The Fire Department is collecting nonperishable food items on the behalf of SPOT with a drop-off location in the main parking lot of the Village.



# What's Wrong with Hearing Aids

theorist, who wore hearing aids later in life, famously remarked, "The most important thing in communication is hearing what isn't said." The hearing aid industry would be wise to listen in. For all the big noise about what can be heard when people with hearing impairment are fitted with aids, is an important message being missed?

Hearing aids, in general, make life better for people with mild to severe hearing loss. But has the development of ever smaller technology made it needlessly difficult for people to enjoy the benefits? Does it seem as though the aids are designed to hide, for vanity's sake, or worse, as if in shame, a hearing disability?

The focus should be on ease of functionality, not the gimmicks that escalate the price for hearing aids beyond the range of reasonable.

Manufacturing a hearing aid costs a few hundred dollars, but a single aidcan retail at two thousand dollars each, with most people needing two of them. Companies market products based on attractive warranties, battery life, and connectivity withTV or phone.

But use of hearing aids is often a hard sell, and the prices and hightech complexities are not the only deterrents.

A study in the International Journal of Audiologynotes, "For a hearingimpaired person, a hearing aid is often beneficial, but noise and annoying sounds can result in non-use." The study found that 91% of participants experienced annoying sounds daily when using hearing aids. Researchers concluded that "improved clinical fitting routines" may be the solution. For some people, perhaps. But there is something wrong when the hearing aid industry ignores challenges people face as soon as they leave hearing clinics. Why, for example, must hearing aids be so ridiculously small? They are so small,

in fact, that any senior with even minor

Peter Drucker, the management arthritis in the hands struggles to grasp and place the teeny technology in the ear canal, while nudging itsy speaker and retention wires into place, and fumbling to find on and off buttons and volume controls no bigger than a tiddle.Compounding the problem, given that seniors have ears that have grown larger with long life, these little bits readily fall out. How much anxiety goes into the search for expensive aids that easily get lost?

> Experts say stigma is associated with hearing impairment, making peoplehesitantto admit the problem. But this stigma stems from outdated societal perceptions that there is something bad about getting older and having hearing loss. It's time for this to

> Let's have hearing aids come to market that are better suited to people who could care less what their ears look like so long as they can hear the conversation. Make these new devices so big that they define new style, offer "bling", or even, gasp, involve piercings to hold them in place!

> Hearing well has important health benefits too. People who suffer from hearing loss tend to develop problems with balance, leading to falls. The absence of mental stimulation from sound reception in the brain can also increase the risk of dementia. And the isolation that often ensues with the development of hearing impairment, especially later in life, is not good for

> Take the advice of Mihalv Csikszentmihalyi, a psychologist best known for his work on happiness, who died last month at the age of 87. He said, "It's not the hearing that improves life, but the listening."

The point is, the needs of the people of New Brunswick are not and cannot be met without significant action.

Earlier this month our government brought forward the white paper on local governance reform.


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# Petitcodiac Area Garden Club

The holiday season is upon us and the they do have their preferences. Here coming days will fly by. Our outdoor gardens have all settled in for a long winter's nap, but for some, inside is awash with plants. This is the season of Christmas Cacti and Poinsettias. Growing up, Christmas Cacti were pink, and Poinsettias were red. Now we see a rainbow of colors available for both and they bring much-welcomed color to our homes during the winter months. Earlier this year, some garden club members were talking about the various kinds of Holiday Cacti, and this is when some of us, including yours truly, learned that not all cacti are Christmas cacti. We have included a picture of three Holiday Cacti - Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas - as an aid for identifying any you have in your home. I found the stems to be the most telling, however, the blooms are also unique.

The great thing about all three of these plants, is they thrive with the same care. They are easy to grow, however,

are a few tips I have gleaned online:

- Cacti require sandy, welldrained soil and don't like extremes of being too dry or too wet. Water once they are dry. They also like a bit of extra nourishment, so feed them 20-20-20 or 10-10-10 plant food diluted with water to 50% strength, every 2-3 weeks.
- This is a plant that likes to be root-bound, so choosing a small pot is best and repot only once the pot is completely filled. When repotting, choose the next size up.
- Sitting on a tray of rocks, with water just below the top of the rocks, provides them with humidity that they appreciate.
- Enjoying bright light is their favorite pastime, but they will burn in direct sunlight. You may need to move them around until you find their happy spot.
- To bloom, they need long cool, dark nights. That includes having no light from lamps. To promote blooming

you can move them into a darker room or away from a heat source to ensure they get 13-15 hours of darkness. Once they have begun to bloom, you can return them to their happy place to be enjoyed by everyone.

Members of the Petitcodiac & Area Gardening Club have begun planning for 2022, which will see even more great things happen, including an update on the Communities in Bloom project. For those who still have keys to the Community Garden, please be sure to drop these by the Village Office and receive your refund. Keys will once again be available at the beginning of the gardening season. There is room to expand the number of plots, so keep that in mind for the coming year. If you are online, please stay in touch through the Petitcodiac and Area Garden Club Facebook group.

#### SWEETENED CONDENSED MILK FUDGE

1 cup Peanut Butter 10 ounces milk Chocolate 1 teaspoon vanilla 14 ounces condensed Milk (sweetened)

Prepare a 9 x 9-inch pan lined with wax paper. In a small bowl, mix peanut butter with about 3 tbsp. sweetened condensed milk, stirring until smooth. Add additional sweetened condensed milk if needed to thin.

Add chocolate to a medium-sized microwave-safe bowl.

Set aside.

Add the remaining sweetened condensed milk and vanilla

Microwave 90 seconds then stir. Continue heating in 30-second increments until smooth. Do not overheat.

Pour chocolate mixture into wax paper lined 9×9-inch pan, and spread with a spatula until even. Scoop peanut butter mixture onto the chocolate mixture. Using a spoon, carefully spread across the top of the chocolate. Let cool.

To remove fudge, lift the wax paper

from pan and slice with a knife or pizza cutter.



#### Condensed Milk Fudge

500 Grams Milk Chocolate 1 teaspoon Vanilla extract 1 large knob Butter Add Sweetened Condensed milk (1can, 395g)

Melt everything together, really gently in a double

But if you prefer you can use a microwave. Simply pop everything into a microwavable bowl and heat it at 80% power in 30 second intervals. Stir it in between each microwave blast and stop when everything has melted an come together.



# Birdwatch Vacation in Your Own Backyard

It is not like they ever left. The cardinal that lands on an evergreen branch and creates an explosion of soft snow is a Canadian sight to behold.

As our migratory bird friends (and some human friends) go south, we are left with each other. And how delightful is that! This is bird feeding season and now is a great time of year to clean and refill your birdfeeders, acquire a birdbath heater, and take this last planting opportunity to put some bird friendly plants in your garden.

Let us start with your garden.

- 1. Don't cut down your ornamental grasses and herbaceous perennials. The seed heads that stand are a buffet counter for birds, especially when the snow covers the ground and access to earth-bound seeds is no longer an option.
- 2. Plant fruit producing Mountain Ash, native American cranberry, Serviceberry, Saskatoon berry and crab-apple trees. Many birds find fruiting plants most enticing in the winter, when they are looking for quick energy and the fruit has matured and softened.
- 3. Birds need shelter. Especially during the winter months when a cold wind blows. Their favourite protection are native black and white cedars. Birds find comfort there, forage the seeds in winter and will often nest in cedars some spring. Any evergreen provides protection for birds come winter. The cardinal that finds refuge in a spruce tree is just one example. Pine, fir, and

junipers can all do the trick.

4. Birds Canada has a very helpful website that addresses the issue nicely by allocating "Bird Garden Zones" across the country. The Bird Garden Zone map carves Canada into 22 zones. Extensive lists of plants are offered for each zone, all native, that are known to attract birds. Click the plant that appeals to you and learn cultural information about the size, shape and fruiting features of the plant, its growing zone limitations, preferred soil type and more. It is handy, quick, and fun. https://www.birdscanada.org/you-can-help/bird-gardens/

We note that not all plants listed are easy to find at a garden-variety retailer. You may have to search online for suppliers of, say, striped maple or fleshy hawthorn. Another fun winter project if you are planning on spring planting. Feeding the birds, with an eye to helping them get through the winter in good health, requires a little planning and thought. Our top tips:

- a. Clean bird feeders every couple of weeks with a mild solution of soap. Disease manifests itself in damp, rotting seeds.
- b. Birds need water. Open water of any kind, providing it is clean, attracts a lot of birds. Ben leaves a bubbler in his pond all winter. Birds hop up to the edge of the ice and take a drink all winter long. If you have a bird bath, use a bird bath heater to keep the water open.
- c. Project Feeder Watch is a citizenscience based method of counting birds and registering them in the Birds Canada database. The "Watch" started November 13th and runs all winter, so there is lots of time for you to sign up at www.birdscanada.org.
- d. Host a birdathon. Bring some friends together in your neighbourhood to watch, identify and study birds. Have fun, share experiences and knowledge, and watch your winter melt away in birding activity.

Tree bags, tinsel, ornaments, nails, tree skirts, string, stands, etc., must be removed before disposal.

Christmas wreaths will NOT be accepted.

#### 2022 BUDGET AND TAX RATE

Salisbury Village Council completed its 2022 budget deliberations on November 8th and passed its 2022 General Operating Fund and Utility Operating Fund motions on November 15th.

Council is pleased to have been able to hold the property tax rate steady at \$1.0442 (per \$100 of assessment) given the financial pressures of rising RCMP costsand increased rates for WorksafeNB, insurance and garbage collection, among others.

This is compounded by the fact that despite growth of 7.07% in the Village of Salisbury's tax base, the New BrunswickGovernment has decreased by \$102,051 its 2022 Community Funding and Equalization Grant (formerly known as the Unconditional Grant) to the Village of Salisbury.

#### REMINDER - PAYMENT DUE FOR OVERDUE 2021 SEWER BILLS

The sewer rate for 2021 in the Village of Salisbury is \$305.00 per unit.

Interest working out to 2% per month is added to all overdue sewer accounts, calculated from the billing date in January.

Interest was added in March, April, May, June, July, August, September, October and November, and will continue on a monthly basis for the rest of the year.

The 2022 sewer rate for Salisbury will increase to \$325 per unit.

It must be noted that it has been seven years since the last increase in sewer rates in Salisbury.

#### 2021 VILLAGE OF SALISBURY DOG TAGS

Due to late fees going into effect back on April 1st, dog registrations in the Village of Salisbury currently cost \$25.00 for spayed or neutered dogs; or \$45.00 if not spayed or neutered (however, for new dogs/puppies, tags are \$15 cheaper).



In order to buy a dog tag, you MUST prove up-to-date vaccinations by way of an official veterinarian receipt. Salisbury Animal Control is provided by New Brunswick SPCA, who can be reached at 1-877-722-1522.

Meantime, 2022 Dog Tags will go on sale starting January 1st,

#### BY-LAW NO. 23 - A BY-LAW TO REGULATE TRAFFIC
