

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



"Dear Mayor Pollock:

Minister Dorothy Shephard has indicated to Horizon that the Department of Health is in a position to support an update to the requirements and costing in design for the construction of a new medical health centre in Petitcodiac.

Horizon Capital Assets group will be working with the local Primary Healthcare leadership of Horizon along with officials at the Department of Health to initiate this work so that it would be ready to begin construction in the spring of 2023, pending final capital budget approval in that fiscal year. Horizon will be communicating this project as a capital priority."

Petty International Raceway will be honouring the legacy of two during the June 17th and 18th running of the 58th River Glade International. Ernie McLean and Pat Rodgers both had significant impacts on stock car racing in Southeastern New Brunswick but their contributions to the sport are felt well beyond county lines. Their innovations and creations have been enjoyed by generations of racers, crew members and fans and will be for several generations to come.

Known to many as the "Godfather of Maritime Motorsports," Ernie McLean's contributions to the sport in Canada are vast. Originally from Chatham, Ernie and his wife Winona returned to New Brunswick from Ontario and built River Glade Speedway in 1964. The River Glade International was born in 1965 and was successful from the drop of the first flag. In addition to promoting River Glade Speedway for its first 30 years, they had stepped on Wheels divisions. RIVER GLADE INTERNATIONAL DEDICATED IN

MEMORY OF ERNIE MCLEAN AND PAT RODGERS

Several drivers recorded their first big win or their biggest win of their racing career in the River Glade International at River Glade Speedway. Ontario's John

Shirtliff won the inaugural running in 1965 and has seen the likes of Don Biederman, Junior Hanley, Jim Hallahan, pioneers of Canadian stock car racing Earl Ross, Caleb Dunn, Adelard Cormier, Jimmy Dunn and Frank Fraser, a six time winner, etch their name into history as a winner in the early years of the event. When Petty International Raceway reopened in 2011, the race became a part of the Maritime Pro Stock Tour schedule and also included a Late Model Sportsman portion of the show. Today's stars continue to write the next chapters of the prestigious event with Corv Hall Jolicure, NB; Pro Stock) and Laurie Cormier (Riverview, NB; Sportsman) being the two most recent Late Model winners of the event in 2021.

In 2022, the 58th River Glade International In Memory of Ernie McLean and Pat Rodgers Weekend will see the event play out over two days. The Father's Day Weekend will begin on Friday, June 17th with a 100-lap Street Stock race with support action from the Four Cylinder Mini Stock and Women portion of the weekend will conclude with a two hour Pro Stock/Super Late Model practice. Saturday, June 18th is headlined by the \$7,000-to-win Super Late Model 150 and the \$4,000-to-win Late Model Sportsman 100. In addition to the big money Late Model shows, the Heart of a Champion Hot Rod Classics only stop to Petty International Raceway for 2022 and will be joined by the Bandolero division as the opening acts.

Here's something you may not know. If the global healthcare sector were a country, it would be the fifthlargest greenhouse gas emitter!

A report from Health Care Without Harm calculated that the environmental impact of healthcare amounts to 4.4% of global net emissions - the equivalent of 514 coal-fired power plants.

So far, North Americans are among the main culprits. By way of example, the report notes, "The United emissions of the sector. It's those who States health sector, the world's number fall ill too early in life from avoidable one emitter in both absolute and per capita terms, produces 57 times more emissions per person than does India." healthcare spending must increase. To

What exactly is causing all these emissions? Primarily, it is the energy consumption of healthcare facilities. healthcare transportation, and health product manufacturing, use, and disposal.

It's not easy for individuals to have clout with the healthcare industry and its complex global supply chains. But there are things everyone can do to share a sense of responsibility.

First and foremost, stay healthy. If you need yet another reason to do it, this is it: staying healthy means not using healthcare products. This will reduce your own contribution to health sector emissions. As it happens, the things that keep people healthy are the same things that protect the environment - e.g., reducing red meat consumption and walking in place of driving.

Second, make use of tele-health. There are times when seeing a doctor in person is an imperative, but tele-health is proving to be a valuable component

of the system. offer lt can convenience. speed, ease of access, low cost, quality care. safety, and a lowcarbon footprint. This is one of the great lessons of the pandemic.

Third, advocate for healthcare providers to decarbonize and be environmentally responsibility.



such an exciting month - longer days, buds on the trees, grass turning and Spring showers for May flowers. Way back in January, we talked about keep your Christmas Poinsettia year around. How did you make out? I'm happy to report that both my white and red Poinsettias are still in bloom! So, what's next. Here are the next steps:

flowering stems or branches back to 4 to 6 inches in height, leaving one to three leaves on each of the old stems or branches. Cutting the plant back with cause buds to grow and develop.

Keep your plant in a sunny window between 15-21C (60-70F). Remove any faded and dried parts of the plan and add more soil. Sterile soil is recommended.

• Mid-month gradually decrease water, allowing the plan to get dry between waterings. Caution: If the stem starts to shrivel, your plant is too stressed and is dving. Give it a bit more water but continue to gradually reduce the water. • In a week or two, when the plant has adjusted to the drying process, move it to a cool spot like the basement or heated garage. You will want to keep it about 15C (60F).

Here We Grow Again

Urban/Rural Rides began as Rural Rides in 2014 in Salisbury and Petitcodiac. Since then, in collaboration with Tele-Drive Albert County, and the volunteer drive program of the Volunteer Centre of Southeast New Brunswick, we expanded to the Tantramar region in 2017 and then expanded to provide service throughout Westmorland and Albert Counties in 2018.

Now, in 2022, the service has officially expanded to communities in the Greater Fredericton area including Cambridge-Narrows, Hanwell, Kingsclear, Oromocto and New Maryland. A launch event was held at Hanwell place in Hanwell on Tuesday March 22 and was very well attended. Additional communities in the Greater Fredericton area will see the service launch in the future once community champions and anchor organizations are identified.

A Community Champion is someone who can connect with a wide group of people from which to recruit volunteer drivers, is connected to an anchor organization supporting their efforts, such as an Age Friendly Committee, senior's advocacy group, or municipal and town council or it's advisory group and serves as a liaison between the community and Urban/Rural Rides. They provide the local connection in the community for the service.

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

Getting Started

No matter what the weather, the calendar tells us it is spring. We know that warmer temperatures are ahead of us, and there will be countless opportunities to get your knees dirty.

If you are new to gardening or just need some important reminders of how to succeed out there, here is our primer to get you started:

Where is the sun? Where does 1. it come up in the morning and down at night? Which direction does your house and future garden face? These are important questions to ask yourself before you plant. A hot, sunny garden calls for distinctly different plant selection than a cool, shady one.

Make your garden smaller than 2. you plan. The image that you have in your head of a great looking garden will not likely consider the work of creating the garden in the first place, and the time and effort of maintaining it. Until you experience this for yourself, you have no way of measuring it. Small successes will provide encouragement to go bigger in future.

Creating a bed in an existing 3. **lawn area?** Cut the lawn short and lay down 10 pages or more of newspaper, being careful not to use this column for that purpose. Pile 10 to 20 cm of triple or disease, pick off dead leaves and mix (equal parts soil, compost and peat) over the newspaper, and 5 to 10 cm of cedar bark mulch over that. Water thoroughly, until the entire pile is wet.

Note: if existing soil is clay based, increase the amount of soil/ mulch accordingly.

4. as you can. Acquire winter hardy plants like trees, shrubs, perennials and even perennial food plants like asparagus, raspberries, and the like. Frost sensitive plants like tomatoes and petunias are planted after threat of frost, usually around May 24.

Shop for plants early. 5. We anticipate another record year at garden retailers, and we know that there are shortages of many plants that will be in high demand. Shop early to avoid disappointment.

For Containers:

Choose a container that is larger than you planned (opposite of our advice for the garden). The larger the pot or container, the greater the soil volume and the better plants will perform in it. Small pots dry out quickly and demand more frequent watering. Use only quality potting soil or container mix from a brand that you trust.

2. Ensure there is good drainage. Water must flow from the surface of the soil to the drainage holes freely. When water pours out the drainage holes of a window box or hanging basket, it is a good sign.

Plant according to conditions. 3. Much like your garden, plant sun loving plants in a sunny location. If you are in a high-rise condo or apartment, be aware that persistent wind has a drying effect. West and south exposure especially dry out containers quickly. Meaning, you will be watering more frequently.

Check your newly planted garden daily. Look for unwanted bugs flowers and of course, check the soil for drvness

Push your finger into the soil up to the second knuckle and if the soil is dry, apply enough water to reach the root zone.



The Hubley Bluenose Special

The Hubley car was built and named for Reginald "Reg" Hubley in 1938. 



That life would have bid me shoulder If I were alone to bear The things that are born by angels Or the answers there are to prayer


And although I'd love to see one I'm sure I would shake with fright For the glory surrounding angels I've heard is an awesome sight


