. We had a gramophone and it had to be wound by hand. I remember the old Edison gramophone with cylinder records.

"There was no bathroom in our house. In the spare room, or guest room, there

were a commode and bureau, or dresser. The commode had rungs to hang towels and face cloths, a basin and large pitcher and soap dish. They were made of thick glass, ironstone or porcelain. In the morning before the guests got up, Mother would place a large pitcher of hot water on the floor just outside their bedroom door. A guest did not wash downstairs where we did.

Our cereal was almost always oatmeal. I don't remember tasting corn flakes when I was a child. Medicines on the shelf were Burdock Blood Bitters, Lydia E. Pinkham's Vegetable Compound, Carter's Little Liver Pills, castor oil, castoria, aspirin and somebody's pink pills.

The songs told a story, usually a sad one I remember one my mother played and sang, "Poor Little Joe". I would cry, then ask her to sing it again. I remember the words yet. A poem I remember was "The Little Dog Under the Wagon". It told the story of the farmer and his wife going to the city with their wagon loaded with things to sell. Their dog "Spot" wanted to go but they thought it would be better if it stayed home and kept the cattle out of the corn. The dog went with them but they didn't know it - it sneaked along under the wagon. Coming home, a robber jumped from behind a tree. "Your money or your life!", he threatened. The little dog under the wagon defended them and so they were very glad "Spot" had gone with them!"

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40th Anniversary of around-the-World Garry Sowerby and Ken Langley

CBC films mini-documentary at Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame and Museum

This fall marks the 40th anniversary of the around-the-world drive that Garry Sowerby, of Moncton, New Brunswick, and Ken Langley, of Sydney, Nova Scotia, did in a 1980 Volvo DL Wagon. That drive resulted in a Guinness World Record for Garry and Ken.

Red Cloud, as the Volvo was dubbed, is on display at the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame and Museum.

Garry Sowerby, the only driver on that 43,030-kilometre global trek, thanks to a Guinness one-driver rule, is a 2012 Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame Inductee.

On September 6, 1980, Garry Sowerby, Ken Langley and Red Cloud departed from the base of Toronto's CN Tower and headed west. They returned on November 19, 1980, breaking an existing Guinness World Record for fastest circumnavigation of the world by car.

They took almost a month off the existing

record, driving through 23 countries in 74 days, one hour, and 11 minutes.

Many who have driven past or walked past the Royal Canadian Legion Building on Kay Street in Petiboniac have noticed the beautiful Murals done by Fred Harrison.

A section of the mural depicts a white rectangle with part of the inscription on it saying

"In Remembrance of Holland 5 - 5 - 45. " Very fitting as 2020 is the 75th Anniversary of the end of World War Two. For those of you who have never visited the Museum, this is the story behind that artifact.

A man from Petiboniac, who joined the Army when he was 24 during World War Two, brought this item home with him after the War ended. His time in the army included service in England, North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, Germany and Holland.

For many years he refused to talk about his memories of that time as so many of the Veterans like him did. Only after frequent questions from one of his children did he finally begin to talk about the friendships he had made and being a farmer, about the land, animals and farms he saw. He talked about the death of his British fiancée in a bombing raid in London. He talked about the lifelong friendships he made with

"His Boys", the men who served with him who were in many cases only 3 or 4 years younger than he was, and because he was one of the older ones they called him "Pops".

He served with the Royal Canadian Engineers, serving as a sniper and was

too humble to acknowledge the many "Thank yous" he received over the years from those men he served with. He often said it was his job to protect the boys and he wanted no thanks for doing his duty.

He was among those referred to as the D Day Dodgers, men who were fighting in Italy at the time of the D Day Invasion. After the Allied victory in Italy he was transferred to the fighting in France, after a brief stay in hospital in England for treatment of shrapnel wounds.

As the months passed and the fighting continued, he found himself in Holland. It was during this time that his memories were mostly of the condition of the citizens of that country.

He would recall the house to house fighting that took place, but would always refer to the people that were starving, the men, women and children that had been left with nothing. The people who were eating grass roots, tulip bulbs and anything else they could find in order to survive.

This is the place in the world that he found himself as word of the end of the War started to spread. Many of the men did not believe it possible that all of the horrors they had seen and continued to experience could be over. It was the truth and on May 5th 1945, the War ended.

The rebuilding would begin soon after, and as part of the recovery of Holland, the Canadian and Allied troops worked to bring a country back to life. They

rebuilt bridges, windmills to drain seawater from the land and helped to reopen factories and businesses that had been left, in many cases with explosives set to detonate when the workers returned. It was as a thank you to the men who had given the people of Holland their lives back that some of the first factories started to produce momentos; souvenirs for the men and women who were helping them to become a Nation again.

One of those souvenirs was a rectangular tile with "In Remembrance Of Holland 5-5-45" on it. Many of the Canadian men who received this little tile had no idea what it was to be used for. When they asked they were told that in Holland as well as other European countries tiles like these were placed behind the stoves in homes, fastened on the wall. They would get warm throughout the day and slowly release the heat into the room at night when the fire died down. They could also be used as tiles around fireplaces.

The workers in the factories where the tiles were made saw that the soldiers really did not have a use for them, so production of them was stopped and the tiles were replaced with ashtrays and other souvenir items.

One of the tiles had been given to the soldier who brought it back to Canada; back home. He kept it well protected and it was a very loved reminder for him of the people who he and his "boys" had helped.

The tile he brought back was given to him as a personal thank you from a little girl that he had given some chocolate to. She would become a lifelong friend who travelled from Holland to visit him several times over the years.

In his later years, as illness started to rob him of many of his memories, he would still refer to the little "Dutch" tile around Remembrance Day and wonder if it was still safe and wonder if his friend, the little girl had enough to eat.

75 years later it is on loan to the

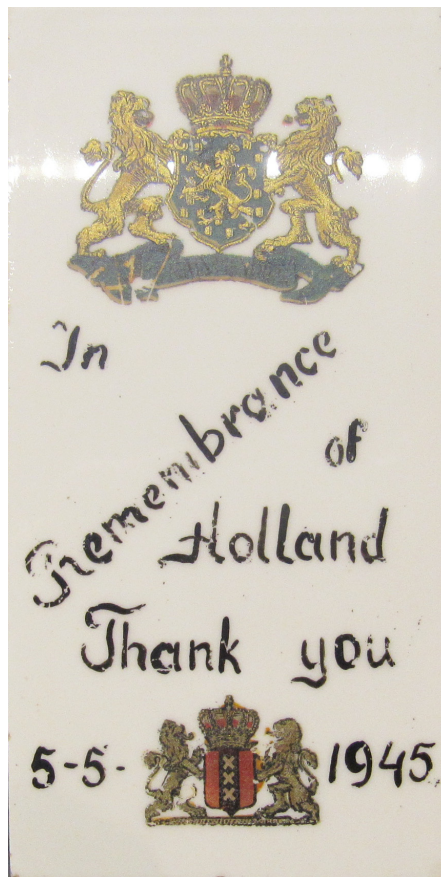
Petitcodiac and Area Community and War Museum and beautifully portrayed on the outside of the Royal Canadian Legion building in Petitcodiac.

Tree Dedication Event Held September 7, 2020

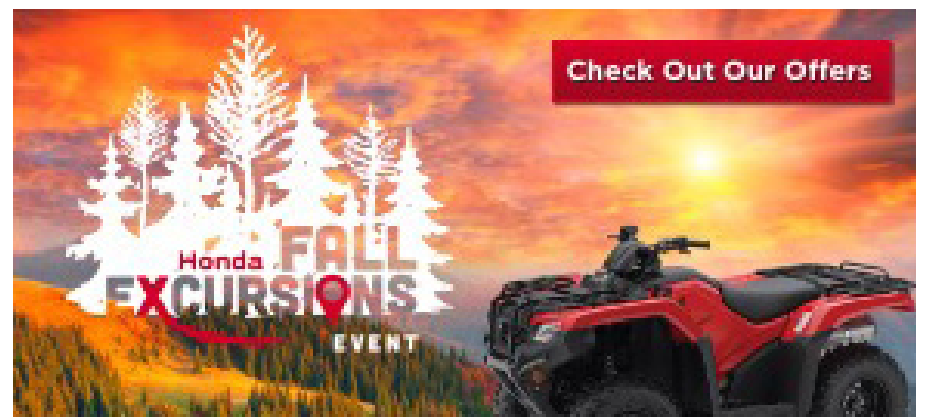

Sitting in the back seat with her head out the window with the breeze blowing on her face. It was always entertaining if an ambulance went by with its siren on. It was one of the few times we would hear her make a sound. The sound of a very loud and long howl.

When Abby could see and was agile, she loved to chase squirrels. When the squirrel ran up the tree, you could see Abby jumping six feet in the air trying to get to it. When she was younger, she enjoyed going for long walks on the beach or in the woods. Taking in the fresh air and just being with her cherished family.

Abby was easy to love, and she returned that love abundantly and unconditionally.

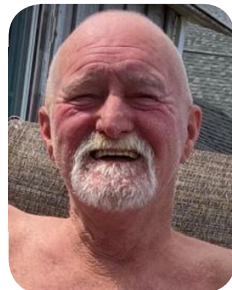

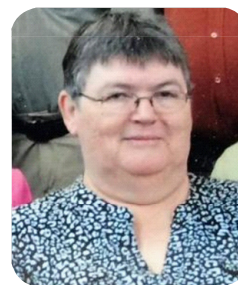

BY-LAW NO. 23 - A BY-LAW TO REGULATE TRAFFIC
