FAME, Flyball Agility Maritime Express, will be hosting a flyball tournament at the Petitcodiac Arena on the weekend of April 23 and 24. FAME is a Greater Moncton area dog sport club which has been hosting various dog sporting events since 1991. This will our

first tournament in over 2 years because of Covid 19 and we are excited to be back competing and pleased to be hosting the tournament in the community of Petitcodiac with teams attending from all three Maritime Provinces.

Flyball is a team sport that is

played in many parts of the world and welcomes all dogs. We are especially proud that many of our competing dogs are rescues. This is also for all age groups. For anyone watching flyball, it is very clear to anyone how much the dogs enjoy this as well as the humans that are racing. It is also a huge social aspect to it. We are all friends on and off the mats. The sport involves teams of four dogs in a relay style race in head-to-head competition against another four-dog team. The dogs race down a fifty-one-foot course over four jumps, retrieve a ball and carry the ball back up the course over the jumps. When teams complete the course without error, they earn points based on their time to earn titles awarded by our governing body, The North American Flyball Association.





For anyone watching flyball, it is very clear how much the dogs enjoy this as well as the

humans that are racing. There is also a huge social aspect to it. We are all friends on and off the mats and enjoy each other's company and we always cheer each other. The tournament is open to the public free of charge and racing will start each day around 9am and continue through the day. There will be a little token for anyone attending and also note that the canteen will be open until 2pm. ## Village Council News

On March 8, 2022 I received some outstanding news from Horizon Health concerning our new medical center. Here are the pertinent paragraphs from that letter:

*"Dear Mayor Pollock:*

*I am delighted to share with you that Minister Dorothy Shephard has indicated to Horizon that the Department of Health is in a position to support an update to the requirements and costing in design for the construction of a new medical health centre in Petitcodiac.*

*Horizon Capital Assets group will be working with the local Primary Healthcare leadership of Horizon along with officials at the Department of Health to initiate this work so that it would be ready to begin construction in the spring of 2023, pending final capital budget approval in that fiscal year. Horizon will be communicating this project as a capital priority."*

*This letter was signed by Dr John Dorman, Interim President and Chief Executive Officer Horizon Health.*

Some more good news for the village, we have two new subdivisions opening up in the village this year. One on Renfrew Street and one at the end of Fawcett Avenue.

The village's Recreation Department is hoping to make some improvements to the Maple Street ice surface area and the walking/snowshoeing trails over the summer. We are also seeking qualified aquatic instructors for the upcoming swim season.

I would also like to thank the Kiwanis Canteen for its contribution to our arenas' great reputation. It was very well-supported by our home crowds as well as our visitors. We received a great number of positive compliments from both.

## RIVER GLADE INTERNATIONAL DEDICATED IN MEMORY OF ERNIE MCLEAN AND PAT RODGERS



to everyone who wanted to be a part of the sport while keeping the class affordable. Those goals Pat put forth of accessibility and affordability in the Sunday Drivers division continue to be instilled within several promoters throughout Atlantic Canada.

Several drivers recorded their first big win or their biggest win of their racing career in the River Glade International at River Glade Speedway. Ontario's John

(RIVER GLADE, NB - March 24, 2022) -

Petty International Raceway will be honouring the legacy of two pioneers of Canadian stock car racing during the June 17th and 18th running of the 58th River Glade International. Ernie McLean and Pat Rodgers both had significant impacts on stock car racing in Southeastern New Brunswick but their contributions to the sport are felt well beyond county lines. Their innovations and creations have been enjoyed by generations of racers, crew members and fans and will be for several generations to come.

Known to many as the "Godfather of Maritime Motorsports," Ernie McLean's contributions to the sport in Canada are vast. Originally from Chatham, Ernie and his wife Winona returned to New Brunswick from Ontario and built River Glade Speedway in 1964. The River Glade International was born in 1965 and was successful from the drop of the first flag. In addition to promoting River Glade Speedway for its first 30 years, they had stepped up to help out several tracks in the Maritimes and were instrumental in the formation of MASCAR, building the foundation of the sport we all enjoy today. Among his accolades, Ernie was awarded with the Canadian Promoter of the Year in 1984, was inducted into the Canadian Motorsports Hall of Fame in 2004 and was a founder of the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame, a Hall in which he and Winona were inducted into in 2010. The Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame Museum is located a short drive from Petty International Raceway in Petitcodiac, New Brunswick.

McLean sold River Glade Speedway to Pat Rodgers in 1994. A man who helped change entry level racing in New Brunswick in the '90s, Pat was the promoter of River Glade Speedway from 1994 to 2004. Along with making several renovations to the historic facility during his tenure, he pioneered the Sunday Drivers class in New Brunswick. This front wheel drive, four cylinder class has been the launching pad for many stock car careers within the Province. Thinking of the racer, it was important to Pat that the division be accessible

Shirtliff won the inaugural running in 1965 and has seen the likes of Don Biederman, Junior Hanley, Jim Hallahan, Earl Ross, Caleb Dunn, Adelard Cormier, Jimmy Dunn and Frank Fraser, a six time winner, etch their name into history as a winner in the early years of the event. When Petty International Raceway reopened in 2011, the race became a part of the Maritime Pro Stock Tour schedule and also included a Late Model Sportsman portion of the show. Today's stars continue to write the next chapters of the prestigious event with Cory Hall (Jolicure, NB; Pro Stock) and Laurie Cormier (Riverview, NB; Sportsman) being the two most recent Late Model winners of the event in 2021.

In 2022, the 58th River Glade International In Memory of Ernie McLean and Pat Rodgers Weekend will see the event play out over two days. The Father's Day Weekend will begin on Friday, June 17th with a 100-lap Street Stock race with support action from the Four Cylinder Mini Stock and Women on Wheels divisions. The Friday night portion of the weekend will conclude with a two hour Pro Stock/Super Late Model practice. Saturday, June 18th is headlined by the \$7,000-to-win Super Late Model 150 and the \$4,000-to-win Late Model Sportsman 100. In addition to the big money Late Model shows, the Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classics powered by Conrad Bros will make their only stop to Petty International Raceway for 2022 and will be joined by the Bandolero division as the opening acts.

The 2022 season begins at Petty International Raceway on Saturday, May 21st with five divisions in actions. The Late Model Sportsman and Street Stock divisions will contest 75-lap features, the Legends will race in Twin 40-lap features with support from the Mini Stock, Atlantic Modified Tour, Bandolero and Women on Wheels divisions.

## Decarbonizing Healthcare



Last month we wrote about the environmental disaster of plastics choking the world's oceans and the consequences for human health through the food chain. This month let's look through a different lens at another environmental disaster of our own making - the carbon footprint of healthcare itself.

Here's something you may not know. If the global healthcare sector were a country, it would be the fifth-largest greenhouse gas emitter!

A report from Health Care Without Harm calculated that the environmental impact of healthcare amounts to 4.4% of global net emissions - the equivalent of 514 coal-fired power plants.

So far, North Americans are among the main culprits. By way of example, the report notes, "The United States health sector, the world's number one emitter in both absolute and per capita terms, produces 57 times more emissions per person than does India."

What exactly is causing all these emissions? Primarily, it is the energy consumption of healthcare facilities, healthcare transportation, and health product manufacturing, use, and disposal.

It's not easy for individuals to have clout with the healthcare industry and its complex global supply chains. But there are things everyone can do to share a sense of responsibility.

First and foremost, stay healthy. If you need yet another reason to do it, this is it: staying healthy means not using healthcare products. This will reduce your own contribution to health sector emissions. As it happens, the things that keep people healthy are the same things that protect the environment - e.g., reducing red meat consumption and walking in place of driving.

Second, make use of tele-health. There are times when seeing a doctor in person is an imperative, but tele-health is proving to be a valuable component of the system. It can offer convenience, speed, ease of access, low cost, quality care, safety, and a low-carbon footprint. This is one of the great lessons of the pandemic.

Third, advocate for healthcare providers to decarbonize and be environmentally responsible. The more people

make this an issue, the more the pressure and incentives build for environmental accountability in healthcare.

Here's an example. People suffering from respiratory conditions may use metered-dose inhalers (MDIs) that work based on a pressurized propellant in an aerosol chamber. Unfortunately, these propellant gases are up to 3,350 times more potent than carbon dioxide in trapping the sun's heat! A single inhaler can release as much emissions as a small car driven for 180 miles. Atypical patient may use 12 inhalers a year. Dry powder inhalers are a good alternative that can be used by the vast majority of patients.

But here are the big conundrums that need innovative solutions. It's not just older people who inevitably need more healthcare - and therein add to the emissions of the sector. It's those who fall ill too early in life from avoidable problems. Plus, there are many people around the world who desperately need better healthcare and for whom healthcare spending must increase. To offset the impact of these deserving consumers, there's an urgent need for a global transition to clean, renewable energy.

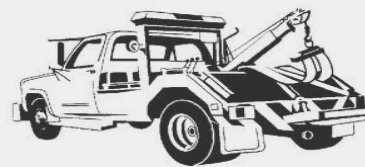
In addition, instead of learning from the errors of developed countries where people are eating too much meat and not getting enough exercise, developing countries that achieve higher income levels are making the same mistakes. The epidemic of diabetes in North America is now a worldwide pandemic.

Finally, doctors must think differently. The Hippocratic Oath implores "First, do no harm." It's time to include the planet, not just the patient, in the thinking.

## Petitcodiac Area Garden Club

Happy Spring Solstice! April is such an exciting month - longer days, buds on the trees, grass turning and Spring showers for May flowers. Way back in January, we talked about keep your Christmas Poinsettia year around. How did you make out? I'm happy to report that both my white and red Poinsettias are still in bloom! So, what's next. Here are the next steps:

- It's time to cut each of the old flowering stems or branches back to 4 to 6 inches in height, leaving one to three leaves on each of the old stems or branches. Cutting the plant back with cause buds to grow and develop.
- Keep your plant in a sunny window between 15-21C (60-70F). Remove any faded and dried parts of the plant and add more soil. Sterile soil is recommended.
- Mid-month gradually decrease water, allowing the plant to get dry between waterings. Caution: If the stem starts to shrivel, your plant is too stressed and is dying. Give it a bit more water but continue to gradually reduce the water.
- In a week or two, when the plant has adjusted to the drying process, move it to a cool spot like the basement or heated garage. You will want to keep it about 15C (60F).

For some, that prefer to just

let their plants grow, without cutting back, that is an option too. They may not bloom in the Fall, but they will

still make a beautiful house plant. More to come in May on the Poinsettia.

Students with the PRS Essential Skills Program will soon be constructing the benches, arbors, entryway, and accessible picnic tables as part of the Community Orchard Pathway Project, under the leadership of Mr. Wilbur. Plans for each item are complete and the finished products will be great! Urban/Rural Rides began as Rural Rides in 2014 in Salisbury and Petitcodiac. Since then, in collaboration with Tele-Drive Albert County, and the volunteer drive program of the Volunteer Centre of Southeast New Brunswick, we expanded to the Tantramar region in 2017 and then expanded to provide service throughout Westmorland and Albert Counties in 2018.

## Getting Started

No matter what the weather, the calendar tells us it is spring. We know that warmer temperatures are ahead of us, and there will be countless opportunities to get your knees dirty.

If you are new to gardening or just need some important reminders of how to succeed out there, here is our primer to get you started:

1. **Where is the sun?** Where does it come up in the morning and down at night? Which direction does your house and future garden face? These are important questions to ask yourself before you plant. A hot, sunny garden calls for distinctly different plant selection than a cool, shady one.

2. **Make your garden smaller than you plan.** The image that you have in your head of a great looking garden will not likely consider the work of creating the garden in the first place, and the time and effort of maintaining it. Until you experience this for yourself, you have no way of measuring it. Small successes will provide encouragement to go bigger in future.

3. **Creating a bed in an existing lawn area?** Cut the lawn short and lay down 10 pages or more of newspaper, being careful not to use this column for that purpose. Pile 10 to 20 cm of triple mix (equal parts soil, compost and peat) over the newspaper, and 5 to 10 cm of cedar bark mulch over that. Water thoroughly, until the entire pile is wet.

Note: if existing soil is clay based, increase the amount of soil/mulch accordingly.

Do this as soon as you can. The longer your bed settles, the better your

new garden will perform.

4. **Plant your new garden as soon as you can.** Acquire winter hardy plants like trees, shrubs, perennials and even perennial food plants like asparagus, raspberries, and the like. Frost sensitive plants like tomatoes and petunias are planted after threat of frost, usually around May 24.

5. **Shop for plants early.** We anticipate another record year at garden retailers, and we know that there are shortages of many plants that will be in high demand. Shop early to avoid disappointment.

### For Containers:

1. **Choose a container that is larger than you planned** (opposite of our advice for the garden). The larger the pot or container, the greater the soil volume and the better plants will perform in it. Small pots dry out quickly and demand more frequent watering. Use only quality potting soil or container mix from a brand that you trust.

2. **Ensure there is good drainage.** Water must flow from the surface of the soil to the drainage holes freely. When water pours out the drainage holes of a window box or hanging basket, it is a good sign.

3. **Plant according to conditions.** Much like your garden, plant sun loving plants in a sunny location. If you are in a high-rise condo or apartment, be aware that persistent wind has a drying effect. West and south exposure especially dry out containers quickly. Meaning, you will be watering more frequently.

Check your newly planted garden daily. Look for unwanted bugs or disease, pick off dead leaves and flowers and of course, check the soil for dryness.

Push your finger into the soil up to the second knuckle and if the soil is dry, apply enough water to reach the root zone.

Manage your expectations. Everyone has seen the pictures of the perfect garden and new gardeners often

start out believing that they will achieve this in their first year.

Start out slow, be prepared to make mistakes, celebrate, and learn from them.

Know that even though Mark has

been gardening for over 40 years, he continues to make mistakes and learn. This is part of the process and with time, you will accept it and enjoy it.

## The Hubley Bluenose Special



The Hubley Bluenose Special race car is on display at the Maritime Motorsports Hall of Fame Museum, 5 Hooper Lane, Petitcodiac. It has no comparison to the cars of to-day that race in the Maritimes.

The Hubley car was built and named for Reginald "Reg" Hubley in 1938. It raced around the Halifax Exhibition grounds track at speeds of up to 100 miles an hour. In 1938, 100 mph was an incredible speed and good enough for top honors against a field of speeders from leading United States racing centers.

The Hubley is on loan to the Maritime

Motorsports Hall of Fame from the Canadian Science and Technology Museum in Ottawa.

If you'd like to see this piece of racing history stop by the Hall of Fame Tuesday - Friday between 9:30am - 4:30pm. 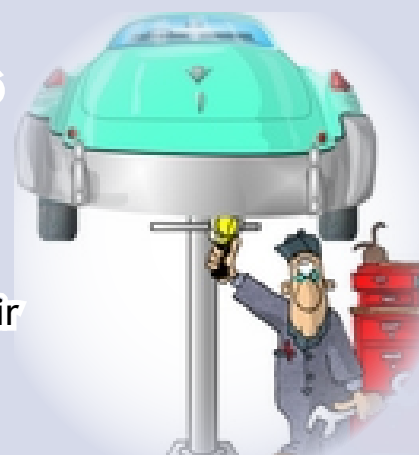

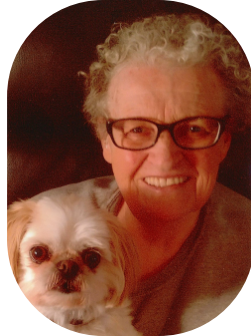

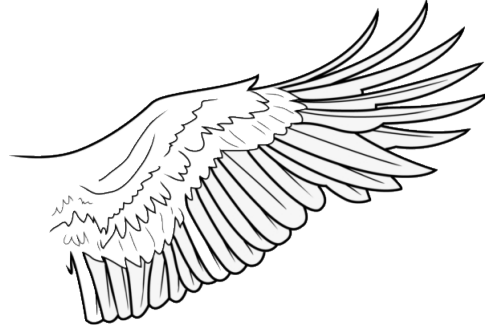

### 2022 SALISBURY DOG TAGS LATE FEE IN EFFECT AS OF APRIL 1

As of April 1st, late fees will be in effect for 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags.

Factoring in this \$15 increase, registration fees as of April 1st will be:

- \$10.00 + \$15.00 = \$25.00 for

spayed or neutered dogs

- \$30.00 + \$15.00 = \$45.00 if

not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of

three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag, you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

**\*\* NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT \*\***

As of April 1st, tags will only be available at the Village Office, 56 Douglas Street.

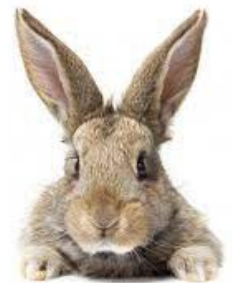
