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Even the Horses like to go to Sugar Camps when Maple Sap Runs

Printed in the telegraph Journal, Saint John, Monday, April 25, 1938

A hole in the ceiling, just above the stove, had been boarded over. Charles Stewart said Arnold Stewart used to flip flapjacks through it. The flapjacks would disappear through the hole and then come floating down again and land on the griddle as neat as anything.

Arnold Stewart poured more buckwheat and buttermilk batter on the griddle and said the real reason the hole had been there was that the sugar hands were lazy. Cold morning they would lie in their bunks on the second floor of the two-storey camp while he cooked breakfast - flapjacks, of course - and he would toss the flapjacks through the hole and they would reach out and catch them.

"They got so they wanted breakfast in bed all the time." He said, "so decided to board the hole over and put a stop to it."

Arnold, whose flapjacks are a work of art, scooped another of them off the griddle and onto the steaming golden mound on the platter, and he shook around the sizzling pork chops in the frying pan.

"Okay, folks, come and get it," he called. And those were the last words anybody spoke for a long time. Nobody could talk and do justice to buckwheat flapjacks and pork chops and maple syrup still warm from the evaporator, and buttermilk so cold it had little splinters of ice in it. All you could do was eat - and eat and eat.

And when you thought you were all through eating and had settled back with your belt let out a couple of notches, you found out you had just started. There was still the dessert to come - the white smooth maple cream and the yellow maple candy.

Typical of many

Such is hospitality at a typical New Brunswick sugar camp - at one of dozens of camps where men and just now concluding operations for the season

The camp we visited - this was a short time ago when sapping activity was at its peak - was that of William A. Stewart on Gowland's Mountain in Albert county, a few miles from the village of Elgin. The road up the mountain still lay under deep snow. Arnold and Charles - William Stewart's sons - hitched a double team to a sleigh and produced enough blankets to outfit an army and the horses, faced with that stiff climb, seemed actually pleased about it.

They were like bird dogs about to be taken out hunting. We found out the reason afterwards. Going up the hill you could see, here and there, white clouds of steam curling up over the woods. "Sugar camps," Arnold explained. "They're boiling off."

When you got to the brow of the hill you hauled half a dozen blankets around you - the wind up there would make a Eskimo shiver - and then the horses, "Queen" and "Bess," picked their way in along a woodland trail and all the trees on either side were maples and on each maple a clean, covered bucket was suspended from a metal spike.

"How many trees do you tap?" Charles answered the question. Tap 100,000 trees.

"Somewhere around 3,300," he said. "There are about 100,000 trees tapped in Albert County and 60,000 just in this Elgin district. They give an average of a pound of sugar each."

On this basis about 40 tons of maple sugar, the best of it is called maple cream because of its whiteness and its smoothness of texture, is shipped from Elgin each year. It has a market value of from \$300 to \$600 a ton. Thus is brings to that rural community in the spring, at a time when things are slack on the farms and ready cash for seed and fertilizer comes in handy, more than \$20,000.

That makes it a valuable industry and one which other sections were there are maple ridges are rapidly taking up. There has been a definite expansion in the maple products business.

"We can sell all we turn out," said Charles.

"Where do you sell it?"

Orders From California

"All over. We had 10 orders all the way from Los Angeles last year. There's the camp ahead."

The camp, a wooden structure, was

divided into two sections - bunkhouse and sugary. As you approached, the mouth-watering aroma of maple drifted over the frosty air.

William Stewart was waiting there and 12-year-old John Stewart, and Harry Smith, the hired man, and they gave you an old-fashioned welcome and took you in by the fire to get warm. In other camps through the districts other sugar crews were welcoming other visitors, because it was Sunday and there is an old Albert County custom of keeping open house at sugar camps on Sundays. Take Salt Herring

People flock to them from all over and some even take salt herring with them. The legend goes that you can eat maple sugar until you feel you can't take another bit, and then chew a chunk of salt herring and begin all over again on the sugar. We're going to try it next time we visit Mr. Stewart, whose fame as a maker of maple cream is more than warranted.

Let's watch him boil a batch. The syrup - the sap has already been evaporated to syrup in the shiny metal evaporator trays - is in a large square tank on top of a flat furnace affair. Mr. Stewart stands over it, never taking his eyes off it once it has started to boil.

ALMA, NB, April 19 2021 - Fundy National Park and Kouchibouguac National Park will begin accepting reservations for the 2021 visitor season on Thursday, April 22nd at 8 a.m. (ADT).

Visitors can book their stay by visiting the Parks Canada website at reservation. pc.gc.ca or by calling 1-877-RESERVE (1-877-737-3783). A reservation is required prior to travelling to both national parks.

Visitors are encouraged to familiarize themselves with the reservation system in advance of the launch date. Reservations could fill up quickly and due to heightened demand, visitors are encouraged to be flexible, consider visiting during the week rather than weekends or visiting during shoulder seasons.



Other news to report. A few local citizens have placed ten bluebird houses in the nature preserve on April 3rd.

It was a gorgeous day and much enjoyed. We are looking forward to seeing how many of the houses will be occupied



We don't always see everything that happens when the earth wakes up in the spring. Most of the time we pay little attention to it. We feel the sun shines more, the temperature is slowly increasing. Snow is melting. With spring coming we feel a lift in our life. Something is happening. Things feel lighter and brighter. This same feeling is felt by all creatures in spring. The earth is waking up, after being dormant for months. Even during the cold winter months nature is at work. Mother bear hidden in a den gave birth to her cubs. The cubs are usually born mid January early February. Mother bear can give birth to one or even four cubs. When the snow melts and the temperature rises she will emerge from her den with her cubs. Since birth the cubs have been drinking mothers milk. Still tiny when they emerge from the den, life will be harder. So much to learn and the constant pressure of finding food. In March and April crows start building their nests. The nest building is done by both the male and female but they can also receive help from the young of the previous year. It seem to function as a mentor program. Crows do not breed until they are at least two years old or even older. It is a great benefit if you have some experience building a nest. Mother knows best. Surprising maybe is to know that owls already have layed their eggs during the month of January and February. Owls are birds that need large and old trees. The owlets stay six to eight weeks in the nest. They leave without knowing how to fly. If you encounter an owlet on the ground in the woods in the spring, it means they just fledged. They are learning how to use their legs. They will hide in shrubs and low bushes. During January and March we will hear more coyote calls.

Because it is mating season. Birds will return to their breeding grounds from overwintering down south. Slowly we humans will notice the signs that spring is coming. The trees start to bud, flowers, like crocuses, pop out of the ground. chipmunks hibernate in burrows three feet underground. Chipmunks work all summer to fill the burrow with food for winter. You won't see them until the ground is free of snow.

We know during warm days in early spring we might see honey bees flying around their home. The bumblebee queen is underground. All the bumblebees died in the fall, the queen bumblebee will hibernate and wait till spring to start a new colony. The full moon in March is called the worm moon. Around this time of year the worms will start coming out of the ground. Animals forage on the forest floor. For animals and insects it is detrimental to their survival. In early spring the first greens emerge. Every single species needs the green ground cover of the forest floor. Without these new greens, it means starvation. Our culture, trying to control everything that lives and grows, makes this type of foraging extremely hard for those species that are depending on it. Habitat loss has dire consequences. Instead of being controlled and managed, the forest needs our protection. As first nations people so correctly acknowledge, all our relations. When we are privileged to walk through a mostly undisturbed forest landscape, you realize life is, about all our relations.

I can attest from my time as Agriculture Minister, our food and beverage sectors have plenty of room to continue growing in new and differing ways.





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"No Mow May"

This May, environmental group, the Petitcodiac Watershed Alliance (PWA) is sharing a campaign to help pollinators and manage storm water management with communities in the Petitcodiac River watershed, which includes the beautiful Village of Petitcodiac! The "No Mow May" campaign is to encourage all people in the watershed to take a non-mowing or less mowing approach to lawns and ditches to help our pollinator populations during a critical season, May. Spring flowers can provide an early source of nectar for pollinators such as bees, hummingbirds, butterflies and beetles. Allowing lawns and ditches to grow during the spring month has now offered huge benefits to pollinating species. This includes our native bee and butterfly populations that have suffered a drastic decline in recent

the local non-profit decades. This campaign also mitigates the impacts of storm water runoff during the spring melt that normally occurs in May. The PWA observes each year during our water quality monitoring project, the quality of our freshwater streams and rivers impacted when the snow melts. Naturalized lawns and ditches for the month of May can help prevent pollutants and debris from entering freshwater ecosystems directly. The roots of the plants will purify and release water to seep through the soil. Plants that can grow unencumbered will absorb more rain and snow melt that will fill our groundwater reserves used by household wells. So please leave the flowers growing in your lawn in May. Don't worry about the hard work of mowing for a month. Get to know your lawn as a natural space, and watch the bees and butterflies visit you this spring!

them in my mind and picture the waving tendrils against my back window - white lilacs waving to me through the pane, so they'll be as in years before when talk" of the tiny boys making pretend I gathered cluster

Even the Horses like to go to Sugar Camps

The syrup bubbles, then foams toward the top of the tank.

"It's going to boil over," you say. "Watch", says Mr. Stewart. He drops a little piece of butter - not

enough to cover your fingernail with into the centre of the tank. The foam recedes.

The toall recedes.

Mr. Stewart dips a special thermometer into the boiling liquid and looks at it and shakes his head. "Another couple of minutes."

A couple of minutes pass and he calls his sons. They carry the tank out and put it down on the snow to cool. Before they do so they pour some of it out on the white snow and it hardens into chewy maple candy and everybody gathers around to help themselves.

You talk and laugh while the tank cools, then the Stewart boys carry it inside again and get after it with wooden "beaters" that look like axe handles. One of them works from one end of the tank and one from the other. All of a sudden, it begins to harden and turn white.

There isn't any time to be last. It has to be molded before it gets hard - and it gets hard quickly once it starts. They paddle it out into mounds. The maple cream is made. And you get busy sampling it.

"How do you come to make such good maple cream?" you ask Mr. Stewart. Family Skill "Well my father made it. I used to watch him just like young John here" - 12 year-old John had watched Mr. Stewart boiling the syrup - "watches me. And my father's father, and old Scot who settled here after he went through the Miramichi fire, used to make it before my father again. It sort of comes down in the family."

"Do you put anything in the maple cream to keep it so white?"

"No that's what makes it so white. You don't put anything into it you can keep out - except sap."

The sap comes out of the trees like clear water. It has a slightly sweetish taste. The sugar hands go through the woods gathering the buckets and emptying them into large cans, like milk cans, which are taken to the sugary by horse and sleigh. The horses are a big help. They seem to know just where the sugar hands well re-appear from the woods, and they have a faculty for moving along the road and stopping at the right place.

They get their reward. Because, when mealtime comes and the hands are filling themselves with mountains of flapjacks drenched with maple syrup, the horses are treated to oats - likewise drenched in maple syrup. It's a great life - life in a sugar camp.

May is Cystic Fibrosis Awareness Month

Cystic fibrosis is the most common fatal 2. genetic disease affecting Canadian children and young adults. There is no cure. It is a multi-system disease that attacks the lungs and digestive system. There are more than 4,370 Canadians living with cystic fibrosis. (Three in our surrounding communities.)

Thanks to investments in CF research and care, there is hope. Canadians are living longer, healthier lives than ever before. Today 61.5 percent of Canadians with cystic fibrosis are adults, but of the Canadians with CF who died in 2019, half were under the age of 33. This is far too young.

The COVID-19 pandemic has made a huge impact on us. Over the past year, our method of fundraising changed. Our Walk to Make Cystic Fibrosis History went to a virtual format. Other events were cancelled completely. Revenue dropped off but our goal to #End CF remained the same.

The 2021 theme for the year is Go Further. What is our chapter doing this May to Go Further and how can you be involved?

LIGHTING OF DRY GRASS AND OPEN FIRES PROHIBITED

A reminder that the lighting of ANY open fire to dispose of dry grass, brush, hay, straw, leaves, buildings, construction materials, automobiles or garbage in the municipality is PROHIBITED. Any fires must be in approved appliances only. Salisbury Fire Rescue reserves the right to order any fires that are not in compliance with Salisbury's Fire By-Law (By-Law No. 48) to be extinguished, and are authorized to issue tickets as they may deem necessary to enforce this By-Law. By-Law No. 48 can be read in its entirety at www.salisburynb.ca (under the tab Inside Your Village Office (By-Laws)). This Fire By-Law also follows the direction of Provincial burning advisories/bans.


