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

Our winter hours are: Thurs - 10 - 5pm Fri - 10 - 5pm Sat - 10 - 2pm



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Village Council News

Council is very pleased to be able to announce that the tax rate in the village of petitcodiac has been decreased by one cent to 1.2794. The Villages general operating budget total for 2022 is \$2,237,562.

At the Petitcodiac Kiwanis Christmas gathering it was my pleasure to award Charlie Howatt a "Certificate of Merit" on behalf of the Village Of Petitcodiac. Kiwanian Charlie Howatt was recognized for his 68 years of service to Kiwanis, the Village Of Petitcodiac and the surrounding area.

Council is pleased to announce the village has accepted the Waste Collection tender from Fero for a 3 year term at a total cost of \$220,038.

The village has agreed to rent the arena for two Flyball Competitions later this year. This is a sport that involves teams of highly trained dogs racing to complete different tasks. More details will follow as we get closer to the events.

Councillor Murphy (recreation) and Councillor Saunders (Works department) have created a winter walking circuit through the village. The circuit will begin at the Arena, down Corey Avenue, across the bridge and up the hill to Church Street, across to Spring Street, down to Main Street past the fire hall, down River Road and back to the arena. This is a distance of approximately 2.8 km depending on who's vehicle you use. The Village will be applying extra salt and sand to this circuit as needed in hopes of keeping it useable for the winter months.

The wastewater sewer operating budget for 2022 is \$254,920 with the annual rate remaining at \$320.

Dog tags are available at the village office for \$15 and must be purchased for each and every dog that resides in the village.

Winter parking is now in effect, any vehicle left unattended on village streets overnight will be towed away at the owner's expense. This allows for safe and timely snow removal.

Just a reminder New Brunswick winter storms often cause power outages. In partnership with New Brunswick EMO we encourage all residents to be prepared to manage on their own for 72 hours. Please have an emergency plan and a storm kit covering the needs of your family and pets.

SOUP IS ON!

As we skate our way through the cold winter months, let's warm up nicely with this wonderfully tasty

Butternut Squash Soup

Ingredients are:

- 1 medium butternut squash, peeled and cubed
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2-4 cloves of garlic, chopped (can use already minced garlic)
- 3 Tbsp of oil or butter

A few pinches of paprika (to taste; smoked paprika is great)

Pepper (to taste)

1/3 cup of sour cream or 1 can of coconut milk (the milk gives the best flavour)

1-2 bay leaves

Vegetable stock (enough to cover, too much will make your soup watery

Method: In the oil or butter, sauté onion. Add squash, garlic, and pepper, and continue to sauté. Do not over sauté as the squash will continue to cook when you add the stock, etc. Add paprika, stock and bay leaves. Cook until the squash is soft (approx. 15-20 min.). When done, remove the bay leaves. Add the sour cream or coconut milk. Blend(any kitchen blender will work) to creamy consistency. Adjust to taste by adding salt, or pepper, or paprika.

Happy New Year! On December 21, we experienced the shortest day of the year, with only 8 hours and 42 minutes of daylight. The great news about that, is that we are now on the path to longer days as we steam forward to Spring! As you are reading this, we have already gained 5 minutes of daylight perhaps you haven't noticed, however, during January we will gain another 57 minutes and we will all appreciate the extra davlight.

Many of us received Poinsettias over the holidays and managed to keep them looking beautiful throughout Christmas. Now that we are packing up all of the trimming, what are we to do with our Poinsettia? Perhaps you simply toss vours, knowing that next year there will be plenty of brightly colored ones to choose from. But, with the long days of winter and no outdoor gardens to tend to, you may want to pay your poinsettia some special attention and enjoy it year-round. Here are some tips:

- Poinsettias are tropical plants and require as much indirect sunlight as you can provide them. If you have a spot near a south facing window, they will enjoy the view and the sun.
- To continue blooming, your plant will need daytime temperatures between 18-21 C (65-70F). During the night they prefer it a bit cooler, but never below 15C (60F) to avoid leaf drop. Leaf drop can also be caused by leaves touching a cold window or being too wet or too

- Throughout the winter, only water when the top of the soil is dry. Water thoroughly until water is draining from the bottom. Watering in the sink allows it to drain nicely or be sure to discard any water that builds up in the saucer. For some this may be weekly, however, if your air is dry during the winter, be sure to check every few days, as they



do not like to stay dry for very long. Watch for more information on Poinsettia care in April, when we will share how to see your Poinsettia through the Spring and Summer. In the meantime, try your hand at keeping your plant until then. In other news, the New Horizon Community Innovation Grant submissions have been awarded and we are just waiting on final confirmation regarding our submission. We look forward to sharing all of the exciting details of the project in February! 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
I was cleaning out my office files for R. R. Rural Rides as I typed up the minutes of our final meeting held on December 6, 2021. Looking at the files gave me a chance to reminisce. It feels a bit like retirement did even though this one took less than the 43 years that I spent in my career position! Although, "Rural Rides" is officially closed as of the end of December 2021, services will continue to be offered through Urban/Rural Rides. I think we should be pleased with what we accomplished. I am satisfied and will explain why I had some specific points to consider for myself.

I discovered that I even have the notes from our first conceptual meeting with Joanna Brown from the Community

Inclusion Network on August 27 of 2013. Bob Lamb, representing Salisbury village council was instrumental in setting that meeting in motion. Rural Rides was incorporated and received their letters patent dated January 3, 2014. I also see that in our 2014 Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), signed by me as president of Rural Rides and by Joanna in October of 2014, there is reference to "- - - produce a report to help assist other groups in establishing similar organizations - - -.". Ring in the New Year with Your Inner Mountaineer

It's not what we were hoping for at this time of year. The doom and gloom of Omicron has many people feeling down. But casting your gaze upwards might be just the right move. For a New Year's Resolution, this might be a good time to channel your inner mountaineer.

Christmas and New Years should be the season for celebration, not hibernation. Families should be together, not torn apart by differing views on vaccination. Charitable giving should be the theme, not clamouring for rapid test kits. Yet so it goes. Even among those getting out for a would-be joyous wintertime walk, you can see, in the narrow space between their toques and their masks, the melancholy in their eyes.

So, what's the relevance of mountaineering in these circumstances?

The attributes shared by people who climb high mountains are just what's needed to fight back against the oppressive weight of pandemic fatigue.

Chase Tucker, founder of Base Camp Training, describes the mountaineering mind set as, "Unwavering self belief. Ability to visualize success in detail. Ability to accept and deal with fear. Ability to manage doubt. Bulletproof positivity." He acknowledges risk management skills, but this comes at the end of his list.

There are, undoubtedly, health benefits of climbing uphill. The most obvious are improvements to physical fitness, especially cardiovascular health. The aerobic exercise of climbing reduces body fat, lowering the risk of heart disease. Since climbing, especially with a backpack, is a weight-bearing exercise, it helps maintain bone density. Climbers have strong muscles in the hips and legs, resulting in better balance.

Most exercises done for 20 minutes or longer can help lower the risk of developing chronic diseases such as hypertension, type 2 diabetes, stroke, arthritis, and even some types of cancer. Think of exercises that make you feel like you are climbing mountains as a

natural antidote to chronic stress too. There is a full-body exercise called mountain climbers. To do it, from a plank position on the floor supporting your body with your feet and hands, you perform it by taking alternate steps forward to the chest, each time returning to the plank position. It's a killer, speeding up the heart rate and working all the muscles of the body. If you have ever tried it, you'll know why climbers are in such tremendous physical shape.

You might want to skip directly to a more manageable, mostly mental, exercise. But are there health benefits to merely thinking about mountains, and not actually climbing them?

The surprising answer is, yes. Mountaineering involves concentration. The climber's steel resolve is a mental exercise, not a physical one. Focus on clearing the mind of festering worries has been shown to build confidence and self-esteem. Adherence to a regular routine of concentration exercises can alleviate the symptoms of some mental health problems.

Chase Tucker describes a technique to train your brain for the attribute of positivity using a bracelet. "When you catch yourself thinking negatively, stop take a breath, tell yourself that you can solve the situation with a positive approach and it will all work out fine. Then, swap the bracelet to the other wrist."

He suggests recording how many times per day you swap wrists. The conscious effort required to stop, reflect, move the bracelet, and try to focus again only on positive thinking involves building commitment to the objective.

Who knows what it will take to break out of the entrenched pandemic mind set while the virus runs its course. But positive mental resolve is a good start for 2022.

Shedding Light on Houseplants

With the shortest day of the year behind us, we turn to our interior greenscapes to lift our spirits through the dark days of winter.

While houseplant companions cheer up our homes, they too are feeling these shorter days. Nobody understands this better than Darryl Cheng, author of The New Plant Parent and an engineer who has studied the relationship between houseplants and light. "The impact of light cannot be overstated: no special fertilizer, distilled water, or humidifiers will improve a houseplant in a poorly lit

environment."

Here are our top tips for ensuring your cherished plant companions wellbeing through the dark days of winter:

- Light is the big one during this shortday time of year. Placing your tropicals in south-facing, unobstructed windows is ideal but there is also nothing wrong with artificial light. Cheng advises that many agricultural-grade grow lights are likely overkill, "most of the tropicals people are growing as houseplants have a lower light demand than the highyielding vegetable crops those lights are built for. If you have a regular white LED bulb, your plants will get enough spectrum at enough intensity to survive". Bear in mind this supplemental LED lighting is lower intensity than the sun, which can be compensated for with longer exposure - up to 12 hours a day won't hurt, and with the efficiency of LED lights there shouldn't be too much cause for concern on your hydro bill.

- Moisture, less. The biggest cause for houseplant failure is too much love in

signed again by myself and Joanna in April of 2015, does in fact use the term "template". Further, I know that the group in Sussex and others and now the folks in Fredericton are working closely with our manager, Kelly, using her experience and our experience to establish organizations of their own. That is using our template!

We started R. R. Rural Rides as a small organization giving a few rides per week and now we have an organization providing thousands per year. We would be driving more if it were not for Covid 19. However, even in the face of Covid, we were able to provide critical rides for medical purposes and for food deliveries.

During our evolution, we had some great help from ESIC and would not exist without them. However meeting the requirements imposed by ESIC created some challenges as well. They wanted amalgamation of fragmented groups and although that made sense, they imposed the name Westmorland Albert Transpo on us. No one liked that name and it did not accurately reflect what we do. That was nearly the death of the whole system. We were also facing financial issues to the point where our sister organization, Tele-Drive, announced that they had folded. It was given a reprieve with funds and personal assistance from Rural Rides. We survived that, and in hindsight, it may have been a good thing since it did force us to complete and improve the amalgamation through the formation of the new umbrella organization. The new executive included the Volunteer Centre and consequently, we officially took on Urban areas. The new Board was established, and we compromised by taking a major part of the Rural Rides name to become Urban/Rural

Rides and we accepted the logo developed by Tele-Drive. The new coming soon and that could be a great opportunity for more implementation.

Consequently, without looking further, I am now satisfied that we, have fulfilled the obligation and commitment made to create a model. I feel relieved that the goal has been achieved. I thank the board members past and present, the staff, past and present for all the contributions to fulfill it. Some of us are on the Board of the new organization "Urban/Rural Rides" - "Transport Urbain/Rural" but we too will be replaced sooner or later and that normally leads to progress. Volunteers are critical to our service both for drivers and for general direction and organization. I encourage you to continue to provide support in any way that you can. I think that volunteerism is critical to survival of our communities. I am satisfied that the original objectives of R. R. Rural Rides have been achieved and I am looking forward to seeing what will be accomplished under the new amalgamated group of Urban/Rural Rides. http://urbanruralrides.ca



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

Shedding Light on Houseplants

the form of watering. Waterlogged potting soil will lead to root rot. If your plants are looking yellow or black and wilted, check to see if the soil is too wet by pushing your finger into the soil about 3 cm deep. Remove the dead foliage and repot into fresh, dry soil if necessary.

- Moisture, more. Many of the tropical plants we enjoy in our home are native to humid, rainforest like environments basically the opposite of our dry Canadian homes during winter. Orchids, Majesty Palm, begonias, and Boston fern are some which will benefit from a daily misting with tepid water in a fine spray bottle, generally when the soil starts to appear dry. Keep an eye out for brown or dry leaf tips. Important note: succulents, fiddle leaf fig, and spider plants are among those which do not benefit from misting and can end up with the symptoms of overwatering when misted. The easiest way to think about whether to mist your houseplants

is to consider where they came from: those native to the Mediterranean and Africa typically enjoy drier conditions than the lush tropical plants hailing from the rainforests of Southeast Asia and South America.

- New Year Diet Program. Like many of us, the new year is a good time for indoor plants to cut back their food intake. Pay close attention - if there is new growth, continue fertilizing at a reduced rate. Most common houseplants slow down in the winter, so you can hold off fertilizing completely until early spring when you notice growth picking up again. In extreme cases, fertilizing in winter can turn soils salty and burn roots, however most often it is just a waste - the expensive fertilizer will end up flowing right through the soil.

Canadian winters are hard on all of us, but when we take the right steps to take care of our houseplants, they will in turn look after us.

COVID-19 - VILLAGE DEPARTMENTS OPEN, BUT MASKS REQUIRED AND ACCESS RESTRICTED

All Village of Salisbury municipal departments remain open for business.

However, due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic in New Brunswick, access restrictions and physical distancing requirements have been reinstated within municipal buildings.

Also, as per direction from NB Public Health, visitors at all municipal departments including the main Village Office are once again mandated to wear a facemask indoors.

As for attendance at gatherings or meetings held by the Village of Salisbury or its municipal departments, guests must be prepared to provide proof of vaccination in order to attend these meetings.

It must be noted that the Village of Salisbury COVID-19 Operational Plan is subject to change should the Provincial government announce any further changes to its coronavirus recovery plan status.

NO OVERNIGHT STREET-SIDE PARKING DURING THE WINTER (SALISBURY BY-LAW NO. 23)

For the purpose of snow removal, no person shall stand or park a vehicle on any highway within the Village of Salisbury between the hours of 1:00 am and 7:00 am from the first day of November in any year until the first day of April in the following year.

BE 72-HOURS READY!

Winter weather has arrived, and it's important that all of us be prepared in the event of storms that result in power outages.

In partnership with the New Brunswick Emergency Measures Organization, the Village of Salisbury urges its residents to be 72-hours ready; that is, be prepared to manage on our own for at least 72 hours while NB Power works to restore service.

Have an emergency plan and a storm kit covering the needs of your family (including pets!).

The Village of Salisbury diligently monitors weather conditions, keeping in close communication with NB EMO in preparation to respond in times of emergency.

With the environment changing, it should be noted that storms are increasing in intensity, if not frequency, further underscoring the importance of being 72-hours ready!

2022 VILLAGE OF SALISBURY DOG TAGS

Your 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee

(a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st).

Registration fees are:

\$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs (this fee increases to \$25 on April 1st (late fee)); or

\$30.00 if not spayed or neutered (this fee increases to \$45 on April 1st (late fee)).



Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian

hospital tag number.

*** NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT. ***
