- •1/2 teaspoon salt
- •1 teaspoon vanilla extract Directions

•Place popcorn in a baking pan and keep warm in a 200° oven. Meanwhile, in a large saucepan, stir together the sugar, corn syrup, water, butter and salt. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil

•Continue cooking without stirring until the temperature reaches 270° on a candy thermometer. Remove from the heat. Add vanilla; stir just enough to mix. Slowly pour over the popcorn. Cool just enough to handle. Shape with buttered hands.

#### What Steak Lovers Should Know About **Plant-Based Meats**

We live at a time of growing choices regarding food substitutes. But how good are these new products when compared with the old staples? Think of margarine versus butter. Or more recently plant-based meats versus the real McCoy? Was William Shakespeare right when he wrote, "A substitute shines brightly as a King, until a King be by"?

A report from the Friedman School of Nutrition Science and Policy at Tufts University provides plenty to chew on. Deciding what to do isn't just a personal decision. It also involved implications for our planet.

According to researchers at Tufts, sales of meat alternatives increased 30% in 2018. This increase is expected to continue since plant-based, meatless "meat" has become available at several fast-food outlets. But how good are these products?

Nicole Negowetti, a clinical instructor at the Harvard Animal Law and Policy Clinic, says, "These new plant-based meat products are designed to replicate the taste, texture and chemical composition of meat."

The point is, producers of these new foods are trying to fool us. They want consumers to have the impression they are eating meat, when in fact they are not. As Negowetti says, whether it's meat from a cow, pig, or any other animal, meat is muscle which is essentially protein and some fat. Meatless manufacturers are extracting these proteins and fats from plants and combining them to mimic the characteristics of animal meat.

It sounds simple, but there is more to the story. Nicole Blackstone, assistant professor in the Friedman School's Division of Agriculture, Food and Environment warns, some of these meatless products are so highly processedthat they bear no resemblance to their sourced plant foods. Particularly those produced manufactured on a large scale are often highly processed and include in novel components.

We are providing an

essential service to our communities and we need all the help we can get.

Volunteers can live anywhere in Westmorland and Albert Counties including but not limited to - Salisbury, Petitcodiac, Moncton, Riverview, Dieppe, Hillsborough, Alma, Riverside Albert, Memramcook, Dorchester, Sackville, Port Elgin, Cap Pele, Grand Barachois, Shediac and all points in between.

Drivers are reimbursed \$.41/km. Volunteering as a driver is a great way to meet and help neighbors in the community. Drivers are provided with personal protective equipment to use when transporting clients and doing deliveries.

If you or someone you know has a few hours a month or more and want to be part of a team working together to overcome the effects of poverty, please call 215-2100 or email r.r.ruralrides@ gmail.com for more information. Drivers need to be over the age of 21, have a valid driver's license, have a reliable automobile, carry \$2 million liability (we will reimburse the extra charge up to \$80 per year), sign an oath of confidentiality, clear a police record check, driver's abstract and provide two references.

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# The Petitcodiac History, Mystery and Giggle Walk

The Petitcodiac History, Mystery and Giggle Walk was held Oct. 31st from 1:00 to 3:00 after

being on again off again due to Covid-19 changes.

Due to Covid restrictions this was a self guided "follow the Arrows" walk. It began at St. Andrews Anglican Church, with a History of the 150 year old this year church presented by Rev. Chris Hayes. And this is where the Mystery begins. There was, at one time a small cemetery behind the church in the area of the church hall. One headstone still remains, what happened to the rest?? How many existed?

The walk continued to the location of the former Primary School where Myrna Martin shared an informative and entertaining history of early days of schooling in the community, including an early method of transportation to school for students, riding there on horse back. Thank you Maple Lane Acres/ Nu-Vision Belgians, owned by Reg Wynes, David and Amy Hodgson, and to Duke the Belgianhorse, Westmorland County Agricultural Fair.

Following a friendly wave to the residents of Fawcett's Rest Home the next stop was at Armstrong's Funeral Home, where Randall Pirie presented memories of this business in the community, informing many who did not know that the building at one time was a family home and shared many other items of interest to the groups on the walk.

Next stop was the bottomless pond where Mac Robinson recalled some special memories.

The pond is the location where a team of horses, a hay wagon and later a Model T car were all supposed to have been lost. There was still no sign of them there that day, perhaps they were never there at all.. Or they may still be there

The arrows pointed the way down the street to Kodiak Place and Dr. Mellish

Manor. At this spot Marilyn Pollock informed the walkers of the History and importance of the rail lines in the Elgin, Havelock and Petitcodiac communities showing the types of freight shipped out of and into the areas served by the rail system. Fur pelts, maple products, flowers, Christmas gifts and a church bell were only a few of the items delivered by rail before trucks became the method used. We aren't sure, but most likely her "Broom" may have been shipped in by rail as well.

Main Street was the next destination for the walkers, passing by a brief history of the Petitcodiac Fire Department, showing the former Fire Station located on what was known as the Back Street.

A distinguished looking gentleman, complete with top hat greeted the walkers at Veterans Park, next to a beautiful fall display provided by the Garden Club. Councillor Dan Pollock provided a "That was then", prior to several fires over the years to "This is Now" view of the businesses located along Main Street.

The last stop for the walkers was at the Baptist Church cemetery where a lady who informed the walkers her name was Mrs. Pugsley was looking for her church. Rumour has it, she is actually Leslie Gogan, the wife of our Mayor Gerry Gogan. Mrs. Pugsley informed the walkers of the history of the Baptist Church in the community and of the fact that the church was actually located at one time on the site of the current cemetery.

A bright sunny day, no mosquitos or black flies in evidence, made this a very informative and entertaining trip back in time

Historical Tid - Bits

Back in the Day of Evan Steeves

'EATON'S CATALOGUE - A boon to rural households. Eaton's sale catalogue featured grab boxes for 25 cents. We bought one when we could afford it and were so curious to see what would be in it we couldn't open it fast enough. Sometimes bobby pins were in it. We sent Eaton orders by mail it would take about a week. Remember Eaton's "beauty dolls" and the Eaton cord that was around each parcel? Logs were hauled on sleds on the snow.

Portable mills were set up in convenient places. Logs were streamdriven, too. The train was popular with people to haul cattle, lumber, pulp and fertilizer. I remember the sounds the old trains made and seeing the black smoke belch from the engine. The grunts when the trains started were loud and far apart but as it picked up speed and got further away, they were closer together until out of hearing.

In the winter Dad took the team harness apart and oiled it. He dipped the leather straps in oil and rubbed it in with his hands. The brass was shined with "Brasso". It came in a can. There were celluloid rings of red, white and blue on the harness for color.

House ceilings were murescoed instead of painted. Napkins were of white linen, as were tablecloths, and had to be ironed. There were no paper Men's shirt collars were serviettes. starched and all shirts were ironed. Starching and ironing was quite a major operation after washing

We had a whip-poor-will come some evenings near our house and sing to us over and over again. Wouldn't I love to hear that today! On summer nights when we were children, we would catch lightning bugs or fire-flies down by the river. There were lots of strangers fishing in the river. Speckled trout and lamprey eels were plentiful as were suckers. We went swimming in there. There were two places along the road between Portage and Goshen where driving horses could stop for a drink of water. If the bridle had a check-rein, the driver would get out of the carriage and let the rein down so the horse could reach the water. Some horses would go faster when returning home than when going away from it. The owner would curry his horses and brush them. Most horses liked that. It would be a fitting reward for a good drive."





#### Winter Survival Pandemic Primer for Gardeners

Mark Cullen is an expert gardener, author, broadcaster, tree advocate and Member of the Order of Canada. His son Ben is a fourth-generation urban gardener and graduate of University of Guelph and Dalhousie University in Halifax. Follow them at markcullen. com, @markcullengardening, and on Facebook.

For those of us who have enjoyed months of outdoor activity, the prospect of knee-deep snow and cold temperatures sends shivers down our back.

Which is why we have created the Pandemic Primer for Gardeners. There is much to keep us physically and mentally active. Here are our top recommendations:

1. Be a joiner. Local horticultural clubs are active right now. Recently we spoke at a meeting of the Richmond Hill Horticultural Society. Over 40 people attended, online and it was cool. Ben

hosted a PowerPoint on "Attracting birds to your garden" while Mark provided colour commentary. Lots of questions and even some answers (!)

There is a local garden club or horticultural society near you that would welcome your participation. For a comprehensive list go to http://markcullen.com/gardening-communities/.

2. Be a saver. Look out of your kitchen window and you might see trees hanging with nuts, annuals (snapdragons and calendula for example) and perennial plants heavy with seed heads, brown little packets ready for harvest. It is a tempting proposition, all that free stuff just outside your home. Harvesting seeds, preserving, and propagating them can be as satisfying as it is profitable. The snapdragon that you start from your own seed is seed you do not have to buy. Or a transplant that you do not need to forage for at a garden retailer come spring.

3. Be a dreamer. Nature gives Canadian gardeners the winter off so that we can dream about the next season. We both do this, Ben conjuring imagines food gardening and pollinators while Mark dreams of creating a new one-acre garden this spring as he makes plans to move house. Ben is moving into his

parents' rural 10acre garden while his Mom and Dad "downsize". Not everyone has such adventures to look forward to but all of us, including singles living in small condos can dream. If you are limited in space, be sure to sign up for a local community or allotment garden before they are all spoken for.

4. Be an action

figure. Winter is not a time for docile gardeners. Be proactive and introduce indoor tropical plants into your life. You do not have to name them. It is ok if you do, after all Tom Hanks named a basketball Wilson and befriended it in the movie Cast Away in 2000. There may be days this winter when the social

restrictions of COVID make us feel cast away.

By adding living foliage and flowers to our indoor living space we can get a lift, become more hopeful and feel good. Moisture is added to the air, oxygen is pumped into the atmosphere and the satisfaction of tending and growing can be unmatched. Like having pets that are clean air machines, without the litter box.

For more information, we recommend that you follow our fiend Darryl Cheng, based in Toronto, on his Instagram account @houseplantjournal. He has over 190,000 followers.

5. Be a listener. Podcasts are taking off in the horticultural genre. Which is why we launched The Green File podcast, featuring interviews with special guests like Darryl Cheng and other Canadian gardening greats including Lorraine Johnson, Niki Jabbour and Sean James. We also like the In Defense of Plants podcast for true plant geeks, The Joe Gardener Show and Gardening with the RHS. Our friends Charlie Dobbin and Niki Jabbour also make their gardening radio programs available in podcast

form, which are worth a listen.

6. Be a reader. The most sophisticated form of listening is reading. Choose a magazine from Canada's own including Canada's Local Gardener (https://www. localgardener.net/). Mark's favourite is The Garden, which is included with his membership in The Royal Horticultural Society in the U.K. annual membership is \$110. https://www.rhs.org.uk/join/ We enjoy reading and recommend a long list of books including: (Mark) Big Lonely Doug, the story of the second largest Douglas fir in B.C., Man of The Trees, biography of Richard St. Barbe Baker, the worlds first conservationist. So far this year, Ben has enjoyed Birds Art Life, a memoir about discovering birding in the city of Toronto by Kyo Maclear. We both enjoyed Nature's Best Hope, A new approach to conservation that starts in your yard by Douglas Tallamy.

Indulge your gardening passion this winter and spring will be here before you know it.

# What Steak Lovers Should Know About Plant-Based Meats

For instance, to achieve the colour and meatiness that blood gives to red meat, producers have found a way to grow heme iron in soy plants. This is the type of iron found in meat and an essential element of blood production. So, what about the health risks of this scientific replication? For the moment Blackstone says we don't know the answer.

We do know that beef-mimicking hamburgers are similar in calories and protein and lower in saturated fats. However, many meat alternatives are higher in sodium than regular meat. Higher sodium intake can lead to higher blood pressure, causing hypertension.

There is one major benefit to eating substitute meat. According to the Centers for Disease Control, one in six North Americans develops food poisoning every year from a variety of food products. Unlike regular meat, substitute meats are far less frequently the cause of E. coli or Salmonella infection. In addition, manufacturers do not have to add antibiotics to these products that can trigger superbug antibiotic resistance. Nor do these products contain hormones.

Negowetti says, "The key question is, can

substitute meat products be the tool to help people decrease their intake of real meat? Global red meat consumption is increasing, and factory farming of animals is known to be devastating to animal welfare and environmental sustainability. I am calling for a broader interpretation of 'healthy' to include planetary health."

Different studies and producers report that a typical meatless hamburger uses 75-99% less water and has about a 90% smaller carbon footprint compared to a regular burger. According to a Nielsen survey, 62% of North Americans say they would replace meatbased protein with plant-based protein.

Negowetti claims the bottom line is that people will buy alternative meat products if they are delicious and cheap. This would also benefit out planet.



# Salisbury Christmas Bird Count December 19, 2020

The Salisbury Naturalist Club will again be holding a 2020 ANNUAL CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT (CBC) on DECEMBER 19th which falls within the count period of December 14'th to January 05/21. Individuals or teams are assigned areas to count and record species and numbers seen throughout the day in their predetermined designated area. The results are entered yearly into the "Audubon Christmas Bird Count" data base. By submitting our CBC bird count enables Audubon Researchers, Conservation Biologists and Wildlife Agencies study the long term health and population of birds.

Areas included in the count are Monteagle, Steeves Settlement, Killams Mills, Petitcodiac, The Glades, Middlesex, Colpitts Settlement, Coverdale Road (short distance), Salisbury, Upper Mt. Road, and everything in between.

It looks like Covid 19 will certainly be restricting the day's activities other than each team tabulating their numbers and forwarding them to our compiler Bill Winsorat the end of the day.

For those that might be interested The Salisbury CBC has been taking place for a number of years. The lowest species count was 35 in 2017 and the highest was 41 in 2019. Counts really vary

depending on weather conditions. Open water greatly adds to the possibilities for ducks and gulls counts. An extra special bird was found near Petitcodiac on count day last year, a Northern Hawk Owl. Other notable species found in other years have been Snowy Owl, Rusty Blackbird, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Northern Shrike, Great Blue Heron (Standing on ice in a frozen pond) and the Cardinals are always a treat.

Anticipating this year's favorable weather conditions for count day, Dec.19'th, you may see a slow moving vehicle on your road with those inside using binoculars peering into your yard. They are not spying on you they are checking your bird feeding area for birds or they may have just seen a bird fly into your trimmed hedge and are trying to identify it.

If possible, it sure would be appreciated if those of you with bird feeder stop them up with seed in hopes of attracting lots of visitors for the day's count. If you see a bird of interest please feel free to contact President Lois Budd at 372-4357
