

Plastic Soup a Disastrous Meal



humankind SO bent destruction? Why so apathetic in the face of annihilating warfare, repeated massive oil spills and choking urban smog? Equally awful is the "Plastic Soup" in our oceans.

A picture of a Hawaiian beach reveals the folly of humans. It shows a huge amount of plastic washed ashore - an insult to a beautiful beach. Such ocean garbage is a serious hazard for sea life. Don't believe the rest us are immune to this environmental disaster. Our lives, too, depend on our oceans.

Small planktonic organisms, through photosynthesis, transform carbon in air and seawater into organic compounds, an essential element of Earth's carbon cycle. They generate about half the atmosphere's oxygen, as much per year as all land plants. Plankton also provides a food source for marine animals. But studies show plastic particles are also being ingested by these animals. This poses a major problem for us all.

Microplastics carry toxic chemicals such as DDT and heavy metals. Scientists say concentrations can reach a million times higher than present in the natural environment. The worrying point is that these contaminated particles are in our food chain and who knows what new diseases will emerge.

Humankind should get its act together. Ocean plastics are concentrating in large offshore patches, extending for miles, consisting of floating and submerged debris. Microplastics and other garbage are present in all oceans and found even at the deepest levels. It's been called "Plastic Soup."

It's estimated the "Great Pacific Garbage Patch" contains at least 70,000 tons of ocean plastic across an area twice the size of Texas! But don't believe it is only the large garbage patches that are the concern. Most of the plastic material is small and distributed throughout the

The 2018 study confirmed that most Follow us Instagram @docgiff waste products in the ocean were made from plastic. A major culprit was

on cigarettes containing plastic filters. When will humans understand this smoking madness must end?

> The fishing industry is not so innocent either. As dependent as it is on preserving a healthy ocean environment, it gets a big F grade. The World Animal Protection Federation, a non-profit association, reports fishers dump an estimated 700 tons of "ghost fishing gear" into the oceans every year. Why? They do not want to spend the money for repairs.

> This further pollutes the ocean. It also traps and ensnares sea life. Animals face another problem. They are eating all this garbage. For instance, in 2018 a dead sperm whale washed ashore on the Spanish coast. A necroscopy revealed the whale's stomach contained 64 pounds of plastic trash! This trash is part of the diet of 800 marine species!

> The US-based Natural Resources Defence Council is trying to get this "Plastic Soup" from getting into the ocean in the first place. Other organizations are monitoring the presence of microplastics so small they float in the air. Very, very small nanoparticles have been proven to pass through cell walls in fish and humans, where they can be chemically active and potentially affect endocrine function, for example.

> We are late in realizing the impact of plastic waste and far too slow to act. If we want to protect our brain, lungs, kidneys, endocrine system, and other organs, it means getting active. Banning plastic bags and radically reducing plastic consumption is required. Eliminating microplastics from common products is also needed. Consumers need to demand less plastic packaging, always recycle, and change buying

> Let's not make plastic soup our every meal - and our demise.

Hanging Out

Up, down, all around. We live indoors, most of the time, come winter, some of us in rather congested space. The 400 sq. ft. condo dweller and the resident of a monster home have one thing in common, besides a roof over their head: a few indoor tropical plants can make dwelling there a whole lot comosum It is designated a "clean air more livable.

Green plants transpire moisture and produce oxygen. They do not necessarily require a lot of attention and they can be good company: no talking back or need for a midnight walk. Need we say more?

The space issue can be addressed by locating some hanging plants around your place. Here are our top 6 choices:

Burro's Tail. Sedum morganianum This really looks cool in a hot window. A succulent that needs bright light, somewhere that you won't knock it as the burro's tails are brittle and drop off easily. It needs very little water. Propagates easily from cuttings so if you do knock off a stem, push it into new soil and add water. Voila. Produce a new Burro's tail in no time.

Grape Ivy. Cissus rhombifolia While this lush looking foliage plant

This summer, our village will be participating in the CIB competition. https://communitiesinbloom.ca Each community is awarded a bloom rating based on the scoring by the judges. In the summer of 2019, Petitcodiac received 4 blooms out of 5, an excellent achievement for our first time competing. So what is CIB you might ask? It is a national volunteer and partnership-driven organization that uses multi-tiered competitive evaluation to promote community improvement. It is so much more than just blooms!

We compete in the national "population" category and are judged functions. in the under 5,000 population size. In other words, we compete with other municipalities across Canada all with a population of under 5,000 residents. Isolation

Are you feeling lonely and isolated? Can't go shopping freely; can't visit friends and relatives; can't go to appointments; can't live the life you think you should. COVID SUCKS - RIGHT? You hope this will all be over soon - and it may be – soon; for you – right? There is light at the end of the tunnel – right? But what if it was not going to be over soon? Would you feel bad about that? Would you be distressed, frustrated, discouraged, depressed and maybe even angry? Of course you would. Look at the media – people are there already.

WELL GUESS WHAT? For a lot of our residents in New Brunswick, this has been their life for longer than twenty-some months and it won't be over soon, even with vaccines and medications to fight Covid.

WHO ARE THESE PEOPLE? They are your friends, your neighbours and your relatives, but they are isolated regardless of Covid because they have no transportation. They may be older or infirm and unable to drive or they may live in the country and want to stay in their homes in the country, but they can't take public transportation for occasional outings because it is not available or because it is expensive and far above their budget limits.

YOU may be able to help solve this. **YES YOU!** Urban/Rural Rides provides rides to these people at an affordable cost. Riders pay a small amount of the cost, prorated based on their income, and some funding comes from grants and donations. The greatest part comes from volunteer drivers providing their time for the rides. Drivers use their own vehicles but are reimbursed for the fuel and operating cost. They require extra liability insurance but even that is reimbursed. Most drivers provide only a few rides per month, but more can be available, that is THEIR/YOUR choice. There is no short notice. We do all the work since we have a ride coordinator who matches drivers and riders. Make her task easier by giving her more choice of drivers. Drivers are asked a day or two in advance and can decline if it doesn't suit their schedule, or sometimes they can work it into their schedule. Right now, during Covid, some drivers have decided not to drive and that is okay, but some continue to drive clients to medical appointments or they may drive supplies from food banks to the clients with no personal contact. The program even provides approved masks and cleaning supplies.

These drives can be fun for the drivers too. We know that many have developed a great camaraderie or friendship with their riders. Urban/Rural Rides under various names, has expanded from a few rides per week a number of years ago, to thousands of rides annually even during Covid (some restrictions apply), and we now cover all of Westmoreland and Albert Counties with work in progress to expand further into the province.

To help these people in need we need your help. YES THAT MEANS YOU! Drivers must pass a criminal record check and a driver certification, but most people qualify readily. Recently retired folks are especially helpful since they are capable of driving, and this gives them new purpose.

Will you show your true colours as a generous volunteer in New Brunswick? Will you volunteer or get more information to consider volunteering? Call our ride Coordinator - Annie at 962-3073 or our executive manager, - Kelly at 215-2100. Come on in. Be part of the parade and not just part of the pavement!

We are even a registered charity and can accept financial donations with tax receipts if that is a consideration for you.







- 2) Ensure that these bins do not fall into disrepair. There have been cases of broken boards and exposed nails, which are a safety hazard for the collector.
- 3) Please keep the bins clean, as they can attract pests. Rats nibbling on bin contents have been reported.

UTILITY (SEWER) OPERATING ACCOUNT

Residents of the Village of Salisbury who live within the serviceable boundary for municipal sewer service have received their sewer bills for 2022 at a rate of \$325.00 per unit.

The annual January-February pause on interest is coming to an end in March.

On March 2nd, interest equivalent to 2% per month will be added to any sewer accounts overdue since the January billing.

OVERDUE SEWER ACCOUNTS

By-Law 45, Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System allows for disconnection of services on overdue accounts. Any unpaid portion of sewer charges after the due date can be subject to refusal or discontinued at any time without notice. Where a sanitary sewerage system has been discontinued, the owner of the premises shall rectify the violation to the satisfaction of the Municipality and pay a sum determined by the Administrator/Clerk, as well as any costs associated with the reconnection of the sanitary sewer supply before the sanitary sewerage is reconnected. This applies as well to any accounts currently outstanding. Arrangements for a payment plan with respect to delinguent accounts must be made. WINTER PARKING

Just a reminder that for the purpose of snow-removal, no person shall stand or park a vehicle on any highway or street within the Village of Salisbury between the hours of 1:00am and 7:00am from the first day of November in any year until the first day of April in the following

year.

DOGS MUST BE KEPT ON **LEASHES IN PUBLIC**

A reminder to those with dogs that Highland Park and the Wetland Trail in Salisbury are NOT "dog parks;" that is, dogs MUST be kept on leashes as is the rule for all public spaces in the village. Allowing your dog to run loose is a violation of By-law No. 41 (Animal Control By-law). The Village of Salisbury, and especially the wildlife, thank you for your understanding with regards to this.

DOG TAGS

Your 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags must be purchased by the end of March to avoid paying a late fee (a \$15.00 penalty will be added to the regular registration fee for tags not bought before April 1st).

Registration fees are:

\$10.00 for spayed or neutered dogs (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$25 on April 1st); or \$30.00 if not spayed or neutered (this, factoring in the late fee, will increase to \$45 on April 1st).

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) vears thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with

the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.




