
Meantime, with all the progress made as of late in New Brunswick's coronavirus recovery plan, we are very confident that Canada Day next year will be back to normal!



Invest Now For Later Bounty

Summer arrived on June 21st. Did you notice? Your plants did. The days shorten and generally temperatures rise, while less rain falls.

This is a cue to gardeners to turn attention to certain time-honoured tasks that maximize flowering and harvest potential. Here is our list for end-of-June gardening chores:

- 1. **Stake and tie**. Tomatoes, climbing roses, clematis, anything that grows up but needs support, needs it now. Mark uses a metal spiral stake to support his tomato plants as they do not require anything to make them grow upright. Just twist the main stem of the plant around the spiral. Prune out the suckers on tomatoes for best fruit production.
- 2. **Prune**. The first flush of new growth on evergreens and shrubs has produced a lot of lanky looking plants. They look a bit like us right now, in need of a haircut. If your winter hardy plants have finished flowering this is the



perfect time to prune a cedar hedge, lilac, forsythia, juniper, Japanese maple: virtually all evergreens and shrubs.

3. Fertilize. Hungry plants tell us when they need nutrients with yellowing leaves or stunted growth. Now is the best time of year to add a season-long fertilizer to the surface of the soil or spread a five-to-seven-centimeter layer of finished compost over the root zone. Containerized plants need additional nutrients this time of year. Look for a slow-release fertilizer product that delivers a mild solution to the root zone with every watering.

- 4. Japanese beetles. The scourge of many gardens in July is the Japanese beetle. One of our most asked questions early in summer is how to control them. There is no easy way. But the most effective method is to hang a pheromone trap, in a tree or on a fence. Beetles are attracted to it and fall into the trap. It is like Fatal Attraction, the movie, without the Hollywood hype. Be sure to empty it out at least every couple of weeks to avoid a bad smell.
- 5. Control insects and disease on fruit trees. We use a combination of End All and garden sulphur for an environmentally responsible combo that slows most problems of this nature to an acceptable level. Nonchemical pest and disease control is not a panacea. Slightly blemished fruit is perfectly palatable and tasty.
- 6. **Deadhead spent flowers.** The flowers on your veronica may have come and gone but the potential to flower again is there if you deadhead them: remove the spent flower before it goes to seed. The energy that the plant would use to produce seed is channelled into producing more flowers. later in the season. This is the result of a desire on the part of the plant to reproduce. Flowers were created by nature to attract pollinators which enable the plant to produce seed and make more plants. It is a primal thing. Many perennials and annuals produce flowers in response to deadheading this time of year, including Shasta daisy, columbine, foxglove, petunias, geraniums, and marigolds.
- 7. Sow and plant for kids. Fastgrowing bush beans, radishes, carrots, and beets are sown by seed now for a harvest in a few weeks. A fast-growing flower or food-producing plant gives kids a lift, catches their attention and teaches them a thing or two about the natural world.

This is also a good time of year to do

Cut your lawn at least 7 to 10 cm high and less frequently as temperatures rise and rain falls less frequently. Do not fertilize it during a drought or prolonged period of heat.

Water only the parts of your garden that demand it and water less frequently but deeply. Watering once a week for a couple of hours is plenty for most flowering plants. Allowing the soil to dry about 6 cm deep between applications encourages deeper roots and more drought-resistant plants.

A little effort now equals bounty later this summer.

New Name! New Look!

Rural Rides started in the Salisbury/
Petitcodiac region in 2015 and has continued to grow ever since. In 2017, a pilot project was undertaken in partnership with Tele-drive Albert County and the Volunteer Centre of South East New Brunswick to expand service to the Tantramar region. That expansion was a success and was quickly followed by a second pilot project in 2018 under the name of WA Transpo to complete the expansion of services to all of Westmorland and Albert Counties with the three established groups working together.

Over the past couple of years, the benefits of working together have far outweighed the value of having three separate organizations serving sections of the same counties. Some of the clear benefits of amalgamated service have been - economies of scale, the ability to employ one common ride coordinator to $respond to \, requests for \, transportation \, for \,$ the entire region, a unified accounting system, a better distribution of tasks amongst staff based on their strengths and experience, service provided in both official languages, service provided to the entire region and a stronger voice advocating for the transportation needs in South East New Brunswick.

With any new organization, there are growing pains and milestones to be completed along the way. The name "WA Transpo" never really seemed to fit what the service is and was often mistaken for a trucking company. The plan early on was to change the name as soon as charitable status was received. Charitable status was granted in November 2020. The process of selecting a new name soon followed. Three strong candidates that translated well in both languages were voted on by the board. The name selected was "Urban/Rural Rides - Transport Urbain/ Rural". This was not a big change for

our clients and volunteers. We had begun answering the phone with that name when the full expansion pilot started in 2018 - in part to clarify that we were providing service in both urban and rural areas, and because it was extremely cumbersome to list all three organizations every time the phone was answered.

The name and logo are a true testament to the spirit of collaboration and cooperation amongst the three groups. Urban represents the service provided by the Volunteer Centre of South East New Brunswick. Rural Rides for the service provided by Rural Rides in Salisbury, Petitcodiac and Tantramar as well as the service to the rural areas of Albert County provided by Tele-drive. So, our new identity going forward, brings together a piece from each group that contributed to getting us to this point.

A tremendous thank you to all the respective boards who did the ground work in each area establishing a volunteer driving service and all the volunteers, past and present, who are the backbone of the program. The Urban/Rural Rides board is comprised of representation from each of the three programs' boards - Rural Rides, Teledrive and the Volunteer Centre, as well as representation from municipalities we serve.

Your door to door volunteer driving program is here to stay. The name may have changed but the mission remains to provide affordable transportation to those who need it. Beat slightly jelled jello until foamy.


Add berries and cool whip, stir mixture,

Summer is here.....so the calendar says. Have you noticed that summer seemed to arrive a little early? We have been blessed with nice weather to plant vegetable and flower gardens. People seem eager to get outside to engage in activities that remind them that life can get back to normal. And, we will get there!

One of the outcomes of the Covid-19 pandemic has been the influx of people moving to rural communities. New properties are being built, houses are being bought sight unseen and also larger properties with farmland and acreage are finding new owners. Most of the people are relocating from various parts of the country and beyond.







When Carl retired from driver due to health reasons he became owner/sponsor for his son Kent from 1992-2007, winning the Modified Championship in 1996. He was co-owner of Livingston Welding helping many racers over the years, from designing and building innovative trailers, to always helping racers by welding up many parts of broken race cars, but rarely wanting anything for helping keep many racecars on the track.



New Restroom Facility to be Built at Highland Park

Some more information regarding the submerged holding tank for the splash construction in 2021 of a new restroom facility for the Village of Salisbury's Highland Park:



In order to service the water demands for both this new restroom facility and the adjacent splash pad (for which the mechanisms are contained in the building), two new wells had to be developed at Highland Park this year. This was necessary due to the states of failure of two wells that had been developed there at the time of the splash pad's original installation, which was done with the intention that the wells drilled in 2016 would complement an existing older well at the site. However, one of those 2016 wells had completely collapsed, while there were numerous deficiencies associated with the other. Neither could be serviced or

The ongoing development this year of the two new wells at the park, along with the planned installation of a new

pad, in addition to the construction of the restroom facility, will prevent the Village from operating the existing restroom and splash pad this season until the new projects are finalized by the fall.

With regards to the old restroom, the reason for such unusual operation times in the past was due to both water supply and the building's form of construction. It was unheated and uninsulated, so the entire facility had to be winterized in the fall and commissioned once again in early summer. The Village could not activate the water supply at the restroom and splash pad until it could be absolutely certain that freezing temperatures were behind us.

As for the new restroom building (see conceptual image above), its design will implement an access control system which will automatically permit and prevent entry to the restroom areas based on hours of operation. The facility is designed to be as vandal resistant as possible.

This project is funded in large part through the federal Gas Tax Fund (GTF) program, supported by a municipal contribution as well as previous local fundraising efforts.

In the meantime, arrangements have been made to have a porta-potty brought to Highland Park on June 11th.
