Westmorland County Agricultural Fair is Celebrating 50 wonderful years as an Incorporated Fair.

In 1967 the Petitcodiac Community Fair Association was formed as a Centennial Project with Chairman William Balzer, first vice, Stewart Constantine, second vice, Gordon MacLaughlin and secretary-treasurer Rev. Harold Hilder. Official Incorporation took place in 1971.

Land; the present location of the Medical Center building and parking lot, was made available from the Village for the Fair. For a number of years the Kiwanis outdoor rink was used as the location of the horse shows and livestock activities It was their hope that the Community Fair would continue to grow and prosper.

The Community Fair was based on the one day Fairs that the Royal Canadian Legion, Branch #41 and many other local organizations in Petitcodiac started as a means to raise funds to support the Veterans returning from World War I, in 1918 and 1919. The funds were used to not only support those men and women, it was also used to provide for the families of men who had been killed in the War.

Some of their fund raising ideas included selling tickets, with the prize of a pony; largest vegetable contest, games of chance and basket socials. These one day Fairs were very well supported by Petitcodiac and surrounding areas with as many as 300 school children participating in the earliest parades and fun activities.



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PEOPLE WHO LAUGH A LOT LIVE LONGER

Before you plan to attend **ELGIN DAY** on Sunday, August 15, 2021 (1-4pm) perhaps you would like to know a little background on how our interesting and pretty little hamlet got its beginnings. Although we seem to be located off the beaten path, so to speak, the New World began to take shape as adventurous settlers from Europe began to set sail for various reasons....perhaps in hopes of a better life, but at the very least a fresh start. Life would have been extremely difficult but it was the strong willed, the clever, and the determined to succeed who said goodbye to Europe and headed across the vast and dangerous Atlantic Ocean.

We do know that the first settler in our area was John Gildart (Geldart) in 1806. He came from Yorkshire, England. One can only imagine what he found - nothing! - but in reality, everything! Rivers with falls, and no doubt, plenty of fish.....thick, rich and old growth forests to build homesteads....and plenty of game and wildlife for food and other needs.

John Gildart apparently chose a location nestled in a valley in what we now know as Elgin Center as his home base. He eventually built a house and sent for his wife, Elizabeth, and children.

Eventually the area saw the arrival of other settlers. As time moved on and the number of settlers increased, it was time to name this new found community of families. The chosen name was Elgin, named in honor of James Bruce, the 8th Earl of Elgin.

Here we are 215 years later and still eager to see our community prosper and grow. Although we know the area looks far different from what John Gildart saw, it still has the power to send us awestruck at the natural beauty tucked away in our little corner of Albert County, New Brunswick.







What do gardeners do on the August long weekend? Garden.

A long holiday weekend like this is like manna from heaven for a gardener. We are on the mountain top, after all. The pinnacle of the season. Your garden will never look as colourful and prosperous as it does now, so, why wouldn't you want to spend every waking hour in it? As of Tuesday, nature begins the long journey towards winter by first creating a multitude of flowers, then seed, and finally the changing of leaf colours as all perennial plants prepare for winter slumber: like your snow tires are right now, dormant.

What to do?

There is so much that you can do in your garden this weekend to engage

the nature within you. Here are our recommended priority tasks:

1. Feed. All plants, except for annuals like petunias and tomatoes, which die with hard frost come fall, can use one more application of fertilizer. We use finished compost by mixing up some tea. Using an old pillowcase, fill one third of it with finished compost either from your composting unit or a bag of composted manure. Tie the top with twine. Drop it into a garbage pail full of water and let steep for 24 hours. The resulting dark mixture is perfect for everything that grows. Use within 48 hours to avoid undesirable smells. Or you can use a synthetic fertilizer one more time.

2. Cut down all perennials that have blossomed in July. daisies, monarda, veronica, hollyhock, filipendula, some varieties of rudbeckia: you get the idea. When you remove the spent flower, you encourage the energy used to create seeds to be channelled to the creation of more flowers. You and the bees win. The plant does not mind either.

you are harvesting Make sure vegetables as they become ready. Tomatoes are ripening now, to beat the band. Peppers, zucchinis, beans and many other fruiting plants produce at their best this time of year. Like

your perennials, when you remove ripening fruit you encourage the plant to produce more.

3. Cut flowers at their peak. of the flowers in your garden and containers looking their absolute best now. Cut some of them to enjoy indoors. It is always best to cut

flowers early in the morning when the natural sugars in the plant are highest. Take a bucket of fresh water out to the garden with you and plunge the cut end of the flower stem into the water. When you get them indoors, recut the stems to suit the vase and use fresh water for your display. Refresh the water daily. Put the cut ends of the flowers in your composter.

4. Water, if you must. We are big fans of watering the garden well, but less frequently. We can not think of one plant that needs water more than once a week, even in a heat wave, other than thirsty container grown plants like Sunshine impatiens. Allowing the root zone of your garden to dry, about 8 to 10 cm deep, between applications of water encourages roots to reach deep for moisture. Deeply rooted plants are drought resistant (which is one reason

why we are not big fans of in ground irrigation systems: they train roots to be lazy). When you do water, we recommend that you leave the sprinkler on for as long as it takes to seep about 6 cm deep. In the long run, you will save water and experience enhanced plant performance.

5. Hammock time. It is warm. Your garden and balcony look great. Get out of doors and enjoy it all while you can. Take the newspaper with you and enjoy each section to its fullest. Bring a book or iPad if you have time to spare. John Graves Simcoe, after whom this holiday was named, had a cottage in Toronto at Bloor and the Don River called Castle Frank. Clearly, he knew that life is not entirely about work, that one must find time to play. And if he had a garden, we have no doubt he would be playing in it this weekend.


I am constantly reminded of the quote: "You can judge a country by how they treat their most vulnerable".

2021 SALISBURY DOG TAGS

Due to late fees going into effect back on April 1st, dog registrations in the Village of Salisbury now cost \$25.00 for spayed or neutered dogs; or \$45.00 if not spayed or neutered.

In order to buy a dog tag at the Village Office at 56 Douglas Street, you MUST prove up-to-date vaccinations by way of an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.
