Work diligently to maintain our present tax rate and the Level of Service the Village of Petitcodiac is known for.

Work towards revitalizing the Downtown business Association. I will begin

Five Race Tracks come Together To Form Maritime Street Stock Series

Street Stock teams in the Maritimes will have a little more to race for in their big events in 2021. The five paved oval race tracks between New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island have entered into an agreement to form the Maritime Street Stock Series. The Series will combine five major 100-lap Street Stock races, one at each track, to ultimately crown a region champion for the popular division.

All aspects of each event will be overseen by their respective race track with championship points being tallied. A point fund has been established between the five tracks involved with the top five in points receiving bonus money on top of any single event purses from the races. The Maritime Street Stock Series champion will receive \$1500, second place will take home \$1000, third place in points will earn \$500, fourth place will pocket \$400 and fifth will earn \$350. In total, the top five championship point purse for the Maritime Street Stock Series is worth \$3,750 on top of any individual race payouts. Any additional prizes and marketing partner announcements for the Series will be announced as they become available.

The Series will begin on Prince Edward Island at Oyster Bed Speedway. The 100-lap opener will take place on Saturday, June 12th at 6pm. Oyster Bed Speedway in Oyster Bed Bridge, Prince Edward Island, is the only paved oval in the Province and has been the stage for various major Street Stock races in the past including the David Lambe Memorial/Piston Cup and the Maritime Street Stock Showdown.

Two weeks later, the Street Stock spotlight will head across the Confederation Bridge to Shediac's CENTRE For Speed for a 100-lap feature on Saturday, June 26th at 6:30pm. Home

to the Atlantic Stock Car Championships in October, the 3/8-mile oval is a favorite amongst competitors for its sweeping corners and high speeds. The facility is located in the shadow of the Lobster Capital of the World in Grand-Barachois, New Brunswick.

Teams will have a chance to catch a breath in July before two major events open the month of August. Petty International Raceway plays host to the third race in the Series, the \$5K Stuff Your Stuff Storage Street Stock 100. The high banked bullring just west of Moncton in River Glade, New Brunswick, has been a battleground for some major Street Stock battles in recent years and the Saturday, August 7th event is expected to be one of its biggest in recent years. As previously announced, the winner of the \$5K Stuff Your Stuff Storage Street Stock 100 will receive \$5,000.

From there, the Series will travel just over an hour up the Trans Canada Highway to Speedway 660 on Saturday, August 14th. The Urquhart Construction 100 enters its second year as a mid-Summer event and was won in 2020 by the late Chris Hanley (St. Stephen, NB). The track is located just a short drive from New Brunswick's capital city of Fredericton in Geary.

The Series finale will take place on Saturday, October 2nd with The Very Best Fall Shootout at Speedway Miramichi. The historic oval located in Canada's Irish Capital of Miramichi, New Brunswick, has been a favorite of both fans and drivers alike near the end of the season. The 100-lap feature was won by Logan Power (Riverview, NB) in 2020.

The Maritime Street Stock Series is a continued effort between Petty Raceway, Speedway 660, Speedway Miramichi, Oyster Bed Speedway and the CENTRE For Speed to work together

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Thank you to everyone that bought meals from the Petitcodiac Historical and Cultural Society and Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame. We had a sell out. Thank you for your patience as this has been the first one we have done in over a year.

time and built more bird houses. With so much forest being lost, it becomes more and more important to add nest boxes for cavity nesting birds. Most cavities for nesting are found in old and large trees. Much of mixed and old growth forest, where trees come to maturity, is becoming rare. Mature forests are an important part of diversity. In the past years I've placed several nest boxes on our property. It is important to have the nest box openings facing north east if possible. This offers some protection against stormy weather. The early morning sun will warm the birdhouse. Birds do inspect their new found house. It has to be the right size for their brood. Birds will not occupy a dirty soiled birdhouse. The birds will simply avoid it. It is a joy to watch birds coming in the spring looking for available places, to build their nests and raise their young. As soon as the decision of residence has been made, the work starts. Constant flying back and forth from the box, by male and female bird, to build the nest. With some bird species it is the male that is responsible for the nest building. It is than inspected by the female. If rejected the male will try again, until his mate approves the dwelling. All kinds of building material is used. You will find hair, feathers, old dry grass, moss and other material weaved into the nest. Eventually a beautiful soft bed has been created. In that special place the female bird will lay her eggs. Only after some precarious mating on a wire or in a tree. Nature makes sure this cycle continues in perpetuity. Rain or shine, nothing will stop these birds from trying to put another nest of young birds into the sky. After the eggs are laid, in a time frame of a couple days or a week, the birds will sit on the eggs for the needed incubation period. Most bird parents share the duty of sitting on

During the winter months I took the the eggs. It might be either night or day duty. Or it can be an hourly exchange of sitting on the eggs. The type of bird species will be the determining factor of the incubation period of the eggs. Most small backyard birds or song birds take about ten days to two weeks of incubation. It will take about the same amount of time for the hatchlings to fledge. It might be good to know that in the last half century North America has lost 3 billion birds. The biggest factor is habitat loss and pesticide use. This alone is a reason to help the birds that are left. I am very curious how many of my birdhouses will have occupants this spring.

Weather permitting:

On April 3rd, at 2 pm. we will have an Elgin Eco Association event in the Mapleton Nature Preserve. We will hang at least 10 birdhouses in various areas. We invite interested families to come and be part of this event. Bring a cordless drill and square drill bit.

Mapleton Acadian Nature Preserve update. To all people interested in birds, you might find this information very interesting. It also shows what an amazing feat it is for birds to come back every year to our preserve to nest. Last year the researchers were able to deploy a blackpoll warbler with a radio tag. The latest data from last year showed the bird had made it to Delaware. It showed the flight path all along the coast. This bird was not yet at its destination because they overwinter in South America. We hope more data will be submitted to keep everybody up to date. The blackpoll warbler weighs less than half an ounce. It makes the longest over water journey of any songbird. Nearly 1800 miles non stop over the Atlantic Ocean to its wintering grounds.

"Beeting" Yourself to Increase Good Health

Common Sense Health - W. Gifford-Jones, MD and Diana Gifford-Jones

Would you like to improve your physical endurance? An exercise routine is the answer. Being physically and mentally



active leads to a longer life. But diet can help too. You can start "beeting" yourself to improved health simply by adding beets to your menu. You should also know that nitrates in beets can treat more than one medical problem. Atherosclerosis, thickening of the inside lining of arteries, decreases the flow of oxygenated blood to coronary arteries. This results in anginal pain or heart attack.

For years researchers have known that nitroglycerine eases angina. But they had no idea why it dilated coronary arteries and increased blood flow to the heart.

Then, three U.S researchers received the Nobel Prize for proving it was nitric oxide (N0) that caused arteries to dilate. Early in life the inner lining of arteries processes large amounts of NO. But as we age the amount of NO decreases, often with disastrous consequences.

In 2009, a research team at the University of Exeter in England reported a surprising discovery. They showed that athletes who drank beet juice for six

days improved their physical endurance by 16 percent while cycling. Equally amazing, beet juice was even more effective than physical training!

The active ingredient in beets is nitrate. This becomes converted into nitrite and finally to nitric oxide which is continuously synthesized in the endothelium (the inside lining of arteries). Lay this exceedingly thin layer of endothelial cells on a flat surface and they would occupy an entire soccer field!

Nitric oxide has been labelled the "miracle molecule" as it helps so many diverse medical problems. For instance, since it dilates coronary arteries it can help to decrease the pain of angina and lower blood pressure.

Experiments show that NO also adds lubrication to the circulatory system. After all, it impossible to eat beets and direct them only to coronary arteries. Rather, NO travels to all organs and in the process prevents blood platelets, part of the clotting process, from stick together causing a heart attack. It also decreases chronic inflammation, another factor associated with coronary attack.

Other research shows that NO lowers blood cholesterol, triglycerides, increases good cholesterol and lowers bad cholesterol. It also prevents bone destruction by osteoclasts.

Today, millions of North Americans suffer from asthma due to inflamed, constricted, mucous clogged airways. Part of the problem is pollution and allergies. Experts at Hammersmith

From the Desk of Your MLA

At last writing we were hoping the groundhog predictions of an early spring would hold true. Since then, we saw March come in like a lion, leaving it no choice but to depart like a lamb. A month ago, we were facing the uncertainty of March break and the possibility of a COVID outbreak after. Mercifully, the worst did not occur.

On March 8th our province returned to the yellow phase of COVID precautions. This has allowed the elected members of our legislature to gather and continue with the governing of New Brunswick.

On March 16th our Finance Minister Ernie Steeves delivered the Budget speech, outlining the New Brunswick government's next fiscal year.

The budget comes at a time when the COVID vaccination program is getting underway and we all look ahead to life more resembling normal later this year.

An examination of the budget with an eye to our communities we find resources being directed toward safer communities and reducing the illegal drug supply; toward addressing gaps in the broadband network and to continue the evolution of information security systems.

Health care delivery and the growing demand for addiction and mental health services all receive needed attention in the budget. It may be years before we understand the impact on COVID on the mental and physical health on New Brunswickers.

In the budget, we find support for the Bounce Back Program to help support adults and youth 15+ manage low mood, mild to moderate depression, anxiety, stress, or worry; and resources to support recommendations from the Psychologists' Resource Strategy to help address critical shortages in the mental health services sector, particularly in the public sector, including shortages of psychologists in schools, within community mental health teams, and in hospitals.

The budget targets more nurse practitioners and initiatives to connect more New Brunswickers with a family doctor.

This year's budget included a raise for home support workers, community residence workers, special care home workers, and family support workers.

The 'Staycation' program will continue for the 2021 tourism season, hopefully giving a boost to our tourism operators.

The budget invested through the Healthy Forests Partnership to proactively protect forests from the impact of the spruce budworm.



What spring season was more anticipated than this one? Perhaps in 1919, during the last pandemic, when people were sequestered in their homes for the winter. Sound familiar?

It has likely been over a hundred years since we last approached the season of renewal, spring, with such enthusiasm. Thus, our opportunity to squeeze much more gardening from the month of April than you likely realize. By "squeeze" we mean enjoy, well before what has traditionally been the start of the gardening season in May.

Sow and Grow

Start vegetable and flowers seeds indoors now. Just about all the seeds that you bought a month ago, when we urged you to acquire your supply early due to unprecedented demand (you did that, right? If not, make that job #1 now), can be sown now. Frost tender flowers like marigolds, alyssum, zinnias, cosmos and a host more should be started in the next couple of weeks either under grow lights or in a sunny window. Same with tubers of dahlias and tuberous begonias.

Mark Cullen is an There are many opportunities to sow crops directly in your garden. Onions by seed and bulb, carrots, beets, kale, radishes, Swiss chard and peas can be sown now. Prepare the soil by turning it with a garden fork or spade once, bang His son Ben is a fourth-generation urban the clumps out of it and add lots of compost. For root crops, add generous quantities of sharp (sand box) sand at least 30 cm deep to open the soil up and improve drainage.

> Wait a few more weeks for flowers that are cold hardy, as we do expect frost for the next 6 to 9 weeks. Sow calendula (pot marigold), dusty miller and alyssum outdoors any time from April 15 onwards.

> Plant. While we wait in great anticipation of the Japanese Cherry blossom show in High Park, with fingers crossed that we will be allowed to access this magnificent display this year, we remind you that all woody, winter hardy plants are good to go for April planting.

> If the plant is dormant and leafless when you buy it you know that it is in its natural state, versus forced in a greenhouse. It is important to know the difference. A plant that is in full leaf is soft and susceptible to frost damage. A dormant tree, shrub or rose plant is naturally protected from temperatures below 0 Celsius. It might not be as attractive, but it will transplant more easily.

> Perennial divisions from your own garden or that of a friend or neighbour, can be planted now. Again, if you are

On the Road to Emmaus

We noticed the roses first - planted and



tended with serious gardening expertise (I don't believe I've ever seen such an abundance of flora as in Jerusalem), but what caught my eye and wrenched at my heart was the old olive tree in



the middle of the garden, the Garden of Gethsemane. What's left of the olive trees leaves much to be desired, but "yes" they do live for thousands of years. My imagination ran wild as I recalled the drama and heartache of that long ago night. One man, on death row, abandoned by all who called Him friend - crying alone under the olive trees.

We had arrived at our destination, mercifully after the Easter crowds had disbanded and flown homeward to their varying destinations. Our way was clear, our paths uncluttered by the tourist hoards, and we could linger and ponder while we once again listened to those old familiar narratives from the gospels, as our leader "John" shared the story of the ressurection, giving it more meaning and clarity than ever before. We stood beside the ulgy rock face Golgotha (The Place of the Skull), grotesque now, distorted after centuries of wars, earthquakes and erosion. Lilies waved along the path and roses spread their scent round the queue of pilgrims each awaiting his or her turn to step into the cavern where for two thousand years bodies have been laid to rest, embalmed with spices, sweet smelling herbs and tenderly wept over - the sepulcher of the Arimathea family, whose tomb was lent by Joseph for the Messiah. I wonder if Joseph really knew in his heart that Jesus would only need it for a couple of nights. I believe he did! Because you either believe or you don't.

Inside were three cots hewn from stone, and outside the believers waited to pay hommage. As I stepped back out into the bright sunlight I imagined the angel's voice: "He is not here - He is risen".

As our little group congregated to board the bus we pondered our destination. "Would the 'Emmmaus' road be crowded with tourists?" Approaching the remnants of the past we found ourselves the only group destined on that day to walk the ancient road. As our feet touched the old, well-imbedded stones, we passed foundations of what was once ancient buildings of a long, long ago thriving community. We felt as though time had wizzed by like the fast-forwarding of a movie-reel and after wars, earthquakes and centuries there was nothing left. Or was there?

As we neared the edge of "the town that once was" we realized that just over the hillside grapes grew in abundance and "life" was in them, maybe as it was on that morning so long ago when lilies bloomed and my Master walked "barefoot perhaps" along that remnant of Roman occupation who little knew they had paved the way for the "King of Kings".



Yes, You Can Garden Now

shopping for perennials and they have soft green foliage or flowers, it is best not to plant them yet as the new growth is frost tender. But a dormant hosta or rhubarb root is safe. This is the perfect time of year to move most herbaceous perennials around your yard or divide the mature ones and give away the divisions.

Prune fruit trees. Apples, peaches, plums, cherries: most fruit trees respond best to an early spring pruning. Open up the crown of a maturing fruit tree by removing the tangle of branches in the middle and allow the sun and wind to filter through the crown of the tree. This will maximize the fruit bearing potential. The fruit that you harvest will be larger, on average, with pruning. Most hobby gardeners are too shy about pruning fruit trees.

As a rule of thumb, we remove up to one third of the growth, concentrating on the upright growing water sprouts and the criss-crossing branches in the interior of the tree. A great website for more information about fruit trees is https://orchardpeople.com/.

Perennial food plants. Asparagus,

grapes, raspberries, strawberries, and the like, are best planted in April, while they are dormant. Buy strawberry plants as one year old roots and plant in compost-rich soil about 30 cm apart. Raspberries are usually sold as rooted cuttings, about 30 cm high. Plant them out about 50 cm apart.

It is early April. You can grow now.

Anglophone Rights Association of New Brunswick

It appears there are some MLA's within our Legislative Assembly that are ill informed as to what the Anglophone Rights Association (ARANB) is and what they advocate for. This is surprising given the availability of media and online resources. With the very important upcoming Official Languages Act (OLA) Review, we want things to be clear with you the public, as well as the Government.

Anyone who perpetuates the notion ARANB is opposed to bilingualism is attempting to avoid meaningful dialogue that may lead to a fair and equitable resolution of the language issues.

To achieve harmony and ensure fairness for both the Anglophone and Francophone communities in New Brunswick, implementation of the OLA needs to be addressed and Act amended.

These amendments must ensure fair and equitable participation in the public service for both Anglophones and Francophones in New Brunswick.

We need to establish and put in place a fair and reasonable language proficiency level expectation for employment, as well as, update language testing processes and procedures to bring the grade 12 intermediate proficiency level requirement, in line with the employment proficiency levels required

by civil/public service.

According to Statistics Canada 2019, in the Anglophone School system, grade 12 proficiency testing, only 1616 of 5873 students took the French language proficiency test. Only 420 obtained a level of Intermediate (2) or higher. NB government dictates an Intermediate plus (2+) level for employment.

So, 291 students reached an employment qualifying level. At best, only 7% of all grade 12 students in 2019 achieved an employable level.

It is noteworthy that even those who obtained an employable level will be retested upon application of any bilingual position.

Any applicants not having levels required and are applying for public service work now and those already in the civil service currently are impeded in either getting hired or getting a promotion.

Statistics Canada in 2016 has indicated, only 16 % of Anglophones in New Brunswick are bilingual. Leaving very few Anglophones with the opportunity to get public service employment.

The government needs to initiate and facilitate meaningful discussions with Anglophones and Francophones that will lead to resolutions of the divisive issues to create a better balance and future for all New Brunswick. This is what the OLA review is about. Good to

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



VILLAGE OF SALISBURY SEWER BILLS - END OF INTEREST-FREE PERIOD

The sewer rate for 2021 in the Village of Salisbury is \$305.00 per unit, unchanged from 2020.

Interest working out to 2% per month is added to all overdue sewer accounts, calculated from the billing date in January. The first application of this interest took place in March and will continue on a monthly basis for the rest of the year.

Meantime, Salisbury By-Law 45, Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System, allows for disconnection of services on overdue accounts. The full by-law can be found on our website, www.salisburynb.ca. Arrangements for overdue account payment plans must be made.

2021 SALISBURY DOG TAGS - LATE FEE IN EFFECT AS OF APRIL 1

As of April 1st, late fees will be in effect for 2021 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags. Factoring in this \$15 increase, registration fees as of April 1st will be:

\$25.00 for spayed or neutered dogs; or

\$45.00 if not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag, you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

* NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT. *

As of April 1st, tags will only be available at the Village Office, 56 Douglas Street.

Meantime, New Brunswick SPCA is assuming the 2021 Animal Control duties for the Village of Salisbury. Please direct any dog-related complaints or inquiries to NB SPCA at 1-877-722-1522.

OPEN FIRES PROHIBITED

A reminder that the lighting of ANY open fire to dispose of dry grass, brush, hay, straw, leaves, buildings, construction materials, automobiles or garbage in the municipality is **PROHIBITED**. Any fires must be in approved appliances only (see Salisbury Fire By-Law (By-Law No. 48) to be extinguished and are authorized to issue tickets as they may deem necessary to enforce this By-Law. By-Law No. 48 can be read in its entirety at www.salisburynb.ca (under the tab Inside Your Village Office (By-Laws)). This Fire By-Law also follows the direction of Provincial burning advisories/bans.
