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
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From the Editor




Do you want to go Snowshoeing?

This year, the holidays aren't what they should be. At least the vaccine's roll-out brings anticipation that 2021 will see a return to normal. Until then, what would be our health advice to cooped up readers in this unusual holiday season? Here are a few suggestions:

Say hello. Connecting with extended family by phone is our best option for now. It's a great time to reach out to old friends too. Behavioural scientists at the University of Chicago and UC Berkeley report we underestimate the positive impact of connecting with others for both our own and others' well-being. Their research shows that we tend to abhor a conversation with a perfect stranger until we have it. So when the pandemic subsides, say hello to whomever sits beside you on a park bench.

Try social media. There are important cautions about social media. Health promotion is not always the norm, for instance for children accessing adult content. But having a strong social network is associated with positive mental health and well-being. Harvard researchers have shown that using social media as part of everyday routine and responding to content that others share is positively associated with social well-being, positive mental health, and self-rated health. (We invite you to connect with us on Instagram!)

Visit a museum. University of Melbourne researchers have investigated the experiences, motivations and needs of older museum visitors and found these spaces can play an important role in building social and inter-generational connectedness and in supporting general health. Research by the University of Leicester in the UK shows that museums provide a sense of optimism and hope, self-esteem and resilience, rest and sanctuary, and a safe, rich environment to access arts and culture. If you haven't experienced a virtual exhibit or an online performance during the

pandemic, it's not too late. Give it a try over the holidays.

Read a book. Reading fires up neural pathways. Studies show it improves memory and empathy. Immersing yourself in books helps fight depression, cuts stress, and reduces the risk of developing Alzheimer's.

Share a recipe. Connecting online this holiday to share a recipe or even cook together creates bonds, supports self care, and creates a space for conversation. Even baking tasty treats can boost self-esteem. Donna Pincus, professor of psychological and brain sciences at Boston University, says, "Whether it's painting or it's making music [or baking], there is a stress relief that people get from having some kind of an outlet and a way to express themselves."

Go for a walk in the woods. "Forest bathing" is good for the soul. But even a walk around the block is worthy. Get outside daily.

Try a natural remedy. Read the archive of columns on our website to learn why you should consider natural approaches as your first line of defence against common health problems.

Hug somebody. Within your household this season, we hope you have somebody to hug. Mutually reciprocated embraces relax muscles, increase circulation, and release endorphins in your body that elevate your mood. One study exposed 400 people to the common cold and found that those who reported more hugging in their lives fared better, a tribute to social connectedness.

Be happy. The research is overwhelming: happiness is good for your health. Your heart, immune system, stress response, and pain management all improve in performance when you are happy, and the effects are lasting. So as Doris Day sings, "Stay with the happy people"!

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

It has probably been a long time since you sat under a palm tree or took a whiff of jasmine flowering by the pool. While you may miss dancing on the beach in the moonlight or the swim-up bar, the thing we miss about the tropics are the exotic plants. Besides, neither of us have been to a resort with a swimup bar but do we miss the tropical plants we have come to know on annual family trips to Florida. A highlight of recent years has been the discovery of Marie Selby Botanical Gardens in Sarasota (https://selby.org/). Exotic plants delight while grandchildren or nieces/ nephews play in the expansive children's garden and outdoor tree "fort", which is, in our opinion, the best of its kind in North America.

Leafy foliage plants like fig trees and pothos seem to be most popular for indoor growing this time of year but there are some terrific tropical flowers that flourish indoors. Here are a few of our recommendations:

Hibiscus

Tropical hibiscus (Hibiscus rosa-sinensis) goes by a lot of names - Chinese hibiscus, China Rose, Hawaiian hibiscus and rose

mallow. A variety that we like is 'Ice Dancer' which sounds like a racehorse and features purple-blue flowers that have bloomed reliably in Ben's office window for four years. So far it has not raced anywhere.

Like most tropical plants, the dry air of our homes during winter is one of the biggest challenges for indoor tropicals. A soft mist daily of water benefits most houseplants including hibiscus.

A hibiscus will grow well in indirect sunlight, but it will never bloom. In a south-facing window, it will really impress. No amount of sunlight is too much.

When new growth appears fertilize using a plant food that has a high middle and third number, like 12-28-12. The first number represents nitrogen, which promotes green growth, phosphorous and potassium, the second and third numbers, help to promote roots and flowers.

In March, prune your hibiscus back by about one third. In May, move it outside for some summer love.

Jasmine

Ever wondered what scent hangs over your dreams of tropical vacations? It is likely jasmine flower.

The small-white flowers of a jasmine plant can fill a room with fragrance and can be kept going through the winter with the right conditions. Jasmine prefer a sunny window with good air circulation. They prefer porous growing mediums such as bark or coir and should remain moist but not soggy. Like hibiscus, a high phosphorus fertilizer will encourage more blooms rather than green growth and an early spring pruning will help before you move it to

an outdoor balcony for the summer. Christmas Cactus

The perfect gift at this time of year, a Christmas cactus will happily flower in indirect light where most other tropicals prefer direct sunlight. If properly taken care of, a Christmas cactus will produce pink, red or white blooms at Christmas, Thanksgiving or Easter (depending on variety) for decades. It is often considered an heirloom plant.

Easy to care for. Water only when dry. Pinch back or prune immediately after flowering by up to one-third.

Orchids

If you like variety, there are more than 100,000 hybrids and cultivars of orchids.

Orchids bloom for weeks or months, and with patience, rebloom reliably.

Approximately 70 per cent of orchids offered for sale are epiphytes: they grow on other plants (usually trees) in the tropics and subtropics. We recommend that you repot an overgrown orchid in loose wood mulch or osmunda fiber. They prefer indirect sunlight and high humidity as they thrive in rainforests under tree cover. A bathroom window (humidity) with indirect sunlight is ideal

Water once per week by submerging the loose roots in water overnight and to encourage reblooming, fertilize by applying water-soluble houseplant fertilizer.

With the floral tropics in your living room, you might find yourself wondering in 2021 why you ever bothered with airport security.



CANDIED SWEET POTATOES

2 medium sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into 1-inch slices. Place in sauce pan, cover with water add a bit of salt. Boil until tender. Drain. Combine the potatoes with

2 tablespoons butter

½ cup white sugar

1/4 cup chopped nuts

½ teaspoon cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon ground cloves

1/8 teaspoon nutmeg

2 tablespoons maple syrup

Mix well, pour into baking dish and bake in 375F oven until browned. About 30 minutes. Remove from oven and top with 2-3 cups of mini marshmallows. Continue baking until marshmallows are lightly browned and melted.



Turkey in Buns

Combine:

¾ cup ketchup

1 cup currant jelly

1/4 cup finely chopped onion

2 Tblsp Worcestershire Sauce

1 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon garlic salt

In a heavy saucepan. Simmer about 20 minutes.

Stir in 3 cups of turkey.

Heat. Spoon onto toasted buttered buns.

He won the International in 1966 and 1968.


1969 he moved to Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, to drive stock car for Forbs Chev.-Olds as well as sell cars for them.



Tree bags, tinsel, ornaments, nails, tree skirts, string, stands, etc., must be removed before disposal.

Christmas wreaths will NOT be accepted.

DOG TAGS

Your 2021 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid a late fee.

A \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st.

Registration fees are:

\$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs (this fee increases to \$25 as of April 1st (late fee)); or


\$30.00 if not spayed or neutered (this fee increases to \$45 as of April 1st (late fee)).

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.



He won his share of races and Mid-Seasons, etc. He raced River Glade Speedway, McEwen's Raceway, for years. He also raced Danny's Speedbowl (Bathurst), Yarmouth Speedway NS, and Shediac Speedway NB. It was rare to build Ford stock cars as the motors cost more to build... but never blew up as much as the high winding Chevs. His first cars were 55 and 56 Fords until sponsorship from Casey Ford, they supplied him with the Mustangs.

Raymond C. Bastille 'Ray' -

Moncton, NB

Being inducted as a Competitor Sports Car. Ray started Autocross in 1988. His contribution to motorsports includes Recreational, Road Challenge, Rally, Sports Car; he has worked as a team and as an official. His accomplishments include National Class Champion B Stock Autocross National Class Champion D Autocross; Overall Regional Champion multiple times; Autocross Regional Class Champion multiple times, Multiple Classes Autocross; Past President Moncton Motor Sports Club; Multiple Terms as Regional Solo Director; and Organizer Slalom at Slalom since 1995 (25 years).

Robert B. Guthrie 'Bob' (deceased) - Fredericton, NB

Being inducted as a Competitor/ Motorsports Builder Sports Car. Robert lived much of his adult life in Fredericton. New Brunswick. In 1993 he began racing in the very competitive Street Stock. 1995 10 years award of dedication to racing at Raceway Park. 1999 2nd place points Street Stock, Oyster Bed Speedway. 2011 Most Sportsman driver, and Myrna O'Connor Award (given to who adds spirit and enthusiasm to the sport. 2012, 2013 third-place point Street Stock Oyster Bed Speedway.

Kris Fournier - Charlottetown, PE Being inducted as a Competitor/Builder Stock Car. Kris's racing story began in

He raced in the Mini Stock division at East River Speedway for several years. then moved to the Street Stock Division at Oyster Bed Speedway. He loved everything about the sport - the thrill of racing - the action, the competition, and the excitement of the track. In 1998 Kris made the move to the Modified Division there he competed until 2004. He then moved up to the Maritime Pro Stock Tour where he raced for 4 years. He changed back to the Late Model. In 2013 he was a Late Model Champion and in 2014 placed 2nd. In 2015 Kris retired. His accomplishments are many, including 1987, 1994, 1997, 2014 - Most Sportsman Like Driver; 2002, 2003 -Most Dedicated Drive Modified Class; 2010 - Winner Pro Stock Super Series; 2013 - Late Model Division Champion; 2013 - Best Appearing Car Late Model Class; 2014 - 2nd Place Championship Late Model Class; All of these awards

1987 was at East River Speedway.

Allan MacPhail / David Peters -Cornwall, PE

They raced together for nearly 30 years, so are being inducted together They began in the early seventies on the clay at Charlottetown Speedway in Sleepy Hollow, with cars that were stock or at least a combination of stock parts. Allan was the driver that wanted to win races and championships. David wore many hats; he was a car builder, pit crew, crew chief, fabricator, and builder of the sport. David was always looking for a way to go a little faster. Their combination worked, winning multiple championships at different tracks, under different conditions, with cars that were constantly becoming more advanced. Winning races and championships continued into the late '70s. At Freetown Speedway David took it upon himself, to build a fence to keep the fans a safe distance from the action. They convinced the owners of the drag strip, Raceway Park, to build a stock car track, a 1/4 mile dirt oval that opened in 1985. In 1986 East River Speedway opened and they won the championship at both tracks. Even the way they got to the track changed over the years, from flat tow to the back of a dump truck and car trailers.

Prince Edward Island Antique Car <u>Club (PEIACC)</u> - Kensington, PE

Being inducted for their Motorsports contribution: Collector, Promoter, Preservation. and Restoration of antique cars of 30 years and older. The Prince Edward Island Car Club was formed in 1964. The preservation and enjoyment of vehicles thirty years and older is its main purpose. The province's redesigned antique auto license plate commemorates Canada's first automobile, owned by "Father Georges-Antoine Belcourt, a pioneering priest in the Rustico area. Prince Edward Island in 1866.

Nova Scotia

Dwight Giddens - Bible Hill, NS Being inducted as Motorsports Builder. In 1973, at the age of 17, he became interested in stock car racing. In 1974 he became Rick Upham's engine builder. In 1982 Dwight gave up his day job and went full time at his shop that he called R&D Performancenter. Dwight began making contacts by phone with nearly every performance supplier in North America that included such industry people as Ray Baker of Baker Engineered Racing Engines; World Products/Dart Racing Heads and Vic Edelbrock of Edelbrock Performance. In 1985 R&D Performancenter purchased Hub City Performance in Truro. Dwight developed

were at Oyster Bed Speedway except an "Inventory Number Sequencing" system and convinced Hoosier Tire to manufacture their tires for MASCAR using this system. Hoosier Tire used that system throughout North America. The system led to the bar code system that is the industry standard today. In 2004, R&D Performancenter became the Legends Cars dealer for the Maritimes. Dwight served as President for the Maritime League Of Legends from 2008 to 2013. R&D Performancenter was sold in 2006, but Dwight remains the inventory control manager.

> Glen Walker - Lower Sackville, NS Being inducted as Competitor, Drag Racing. Glen started his love affair with motorsports in the mid-1960s. As an accomplished drag racer, Glen has dozens of event wins to his credit throughout the drag strips in NS. Glen was a founding member of the Halifaxbased Intruders Car Club and in the mid-'70s he worked with Bruce Robertson to bring top-caliber car shows to the Maritimes. He was an International Show Car Association (ISCA) member and judge from 1976-95, Glen was instrumental in bringing monster trucks to the Maritimes. Glen sponsored Greg Sewart's racing for years. As his friend Jerry 'Jer Bear' Lawrence (Class of 2007) comments "Glen is one of the good guys who has helped build motorsports in NS, NB, and PEI.

Russell White / Bobby White -Kennetcook, NS

Being inducted as a Builder/ Competitor, Stock Car Racing. Russell White and family was the backbone of the hotbed of Late Model racing that came from Kennetcook in the years of the 60s through the 80s. Russell White bought Onslow Speedway in 1978. Russell's support to the local racing community was unwavering. Russell's son Bobby started racing in 1977 at the age of 18 in the Mini class at Atlantic Speedway and won the Points Championship. The next year he moved up to Late Model and in 1980 he won the points championship at Onslow. In only his third year behind the wheel of a stock car, he made guite an impression not only in NS, NB but also in Cayuga, Delaware, and Flamboro in Ontario. He was a regular winner in MASCAR. Bobby stopped racing fulltime due to back problems but ran some special events over the years. He was always a fan favorite.
