The Mayors of the Village of Petitscodiac and the Village of Salisbury are pleased to announce that the municipalities have entered into a Regional Recreation Agreement as of January 1st, 2022.







The municipalities have recently seen great success with the creation of Baseball and Basketball associations which bring together youth in both the Salisbury and Petitscodiac areas. Facilities in both municipalities are being utilized by these associations and maintenance/scheduling are shared.

These above noted successes, as well as the challenges for small, rural municipalities to retain qualified staff on limited budgets, initiated a conversation between the Mayors to develop an agreement where one Director would organize Recreation and Wellness activities for both municipalities. Village Council News

On January 18 Council met, via Zoom with MLA Ross Wetmore and Minister of Health Dorothy Shephard to discuss the state of our Medical Center. At this meeting Council was informed by Minister Shephard and MLA Wetmore that the design phase of a new Medical Centre in Petitcodiac would be completed in 2022, with the tentative construction phase of the new Medical Center to be completed in 2023/2024. There are a number of steps that must take place before this project will be completed, but needless to say this was great news for Council as well as the residents of Petitcodiac and surrounding areas. This has been a priority for over 10 years and hopefully this will be the final stage of our quest for a new medical center.

The work on new government reform has begun. We were recently notified that our transition facilitator has been appointed, our facilitator is Mr. Chad Peters. He has been tasked with the job of assisting us throughout the transition work for our new municipality.

The Village of Petitcodiac has partnered with the Village of Salisbury and has signed a 12 month agreement to share the services of a Recreation Director. We welcome Jarrett Crossman and are excited to begin this partnership and look forward to working with Jarrett on our recreational/active living programs.

The new works garage is now operational with a few minor tasks to be completed. We look forward to having an open house to showcase the new facility at a later date, dependant

on Covid restrictions in place at that time.

SNOWSHOEING - with a valid library card snowshoes and poles can be borrowed from our library on Kay Street. The trails are open and being well used at the Maple Street Park. The village works crews have been working on both rinks and are diligently working to get the larger one up and operating. A big village thank you to Byron Berry for his hard work and dedication at our outdoor rinks on Maple Street, it is much appreciated, especially in these times when little else is available. Thank you Byron!!

I would also like to compliment our snow removal crew for their excellent work this winter. It is hard to predict the weather when it goes from arctic chills to balmy thaws, from snow to rain. They are on call 24 hours a day seven days a week to keep our sidewalks and streets safe for us to use.

Please remember if you are a dog owner you must purchase a dog tag at the village office.

Our spring cleanup will be on May 6 with fall cleanup scheduled for September 30.

The use of fireworks is not allowed within village limits. The use of fireworks without village authorization may result in a fine of up to \$500.

I hope by the time you are reading this we are out of level 3 of Covid restrictions.

PETTY INTERNATIONAL RACEWAY ANNOUNCES 2022 SCHEDULE

RIVER GLADE, NB - December 31st, 2021) - Petty International Raceway is excited to unveil their 2022 schedule of events. The track will operate on nine weekends in 2022 from May to October with an additional New Year's Eve event in December. The track will see all major established Maritime based touring series visit the high banked bullring throughout the season with six events being headlined by a Pro Stock or Super Late Model race and a quartet of \$4,000-to-win Late Model Sportsman races presented by Airdrie Tire.

Some of the highlights include:

Season Opener takes place on Saturday, May 21st with five divisions in action. The 58th Jones Auto Body River Glade International moves to Father's Day Weekend on Friday, June 17th and Saturday, June 18th. The weekend will be dedicated to the memories of Pat Rodgers and Ernie McLean.

The Ninth Annual Mike Stevens Memorial Weekend returns on Friday, September 16th and Saturday, September 17th.

Four, \$4,000-to-win Late Model Sportsman races presented by Airdrie Tire will take place on June 18th, July 30th, September 17th and October 15th.

An additional Super Late Model 150 has been announced for October 15th. A Swap Meet and Show & Shine will take place on October 16th.

The East Coast International Pro

Stock Tour will stop three times in 2022 (June 4th, July 9th and August 27th). Dates have also been announced for the Maritime League of Legends Tour, East Coast Mini Stock Tour and Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classics powered by Conrad Bros.

Two Days of Destruction will take place - one in Summer on August 13th and one in Winter on December 31st.

The schedule is anchored by two major double header weekends. The 58th Jones Auto Body River Glade International will move to June, taking place on Friday, June 17th and Saturday, June 18th. The Father's Day Weekend is dedicated to the memories of Pat Rodgers and Ernie McLean - two promoters who helped build, grow and ultimately shape the sport as we know it in New Brunswick and beyond. Friday will see a Street Stock 100 on Friday night with support from the Mini Stocks and the Women on Wheels with a two-hour Pro Stock/Super Late Model practice to follow. Saturday will see the Pat Rodgers and Ernie McLean Memorial 150 for Pro Stocks. The \$4,000-to-win Airdrie Tire Late Model Sportsman 100 will also go green on Saturday, June 18th along with racing action for the Bandoleros and the Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classics powered by Conrad Bros.

The Ninth Annual Mike Stevens Memorial Weekend returns in 2022 on its traditional mid-September date.

The Pro Stocks/Super Late Models and Late Model Sportsman (with \$4,000 to win presented by Airdrie Tire) will once again anchor the Saturday, September 17th portion of the show. The Maritime League of Legends Tour and Bandoleros will warm up the track on Saturday. Friday, September 16th's racing will see 100-laps of Street Stock action and racing in the Mini Stock, Bandolero and Women on Wheels divisions.

An additional Super Late Model/Pro Stock and Late Model Sportsman twin bill will take place on Saturday, October 15th. The race will also feature the Petty Raceway Legends, Bandoleros and Women on Wheels. A Super Swap Meet and Show & Shine will take place the next day at the track on Sunday, October 16th.

The fourth Airdrie Tire \$4,000-to-win Late Model Sportsman 100 will headline the card on Saturday, July 30th. The New Brunswick Day Long Weekend card has racing scheduled for all Petty International Raceway staple divisions, including the Street Stocks, Legends, Mini Stocks, Bandoleros and Women on Wheels. The Legend and Mini Stock races on July 30th will be Twin 40-lap events.

The schedule kicks off on Saturday, May 21st during the Victoria Day Long Weekend with five of the six Petty International Raceway house divisions, headlined by 75-lap features for Late

Model Sportsman and Street Stock. The Mini Stocks, Bandoleros and Women on Wheels will also join them on the card.

The East Coast International Pro Stock Tour returns for a trio of races. The marquee touring series in Atlantic Canada stops on June 4th, July 9th and August 27th. The Maritime League of Legends Tour joins the Pro Stocks on June 4th and returns during the Mike Stevens Memorial Weekend on September 17th. The East Coast Mini Stock Tour has a stop at Petty International Raceway on Saturday, August 27th in what is sure to be a pivotal race in their championship chase. The Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classic powered by Conrad Bros will once again be a part of the River Glade International weekend on Saturday, June 18th. It is expected that the Atlantic Modified Tour will return to the track in 2022 but their dates were unavailable at press time.

The popular Day of Destruction Returns on Saturday, August 13th with Enduro and Demolition action. A new event will see both return for a New Years Eve Party on Saturday, December 31st, 2022.

Who Has Lost the Logic in the Vaccine Debate?

Why would any logical person choose to face severe medical complications of COVID if they could be avoided? Most of us have weighed the issues and decided to follow vaccine recommendations. But some flatly refuse. Why?

No issue is crying out louder for resolution than this vaccine debate. Now governments are set to mandate COVID vaccines to force hesitant citizens to comply. It's been done before time and again - for childhood immunizations, for example.

That's one way to go about it. But a look at the medical evidence should help compel sensible people to opt in.

A growing stack of studies shows that vaccinated people are much less likely to die from COVID than the unvaccinated. Do not people desire to stay on this planet?

Undoubtedly, some people feel like giving up. The cause might be inept government, threat of nuclear war, increasing inflation, or a dysfunctional family, but death by COVID can be avoided. And note, this disease is not a pleasant way to die. Giving in to COVID is not a rational choice.

Beyond the short-term risk of serious illness or death, there are awful complications of "long-COVID," occurring when patients do not recover for several weeks or months following the start of symptoms. Estimates range, but studies show that 50% or more of COVID survivors suffer numerous long-term problems.

Have a look at the reports of any leading research-intensive hospital. Toronto's Sunnybrook Hospital is one example. Dr. Idan Roifman, cardiologist, is using magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) to find evidence of heart damage in recovered COVID patients. Observations show an adverse inflammatory effect of COVID infection on the heart muscle. Injury can be similar to a heart attack.

This is not good news, especially given COVID also increases the risk of blood clots.

The brain can be injured too, but researchers are not sure to what extent. One concern is that patients who have been on ventilators before recovering from COVID have been found to have micro-bleeds into the brain or mini strokes. Other individuals recovered from COVID have on-going inflammation in the brain. They suffer from lingering brain-fog and poor memory. Dr. Simon Graham, another researcher at Sunnybrook Hospital, is studying how COVID's impact on the brain could be responsible for post-COVID persistent shortness of breath and abnormal heart rate.

It's logical to ask, could this brain pathology from COVID infection trigger mental health issues? Dr. Anthony Levitt, chief of Sunnybrook's Hurvitz Brain Sciences Program, is trying to provide answers.

An 18-month study of 7,500 people reveals those who have suffered from COVID have a greater risk of depression, anxiety and substance misuse, compared to those who have not been infected. A report in the Journal of the Royal Society of Medicine states that long-COVID's common symptoms include "cognitive impairment, memory loss, anxiety, and sleep disorders."

Petitcodiac Area **Garden Club**

Great news gardening friends! The Petitcodiac and Area Garden Club is excited to announce that our application for funding through the Horizon's Community Innovation Grant was successful! Horizon's Community Innovation Grant (COIN-G) is a program for communities, in partnership with Horizon to fund initiatives or projects within local communities. Grants range from \$1000 - \$10,000 to support health related projects that respond to the priorities determined through the Community Health Needs Assessments. Today we will share details of the Community Orchard Pathway Project.

Let's start with a little background. Back in September and October 2021, a group of volunteers, led by Karen Hall-Middleton, began to look into this opportunity to continue to develop the Community Garden and Community Orchard spaces. This involved numerous conversations with Garden Club members, Horizon representatives, Village of Petitcodiac, Community Orchard representatives, school representatives, and local businesses. Based on the results of these discussions, the decision to submit an application was made. In addition to all of the above, the submission required a lot of research. All totalled, over 100 volunteer hours were invested just getting to the point of submitting the application!

In late December, the Club received verbal confirmation that our application was successful and in January, a cheque in the amount of \$8015 (the full amount requested), was received! It is important to note that communities applying for this grant must demonstrate significant community interest in regard to volunteer participation and in-kind contributions of labour and materials. Of course, the local community came through, with nearly \$12,000 in commitments of labor and materials, to date. Upon completion, this project represents an

investment in our community of over \$21,000!

Mayor Dan Pollock shared, "Congratulations to the Petitcodiac and Area Garden Club on receiving the Horizon's Community Innovation Grant (Coin-g). Looking forward to the improvements including the accessibility to the Community Garden and Advance Savings Community Orchard. Thanks to everyone who is helping with this project."

As Mayor Pollock mentioned, the Community Orchard Pathway Project will provide much needed safe access to the Petitcodiac Advance Savings Community Orchard. It will also provide a low-impact, accessible walking/rolling path to promote outside exercise for people of all ages. The Community Orchard and Community Garden both play a role in improving food security in the community and have a strong volunteer and community presence. The addition of the Pathway will provide new opportunities for members of the community to gather, socialize, and exercise. Here are some key improvements included in this project (see stars in concept diagram):

- Installation of a low-impact, wheelchair accessible pathway, following completion of drainage infrastructure improvements in this area to avoid erosion due to flooding.

- Parking upgrades to include two accessible parking spaces, adjacent to the pathway.

- Installation of a gate at the northeast end of the Community Garden to allow for easy access between the Garden and Orchard during shared events.

- Construction and installation of accessible picnic tables, benches, and arbors. These items, along with mature shade trees, are available for sponsorship or to be placed as a memorial. Please contact us for more details.

- Installation of boulders along the northwest side of the skating rink to provide a safety barrier between the

access road and pathway.

- Addition of pet waste stations, bird houses, and Community Orchard Pathway entrance signage.

- Planting of butterfly and pollination gardens along the Pathway, to aid in pollination for both the Garden and Orchard.

- Addition of a Nature Sensory Wall.

The drainage infrastructure and pathway installation work will begin as soon as ground conditions allow. We are excited to involve Petitcodiac high school students with the constructing benches, arbors, and picnic tables, once in-class learning resumes.

We hope you are as excited about this project as we are. As you can see, this is an ambitious project that, weather cooperating, will be complete and ready for everyone to

enjoy by mid-to-late June! It's one more day to enjoy winter in our beautiful province and it's one day closer to spring. It's another day to plan the garden and reminisce about sun-drenched days of last spring and summer.

Our New Brunswick garden season seems to last twelve months and seems to be divided into four seasons, all sharing a delicious common thread.

We have, in constant rotation: 1) eating canned and frozen vegetables and starting seedlings season. This blends into 2) finishing the frozen and canned produce, planting season and enjoying early flower blossom season as we plant late summer and fall flower bulbs. This morphs into 3) eating early produce like peas and lettuce and growing/weeding season, which shifts into 4) harvest/eat fresh food like mad/canning and freezing season which happens to also be enjoy cut flower and plant spring bulb season.

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Horticultural Myth Busting

Often, we are presented with advice that sounds like a fact. “Bone meal is good for plants” or “Native plants are always the best choice”. You would think that experience has taught us that there are few facts in life, but things are not always so clear – especially in the world of horticulture. A website based at the University of Washington State attempts to bust a lot of popular notions that we have about how to be successful gardeners.

Here are some of the more common “myths” addressed and what they say about them.

Myth of xeriscaping. We have written about the use of plants that manage high and low amounts of water. You might say that once a sedum plant is established, it requires no water from us. According to the website article on the subject, “Xerophytes (plants commonly used in xeriscaping) are particularly adept at taking up and storing water when it’s available.”

Plants that do not require a

lot of water often go dormant when dry, dropping leaves and flowers. Ironically, a study in Arizona found that homeowners understood the ecological benefits of xeriscaping but often ended up irrigating more to maintain aesthetics throughout the dry season.

The lesson? Resist the temptation to water a xeriscape garden in times of drought no matter what they look like while dry. The important thing about xerophytic plants is that they will come back when the drought subsides. Just be patient.

Myth of native plants superiority.

We are advocates for native plants and gardens. Mark is President of Trees For Life, a not for profit organization dedicated to planting native trees in the urban environment. But there is a caveat, according to the University of Washington website, native plants can suffer from “Significant compaction and other physical disturbances because of animal, pedestrian, and vehicular

JUST THINKING.....By Holly Hersey

"Here we are once again with a new year, a new beginning, a new opportunity. How will this one turn out? Will it be a good one, a bad one, a happy and prosperous one, the options are endless. I hear all the time, from all kinds of people, about what a different and scary world we live in, how they just wish things would go back to normal, back to the way they used to be.

Every day, every hour since the beginning of time the world has changed, never to be again the way it was. Most of the time the changes are small, so you don't really notice them and realise the world has changed. Occasionally changes are big enough for you to notice, but for the most part

they aren't big enough for the majority of the world to be impacted. More rarely there are things that have such an impact that everyone notices. That's where we are now. In reality what has happened is normal. Small change or enormous change, life changes or it stops. That also is a change.

How we deal with those changes is what is important, not what causes the changes. We can wail and moan and complain all we want. We can stick our heads in the sand and wish and pray that things will return to where we were comfortable. Some changes are more easily embraced than others, but all changes need to be considered. That's not to say that all changes have to be accepted, but you have to consider the change, how it affects you and what you can do to make the world a better place regardless of the changes. We need to leave our negativity behind and try

traffic. Alkaline pH due to leaching of lime from concrete. Lack of mulch or other soil protection, lack of adequate water in summer months, increased heat load from asphalt reflectance and air pollution." We find it hard to argue that the urban environment can be very hostile to plants, native or otherwise.

The bottom line is to choose plants that are suited to their growing conditions. Sun and shade are easy to determine but also consider soil (clay requires a thoughtful plant selection), compaction from human traffic, and only plant woodland plants in a woodland.

Myth of Landscape Fabric: the use of it provides permanent control of weeds. Our experience tells us that the reverse is true. We don't need this website to tell us that once the geotextile (synthetic) landscape fabric is laid down, it harbours weed seeds, becomes entangled with existing plant roots, and begins to degrade but never completely goes away. The claims of weed control are indeed a myth. Mark recently bought a house where the previous owner used copious quantities of landscape fabric for whatever purpose. He tries to imagine what went through the homeowner's mind, as Mark pulls the stuff out by the handful.

Bottom line: there is no substitute for regular weeding and

to respond with positivity. We need to think about how what we do affects those around us. We need to be kinder and gentler. We can sit and do nothing but complain or we can do whatever we can to make our corner of the world a better place.

So, will this new year be a good year or a bad year? It's all up to you and how you choose to deal with the circumstances you are presented with. I intend to try to be more positive, to look for the good wherever I can find. I plan to enjoy my family, my friends, the world around me as much as I can and try to make the world a better place despite all the changes we face."

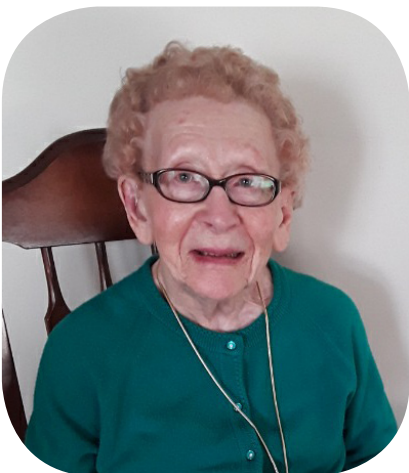

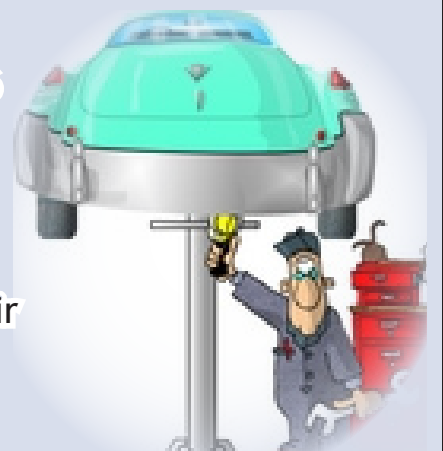

UTILITY (SEWER) OPERATING ACCOUNT

Residents of the Village of Salisbury who live within the serviceable boundary for municipal sewer service have, by now, received their sewer bills for 2022 at a rate of \$325.00 per unit. This increase, the first in seven years, is due to both the annual maintenance of the wastewater treatment facility and rising costs related to sewer system rehabilitations.

For any sewer customers paying their bills up to this point and during February, new interest will not be applied to accounts during this time. This, however, will end after March 1st. On March 2nd, interest equivalent to 2% per month will be added to any sewer accounts overdue since the January billing.

OVERDUE SEWER ACCOUNTS

By-Law 45, Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System allows for disconnection of services on overdue accounts. Any unpaid portion of sewer charges after the due date can be subject to refusal or discontinued at any time without notice. Where a sanitary sewerage system has been discontinued, the owner of the premises shall rectify the violation to the satisfaction of the Municipality and pay a sum determined by the Administrator/Clerk, as well as any costs associated with the reconnection of the sanitary sewer supply before the sanitary sewerage is reconnected. This applies as well to any accounts currently outstanding. Arrangements for a payment plan with respect to delinquent accounts must be made. The complete by-law can be found online at www.salisburynb.ca.

DOG TAGS

Your 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee (a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st).

Registration fees are:

\$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$25 on April 1st); or
\$30.00 if not spayed or neutered (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$45 on April 1st).

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

***** NO DOG TAGS WILL BE ISSUED WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT. *****

Dog Tags can be purchased at either the Village Office (located at 56 Douglas Street) or at Silver Fox Veterinary Medical Centre.

WINTER PARKING

Just a reminder that for the purpose of snow-removal, no person shall stand or park a vehicle on any highway or street within the Village of Salisbury between the hours of 1:00am and 7:00am from the first day of November in any year until the first day of April in the following year.

In partnership with the New Brunswick Emergency Measures Organization, the Village of Salisbury urges residents to be prepared to manage on our own for at least 72 hours while NB Power works to restore service.

Have an emergency plan and a storm kit covering the needs of your family (including pets!).

Are you ready?

GET A KIT

A basic emergency kit should contain the following supplies:

- ☐ Water (two litres per person per day)
- ☐ Non-perishable food (Canned and dried goods, energy bars, etc. Replace each year.)
- ☐ Manual can opener
- ☐ Wind-up or battery-powered flashlight (and extra batteries)
- ☐ Wind-up or battery-powered radio (and extra batteries)
- ☐ Candles and matches or lighter
- ☐ First aid kit
- ☐ Extra cash money (smaller bills and change)
- ☐ Spare house and car keys
- ☐ A copy of emergency plan and contact information
- ☐ Prescription medications
- ☐ Special items such as infant formula, equipment for persons with disabilities or food, water and medication for your pets or service animal.

Check at home to see if you have everything you need.
