Looking out the window, this gardener can see green grass and the tips of trees and bushes changing colors. Tulips and daffodils are coming up and the earliest of Spring flowers are in bloom. How wonderful it is to see everything coming to life. I suspect many of you are already busy in your yards with lots of preparations for this year's gardening season. Here in the Village, clean-up at Veterans Memorial Park has started and tree trimming took place at the Community Garden. Watch our Facebook page for more clean-up dates throughout the Village.

In 2021, the Victory Garden, located in Veterans Memorial Park was dedicated to the memory of the brave Canadian troops played an important role in the liberation of the Netherlands from Nazi forces on May 5, 1945. Every year since the war, the Netherlands have sent thousands of tulips to Ottawa in appreciation of Canada's sacrifice. On May 5, take a few minutes to remember the bravery of Canadian soldiers and perhaps visit the garden when it is in bloom this summer.

The dates have been announced for Communities in Bloom. The representatives arrive on July 12 and the

tour of the Village and judging will take place on July 13. Previously, Petitcodiac received 4 out of 5 Blooms and we are striving to add another Bloom this year. So how can you help? Keep these dates in mind and show the judges what a beautiful community we live in. Consider adding a vegetable or perennial garden at your home or spruce up the ones you have; get involved in the Spring Litter Cleanup on May 14; reach out to neighbors who may need a hand with their Spring clean-up. Presentation is everything and many hands make light work. To help get you started, plan to attend the 3rd Petitcodiac and Area Garden Club Annual Plant sale, being held May 28 at the Community Garden on Maple Street from 10 AM - 1 PM. There will be a large selection of perennials at incredibly affordable prices. The success of the Annual Plant Sale event relies on the generous and abundant donations of plants from community members. As you are cleaning up your beds and dividing perennials, please consider donating



any plants you will not be using to the Garden Club. Donations can be dropped off to Cathy Drury at 2 Smith Street (756-2068) or Karen Hall-Middleton at 430 Blakney Road (756-8224). Pick-up can also be arranged, by calling either Cathy or Karen.

The Seed Library is proving popular as it visits various locations in the Village. Right now, you can find it at SPOT. Due to its popularity, new donations of any seeds you are not using will be appreciated. The Seed Library will be at the Annual Plant Sale, providing you with access to both vegetable and flower seeds at no cost. Have some seeds you won't be using? Bring them along and donate or trade them. For location information or to donate seeds prior to the Annual Plant Sale, please contact Karen Hall-Middleton (756-8224).

In mid-April trees were trimmed at the Community Garden, as preparations are starting to put in the Community Orchard Pathway. It is still a bit too wet to begin the drainage improvements, but we expect that we will be on schedule to start in the next couple of weeks. We are very excited that the lumber has been delivered to PRS and students have begun to work on the benches, arbors, archways and accessible picnic tables. It is wonderful to be able to engage students in community projects, while they learn carpentry skills.

For the Orchard Pathway, we are looking for sponsors for the items being built by the students, along with shade trees. Here are the details: Benches: \$300; Bench/Arbor Combinations: \$500; Archway/Arbor Combinations: \$400; Shade Trees: \$500; Accessible picnic tables: \$500. Tax

receipts are available for all sponsorships and a plaque will be placed on the item sponsored. This is a wonderful way for families, organizations, community groups, businesses, and individuals to add to the beauty and accessibility of the Orchard Pathway. There is a \$10 key fee that will be refunded when you return your key at the end of the season. Plots are assigned on a FIRST COME BASIS and will be tilled as soon as the ground has dried sufficiently.

For Men, Don't Disregard a Lump in the Breast



depressants. Drugs for treating heart and stomach conditions, including ulcers, can trigger the problem. Too much or too little thyroid medication may be the cause. Recreational drugs can have a role as well.

The long list of possible causes doesn't end here. For instance, obesity also increases estrogen levels and increases fatty material in the breast. Even an enlarged prostate gland and bacterial and fungal infections are listed causes of this condition. And last, but not least, is aging.

Males who develop enlarged breasts face one difficult dilemma. That is, increased breast tissue is associated with the other sex. Psychological distress is an unfortunate consequence for men who then try to hide the condition. But like it or not, they should not ignore breast lumps and must consult a doctor.

Faced with so many possible causes, what is a doctor going to do? The first step is to rule out the possibility of cancer. This done by two non-invasive procedures, a mammogram and an ultrasound examination of both breasts. Both breasts are done because a malignancy could have spread to the other breast.

Regarding the psychology of gynecomastia, one male patient had this to say, "I found myself the only male sitting in a room occupied by women all waiting to have mammograms. It was an unusual experience. But I felt a connection with everyone in the room, all hoping to get the news there was no cancer found."

How long will it take to get the results of these procedures? It depends on the facility that performs them. Some fortunate patients will be referred to clinics where ultrasound technicians and radiologists immediately examine the tests and offer reports to patients before they leave - hopefully, with the diagnosis of gynecomastia, not cancer.

In some cases, gynecomastia becomes so pronounced that steps are taken to remove breast tissue. This can be done by either surgery or liposuction.

But in most cases of swollen and tender breast tissue in men, confirmation that cancer is not detected is reassurance enough. From there, the best treatment is patience while time and nature heal the problem.

The most important message for men and women alike? Screening for breast lumps saves lives. Don't neglect to do it.

The Struggle to Keep Up - We Need You!

The last couple of years have presented many challenges for non-profits. As a transportation service, we worked hard to observe safety protocols and do everything in our power to keep people safe from COVID. We were often at the mercy of the current levels of lockdown, frequently having to cancel dozens of rides in a span of a week or two when in high lockdown and hospitals and doctors cancelled appointments or switched to virtual. For those canceled appointments, they were then rescheduled meaning all those rides had to be re-booked.

A second challenge we faced was a decreased pool of volunteer drivers as several took a step back due to compromised health. Sadly, we also had several volunteers pass away in the past couple of years for a variety of reasons. We were, however, very fortunate to avoid any COVID cases the entire time the province was under the emergency order.

Sadly though, like many of our health care facilities, we are now struggling to keep up with demand because of an increase in volunteers either testing positive or isolating because they have been in contact with someone who has tested positive. We operate on the side of caution when there is contact because many of our clients are struggling with health issues. On the other side of things, everything is now open. People want to resume normal life and therefore the demand for rides is increasing. Unfortunately, that puts us in a position of turning down rides and sometimes, if a driver notifies us, they need to isolate and we cannot find a replacement for the rides they were booked to do, we may have to cancel or reschedule rides.

All of this to say, we need your help. We need more volunteer drivers to keep things running smoothly and to make sure those who need to get to medical appointments or access life needs like food, can do so in a timely manner. Drivers are reimbursed \$.46/km.

We have been blessed to have so many dedicated and caring volunteers over the years and we are grateful for the time they give. We know when we all work together, we can accomplish great things. We are inviting you to be part of this team of amazing volunteers who change lives one ride at a time.

An Old Kitchen Table

Another family dinner behind us, another stack of dishes washed, air dried, and put away, silverware back into its chest, leftovers packed into Tupperware into an overflowing fridge, and I am impressed with the bounty of food, family, memories and future.

The table from last year has been replaced by a sturdy hand made one, courtesy of my son. I love it. The old table is stored in the shed. It has a burnt out spot in the centre where a Christmas candle wreath burned right through it. The flames actually scorched the ceiling above it. I loved that old table mainly because it reminded me that angels had to have been present that night while I was at work during the nightshift. I'd left the candle burning, expecting a son to extinguish it, but he fell asleep on the sofa (and angels happened by).

Kitchen tables are wafting their way across my memory today. The earliest one I recall was an old drop-leaf table. It was covered with a linoleum square, and memories of Mama rolling out bread dough, cutting out cookies and biscuits come to mind, as do plates of deer meat, vegetables (all homegrown), family dinners on Sunday and Birthday cakes to no end.

If company from "the States"

showed up on holidays, we used the round oak table in the parlour. Our next door neighbour had her family visit her from "the States" one summer and borrowed Mama's good table. My cousins and I, a couple of weeks later were sent to retrieve it for our own expected guests. We were only 7 or 8 year old and as the castors didn't roll well down the dirt road, we upended it and rolled it on its edge, down the road and up the lane and Mama threw on a lacy tablecloth and we dined in style. That's when I first learned to appreciate the durability of "oak".

The table had in its day held dish-pan and drain pan, in an era when dishwasher was thrown on the rose bushes and table clothes were shaken outside.

Mama's table was the centre of the home and company always welcome. I remember Daddy telling us about a pet fawn they'd allowed free rein of the back-door, until she trotted in one day and grabbed the food off the preacher's plate. I believe he said it was pancakes. Oh my! The stories these old tables could tell.

In the city, years later, my mother had a diningroom suite. The table had a fold-down extension in the centre. One day she stood on the table

to paint the ceiling and it buckled, giving her an awful shin bruising (not all tables are good for everything).

When I married and our family outgrew the chrome table we'd acquired as a wedding gift, we bought a rugged steel table with an arborite top, 6 ft. long, able to accommodate the 10 cream cans that seated as many children (Papa and I used chairs). That table could tell many a tale from years of Christmas dinners, cozy suppers - the table was used for everything from chain-saw sharpening, Monopoly games, newborn baby baths, Valentine making, Bible reading, homework

assignments, to plant-potting, letter writing and hay harvest suppers. It held mugs of steaming hot chocolate after sleighrides, and morning pots of tea and bowls of oatmeal. I could go on forever, but when the children were all grown and the table was finally being removed from the kitchen, we up-ended it and in the ledge around the rim (out of sight for years) were tiny dried peas, and hard little pieces of liver from years before, stashed where only the smallest of fingers could hide them. Tears came to my eyes for I knew most of my children hated peas and liver. I remember how

the boys would watch as I served peas and complain saying, "How come I have more than my brother?" Yet if you gave them cake they'd complain, "How come his is bigger than mine?" Speaking of cake. I tallied up the number of Birthday cakes I'd made and served on that table and arrived at 258 for birthdays alone.

now we usually serve special dinners buffet style. Memories still come to call even though the faces are a bit different. Some family members are in Alberta, Australia and some in Heaven, but when the food is blessed and heads are bowed, each one is right here in the kitchen and my heart is overflowing with the bounty and memories of old kitchen tables.

6 Tools Every Gardener Needs

Gardeners are known to form attachments to their favourite garden tools. Mark is leaving his favourite digging spade to someone special (can't say who) in his will.

Having the right tools in the garden turns drudgery to joy and can improve us as gardeners.

With that in mind, here is our list of six essential garden tools:

1. Scoop, not a trowel. When you are down on your knees planting small perennials or vegetable transplants, you do not want to move soil by the thimble full. Rather, you want the option to move a volume of soil that makes it worth the effort. You need a scoop. Preferably a stainless steel (no rust, permanent edge) scoop that will stand up to moving

volume, hitting the odd stone or layer of clay in the process. A scoop that will stand up to years of abuse. A good one is about \$20 at most retailers.

2. Spade, not a shovel. There is nothing wrong with digging a hole with a shovel. We have shovels but we reach for a spade first, especially when it has been sharpened on a grinding wheel. A razor-sharp spade, which is a shovel with a flat mouth, is very handy for edging the lawn, picking up waste, digging and dividing perennials. It can move a greater volume of soil than a shovel, reducing the workload and helping you be more efficient with both your body movement and time.

3. Hand pruners, but good ones. Stems and small branches often need attention. The idea behind pruning is to control Mother nature to the extent that you and she can live together. We spend a lot of time clipping small branches. When we get the timing right, we maximize the flowering potential for many roses and flowering shrubs. A cheap pair of hand pruners will twist in your hand and not hold an edge while you work. A quality pair will cut through



green wood like a hot knife through butter. And they will last a very long time. The best in the business is Swiss made Felco, which run about \$70 or more and are worth every penny.

4. Leaf rake, a stiff one. You can buy a broad leaf rake for \$8 to \$30. The difference is the quality of the tines, which should flex and return to their original position while in use. This is called "memory" and you want to have good memories of using your leaf rake. Not only handy for raking fallen leaves come autumn but for garden clean up this time of year, excess grass clippings and even debris from the driveway. Noiseless compared to a leaf blower.

5. Hoe. Choose your weapon: a Dutch (push) or draw (pull) hoe. They all do the same job of cutting down weeds in their prime, while they are young. The hoe that works best for you is a personal matter. We like the traditional farmer's draw hoe. When you bring a new one home be sure to sharpen it on a grinding wheel if you have one or use a good file.

6. Orchard "tripod" ladder. Whether taming a vine or pruning mature trees, gardening is an activity which sometimes requires us to go vertical. These instances can pose safety risks, and if you have ever felt a traditional A-frame ladder teeter

on soft ground then you know what we mean. For these tasks, we find a three-legged orchard ladder is best.

Orchard ladders have a wide flare at the bottom of the climbing side, with a flared single leg on the other side which provides far superior stability on soft ground. A good orchard ladder can be hard to come by, so we recommend contacting a nursery supply company or ordering at <https://gardenerskit.com/>.

In this season of change, make sure you have the right tools at hand.

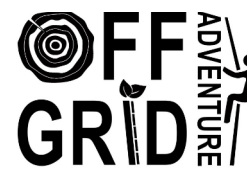

He told us how it can be powered by naphtha fuel, how it is pressurized by pumping the valve, and how the neck is heated to pull the fuel into the nozzle. This is how it is used as a blow torch, and to modify it into a soldering iron another part was added which was then heated up. He also mentioned how these were used to melt pots of lead for sealing cast iron sewer pipes.

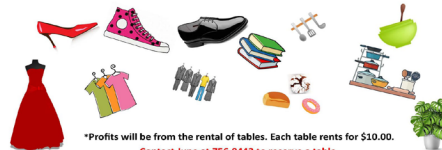

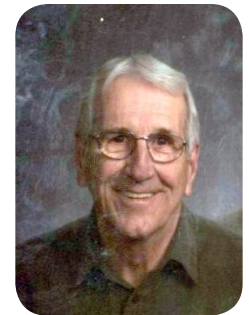

In November 2021 the Province of New Brunswick announced Amalgamations of communities as well as LSDs to shrink the number of Villages, Towns, Cities and Local Service Districts down from 340 to 90.

In Salisbury's case we are being brought together with a portion of the LSD of Coverdale (8%), a portion of the LSD of Salisbury (80%), and a portion of the LSD of Moncton (5%), final maps should be available shortly. For the most part areas of the LSD's where households go to school in Salisbury will be included with Salisbury. This will not take place until January 1, 2023

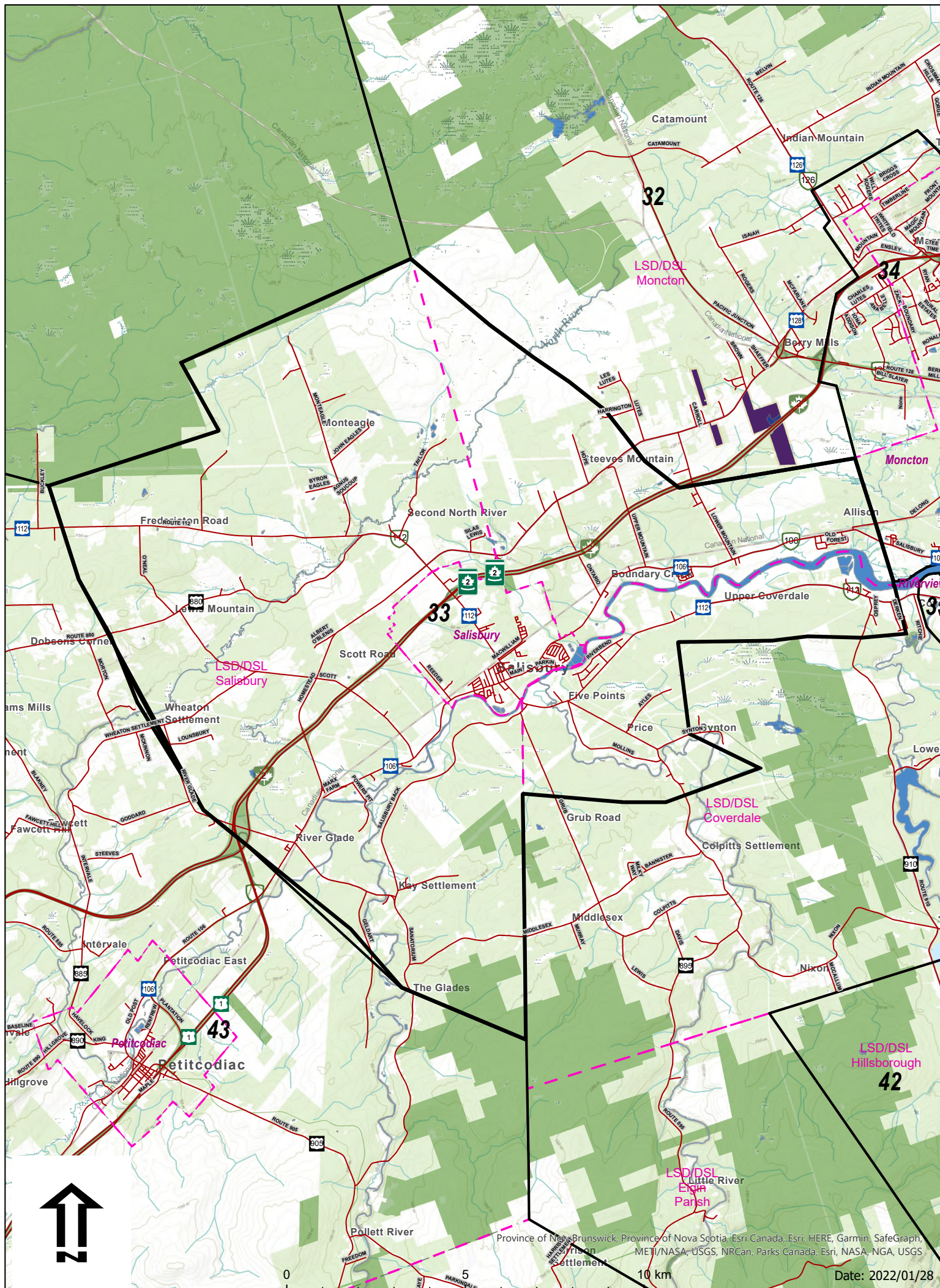
One of the rationale the province had on doing municipal reform was that 30% of the population could not vote locally on issues in their area.... in the case of the LSD's that are joining Salisbury those residents will now have a vote, and those residents can also run for council. This will mean the council composition we now have in Salisbury will change.

Under the new municipality there will be 7 councilors, with 3 Councilors coming from Salisbury and 3 from the LSD areas and one councilor at large (The Village currently has five councilors) , plus a Mayor. You can read about it in the report that can be found on the "Salisbury News and Happenings" FB page. It will also mean an election this coming November.

I use the word community for the area Entity 33 encompasses and did far before the Province of New Brunswick introduced this amalgamation, I have coached and been friends with families from Riverbend, Boundary Creek, River Glade, Coverdale, Salisbury West and always felt we shared the same rural values and way of life and all collectively worked together to make this area a better place for our families.

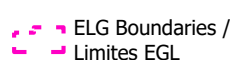

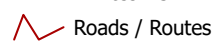

Change is coming to our community. The province is reshaping the way we govern our communities. The decision was made to merge the LSD's of Elgin Centre, Elgin Parish, 20% of Salisbury LSD and the Village of Petitcodiac to become one incorporated municipality.

The approach is ambitious, but we are confident that it will collectively lead to improvements for maintaining and improving services, give local and regional service representation to all areas, foster collaboration efforts for new businesses, industry, and economic growth accessing grants, setting tax rates based on services available and to develop by-laws to ensure fair and level governing of rules and regulations to suit unique community needs.

The new council will consist of five members in total: Mayor (elected at large), one Councillor seat (elected at large), and three seats available for Councillors from each Ward;

- Ward 1, North Ward (north of Petitcodiac)
- Ward 2, Petitcodiac Ward (existing village limits)
- Ward 3, South Ward (Elgin Center and Elgin Parish)

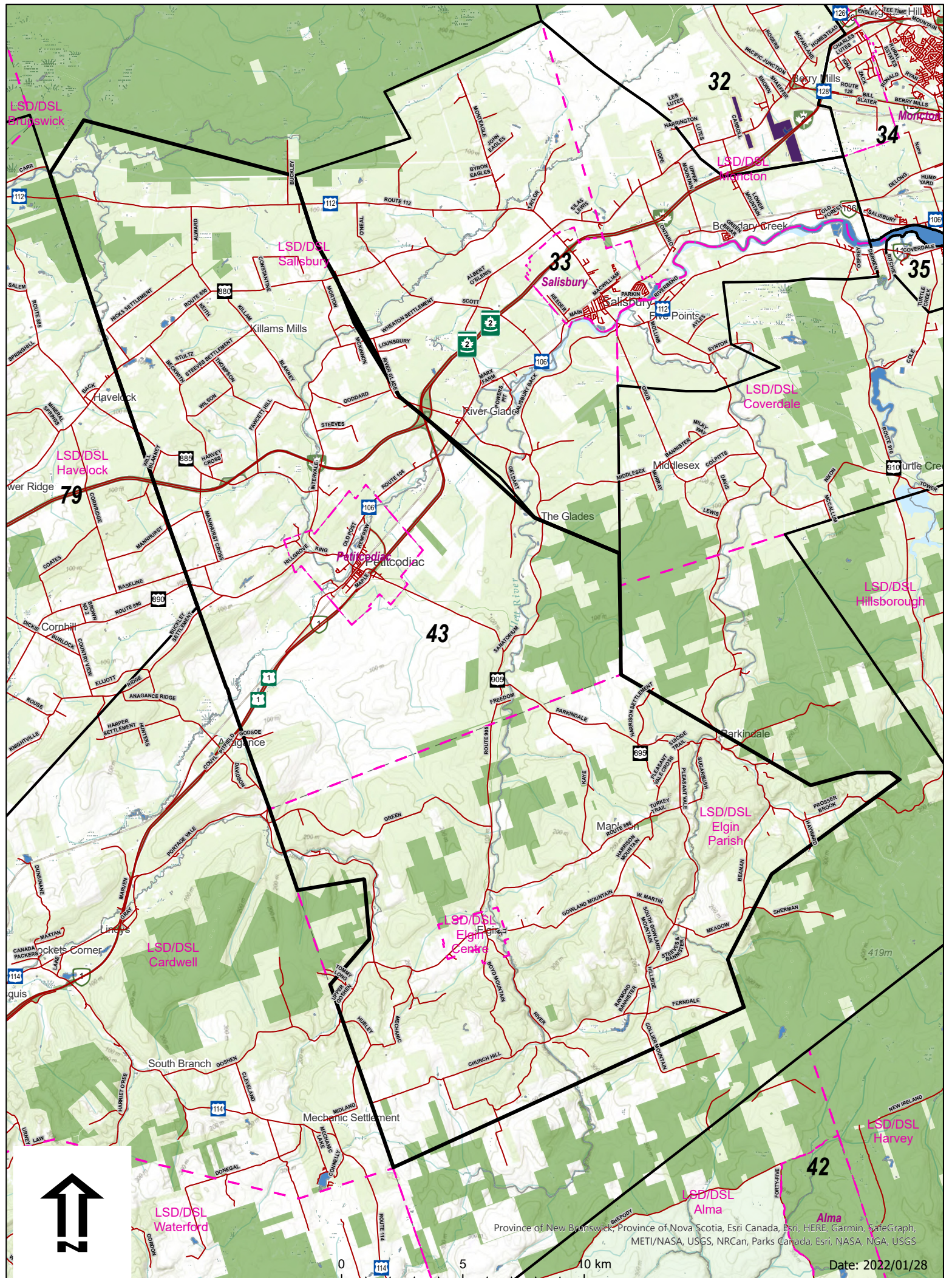

OPEN FIRES PROHIBITED

A reminder that the lighting of ANY open fire to dispose of dry grass, brush, hay, straw, leaves, buildings, construction materials, automobiles or garbage in the municipality is PROHIBITED. Any fires must be in approved appliances only. Salisbury Fire Rescue reserves the right to order any fires that are not in compliance with Salisbury's Fire By-Law (By-Law No. 48) to be extinguished, and are authorized to issue tickets as they may deem necessary to enforce this By-Law. By-Law No. 48 can be read in its entirety at <https://salisburynb.ca/> under the Village Office tab (By-Laws). This Fire By-Law also follows the direction of Provincial burning advisories/bans.

REMINDER - PAYMENT DUE FOR VILLAGE OF SALISBURY SEWER BILLS

The sewer rate for 2022 in the Village of Salisbury is \$325.00 per unit. Interest working out to 2% per month is added to all overdue sewer accounts, calculated from the billing date in January. Interest was applied in March and April to accounts with balances and will continue on a monthly basis for the rest of the year. Meantime, Salisbury By-Law No. 45, Relating to the Collection of User-Charges for the Sanitary Sewerage System, allows for disconnection of services on overdue accounts. The full by-law can be found on our website, <https://salisburynb.ca/>. Arrangements for overdue account payment plans must be made.

2022 SALISBURY DOG TAGS LATE FEES IN EFFECT

As of April 1st, late fees have been in effect for 2022 Village of Salisbury Dog Tags.

Factoring in this \$15 increase, registration fees are currently:
\$10.00 + \$15.00 = \$25.00 for spayed or neutered dogs
\$30.00 + \$15.00 = \$45.00 if not spayed or neutered.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of three (3) months shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against distemper and canine parvovirus and must repeat this process every two (2) years thereafter.

Every owner of a dog(s) over the age of four (4) months, shall have such dog(s) vaccinated against rabies and every three (3) years thereafter.

In order to buy a dog tag, you must show an official receipt from a licensed veterinarian hospital with the breed, colour and name of dog showing on receipt, as well as the veterinarian hospital tag number.

*** NO ONE WILL BE ISSUED A DOG TAG WITHOUT THE OFFICIAL RECEIPT. ***

Since April 1st, tags have only been available for purchase at the Village Office, 56 Douglas Street.

Meantime, New Brunswick SPCA is once again assuming Animal Control duties for the Village of Salisbury. Please direct any dog-related complaints or inquiries to NB SPCA at 1-877-722-1522.
